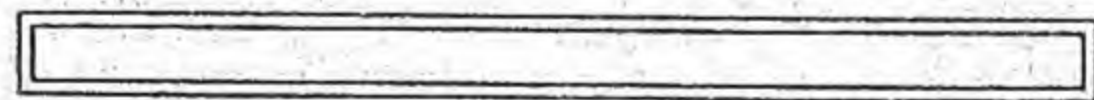

School Report.

To the citizens of the Town of Winterport:—

We respectfully submit the following report of the schools and of their financial condition for the year 1919-20.

The village schools have been in charge of teachers as follows:

Grammar, Ruby C. Gray; Intermediate, Geneva Thompson; Upper Primary, Grace Thompson; Lower Primary, Almira Porter. They are all teachers of training and experience. Most excellent results have been obtained although the schools have been broken somewhat by the whooping cough.

The rural schools have been under the direction of the following teachers. The first fourteen weeks of the Fisher school were taught by Mrs. Gertrude Robertson, a normal graduate and teacher of experience. She resigned and Miss Hazel Lowe was transferred from the Ellingwood's Corner school to the Fisher school, Miss Lela Hunting taking charge of the Ellingwood's Corner school. Mrs. Lois Marden taught the Lowell school twelve weeks but on account of sickness was unable to continue and Miss Marguerite M. Bartlett has since had it in charge.

Miss Velma Myrick teaches the Martin school and Miss E. Marguerite Page, who took the special training course for rural school teachers at Castine during the summer of 1919, teaches the Whittier school.

We think the attendance, generally speaking, has been the best we have ever known it to be and the children are making excellent progress under the very careful instruction of these teachers.

CONVEYANCE.

The scholars from the Cole's Corner road have been conveyed to the Whittier school by Mr. Albert S. Twining. Conveyance is furnished to the Martin school by Mr. Homer Tasker, Mr. Maurice Clark and Mr. Eugene Ritchie. Mr. John Fields conveys Juanita Fields and Dale Dyer to the Fisher school. Mr. G. Dunton furnishes conveyance to the village school for the Gamble and Arbuckle children.

FUEL.

Fuel has been bought as usual by members of the school committee.

REPAIRS.

The Whittier school has been remodeled, the wood shed and toilets annexed. With a new floor, more windows and new paper and paint inside, the schoolhouse has been made very wholesome and attractive.

EQUALIZATION FUND.

As advised last year the balance, \$83.02 and \$60.00 received this year have been expended in repairing the Whittier school.

SPECIAL EQUALIZATION FUND.

We have received from the state to be expended for our High School the amount of \$200:

Applying on teachers' wages	\$100 00
Providing for equipment	50 00

We have also received from the state credited to the Common School account \$300.

Increasing wages of better qualified teachers	\$270 00
Toward connection of outbuildings at Martin and Fisher schools	\$60 00

TEXT BOOKS.

No changes in text books have been made. We have not been able to buy books enough to supply the demand this year, only those which were absolutely necessary have been bought.

Insurance, Apparatus, Appliances, etc. A fair amount of equipment and material has been bought. The state gave us \$50 toward equipment.

Mrs. Niles very kindly gave the high school a small laboratory equipment consisting of chemicals, apparatus, cases and shelving—a valuable little laboratory. We highly appreciate her thoughtful generosity.

HIGH SCHOOL.

We were very fortunate in securing for our high school, two teachers so well fitted for the work, H. P. Andrews, Principal and Miss Melvina Trecarton, Assistant Principal.

Report of the High School Principal.

To the Officers and Citizens of the town of Winterport.

The following report of the high school for 1919-20 is respectfully submitted:

From the opening of the school Sept. 8, 1919, we have had a good attendance, 49 students being registered the first day, of which 43 have remained throughout the year. The daily attendance of the students has been in general very good, altho there have been some instances of irregular attendance. Most of these are due to sickness and to severe weather conditions prevailing during the winter.

We were obliged to close the school for a week during the influenza epidemic and to lose two or three days on account of severe snow storms this winter. This has been the general experience of schools throughout the state and we have lost very little time compared with schools in other localities.

Reports received from graduates who are pursuing collegiate studies are very satisfactory and indicate that the school has maintained a suitable standard of instruction. The work of a student in college, especially during the first year is an indicator of the preparation he has received in the secondary school, and it is our intention to provide each student with such a

foundation for his college work as will allow him to grasp it in a thorough and comprehensive manner.

For those students who do not expect to take up further courses of study, the high school curriculum is designed to give a broad and general training, which should enable them to become useful and intelligent citizens of the community in which they live.

The high school has received a valuable and useful gift this year in the form of a complete set of laboratory equipment and chemicals. This was presented by Mrs. Margaret Abbot Niles in memory of her son, Albion Keith Bolan, a graduate of the school, who gave up his life while in the service of his country during the late war. Mrs. Niles has also made several valuable additions to the school.

I wish to take this opportunity of expressing my appreciation of the able and efficient service of the School Board and the Superintendent of Schools, who have shown a very helpful and sympathetic cooperation in the school work.

To the parents and friends of the students appreciation is also due for their interest and cooperation in all matters pertaining to the school. There is no influence felt any more strongly in a school than home influence and the advice and support of the parents of the students greatly increases the efficiency of the school and the standing attained by the students in their attendance and school work.

In closing let me say that now, as never before, the world is waking up to the need of better education and better facilities for education; and the kind of men and women who are to be our future citizens depends on the effort we make now to provide them with the most modern, healthful and efficient means of training them for their life work.

To Joshua Treat, Jr., a Constable in the town of Winterport, in said County, Greeting:—

In the name of the State of Maine you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of said Town of Winterport, qualified by law to vote in town affairs, to assemble in Union Hall, in said town on Monday, March 22, 1920 at 10 o'clock a. m., to act on the following articles, to wit:

Art. 1. To choose a Moderator to preside at said meeting.

Art. 2. To choose a clerk for the ensuing year.

Art. 3. To choose three or more Selectmen.

Art. 4. To choose a Town Treasurer.

Art. 5. To see what sums of money the town will vote to raise for the support of Common Schools, for Free High School, for the repairs of Schoolhouses, for School Supplies and for Free Text Books.

Art. 6. To see if the town will vote "yes" or "no" on the question of appropriating and raising money necessary to entitle the town to State aid as provided in Section 20 of Chapter 130 of the Public Laws of 1913.

Art. 7. To see if the town will appropriate and raise the sum of \$533.00 for the improvement of the section of State Aid road, as outlined in the report of the State Highway Commissioner, in addition to the amount regularly raised for the care of ways, highways and bridges; the above amount being the maximum which the town is allowed to raise under the provisions of Section 9 and 18 of the Public Laws of 1913.

Art. 8. To see whether the town will vote to raise money, and what sums, for the maintainance of State and State Aid highway during the ensuing year, within the limits of the town, under the provisions of Section 9 and 18 of the Public Laws of 1913.

Art. 9. To see what sums of money the town will vote to raise for the Repair of Highways and Bridges and for Clearing the Snow from Roads during the coming winter.

Art. 10. To see what sums of money the town vote to raise for the Support of Poor, Salaries of Officers, for Abate-ments, for Hydrant Rental and other Miscellaneous Town Charges.

Art. 11. To see what sums of money the town will vote to raise for Memorial Purposes, Free Library, Winding Town Clock and Lighting Streets.

Art. 12. To see how many Road Commissioners the town will vote to have, or if they will allow the Selectmen to try the System of Patrolmen.

Art. 13. To fix the rate of discount, if any, for the prompt payment of Taxes and the time when such discount shall cease; to fix the time when the taxes due the town for the year 1920 shall become payable and collectable; to determine whether interest shall be charged on taxes remaining unpaid after that date and the rate of such interest, to see if the town will vote to instruct its Collector of Taxes for the ensuing year to collect all such taxes within the limit made by the State Laws for the Collection of Taxes, and instruct the Municipal Officers to require the Collector to give a bond for his faithful compliance with the vote under this article.

Art. 14. To fix the compensation of the Collector of Taxes for the ensuing year.

Art. 15. To choose a Collector of Taxes.

Art. 16. To choose three or more Assessors of Taxes.

Art. 17. To choose three or more Overseers of the Poor.

Art. 18. To choose one or more Members of the Superin-tending School Committee.

Art. 19. To choose a Town Agent.

Art. 20. To choose an Auditor of Accounts.

Art. 21. To choose one or more Constables.

Art. 22. To choose one or more Fire Wardens.

Art. 23. To choose a Fire Inspector.

Art. 24. To choose one or more Fence Viewers.

Art. 25. To choose one or more Measurers of Wood and

Bark and Lumber, Shingles, Clapboards, Hoops and Staves.

Art. 26. To choose one or more Sealers of Leather and Sealers of Weights and Measures.

Art. 27. To ascertain if the Town will vote to authorize and empower the Selectmen to negotiate and join with the Selectmen from other Towns of the County and Municipal Officers of the City of Belfast in the purchase or lease of a farm or property within the corporate limits of the City of Belfast, to be used as a Waldo County Home for the Aged and Infirm Persons of the City of Belfast and the Towns of Waldo County which may join in the undertaking, on such a pro rata basis as may be arranged and agreed upon and for such term of years as may be likewise agreed upon.

Art. 28. To see if the town will vote to accept from the estate of Persinia W. Cole the sum of one hundred dollars (\$100), the income therefrom to be expended annually for the perpetual care of the burial lot of Benjamin F. Cole in the cemetery at Ellingwood's Corner, in Winterport.
