# REPAIRS AND EQUIPMENT

For this purpose the sum of \$200 was raised. The balance of \$43.19 from last year and the \$5.00 received from the sale of old furniture added to the appropriation made \$248.19 available.

The above figures show that the expenditures exceed the amount available by \$139.86 and they also show that the big items of expense are for new desks and for water supply. Because of the increase in enrollment in the grammar grades it was necessary to purchase more desks than we had allowed for in the budget and there was no provision made for the work done at the springs and on the pipe line which carries the water from Mrs. Lane's spring to the main line leading from the new spring to the West Peru Building.

Soon after the school opened last fall the water supply was not sufficient to meet the needs of the school building, the Lane apartment houses, the barber shop and the Wood place. After an investigation of conditions it was decided that considerable water from the veins on the hill side was going to waste instead of supplying the reservoir. This waste was stopped to considerable extent by some work in the vicinity of the spring at an expense of \$61.62 which made it possible to run the school until the second day of February when the flow of water again failed. For a time it looked as if we would have to close the school until we could build some W. P. A. toilets, but Rodney Linnell came to the rescue with a plan for getting water from Mrs. Lane's spring. His plan was accepted by the school officials and he was authorized to go ahead with the project. This was Thursday night and Sunday there was plenty of water with good pressure in the school building. The total expense for the new pipe and fixtures, digging the trench, laying the pipe and making the necessary connections was \$57.87.

For several years we had tried to stop the old heater at East Peru from smoking. We called to our assistance not only from Peru, but from the surrounding towns as well, men well versed in handling problems pertaining to heat and ventilation but of no avail. Finally John Monteith was elected to the school board and after making a diagnosis of

the case he reported that the stove had smoked so long that it could not give up the habit and that the only thing to do was to let some one have it for a building where smoking was allowed and enjoyed. He was told that we did not have the money to buy a new stove this year but that did not stop John. He said that he would sell us a nice heater practically new for less than half price and install it free of charge. In addition to this he would help the school put on an entertainment to pay half of the \$30. The school officials accepted his offer and Mr. Monteith made good with his promise. The entertainment was a grand success, everybody had a good time and we have a good heater at a cost of only \$15 to the school department. After paying half the price of the heater there was enough left from the entertainment to buy an electric clock which was very much needed in the school.

The amounts asked for three items in the budget are less than last year. The reductions are: common schools, \$500; books and supplies, \$100; insurance, \$55.42. The increases are: high school tuition, \$1,000; repairs and equipment, \$150. The last three items are the same as last year. The total budget is \$494.58 more than the one submitted a year ago.

#### FINANCES

For the past two years we have been trying to balance our budget. Two years ago we had an overdraft of \$1,489.67. Last year we reduced it to \$661.95. The past year we had hoped to wipe it out but the expenditures for school desks, high school tuition and insurance are more than we anticipated at the last annual meeting and no provision at all was made for water expense. However we have done better than the National Government is doing. We have kept the deficit

from increasing and have reduced it \$109.23. The total overdraft is now \$552.72.

In spite of the fact that we are asking for more money for the running expenses of the schools than we did in the early years of my superintendency in this union it may make some of the taxpayers feel better to learn that the per capita amount asked for the coming year is \$9.10 less than the amount raised for each common school pupil in 1926. In that year the total enrollment was 115. This year it is 193.

In closing I wish to thank the School Committee for valuable assistance and to thank all the citizens of Peru who have helped the schools in any way the past year.

# WARRANT FOR ANNUAL TOWN MEETING STATE OF MAINE COUNTY OF OXFORD, ss:

To Esbjorn Wiken, a Constable of the Town of Peru in the County of Oxford, Greeting:

You are hereby required, in the name of the State of Maine, to notify and warn the inhabitants of the Town of Peru, qualified to vote in Town affairs to assemble at the Town Hall, in said Town, on Monday, the fourth day of March, A. D. 1940, at ten o'clock in the forenoon, to act on the following articles, to wit:

- Art. 1. To choose a Moderator to preside at said meeting.
  - Art. 2. To choose a Clerk for the ensuing year.
- Art. 3. To see if the Town will vote to accept the report of its several Town Officers.
- Art. 4. To see if the Town will vote to elect one or more Road Commissioners.
  - Art. 5. To choose all other necessary Town Officers.
- Art. 6. To see what sums of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the maintenance and support of Schools, the Poor maintenance and repair of Roads and Bridges, maintenance of State Aid and Third Class Roads and to defray all other necessary Town charges.
- Art. 7. To see what sum the Town will raise and appropriate for State Aid Road construction in addition to the amounts regularly raised for the care of ways, Highways and Bridges under the provisions of Section 19, Chap. 28, Revised Statutes of 1930, or under the provisions of Section 3, Chap. 229, Public Laws of 1937.
- Art. 8. To see if the Town will raise \$62.00 or what other sum for school nursing to be expended under the auspices of the Bureau of Health of the State Department of Health and Welfare.
- Art. 9. To see what sum the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for advertising our natural resources, advantages and attractions under the provisions of Chap. 5, Sect. 82 of the Revised Statutes, to be expended under the direction of the State of Maine Publicity Bureau.

- Art. 10. To see what sum the Town will vote to raise for payment on its long time loans or take any action relative thereto.
- Art. 11. To see if the Town will vote to raise \$40.00 for School Dental Hygiene, to be expended under the auspices of the Bureau of Health of the State Dept. of Health and Welfare.
- Art. 12. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$100.00 or some other sum toward the maintenance of the P. F. P. A.
- Art. 13. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$100.00 or some other sum toward the maintenance of the West Peru Cemetery Association.
- Art. 14. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate \$200.00 or some other sum to control white pine blister rust, 50% State funds and W. P. A. funds are promised as far as they are available, local labor will be used if it is available.
- Art. 15. To see if the Town will vote to buy a Snow Plow for the Town's Tractor.
- Art. 16. To see what sum of money the Town will appropriate and raise for payment of the same.
- Art. 17. To fix the compensation of the Collector of Taxes.
- Art.18. To see if the Town will vote to instruct the Selectmen to transfer the unexpended balances of the different accounts of 1939 to the same accounts in 1940.
- Art. 19 To see if the Town will authorize the Town Treasurer with the approval of the Selectmen to hire such sums of money as may be necessary to pay Town charges and Town Debts, in anticipation of the collection of taxes and to issue and negotiate the notes of the Town for the money so borrowed to an amount not exceeding in the aggregate the total tax levy for the preceding municipal year as temporary loans to be paid during the year 1940 out of money raised during said year 1940 by taxes.
- Art. 20. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

Art. 21. To see if the Town will vote to instruct the Selectmen to sell or dispose all property taken over by Tax Liens.

The Selectmen give notice that they will be in session at the Town Hall, Peru, at 9 o'clock on the morning of the 4th day of March, A. D. 1940, for the purpose of correcting the list of voters.
