

WARRANT FOR TOWN MEETING

To Raymond A. Waterhouse, a Constable of Poland in the County of Androscoggin, and State of Maine:

Greeting:

In the name of the State of Maine you are hereby required by law to notify and warn the inhabitants of the Town of Poland qualified by law to vote in Town affairs to meet at the Town Hall in said Town of Poland on Monday, the fourteenth day of March, 1938, at nine o'clock in the forenoon to act on the following articles, to wit:

- Article 1. To choose a moderator to preside at said meeting.
- Art. 2. To hear and act upon the reports of Town Officers.
- Art. 3. To see what sum of money the inhabitants of the Town will vote to raise and appropriate to pay the tuition of scholars attending High Schools of other towns and for Support of Common Schools and for text-books and supplies.
- Art. 4. To see what sum of money the inhabitants of the town will vote to raise and appropriate for repairs of school property.
- Art. 5. To see if the inhabitants of the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$100.00 for the health work in schools, the rest of the bills to be paid by the Poland Red Cross.

- Art. 6. To see if the inhabitants of the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$75.00 for school board.
- Art. 7. To see what sum of money the inhabitants of the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the support of roads and bridges.
- Art. 8. To see what sum of money the inhabitants of the town will vote to raise and appropriate for Common Road Patrol.
- Art. 9. To see if the inhabitants of the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$300.00 to resurface the Schellinger Road. This road was built by special appropriation.
- Art. 10. To see if the inhabitants of the town will vote "yes" or "no" in regard to snow removal in the town for the winter of 1938-1939.
- Art. 11. To see what sum of money the inhabitants of the town will vote to raise and appropriate to pay snow bills.
- Art. 12. To see what sum of money the inhabitants of the town will approve for State Aid Road Construction (in addition to the amounts regularly raised for the care of ways, highways, and bridges) under the provisions of Section 19, Chapter 28, Revised Statutes of 1930 or under the provisions of Section 3, Chapter 229, Public Laws of 1937.
- Art. 13. To see if the inhabitants of the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,019.00 for maintenance of Third Class Roads under provisions of Sections 44 and 46. Chapter 28, R. S. 1930, as amended by Sections 4 and 5 of Chapter 229, P. L. 1937.

- Art. 14. To see if the inhabitants of the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,974.00 for maintenance of State Highways and Special Resolve Highways during the ensuing year under provisions of Sections 9, 18, 36, 37, and 38. Chapter 28 of R. S. 1930 and Section 9, Chapter 149, P. L. 1935.
- Art. 15. To see if the inhabitants of the town will vote to fix the compensation of the road crew, compensation of teams and trucks and for Town Officials and receive bids from candidates for tax collector.
- Art. 16. To see what sum of money the inhabitants of the town will vote to raise and appropriate for Salaries of Superintendent of Schools and other Town Officers.
- Art. 17. To see what sum of money the inhabitants of the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the support of the poor.
- Art. 18. To see if the inhabitants of the town will vote to give the Tax Collector permission and authority to collect delinquent taxes, both real and personal, by State Law.
- Art. 19. To see if the inhabitants of the town will vote to allow on personal and real estate tax bills for 1938, a cash discount of 2% if paid on or before July 1, 1938.
- Art. 20. To see if the inhabitants of the town will vote to make all taxes due and payable on or before November 1, 1938.
- Art. 21. To see what sum of money the inhabitants of the town will vote to raise and appropriate to pay Collector's Commissions, Abatements, and discount on taxes.

- Art. 22. To determine whether the inhabitants of the town will vote to authorize and empower the Selectmen and Treasurer to sell at public or private sale in such manner on such conditions for such amounts and upon such terms of payment as they in their discretion may deem advisable any or all real estate now held by the town, title to which is claimed by the town, either by virtue of the tax deed lien procedure, provided by Section 72 of Chapter 14 of the Revised Statutes of 1930 et sequi, or by virtue of the tax mortgage lien procedure provided by Chapter 244, P. L. of 1933 et sequi.
- Art. 23. To determine whether the inhabitants of the town will vote to authorize the Town Treasurer to sign, seal, execute, and deliver good and sufficient quit claim deeds without covenant to any and all purchasers of property sold under the terms and provisions of the vote set out in the above article of this warrant. This article is not to be voted upon in event the vote upon the proposition set out in the above article of this warrant is negative.
- Art. 24. To see if the inhabitants of the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen and Treasurer to procure a temporary loan or loans not to exceed \$25,000.00 in anticipation of taxes for the purpose of paying obligations of the town; such notes to be paid during the current municipal year out of money raised during said current municipal year by taxes.
- Art. 25. To see if the inhabitants of the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$350.00 to pay interest on Temporary Loans.
- Art. 26. To see if the inhabitants of the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$3,050.70 to pay two Bonds and Interest due April 1, 1938 and October 1, 1938.

- Art. 27. To see what sum of money the inhabitants of the town will vote to raise and appropriate for Contingent Fund.
- Art. 28. To see if the inhabitants of the town will vote to allow the Moderator to appoint a Committee of three, who shall nominate seven citizens of the Town of Poland, Maine, to act as a Budget and Advisory Committee for the term of one year and to serve without pay, said nominations to be confirmed by vote of meeting.
- Art. 29. To see if the inhabitants of the town will vote to retain from bills due from the town, amount due the town for unpaid taxes due from persons presenting such bills, which are one or more years in arrears.
- Art. 30. To see if the inhabitants of the town will vote to authorize the taxpayers to call the nearest fire department in case of fire without permission from the selectmen, and have the selectmen instruct the fire department to this effect.
- Art. 31. To see if the inhabitants of the town will vote to continue the Harris Hill School for the year beginning September, 1938.
- Art. 32. To see if the inhabitants of the town will vote to have the town books audited for the ensuing year.
- Art. 33. To see if the inhabitants of the town will vote to insure any or all of the schoolhouses and raise money for the same.
- Art. 34. To see if the inhabitants of the town will vote to sell the Range Hill Schoolhouse.

- Art. 35. To see if the inhabitants of the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000.00, the same to be used with Federal Money. If no Federal Money is available this amount be transferred to Poor Amount if needed.
- Art. 36. To see if the inhabitants of the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$100.00 for repairs of Town Buildings.
- Art. 37. To see if the inhabitants of the town will vote to accept the ballots now in use or new form of ballots
- Art. 38. To see if the town will vote to choose a Committee to dispose of the Town Farm properties and such other real estate belonging to the Town of Poland, as it may seem advisable to dispose of. Such Committee to be given full authority to accept such prices as they may think for the best interest of the Town and to proceed in such manner as they may see fit to effect the sales.
- Art. 39. If a favorable vote on preceding article, to see what methods will be used in selecting the Committee, the number thereof, and choose the members.
- Art. 40. To see what disposal will be made of such moneys as may be collected under said articles.
- Art. 41. To see what sum of money the inhabitants of the town will vote to raise and appropriate to be expended and used for advertising the natural resources, advantages, and attractions of the State of Maine.

The Polls will be opened for balloting for Town Officers from Two o'clock until Seven o'clock in the afternoon.

The Selectmen give notice that they will be in session at the Town Office on March 10, 11, 12, 1938, in the afternoon from 1:00 to 5:00 o'clock for the purpose of correcting the list of voters.

REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the Superintending School Committee and citizens of the Town of Poland:

Herewith is presented for your consideration a brief report of school affairs for the year ending Feb. 12, 1938.

According to the school census which is sent to the state each year in April, there were in town 479 persons between the ages of 5 and 21, 249 boys and 230 girls, a gain of 12 over the number reported the previous year. We found 367 Poland pupils attending school last fall, 306 in the local schools and 61 in various High Schools and Academies. 31 Minot pupils were attending the Minot Corner and Hacketts Mills schools, a somewhat larger number than usual.

Five of these students have left school since the beginning of the fall term leaving at the present writing 56 in school. With 19 to be graduated and about 22 to enter next fall the enrollment in High Schools next fall will not be quite as large as usual, unless some new residents move into town.

The teaching force is about the same as last year. Miss Drew, who taught at West Poland Primary last year, did not accept reelection and her place is taken by Glenys Walker who has been teaching at Lower White Oak Hill for several years. This latter school is closed by the operation of the state law for small attendance and those pupils are being transported to Upper White Oak Hill where Ina McMorran is the new teacher. Mrs. Hanscom, teacher at Bailey Hill, and Mrs. Brown. teacher at Harris Hill have resigned during the present term, their places being taken by Edna Durgin and Rita Sargent respectively.

It is a pleasure to state that the schools are progressing finely in every respect, that the children are being taught well, and are being kept up to a high standard.

We maintained a 35 week school year for the year closing last June for the first time in the history of the town and it is planned to have 36 weeks the present year. This will put Poland on a par with neighboring towns and will give the children a much better opportunity for preparation for High School.

Considerable very necessary repair work was done during the summer, particularly at West Poland, Upper White Oak Hill, Empire, and Bailey Hill. The last three mentioned were painted both inside and out. The lighting was changed and a new 12 foot slate blackboard installed at the Empire school, making a great improvement to that building. At West Poland, shingling the back side and making the toilet conditions more sanitary made the largest expense in the repair account.

For next year it is recommended that the upper side of the roof at West Poland be shingled, and at least two buildings be painted and the lighting changed to conform to State standards.

Since last year at this time electric lights have been installed at West Poland, Upper White Oak Hill, Harris Hill and Hacketts Mills. This has been done wholly by the schools, and speaks very highly for the enterprise and

interest of the teachers, pupils and citizens of those communities, for it is no easy task to raise the money for these purposes. There remain now only three buildings in active use that are not equipped with electric lights.

The budget for the coming year is published in this report and calls for the same amount that was recommended last year by the Committee, \$14,000.00 for the operation of the schools and \$1,000.00 for repairs. This does not contemplate any changes in salaries for teaching or transportation, and is an amount sufficient to carry on a 36 week school year for the benefit of Poland children.

In closing, I wish to thank the Committee members, teachers and citizens of the town for their cooperation in making the past year one of success.

REPORT OF THE RED CROSS COUNTY SCHOOL NURSE

POLAND SCHOOLS

November 1, 1937

The school children of Poland had their annual inspection and follow-up by the nurse from the Lewiston-Auburn Chapter of the American Red Cross October 18, 1937 to October 27, 1937.

12 schools were visited.

289 children were inspected.

The following conditions were found:

- 21 children had throat defects.
- 195 children needed dental treatment.
- 33 children had defective vision or needed to have a checkup with their eye specialists.
- 13 children were underweight.
- 11 children with undesirable hair conditions.
- 286 notices were sent to parents or guardians.
 - 50 home calls were made to render assistance in correcting the individual defective condition.
 - 92 children were given special individual attention regarding diet, posture, personal hygiene, physical development and personal health problems.

Since the inspection of the Fall of 1936 the following corrections have been made:

- 28 children have had dental corrections or were having treatment at time of inspection.
- 16 children have been refitted to glasses.

There have not been any who have had corrective throat treatments.

Although there is much to be done in corrective work, it is felt that some gain has been made in acquiring health consciousness. It is encouraging to note the increasing interest shown by the children asking for suggestions and recommendations of what they can do to bring their health records up to the standard requirements.

Several children had their dental certificates stating that corrective work was complete to date and a few others informed the health nurse of their appointments for dental work.

We know that children cannot put forward their best efforts when they are unduly fatigued by such obstacles and drawbacks as defective throat conditions; headaches, due to eyestrain; and decayed and aching teeth.

As someone has said: "There is nothing in all the world so important as children, nothing so interesting. If ever you wish to go in for philanthropy, if ever you wish to be of real use in the world, do something for children."

How can one better invest one's resources than in providing the means for building up these children into healthier men and women! What greater reward can you ask for than to realize your responsibility in accomplishing this!

We wish to extend our appreciation to Mr. Henry W. Coburn, Supt. of Schools; to the Selectmen; to the School Committee; to Mr. Earl Rowell, Chairman Poland Branch of the American Red Cross; to the Teachers and Parents of Poland for their cooperation with the school nurse as shown by their splendid interest in the health work in the Poland schools; also, to the Doctors and Dentists who have given of their time for consultations and recommendations.

Three homes and two school houses have been disinfected for Scarlet Fever. Thirty-one families were placed under quarantine as a precaution of the spread of scarlet fever and the Health Officer of Minot was notified so he could place seven families under quarantine. One person was given permission to return to her home in Massachusetts and permission was obtained for one person to be brought back to Poland.

Mr. Elmer Walker and Mr. A. F. Waterhouse were appointed plumbing inspector and deputy and were confirmed by the State Bureau of Health for 1938.

During March free vaccination will be given to all who apply to this office, as a precaution against Small Pox.

We wish to thank all for their cooperation and ask that all communicable diseases be promptly reported to this office.


