To the Superintending School Committee of the town of Peru;

Gentlemen:

I have the honor to submit to you my first annual report of the condition of the schools in the town of Peru. It has been my aim to frame in this report a statement of facts,

indicating as nearly as possible what Peru schools are, not what they might be.

In general, I am glad to say that in the most of our schools the teachers have done faithful and efficient work. There has been but one or two schools where cases of dissatisfaction have been reported. We sometimes find a teacher who does not in every way take the interest in her work that might be considered advisable for the best interests of the schools. It requires an interested teacher to be able to interest the pupil; furthermore, although we may deplore the fact that we are unable to pay higher salaries to our teachers, yet we must remember that the teacher who engages to teach a school at a small salary is under the same obligation to devote the best of her time and energy to the interest of the school, just as truly as if she received a salary twice as large.

The day has gone by when the successful teacher can perform her work in a day of six hours. We find the most successful teachers now laboring with and for her pupils, eight, ten and even twelve hours a day. Before the best results may be obtained, the teacher should understand something of the home conditions and influences surrounding the pupil, and there should ever be the most hearty and cordial co-operation between parent and teacher. The problem of grading our rural schools presents many difficulties which cannot be successfully solved in a single year. Pupils should not be encouraged to enter High school until they have thoroughly mastered the studies of the common school. Especially should we guard against the evil of entering the high school at too early an age.

The course of study in the modern High school present many difficulties to the average pupil of immature years thereby resulting in discouragement and the pupils' leaving school. Such has been the example in our own town. To remedy this we have put into our course of study an extra

year which gives them a thorough review in Arithmetic,

Grammar, and Physiology, and an insight into Algebra and Bookkeeping.

The average scholar should not be allowed to enter the High school until he has reached the age of fourteen or perhaps fifteen years. Of course there may be exceptions, but in the majority of cases I think you will find the above condition true.

I would advise the voters of the town of Peru to purchase Union Hall, West Peru, and fit it up for school purposes, at the present time it can be done for very little money.

There are thirty-seven scholars in this school and one teacher cannot do the work that belongs to her to do and obtain good results. I would divide the school, having the higher grades up stairs and the lower grades below. I would recommend \$300 for the purchase of this building and fitting up same for school purposes.

TRANSPORTATION.

This is one of our most important as well as most difficult problems, At this time I have arrived at no satisfactory solution. In the spring and fall the pupils were carried from East Peru to Peru Center. It was thought best to open a school at the East Peru schoolhouse in the winter. The pupils from the Union district were carried to the Highland school in the spring, on account of the High school which was in session at that time. In the fall we started a school in the Union district and as nearly all the pupils belonged there, it left only three pupils in the Highland school; so this fall and winter they have been conveyed to the Union school.

I heartily favor the uniting of two or more small schools, when it can be done. It is certainly unprofitable and also undesirable to maintain schools of eight and ten

scholars, unless existing conditions make it absolutely necessary. Thus the question naturally resolves itself into the transportation of scholars to a nearby district, or the removing of schoolhouses to such location that they may accommodate two or more districts.

I think it would be advisable to convey from the Highland to the Union school next spring and fall and give them a school in the winter. I think there will be pupils enough to hold a school at East Peru the present year and as the pupils are mostly small I should recommend running a school in that district.

REPAIRS.


We have done quite an extensive business at repair work the past year. A woodshed and outbuilding have been built at the West Peru schoolhouse which is a great improvement. Outbuildings have also been built at the Pond and East Peru schoolhouses. We put in some new steps at the Dickvale schoolhouse which was very much needed. A few other necessary repairs have also been made, such as setting glass, etc. Some of our buildings need work done on them another year. At the Pond, the building needs to be clapboarded and painted. East Peru schoolhouse needs under-pinning righted up, joints pointed, new front door, and a good coat of paint. The schoolbuilding at Dickvale needs shingling and painting.

I would recommend \$250 for repairs for the coming year.

BOOKS.

Some excellent books on Nature and Wards' Primers and First-Readers have been purchased. We also purchas-



class.

The Arithmetics in use in the lower grades were anything but satisfactory, and after a long careful study we exchanged the old books for the Milne's Progressive Arithmetic which is considered one of the best books in print. It has given entire satisfaction.

We have quite a number of books in use at the present time that are too hard for the average scholar.

I would recommend \$125 for the purchase of school books another year.

I am sorry to say that there is one thing lacking in every school in town, that is a good map of Maine, I therefore recommend \$50 to be raised for the purchase of maps.

In regard to the matter of the general common school appropriation, I would recommend the raising of \$1,100 for the support of schools.

You will notice that the appropriation this year was overdrawn a little but it was voted at the regular meeting of the School board to advance the wages of teachers, which was a grand idea, as we shall be able to secure better teachers and have better schools. A shortage in fuel caused us to overdraw a little. It is well for us to economize in all our appropriations, but when it becomes necessary to practice close economy, I believe that the appropriation for the support of common schools should be the last to be curtailed.

In conclusion, allow me to express my thanks to the School Committee for their help and encouragement; to the citizens of Peru for their co-operation and forbearance; and to the teachers and pupils for their good work.

We hereby accept the report of the Superintendent and recommend it to you for consideration.


