

To E. E. Megquire, Constable of the Town of Glenburn in said County:

GREETING:

In the name of the State of Maine you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of said town of Glenburn qualified by law to vote in town affairs, to assemble at the town hall at Glenburn Center on Monday, the 13th day of March, A. D., 1916, at 10 o'clock in the forenoon to act on the following articles, viz.:

- Art. 1. To choose a moderator to preside at said meeting.
- Art. 2. To choose a town clerk for the ensuing year.
- Art. 3. To act on the reports of town officers for past year.
- Art. 4. To choose a board of selectmen, assessors and overseers of poor for the ensuing year.
 - Art. 5. To choose a town treasurer for the ensuing year.
- Art. 6. To choose one member of the school board for three years.
- Art. 7. To see if the town will vote to have one or more road commissioners appointed.
 - Art. 8. To elect one or more fire wards for the ensuing year.
- Art. 9. To see if the town will vote "yes" or "no" on the question of appropriating and raising money necessary to entitle the town to state aid as provided in section 20, of chapter 130, of the Public Laws of 1913.
- Art. 10. To see if the town will appropriate and raise the sum of \$300.00 for the improvement of the section of the State Aid road as outlined in the State highways commissioners in addition to the amounts regularly raised for the care of ways, highways and

bridges, the above amount being the maximum which the town is allowed to raise under the provisions of Section 19, of Chapter 130, of the Public Laws of 1913.

- Art. 11. To see whether the town will vote to raise money and what sum for the maintenance for the state highways during the ensuing year within the limits of the town, under the provisions of section 9 of chapter 130 of the Public Laws of 1913.
- Art. 12. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for roads and bridges.
- Art. 13. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for support of poor.
- Art. 14. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for support of schools.
- Art. 15. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for school supplies.
- Art. 16. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for free text books.
- Art. 17. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for repair on schoolhouses.
- Art. 18. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for high school tuition.
- Art. 19. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise to pay interest on school fund.
- Art. 20. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for Memorial purposes.
- Art. 21. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for cemetery purposes.
- Art. 22. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$15.00 to be expended in the East Side Cemetery.
- Art. 23. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise to be expended on the cemeteries in the west side of town.
- Art. 24. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for cutting bushes in the highway as the laws of the state requires.

- Art. 25. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise to pay on town hall debt.
- Art. 26. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for incidental purposes.
- Art. 27. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$50.00 to be expended on Gibbs hill so called.
- Art. 28. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise to destroy brown tail moth nests.
- Art. 29. To see if the town will vote to reimburse the sum of \$3.30 the sum paid by Chas. Howard for taxes paid on land owned by Major Strout, 1914.
- Art. 30. To see if the town will vote to reimburse G. W. Vickery, Supt. of Schools on graduation exercises.
- Art. 31. To see if the town will vote to remove the remains of unknown bodies to the East Side Cemetery, now in Ed Canty gravel bank.
- Art. 32. To see if the town will vote to buy or hire a piano for use of hall.
- Art. 33. To see if the town will vote to abate part of Howard Bunker tax for the year 1915.
- Art. 34. To see if the town will vote to authorize its superintending school committee to join with some town or towns for the purpose of employing a superintendent of schools in accordance with the provisions of section 40 to 45 inclusive of Chapter 15 of the revised statute.
- Art. 35. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the salary of superintendent of schools for the ensuing year.
- Art. 36. To see if the town will accept the list of jurors as prepared by the municipal officers.
- Art. 37. To see what action the town will take relative to collection of taxes.
- Art. 38. To choose all necessary town officers required by law to be chosen at annual town meeting.

The Selectmen will be in session at the town hall in said Glenburn on the 13th day of March, A. D., 1916, at 9 o'clock in the forenoon for the purpose of correcting the list of voters.

Report of Superintendent of Schools

To the School Committee of the Town of Glenburn:

Gentlemen:—I herewith submit my second annual report of the condition and progress of the public schools of Glenburn. This has been a very successful year in our schools and the pupils have made excellent progress in their studies.

And here I wish to say that I am very proud of the Glenburn In the two years that I have been connected with them I have never had a complaint from a teacher in regard to the conduct of her pupils on the contrary they have had nothing but praise for the good conduct and ability of their pupils. The most difficult thing I have had to contend with in my years work has been the frequent change of teachers. The spring term in Center School was taught by Miss Gladys Galvin, this being her fourth term in this school and was up to her usual high standard; as Miss Galvin decided to make a change, Miss Opal Myrick was engaged for the fall term, which she taught very successfully but declined to return for the winter and Miss Alice Nickerson was engaged for the winter, who proved to be a very able teacher and the pupils showed marked improvement. The spring term in the Gibbs School was taught by Miss Leola E. Archer, this being her fourth term in this school. I cannot say too much in praise of her work. Much to the regret of both parents and pupils Miss Archer declined to return and Miss Helen Williams was engaged for the fall term which she taught successfully but decided to return home. Miss Mildred Batson was engaged for the winter term and proved to be an exceptionally able teacher.

The spring term in the Vickery school was taught by Miss Beulah Hardison, this being her second term in this school both of which she taught successfully. Owing to the marriage of Miss Hardison we had to secure another teacher for the fall term, and we were fortunate in securing Miss Marion Arey who taught

the fall and winter terms in a very satisfactory and successful maner.

In the West school Miss Annie B. Clemmons was engaged for the spring term and we were fortunate in retaining her through the year as she has the ability that would guarantee success in any school in which she may be placed.

REPAIRS AND IMPROVEMENTS

There has been a new outbuilding built at the center school which is a great improvement over the disreputable one it replaced. The building at this school needs painting badly.

The West Schoolhouse needs two windows placed in the back end as the light is very poor. It also needs a new outbuilding containing room for wood and toilet. The outbuilding at the Vickery school needs repair, and the house in the Gibbs school will have to be almost entirely rebuilt.

TEXT BOOKS

As was the case last year, this fund has been overdrawn owing to the change of grammars and the large number of supplementary readers required. This with the new books for the tenth grade and to replace the old books make up the amount. This may seem a large amount but it is absolutely necessary if our schools are to reach the high standard we have set for them.

HOPEFUL SIGNS

An increasing demand for the best in teachers methods and equipment.

A growing pride in our schools.

The large number of pupils preparing for high school.

One thing that must be banished, the filthy outhouse.

SOME THINGS TO WORK FOR

More attractive schoolrooms.

Better school equipment.

Better attendance. Poor attendance is the greatest fault of our schools and is one for which the parents are wholly responsible and should be improved that our schools maintain their present standard of thirty four weeks a year, more if possible.

And we should make a determined effort to maintain the thirty-four week school and to make it thirty-six if possible.
