## WARRANT FOR TOWN MEETING

---

To Raymond A. Waterhouse, a Constable of Poland in the  
County of Androscoggin, and State of Maine:

Greeting:

In the name of the State of Maine you are hereby required by law to notify and warn the inhabitants of the Town of Poland qualified by law to vote in Town affairs to meet at the Town Hall in said Town of Poland on Monday, the ninth day of March, 1936, at nine o'clock in the forenoon to act on the following articles, to wit:

Article 1. To choose a moderator to preside at said meeting.

Art. 2. To hear and act upon reports of Town Officers and Committee on Accounts.

Art. 3. To see what sum of money the inhabitants of the Town will vote to raise and appropriate to pay the tuition of scholars attending High School of other towns and for Support of Common Schools and for textbooks and supplies.

Art. 4. To see what sum of money the inhabitants of the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for repairs of school property.

Art. 5. To see if the inhabitants of the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$100.00 for the health work in the schools. The rest of the bills to be paid by the Poland Red Cross.

Art. 6. To see if the inhabitants of the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$75.00 for school board.

Art. 7. To see what sum of money the inhabitants of the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the support of roads and bridges.

Art. 8. To see what sum of money the inhabitants of the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for Common Road Patrol.

Art. 9. To see if the inhabitants of the Town will vote "Yes" or "No" in regard to snow removal in Town for the winter of 1936-1937.

Art. 10. To see what sum of money the inhabitants of the Town will vote to raise and appropriate to pay snow bills.

Art. 11. To see what sum of money the inhabitants of the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for Snow Fence.

Art. 12. To see what sum of money the inhabitants of the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for State Aid Road Construction. The Town may raise any amount not exceeding two units.

Art. 13. To see if the inhabitants of the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$847.00 for maintenance of Third Class Road, such sums being necessary to prevent a forfeiture of apportionment from the State under provisions of Section 4, Chapter 260, of P. L. of 1929.

Art. 14. To see if the inhabitants of the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,641.20 for maintenance of State Highways and Special Resolve Highways during the ensuing year under provisions of Sections 9, 18, 36, 37 and 38, Chapter 28 of the Revised Statutes of 1930 and Section 9, Chapter 149, P. L. 1935.

Art. 15. To see if the inhabitants of the Town will vote to fix the compensation of the road crew, compensation for teams and trucks and for Town Officials.

Art. 16. To see what sum of money the inhabitants of the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for Salaries of Superintendent of Schools and other Town Officers.

Art. 17. To see what sum of money the inhabitants of the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the support of the poor.

Art. 18. To see what sum of money the inhabitants of the Town will vote to raise and appropriate to pay Collector's Commission and Abatements.

Art. 19. To see if the inhabitants of the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$600.00 to pay interest on Temporary Loans.

Art. 20. To see what sum of money the inhabitants of the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the Contingent Fund.

Art. 21. To see if the inhabitants of the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$3,210.00 to pay two Bonds and Interest due October 1, 1936.

Art. 22. To see if the inhabitants of the Town will vote to give the Tax Collector permission and authority to collect delinquent taxes, both real and personal, by the State Law.

Art. 23. To see if the inhabitants of the Town will vote to make all taxes due and payable on or before November 1, 1936.

Art. 24. To see if the inhabitants of the Town will vote to charge interest at the rate of 6% from November 1, 1936, on all taxes unpaid after December 1, 1936.

Art. 25. To see if the inhabitants of the Town will vote to allow on personal and real estate tax bills for 1936 a cash discount of 2% if paid on or before July 1, 1936.

Art. 26. To see if the inhabitants of the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to procure a temporary loan or

loans, not to exceed \$25,000.00, in anticipation of taxes for the purpose of paying obligations of the Town; such notes to be paid during the current municipal year out of money raised during said current municipal year by taxes.

Art. 27. To see if the inhabitants of the Town will vote to allow the Moderator to appoint a Committee of three, who shall nominate seven citizens of the Town of Poland, Maine, to act as a budget and advisory committee for the term of one year and to serve without pay, said nomination to be confirmed by vote of meeting.

Art. 28. To see if the inhabitants of the Town will vote to retain from bills due from the town, amounts due the town for unpaid taxes due from persons presenting such bills, which are one or more years in arrears.

Art. 29. To see if the inhabitants of the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$200.00 for Repairs of Town Buildings.

Art. 30. To see if the inhabitants of the Town will vote to authorize the tax-payers to call the nearest fire department in case of fire without permission from the Selectmen and have the Selectmen instruct the fire department to this effect.

Art. 31. To see if the inhabitants of the Town will vote to continue the Johnson Hill and Bailey Hill Schools for the School Year beginning September, 1936.

Art. 32. To see if the inhabitants of the Town will vote to have the town books audited for the ensuing year.

Art. 33. To see what sum of money, if any, the inhabitants of the Town will vote to raise and appropriate to donate to the A. A. Dwinal Post, G. A. R. to help defray expenses of Memorial Day.

Art. 34. To see if the inhabitants of the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$100.00 for street lights for Poland Corner.

Art. 35. To see if the inhabitants of the Town will vote to continue the Town Reports as recommended by the State Auditor.

Art. 36. To see if the inhabitants of the Town will vote to give Mrs. Jennie Emery permission to connect to the water pipe from the Town Hall and what will be the charge for the same.

Art. 37. To see if the inhabitants of the Town will vote to discontinue the so-called Hunt Road on Harris Hill, road closed subject to the abutters.

Art. 38. To see if the inhabitants of the Town will vote to authorize the Moderator to appoint a committee of three to challenge all illegal votes.

Art. 39. To see if the inhabitants of the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,384.79 to balance the overdrafts of 1935-1936.

Art. 40. To see if the inhabitants of the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$250.00 to be used with Federal money.

Art. 41 To see if the inhabitants of the Town will vote to accept the following:

To the Town of Poland, Maine, I give and bequeath the sum of Five Hundred (\$500.00) Dollars in trust for the following uses and purposes. This amount is to be placed at interest and such part of said sum as is necessary is to be used to build a new fence around the White Oak Hill Cemetery in said Poland. Said fence is to be built whenever, in the judgment of the Selectmen of the Town of Poland, it shall be necessary. Whatever may remain of the said Five Hundred (\$500.00) Dollars and accumulated interest after the building of said fence is to be added to the original "Otis W. Thurston Fund,"



Art. 42. To see if the inhabitants of the Town will vote to accept the following:

To the Town of Poland, Maine, I give and bequeath the sum of One Hundred Fifty (\$150.00) Dollars, in trust, to be invested and the interest to be used in the upkeep of cemetery lot numbered 93 in the Highland Cemetery of West Poland deeded to F. Storer and W. H. Storer.

Art. 43. To see if the inhabitants of the Town will vote to accept the following:

To the Town of Poland, Maine, I give and bequeath the sum of Four Hundred (\$400.00) Dollars, in trust, for the following uses and purposes. This amount is to be placed at interest and said interest to be used and expended for the general upkeep and maintenance of the Highland Cemetery at West Poland.

The Polls will be opened for balloting for Town Officers from Two o'clock until Seven o'clock in the afternoon.

The Selectmen give notice that they will be in session at the Town Office on March 5, 6, 7, 1936, in the afternoon from 1.00 to 5.00 o'clock for the purpose of correcting the list of voters.

## REPORT OF BUDGET COMMITTEE

---

Poland, Maine, February 24, 1936.

At the meeting of the Budget Committee, held in conjunction with the Board of Selectmen, at the Town Office on the above date it was agreed to recommend that the following amounts be raised for the several items of town business at the Annual Town Meeting to be held on March 9, 1936.

18. Compensation of Road Crew, 28 cents per hour.  
Trucks, \$1.00 per hour. Teams, \$5.00 per day.  
Selectmen, \$3.25 per day.
19. To allow on personal and real estate tax bills, a 2% cash discount if paid on or before July 1, 1936.
20. To authorize the Town Treasurer and Selectmen to secure necessary loan or loans not exceeding \$25,000.00, to be paid out of money raised by taxes during 1936.

We have held eight meetings during the year, with the Selectmen, the Superintending School Committee and as our own committee. We have not always agreed on all matters but have, in all cases after due deliberation, come to a harmonious decision, taking into consideration the best interests of the Town as a whole.

## REPORT OF AUDITOR

---

Augusta, Maine, February 24, 1936.

Selectmen of Poland, Maine.

Gentlemen:

This is to certify that we have examined the records of the Treasurer, Tax Collector and Selectmen which to the best of our knowledge and belief have been correctly kept.

Reports of your Treasurer, Tax Collector and Selectmen are enclosed in this report, also a Comparative Balance Sheet, Reconciliation of the Treasurer's Cash and a list of Accounts Payable that had to be carried forward into next year for payment.

Trust Funds, as shown in the Comparative Balance Sheet, are represented by Cash in the Bank, only interest from these funds is expended.

In closing the accounts of the year 1935, you will note that all Overdrafts and Unexpended Balances have been transferred to the Summary of Accounts instead of being carried forward to next year's accounts as has been the practice in other years. This year there was a Net Overdraft of \$1,384.79 which was added to your Net Town Debt account. This will explain the increase in your Net Town Debt figure over last year.

We do not recommend the printing of each name that might appear on a payroll as it seems entirely unnecessary and in most cases serves only in personal satisfaction to some who wish to find fault. The town records are at all

times available to any taxpayer who can get any information desired from them.

We wish at this time to thank your town officers for their courteous assistance during the examination of their books.

## REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

---

To the Superintending School Committee and Citizens of the Town of Poland:

Herewith is presented for your consideration a brief school report for the fiscal year 1935-36.

The annual school census which is taken in the month of April showed that there were in town at that time, 476 persons between the ages of 5 and 21, 246 boys and 230 girls, five more than was reported last year and seventy-five more than in April, 1932. Out of this number of young people 369 were attending school last fall, 289 in the local schools and 80 in various High Schools and Academies.

At the present time, six of the above have left school, leaving a secondary school enrollment of 74, all of whom will probably remain in school until the end of the spring term. There are 18 to be graduated in June, leaving 56 to continue in school. With 31 to finish the eighth grade this spring we may look forward to a secondary school registration of 87 for next fall term. Figuring that all of this eighth grade will enter schools where the tuition rate

will be \$25.00 for the fall term, the cost for the coming year will be something like this: winter term, \$1,655.00, spring term, \$1,610.00, fall term, \$2,242.00, a total of \$5,507.00. This, of course, is based on the supposition that no one will drop out of school and that every eighth grade pupil will enter some High School next fall. We cannot say definitely that this will be true, nor do we know whether or not some families with children of High School age will move into town, as is often the case. I have gone into this matter in considerable detail with the idea in mind of giving every citizen the information as to the reason why the above amount is recommended to be raised for High School tuition at the annual meeting.

Your attention is called to the tabular statements which accompany this report. They give a very good picture of school affairs, the number enrolled in each school, the number in each grade, the attendance, the teachers, etc., and are worthy of your consideration.

A few changes have taken place in the teaching force since last year. It became necessary, this fall, to employ an additional teacher at South Poland on account of the large registration at that school, and Miss Crissie Dunham, of Auburn, was appointed to that position the second week of school. Miss Rose Littlehale, of Auburn also, was at the Bailey Hill School for the fall term, being transferred to the Herrick Valley school at the beginning of the winter term, Miss Walton coming back to her old school at Bailey Hill. Both the new teachers are graduates of Normal School and are fitting into their positions very nicely. Miss Ina Cole, who had been on leave of absence for a year in order to complete her Normal course is back at West Poland Primary, taking the place of Miss Drew, who was transferred to the Hardscrabble school.

I feel that the children in the schools of Poland are fortunate in having for their teachers such a fine, well trained group of people. All of them, with one exception, are teachers of experience who have proven their worth in



previous years. Ten of them are graduates of Normal School, one is a college graduate, and all the others have had Normal training.

A good grade of work is being done by the pupils under the direction of these teachers. Accuracy is being insisted upon, good reading, both oral and silent is required, and those in the upper grades in particular, are being taught to think and reason for themselves, preparatory to being able to meet High School requirements. That the quality of teaching has been very good in past years, is shown by the quality of work done in various High Schools by Poland boys and girls, many of whom have always been on the honor roll and have earned honor parts for graduation.

The financial statement of the School Fund shows receipts of \$16,790.89 and expenditures of \$16,009.90, leaving a balance of \$780.99. The receipts were \$461.08 more than last year, and the expenditures \$242.82 less. The large balance to be carried forward is caused by the fact that several tuition bills for the winter term which are usually paid before books are closed, have not been received as yet. Also approximately \$200.00 more was received from the State and the town of Minot than was estimated a year ago. Had these tuition bills been in and had the receipts been what was estimated, we would have just about broken even. As it was, the teachers were given a 5% cut at the beginning of the spring term, while the extra amount received, as noted above, enabled us to employ the additional teacher at South Poland last fall.

As a matter of interest and comparison, the figures of receipts and expenditures of four years ago and the year just closed are given.

Please note that \$1,307.43 more has been paid for tuition this year, and that \$1,746.86 less has been paid for teachers salaries. Can we draw any other conclusion than that the ever increasing cost of tuition for a few young people has been paid by taking the money away from those who are responsible for the proper instruction of the large number of elementary pupils?

The Repairs account has a balance of \$56.23. The principal items of expense this year were the purchase of a new heater for the Minot Corner Grammar School, and for repair work at West Poland. At the latter school the chimney was raised three feet, and both rooms were thoroughly renovated, also new duck curtains were installed in the Grammar room.

The coming year it will be necessary to build a combined wood shed and toilet at Poland Corner. The toilet conditions at West Poland should be remedied, also ordinary repairs at every school must be attended to, as is the case each year. We should enter upon a program of outside painting and interior renovation at once. Nearly every building is in need of this type of work, and it is neither

economy nor good business to let them go too long. Let us remember that a good looking school building with well kept grounds is an asset to any town.

In closing I would like to thank the Committee, the teachers, and all those people who have helped to make this a successful school year.

## REPORT OF THE RED CROSS OF POLAND, MAINE

---

February 15, 1936

**All Children Wish To Be Well Children. We Have Failed Them If We Have Not Made Every Effort To Help Them Win Their Aim.**

This year the 15 schools of Poland observed Health Days on May 20th and 21st, also in September. Several children were accompanied by their parents who availed themselves of the splendid opportunity to talk over their problems with the physicians, dentists and the nurse. All children came to Minot Corner and West Poland schools for their examinations.

This is the first year that Poland schools have had a Health Day and the parents showed their interest and co-operated by attending and suggesting that the Health Day be repeated.

The Health Days were arranged by the Poland school board, assisted by the Poland Red Cross and the County school nurse. Dr. Charles Steele of Auburn, Dr. Donald Wright and Dr. W. M. Scott of Lewiston examined all the children coming to Minot Corner Health Day. Dr. Robert J. Wiseman, Jr. of Lewiston examined all the children coming to the West Poland clinic. He was assisted by Miss Clara Tapley, dental hygienist of the Lewiston-Auburn Red Cross and the County school nurse.

A total of 560 children were examined with the following results: 37 children had defective vision, 1 had defective hearing, 341 had teeth defects, 53 had enlarged tonsils, 8 had skin defects, 5 had defective glands and 3 had heart defects.

All children were weighed and measured and 19 were under weight. 346 notices were sent to parents and 96 home visits were made to give help necessary in planning for the corrective work for the children. 42 children have qualified for the 7 point health award and have received pins and certificates. This means that these 42 boys and girls have well bodies, free from defects. These children have turned the cornerstone of success by beginning life with a healthy body.

Many parents have provided the needed corrections and others have been aided, in securing what was needed for the health of their children.

Eleven have been fitted to glasses and are now able to attend school. They can really see their work instead of guessing, or have someone read their work for them. The strain on these children's eyes is now gone. 86 have had dental corrections and now have a normal looking mouth. They also may enjoy their meals each day without the danger of toothache. 16 have returned to school after having hospital treatment for enlarged tonsils. These children now feel alert and are able to do their school work without always feeling tired, as they had previously done. 6 have received medical treatment for skin defects. No truer words can be found than those of one mother who said, "I want to do all I can to provide my child with the necessary equipment to earn his living and that necessary equipment is a HEALTHY BODY."

We are proud to say more than one-half of the defective teeth of our children have been corrected, and up to date the Poland Chapter has spent \$176 on the children of our schools this year.

Five persons have been vaccinated as a precaution against small pox. Twenty-four have been cultured as possible suspects for diphtheria and 24000 units of anti toxin have been administered. Three schools have been visited by our Physician to relieve the spread of impetigo and treatment given to all affected. Permission was granted for one person to return to their home outside our Town and sixty given permission to leave for their homes outside this State. Two homes have been disinfected and we now have one residence under quarantine for diphtheria.

Mr. Elmer Walker of South Poland and Mr. A. F. Waterhouse of West Poland were appointed plumbing inspector and deputy, and were confirmed by the State Department for 1936.

During March free vaccination will be given to all who apply as a precaution against small pox.

We wish to express our appreciation to all for their cooperation and wish to emphasize the fact that all communicable diseases are required by law to be reported to this office.
