

Report of the

Superintendent of Schools

To the Superintending School Committee and Citizens of Peru:

Hereby I submit my annual report of the progress, conditions, and needs of the schools of Peru.

Following the course of study adopted last year, the schools have made excellent progress and attained a higher standard than heretofore. Several of our pupils have moved from this to other towns and have been able to enter more advanced grades. Our high school students are making good and very favorable reports of their work have been received. The question has arisen in the minds of some of our citizens as to the advisability of establishing a high school in our own town. It may seem that we are expending quite a sum for high school tuition, but a study of the requirements for the maintenance of a free high school as stated in the school laws of the state, will show the impractibility of such a move.

INSTRUCTORS—PARENTS

Education in a rural community depends very largely upon its teaching force. The rural teacher of today must know how to govern wisely, must be well versed in a wide range of subjects, must look after the physical welfare of the children entrusted to her care, must take an interest in all that interests the community, must please and entertain, in short she must be "an all-round specialist." And what is she getting in return? The least she may expect is sympathy, interest in her work on the part of the parents, and now and then a word of encouragement. For successful results, teachers need the cooperation of the parents. The parents' responsibility does not end when they send the child off to school in the morning. We need your assistance in many ways,—you can help to prevent contagious diseas-

es, see that the children remain at home evenings during the school week, encourage home study, prevent tardiness and absences, and be interested in all that pertains to the good of the school. Show your interest by frequent visits.

The attendance for the past year has improved except in one or two sections of the town. When parents realize the importance of each day's work as a part of the finished whole, they will see greater progress in the school work of the children.

You have reason to be pleased with your teachers. They have been faithful, have shown much interest in their work, and are striving for improvement, both in self and school. Nearly all take one or more school magazines and they have taken advantage of the traveling library for teachers. Special effort has been made to make school-rooms attractive. Educational exhibits have been obtained and new books of educational value have been added to the school libraries. Some hand work has been attempted and more drawing in all the schools. Public exhibitions of work at the close of the spring term added zest to school work.

TEXT-BOOKS

This year the old physiologies have been exchanged for new ones of a more practical kind. Civics has been introduced into the ninth grade. Some worn-out books have been replaced. Next year the old geographies should be exchanged, and new maps and globes are needed.

REPAIRS

A hardwood floor has been laid in the grammar room and the room now needs paint and paper. The flag-poles at four of the buildings have been repaired. The East Peru building needs shingling on one side. In some of the rooms the sheathing is badly smoked; it should be thoroughly cleaned and varnished, and all of the desks and seats need varnishing.

COMMON SCHOOL ACCOUNT

The Common School account shows a balance somewhat larger than usual. This is due in part to the fact that the present term began a month later than formerly. This arrangement was made to have the vacation occur during the holidays. The Equalization Fund, to be used for lengthening the school year or increasing salaries, is larger

than last year, and the School and Mill Fund is considerably increased. This does not mean that the Common School Fund for the coming year should be reduced. Though the high cost of living has not affected us greatly, I find that it is difficult to secure board for teachers at the price formerly paid, nor should we expect it. Teachers' salaries are increasing elsewhere, and janitors are demanding more for their work.
