REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

GLENBURN, MAINE

To the Superintending School Committee and Citizens of Glen-burn:

I hereby submit my first annual report of the Glenburn schools for the municipal year ending March 1, 1923.

As I did not become your superintendent until July first I cannot give you any report of the spring term other than financial and so I will confine my review of the work to the two terms which have come under my observation.

In the Center School the work has gone very smoothly and satisfactory progress has been made. As the former teacher was retained in the school the work was not retarded at the beginning of the school year as is always the case when a change of teachers is made.

At West Glenburn there has been considerable interference with the school work on account of delay in the completion of the building, and illness which resulted in having to change teachers soon after the fall term opened. However, during the winter term there has been no interruption and the work is progressing in a satisfactory and pleasing manner. Hot lunches are being served to the children under the direction of the teacher and this adds much to the interest and general welfare of the school.

During the fall term a course of study containing the essential elementary requirements of the State Department was placed in each school, and since that time the teachers have endeavored to see that the children were receiving the proper training for the grades in which they are enrolled. The modern geographies which were recommended by your former superintendent were placed in the schools during the fall term.

The schoolhouse at West Glenburn has been rebuilt and accepted as a modern school building by the State Department. Such a building is a credit and asset to the town and I congratulate you upon the improvements which you have begun.

This year you will have thirty six weeks of school which if continued will give to your children as good a foundation as is given to those residing in larger towns, so that within a few years you may be able to adopt the eight grade system.

The arrangement with Bangor whereby the scholars in the lower part of the town could attend the Sherburn School has been renewed this year, and I hope in time it may become a permanent institution.

Now I wish to call your attention to some of the needs of the coming year. It is not for the best interests of the scholars to shorten your school year and I believe if you will maintain thirty six weeks during the coming year the results will be so satisfactory that you will never have a less number. The supply of maps, charts, primary devices, reference books, and dictionaries is very inadequate, and without this necessary equipment it is impossible for a teacher to obtain the best results.

According to the new state law, before Sept. 1, 1924 all school buildings must be equipped with sanitary toilets which meet the approval of the State Department. As nearly as I can ascertain this will cost under ordinary conditions from \$300.00 to \$400.00 per school building. It will be necessary for you to build one of these at the Center schoolhouse before the date mentioned. Now there is a state law to the effect that if any repairs or alterations upon a school building exceed \$500.00 the plans must be approved by the State Superintendent of Schools and the State Board of Health. This approval would probably compel the remodeling of the building to meet modern requirements. As the Center schoolhouse is in poor repair there is a chance that the toilet could not be built and attached to the building as the law requires without making the total expense more than \$500.00. In such a case the greater part of your work might be lost as you would be obliged to tear away parts already finished in order to rebuild upon modern lines. Therefore it seems to me that it would be better for the town if the plans of last year should be carried out—the remodeling of the Center schoolhouse along the same lines as the one at West Glenburn.

I have studied the conditions carefully and make the following recommendations for the coming year. If you wish to hold your schools to their present standard you will need the same appropriation for common schools as you had last year—\$2500.00. As the financial report shows a balance of \$184.73 in the high school account, I think an appropriation of \$50 would be sufficient to meet the needs of the high school tuition. The West Glenburn school building will need to be painted this spring and to meet this expense and the cost of remodeling the Center building I would recommend an appropriation on the repair account of \$1300.00.

During the past eight months I have enjoyed my work as your superintendent and I wish to thank the citizens for their kindness and cooperation, the members of the school committee for their advice and support, the teachers for the energy and loyalty they have shown, and the children for their interest and effort. Asking that you may continue the improvements in school work which you have begun and with best wishes for your schools and scholars during the coming year, I will close this part of my report and present for your inspection the financial summary of the past year.
