Special mention should be made of the attendance of Christine Luce of East Peru, who did not miss a session for 258 consecutive weeks, but was absent one week of the fall term on account of chicken pox. Previous to last fall the East Peru school always maintained an excellent record for attendance, but the chicken pox epidemic made it necessary for a large number of pupils to be absent for a few days during the term. The attendance in the other schools of the town was affected also by the same disease but not enough to cause so much absence.

The above list contains thirty-nine names. Since the opening of the school year Roland Benson and Dwight Gurney have withdrawn from Dixfield High. Frank Schafer and Kenneth Knox have been removed from the list because their parents are now living in Dixfield. Roy Norton and Lincoln Scott have withdrawn from Stephens High. Louise Godish is not in school at present, but plans to return next year. Murial Norton has withdrawn from Mexico High. If the Seniors in Dixfield and Stephens are graduated, four more will be removed from the list, thus leaving 28 students in High school. Considering there are 20 pupils in the eighth grade of the Town, we should plan for a tuition list of at least 45 for the coming school year. About three of the eighth grade pupils may not enter high school.

CONCLUSION

The first graduation in the new building at West Peru was held June 9th, 1937. The event was a grand success in every respect. A fine program consisting of music, dramatics, class gifts, opening and closing addresses was presented to a large and appreciative audience. We now have a suitable assembly room for public exhibitions and it is the hope of the school officials to have the promotion exercises for high school held at West Peru each year by having a joint program instead of one for each school. Again I wish to thank the people of Peru Center and East Peru for their attitude relative to the new school and the excellent support they have given.

The sum of \$500 promised from the State Equalization Fund by Mr. R. J. Libby the night of the dedication was

received in reimbursement for the \$500 expended for special equipment. The larger expenditures of this account were for slides, teeter boards, swings, basket ball courts, equipment for base ball and basket ball, lunch room tables and seats, first aid kit, rhythm band instruments and a very fine set of encyclopedias.

With the amount unexpended last year from the appropriation for the West Peru Building it was possible to complete the grading of the grounds, to make a beautiful lawn in front of the schoolhouse, to seal and paint all the floors in the basement and to give all the wood work in the class rooms, hall and stairways a second coat. In addition many

minor improvements were made.

Much credit is due the teachers and pupils of West Peru for the hard work done in preparing and presenting entertainments to earn money to buy a fine piano. I am glad to report that the bill for the instrument has been paid in full. We thank the pupils of Peru Center and East Peru who sold many of the entertainment tickets and the citizens who purchased them.

We thank the town for installing electric lights in the

school at the Center.

The East Peru pupils and teacher earned the money necessary for the electric lights in that building. All school rooms in the town are now lighted by electricity and have excellent fixtures.

All teachers attended school at Farmington during the vacation and derived considerable benefit from the courses pursued. They also attended the County and State Conventions.

We are very sorry that Mrs. Starbird is ill and cannot teach the Peru Center School as we had planned. According to reports at this writing she will be able to return for the spring term.

In closing I wish to thank all the citizens of Peru and especially the selectmen, the treasurer, the school board, the teachers and pupils for their kind assistance the past year.

WARRANT FOR ANNUAL TOWN MEETING STATE OF MAINE, OXFORD COUNTY, S. S.

To Sidney A. Hazelton, a Constable of the Town of Peru, in the County of Oxford, Greeting:

You are hereby required, in the name of the State of Maine, to notify and warn the inhabitants of the Town of Peru, qualified to vote in Town Affairs, to assemble at the Town Hall, in said Town, on Monday, the seventh day of March, A. D. 1938, at ten o'clock in the forenoon, to act on the following articles, to wit:

- Art. 1. To choose a Moderator to preside at said meeting.
 - Art. 2. To choose a Clerk for the ensuing year.
- Art. 3. To see if the Town will vote to accept the report of its several Town Officers.
- Art. 4. To see if the Town will instruct the Selectmen to appoint one, or more, Road Commissioners.
- Art. 5. To see if the Town will vote to elect one, or more, Road Commissioners.
- Art. 6. To see if the Town will vote to choose a Board of Overseers of the Poor, independent of the Selectmen.
 - Art. 7. To choose all other necessary Town Officers.
- Art. 8. To see what sums of money the Town will vote to raise for the maintenance and support of Schools, the Poor, Maintenance and repair of Roads and Bridges, maintenance of State, State Aid and Third Class Roads and to defray all other necessary Town Charges.
- Art. 9. To see if the Town will vote "Yes," or "No," on the question of appropriating and raising money necessary to entitle the Town to State Aid as provided in Sec. 20, Chap. 28, R. S. of 1930.
- Art. 10. To see what sum the Town will appropriate and raise for the improvement of the section of the State Aid Road as outlined in the report of the Highway Commission in addition to the amounts regularly raised for the care of ways, highways and bridges under the provisions of Sec. 19, of Chap. 28, R. S. of 1930.

- Art. 11. To see if the Town will vote to raise \$62.00 for School Nursing under the auspices of the Bureau of Health of the State Department of Health and Welfare.
- Art. 12. To see if the Town will vote to raise \$3,000.00 or some other sum, to pay on its long time loans.
- Art. 13. To see if the Town will vote to raise money, and what sum, to make over the brick school house at West Peru into rents.
- Art. 14. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to sell and convey the brick school house and lot at West Peru, should they receive an advantageous offer for the same.
- Art. 15. To see if the Town will vote to construct an extension to Dolloff St. from its easterly end to the State Road near the residence of Leonard B. Hall.
- Art. 16. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise to construct a road from the easterly end of Dolloff St. to the State Road near the residence of Leonard B. Hall.
- Art. 17. To see if the Town will vote to allow the Selectmen to sell and convey all real estate acquired under tax titles and accept time payments if they consider it advisable.
- Art. 18. To see if the Town will vote to raise money, and what sum, to tar the road from the Third Class Road to the new State Road near the residence of E. C. Knox.
- Art. 19. To fix the compensation of the Collector of Taxes.
- Art. 20. To see if the Town will vote to take over the control of the Property of Herbert H. and Noama V. Lunt and instruct the Selectmen to take any steps necessary for the execution of said trust.
- Art. 21. To see what action the Town will take in regard to high school tuition paid by parents where scholars were sent to Rumford High School.
- Art. 22. To see if the Town will vote to pay the men on the Town Roads 38 cents per hour.

Art. 23. To see if the Town will authorize the Town Treasurer with the approval of the Selectmen to hire such sums of money as may be necessary to pay Town Charges and Town Debts, in anticipation of the collection of taxes and to issue and negotiate the notes of the Town for the money so borrowed to an amount not exceeding in the aggregate the total tax levy for the preceding municipal year as temporary loans to be paid during the year 1938 out of money raised during the said year 1938 by taxes.

Art. 24. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

The Selectmen give notice that they will be in session at the Town Hall, Peru, at 9 o'clock on the morning of the 7th day of March, A. D. 1938, for the purpose of correcting the list of voters.
