

The total enrollment of the town is four more than last year. Five pupils were not absent for the school year ending June 12, 1931. They are Uric Wiken of West Peru Primary; Roger Brown of the Knox School; Rubina Vaughn of Peru Center; Christine Luce and Pauline Luce of East Peru.

For the fall term of fourteen weeks ending December 18, 1930, the following pupils were not absent: Thurl Dyment, Walter Dyment, Lillian Frost and Alphonse Thomas of West Peru Primary; Josephine Tutlis and Donald Lane of West Peru Grammar; Joseph Lovejoy, Virginia Roott, Dorothy Shaw, Vivian Putnam and Everett Child of Dickvale; Roger Brown, Mildred Kazregis, Julia

Kazregis and John Kazregis of the Knox School; Ernest Gill, Margaret Henry, Harold Gill, Henry Edison, Florence Robinson, Louise Godish and Raymond Linnell of Peru Center; Eleanor Bigelow, Pauline Luce, Christine Luce, Merle Knox, Jr., Wilbur Cote and Zibia Hosley of East Peru.

Christine and Pauline Knox of East Peru and Roger Brown of the Knox School have perfect attendance records for the past four terms. They did not miss a day for 50 weeks.

## REPAIRS AND EQUIPMENT

All schoolhouse chimney flues and all toilet vaults were thoroughly cleaned. All school rooms and toilet rooms were cleaned and the floors oiled. Four chimney tops were so loose it was necessary to repair them to prevent roof fires and injury to children from falling bricks. The roof on the southern side of the West Peru School was reshingled. Dickvale school was refurnished so that all the pupils have new seats and desks of the most modern type. A new desk with all the conveniences for the teacher's work was purchased. The door steps were repaired and a new lock provided for the outside door. At the Knox school the roof, door steps and toilets were repaired. The school grounds were much improved by cutting all the bushes and removing the rubbish. The fence was in need of repairs in several places and this matter was attended to also. New window shades were furnished for the main room and a case of maps installed. The chemical toilets of the Peru Center school were repaired, windows reputtied, new grates bought for the heater, lock furnished for the outside door and new door steps built. At East Peru smaller seats were provided because the old ones were so high the children could not rest their feet on the floor. A new lock was installed in the outside door.

The high school tuition list contains 29 names. The town paid tuition for that number of pupils for the fall term. Next June about 7 will be removed from the list by graduation, decreasing the number to 22, but there are 15 eighth grade pupils and possibly more who will complete the common school course. Consequently the town may be required to pay tuition for 37 high school pupils next fall.

#### BUDGET FOR ANNUAL TOWN MEETING

Your School Committee and Superintendent have considered the needs of the schools for the ensuing year and submit the following budget for the annual town meeting.

Common Schools,	\$ 3,600 00

The recommendation for the common schools is \$400 more than last year because the amount of money on hand in that account is \$836.78 less than the amount unexpended a year ago. Since there is more money left in the high school tuition account than usual, the sum asked for is \$400 less than the amount raised in 1931. The recommendation for repairs and equipment is just one-half the amount of last year. The other items are the same as they have been for a long time. The total budget is \$300 less than last March, and \$1,020 less than the amount raised for schools in 1930.

The financial statement of the schools is appended to this report. No account is overdrawn. The total amount unexpended in the school department is \$781.64.

#### CONCLUSION

In closing this report I submit a few lines recently released by Dr. Bertram E. Packard, State Commissioner of Education: "I am confident that the people of Maine have faith in public education. I am confident that our citizens will see to it that the present generation in our public schools are in no way deprived of their fair share of educational opportunity. We must see to it that in our zeal for economy we do not go to the extent of impairing our public school system and thereby deprive the future citizenship of the state of the opportunities to which it is rightfully entitled."

I take this opportunity to thank all the citizens of Peru who have aided the schools in any way the past year.
