WARRANT FOR TOWN MEETING

To Raymond A. Waterhouse, a Constable of Poland, in the County of Androscoggin and State of Maine:

Greetings:

In the name of the State of Maine you are hereby required by law to notify and warn the inhabitants of the Town of Poland qualified by law to vote in Town Affairs to meet at the Town Hall in said Town of Poland on Monday the tenth day of March, 1941, at nine-thirty o'clock in the forenoon to act on the following articles, to wit:

Article 1. To choose a moderator to preside at said meeting.

Art. 2. To hear and act upon the reports of Town Officers.

Art. 3. To see what sum of money the inhabitants of the town will vote to raise and appropriate to pay the tuition of scholars attending High Schools of other towns, and for Support of Common Schools, and for textbooks and supplies.

Art. 4. To see what sum of money the inhabitants of the town will vote to raise and appropriate for repairs of school property.

Art. 5. To see if the inhabitants of the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$100.00 for the health work in schools, the rest of the bills to be paid by the Poland Red Cross.

Art. 6. To see if the inhabitants of the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$75.00 for school board.

Art. 7. To see what sum of money the inhabitants will vote to raise and appropriate for the support of roads and bridges.

Art. 8. To see if the inhabitants of the town will vote "yes" or "no" in regard to snow removal for the winter of 1941-42.

Art. 9. To see what sum of money the inhabitants of the town will vote to raise and appropriate to pay snow bills.

Art. 10. To see what sum of money the inhabitants of the town will approve for State Aid Road Construction (in addition to the amount regularly raised for the care of ways, bridges and highways) under the provisions of Section 19, Chapter 28, R. S. of 1930 or under the provisions of Section 3, Chapter 229, Public Laws of 1937.

Art. 11. To see if the inhabitants of the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1259.00 for maintenance of Third Class Roads under provisions of Sections 44 and 46, Chapter 28, R. S. 1930 as amended by Sections 4 and 5 of Chapter 229, P. L. 1937.

Art. 12. To see if the inhabitants of the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1775.00 for maintenance of State Highways and Special Resolve Highways during the ensuing year under the provisions of Sections 9, 18, 36, 37, and 38, Chapter 28, of R. S. 1930 and Section 9, Chapter 149, P. L. 1935.

Art. 13. To see if the inhabitants of the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000.00 to reconstruct and tar the Third Class Road continuing from end of work done in 1939 to State Aid Road No. 1.

Art. 14. To see if the inhabitants of the town will vote to fix the compensation of the Town Officers, and receive teams and trucks.

Art. 15. To see if the inhabitants of the town will vote to fix the compensation of the Town Officers, and receive bids from candidates for Tax Collector.

Art. 16. To see what sum of money the inhabitants of the town will vote to raise and appropriate for Salaries of Superintendent of Schools and other Town Officers.

Art. 17. To see what sum of money the inhabitants of the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the support of the poor.

Art. 18. To see if the inhabitants of the town will vote to give the Tax Collector permission and authority to collect delinquent taxes, both real and personal, by State Law.

Art. 19. To see if the inhabitants of the town will vote to allow on personal and real estate tax bills for 1941 a cash discount of 2% if paid on or before July 1, 1941.

Art. 20. To see if the inhabitants of the town will vote to make all taxes due and payable on or before Nov. 1, 1941.

Art. 21. To see what sum of money the inhabitants of the town will vote to raise and appropriate to pay Collector's Commissions, Abatements and discounts on taxes.

Art. 22. To determine whether the inhabitants of the town will vote to authorize and empower the Selectmen and Treasurer to sell at public or private sale in such manner, on such conditions, for such amounts and upon such terms of payments as they in their discretion may deem advisable, any or all real estate now held by the town, title to which is claimed by the town either by virtue of the tax deed lien procedure provided by Section 72 of Chapter 14 of the R. S. of 1930, et sequi, or by virtue of the tax mortgage lien procedure provided by Chapter 244, P. L. of 1933, et sequi.

Art. 23. To determine whether the inhabitants of the town will vote to authorize the Town Treasurer to sign, seal, execute and deliver good and sufficient quit claim deeds without covenant to any and all purchasers of property sold under the terms and provisions of the vote set out in above article of this warrant. This article is not to be voted upon in event the vote upon the proposition set out in the above article of this warrant is negative. Art. 24. To see if the inhabitants of the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen and Treasurer to procure a temporary loan or loans, not to exceed \$25,000.00 in anticipation of taxes, for the purpose of paying obligations of the town; such notes to be paid during the current municipal year out of money raised during said current municipal year by taxes.

Art. 25. To see if the inhabitants of the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$150.00 to pay interest on temporary loans.

Art. 26. To see if the inhabitants of the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,650.70 to pay two bonds and interest due April 1, 1941, and October 1, 1941.

Art. 27. To see what sum of money the inhabitants of the town will vote to raise and appropriate for Contingent Fund.

Art. 28. To see whether the inhabitants of the Town of Poland will vote to borrow the sum of \$16,000.00 for the purpose of calling and redeeming outstanding Refunding Serial Bonds of the Town of Poland dated and issued October 1, 1935 and pursuant thereto issue Serial Refunding Bonds in the amount of \$16,000.00 said bonds to be dated April 1, 1941, and to be written to mature serially \$2,000.00 on the first day of October, 1941, and \$2,000.00 on the first day of each October thereafter through and including October 1, 1948; said bonds to be issued in denominations of \$1,000.00 to bear interest as per coupons to be attached at the rate of $2\frac{1}{2}\%$ per annum, payable semi-annually, said bonds to be callable at or before maturity on any interest date, at a rate of 103; said bonds to be signed, executed, and issued on behalf of the Town of Poland by the Selectmen and the Town Treasurer of the Town of Poland and to bear the Town seal, said bonds to be made payable to bearer at the Canal National Bank, Portland, Maine, and to bear the certificate of said bank; funds necessary to pay the principal

and interest on said bonds as the same mature to be included in the tax levy for each succeeding year until said bonds are paid in full; all other details in the preparation and issuance of said bonds not inconsistent with the specific provisions of this Article to be left to the discretion of the Selectmen of the Town of Poland.

Art. 29. To see whether the inhabitants of the Town of Poland will authorize the Selectmen and Town Treasurer to negotiate the sale of the issue of Serial Refunding Bonds provided for in the foregoing Article at private sale for a price not less than the par value of said bonds.

Art. 30. To see if the inhabitants of the town will vote to allow the moderator to appoint a committee of three, who shall nominate seven citizens of the Town of Poland, Maine, to act as a Budget and Advisory Committee for the term of one year, and to serve without pay, said nominations to be confirmed by vote of meeting.

Art. 31. To see if the inhabitants of the town will vote

to retain from bills due from the town, amounts due the town for unpaid taxes due from persons presenting such bills, which are one or more years in arrears.

Art. 32. To see if the inhabitants of the town will vote to authorize the taxpayers to call the nearest fire department in case of fire, without permission from the Selectmen, and have the selectmen instruct the fire department to this effect.

Art. 33. To see if the inhabitants of the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$3,000.00 the same to be used with Federal money. If no Federal money is available, this amount to be transferred to Poor Account if needed.

Art. 34. To see if the inhabitants of the town will vote to accept Sections 36, 37, 38, and 39, Chapter 26, of Revised Statutes 1930, relative to giving the Town Officers a right to have removed buildings that are dangerous as regards fire or human life. Art. 35. To see if the inhabitants of the Town will vote to accept a sum of \$200.00 in perpetual trust, to be deposited in some local savings bank in Lewiston or Auburn, Me., at interest. The net income, and no more, to be used for the perpetual care and upkeep of the lot in the Lane Cemetery in said Town of Poland located in East Poland, in which the late Harry E. Davis is buried.

Art. 36. To see if the inhabitants of the town will vote to recommend to the board of Assessors to exempt from taxes the Lake Grange and Excelsior Grange property for the ensuing year.

Art. 37. To see what sum of money the inhabitants of the town will vote to raise and appropriate to be expended and used for advertising the natural resources, advantages, and attractions of State of Maine, to be paid to State of Maine Publicity Bureau.

The polls will be open for balloting for Town Officers from 2.00 to 7.00 o'clock in the afternoon.

The Selectmen give notice that they will be in session at the Town Office on March 6, 7, and 8, 1941, in the afternoon from 1.00 to 5.00 o'clock for the purpose of correcting the list of voters.

We would like to call the attention of our inhabitants, that on February 15, all bills for 1940 were paid, including \$1,690.00 for a new truck and equipment, \$1070.00 for

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fire, \$2,700.00 for overdraft on W.P.A. work and \$1,010.00 on the bonded indebtedness. This makes a total of \$6,470 for which no assessment was made at our Annual Meeting for 1940.

A total of \$3,000.00 was paid on our bonded indebtedness this year, bringing this down from \$19,000.00 to \$16,000.00 and we have a cash balance of \$8,339.99.

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AUDITOR'S REPORT

STATE DEPARTMENT OF AUDIT

March 5, 1941

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Poland:

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In accordance with your request, this department, represented by Messrs. G. C. Lewis and J. R. Bishop, has completed an examination of the accounts of your town officials for the municipal year ended February 15, 1941.

Our report, herewith submitted, was prepared from your town records and, to the best of our knowledge and belief, properly reflects the true financial condition of your municipality as of the above date; subject however to a probable shrinkage in the final settlement of unpaid taxes, tax liens and deeds, also to a substantial shrinkage in the impounded funds, both General Cash and Trust Funds.

COMMENTS

CASH:

All cash recorded as received appeared to be properly accounted for and deposited in the bank.

The expenditures were made by check from properly authorized warrants.

The cash balance was reconciled with the bank.

TAX LIENS AND DEEDS:

All income from tax liens and deeds during the year was apparently accounted for. Some adjustments and settlements of the older accounts were made by your Selectmen, the values of which were probably questionable.

Lists were prepared by us of all unpaid tax liens and deeds carried on the town books as of February 15, 1941 and are shown by Schedules 3 and 4.

TRUST FUNDS:

The investments were examined and listed. Schedule 6 in this report shows the purpose, amount and custodian of the investments.

TAXES:

The 1940 tax commitment was added and found to agree with the records of the Assessors.

The abatements were checked for authority and a list of unpaid 1940 taxes is shown by Schedule 2.

The excise tax was checked and appeared to be properly accounted for.

An examination was made of prior years' taxes and although we have listed only the unpaid balance for 1939 on Schedule 2, it appeared that the detail on hand properly supported the unpaid balances on the town books.

GENERAL:

A partial examination was made of paid bills and payrolls. Those checked appeared to be in proper form and to substantiate the authorization for payment. With the exception of cash and trust funds, no external verification was made of your asset and liability accounts.

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



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# **REPORT OF RED CROSS COUNTY SCHOOL** NURSE, POLAND SCHOOLS

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#### - November 6, 1940

The school children of Poland had their annual health inspection by the nurse from the Lewiston-Auburn Chapter of the American Red Cross October 10 to October 30, 1940.

12 schools were visited.

299 children were inspected, weighed, and measured.

222 children had their vision tested by the nurse. The following conditions were found:

48 children had throat defects.

- 269 children needed dental treatment—(219
  - children needing fillings, extractions, or both and 50 children needing just prophylaxis)
  - 28 children had defective vision or needed to have a checkup with their eye specialists.
    - 7 children were underweight.
  - 16 children had undersirable hair conditions-5 of them at an infectious stage.
  - 1 child had a defective ear condition.
  - 17 children had enlarged cervical glands.
- 362 notices were sent to parents or guardians.
  - 7 home calls were made to render assistance in correcting the individual defective condition.
- 225 children were given special individual attention, regarding posture, hygiene, and physical development.

Since the inspection of the Fall of 1939, the following corrections have been made:

- 85 children have had dental corrections or were having treatment at the time of the inspection.
- 6 children have had throat operations.
- 6 children had an improved condition of throat, due to correction of dental defects and a more supervised program of diet and daily habits.
- 16 children have had their eyes treated.

There were 39 children who had had all dental corrections made and were the proud possessors of certificates stating that all teeth had been cleaned and polished; all pits and fissures had received adequated treatment; carious deciduous teeth had received reasonable consideration.

It is interesting to note the different stages of improvement; for instance, those children who have been receiving regular dental care for the past several years, seem to need only prophylaxis and in some cases apparently do not need any treatment at all.

One ten year old child who had had corrective dental work last year for the first time, anxiously inquired: "How are my teeth this year?" On being answered that they looked to be in very good condition, he informed the nurse: "The dentist told me that I have strong teeth and he wants me to take good care of 'em! I wanted to know if you thought I had been doing my part, I'm trying so hard. They felt so good after the dentist cleaned and filled them for me."

Several pupils who are repeating grades have shown a remarkable improvement since throat operations, and, also, others who had their eyes properly fitted to glasses. One child who had had trouble with inflamed eyelids as the only sympton of defective vision or eyestrain was fitted to glasses last year. Not only are the eyelids in normal condition but the child has advanced from the "dull or backward" group to one of the most brilliant pupils of the class. It is most gratifying to note the improvement in their personal appearance. This children are conscious that it is so much easier to obtain the requirements of standard health as soon as the daily health habits are established.

We wish to extend our sincere appreciation to all those who are cooperating in many ways of encouragement and financial assistance to make the health program successful.

#### REPORT OF THE POLAND RED CROSS

During the past ten years the Town, with Red Cross Aid and under Red Cross supervision have given free health

check and free throat inspection to every school child in the Town of Poland. Following this check-up families needing Red Cross help have been given it. This year they have given dental treatment to about one hundred twentyfive children, tonsil operations to six, and eight children have been fitted to glasses.

The Poland Red Cross have the largest dental clinic in the state and much credit for this is due to the Poland people for their generous response to our requests for help, especially in February when we have our annual benefit party. Also a great deal of credit should go to Dr. Taylor for giving us so much of his time, doing more clinic work than most dentists will do.

Best of all is the fact that the children's teeth are beginning to show the result of our services rendered. It is very seldom now that Dr. Taylor has to extract second year molars or remove other teeth that children should be 67

keeping but have to be removed because they have not had proper attention. We feel that we have really accomplished a great deal in this line of work and sincerely thank all the people who have so kindly cooperated with us.

This year we had an enrollment of 143 members which was eleven more than last year and at this time the officers and executive committee wish to thank all members, teachers, parents, Miss Hardy and also the many friends who have helped us to make our work such a success.
