between the ages of 5 and 21 years.

The attendance the past year has not been up to the average of the few years past. It was due mostly to the fact that the whooping cough was prevalent in nearly all the schools and the smallpox scare in the fall caused nearly all of the children to be vaccinated and many were obliged to stay at home on account of sore arms. We had a few truants however, and they were ably attended to by our truant officer, A. W. Atkins. He was notified at eight different times during the year and all pupils were promptly returned. E. G. Bassett was chosen to act as truant officer for the Pond, East Peru, and Center schools, but I am unable to report on his work as I have received no report from him.

#### Teachers

The work done by the most of our teachers during the past year has been well handled. The Committee believe that it is the best policy to retain a teacher in the same school as long as her work is satisfactory. We took special pains at the beginning of the school year to select teachers of high grade and raised

#### the wages of the experienced teachers 50c per week. Such a policy

#### I most heartily approve. By a substantial increase the results

have fully justified the action. I have found the teachers interested and always ready to receive most cordially such suggestions as I have been able to give.

#### The School Year

The town is to be congratulated that with the increase of the State school funds, it has been possible to extend our school year to 33 weeks. Three eleven-week terms. Larger towns are giving from 36 to 40 weeks of school a year and are finding it none too much to prepare their children for successful living.

#### Conveyance

Pupils have been conveyed from the head of the Pond to the Worthley Pond School throughout the year, also Joseph Curneils' children were conveyed to the McDonald School during the spring and fall terms.

#### Text Books

We have only met existing needs in our text-books during the past year, supplying books to replace old ones mostly.

New arithmetics, called The Nichol's Graded Lessons were tried in some of our schools and are highly recommended by most all of the teachers. The children are not careful enough with their books; there are cases where they have destroyed their books in one or two terms' use. Such cases ought to be reported at once by the teacher to the Superintendent or School Committee.

#### Repairs

The first order drawn on this account was for the balance due on the desks purchased for the Pond School the year before. We have during the past year changed the seats in the Dickvale and West Peru Primary Schools, also built a fence around a lot of land given by Raleigh Babb to the children of the East Peru School, to be used as a playground. He has at any time a right to take the land back if it is not used for the above named purpose. The School Committee and citizens of East Peru appreciate this generous gift as the children have had no chance

#### to play whatever, without trespassing on some other property.

We thought it a grand idea to have all of the schoolhouses fumigated before the fall term opened; other repairs such as, house cleaning, setting glass, and varnishing school desks at Peru were done.

The woodshed at Dickvale has got to be shingled soon. The foundation at East Peru Schoolhouse has got to be attended to next year. All schoolrooms need a coat or two of paint inside.

#### Conclusion

I would recommend the following sums to be raised for schools:

Common schools, Text books and supplies, Repairs, High school tuition, \$1,300.00 225.00 125.00 150.00

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In closing, I wish to express my appreciation to the teachers for their readiness to assist me in everything tending to the betterment of the schools. Also to the Superintending School Committee and citizens for the loyal support they have given me during the past year.
