





REPORT OF HEALTH OFFICER

Winterport, Maine, January 26, 1942.

In submitting my report as Health Officer for the Town of Winterport, I am pleased to state that the public health conditions in this town have been very good for the past year. There still remain a few cases of unsanitary conditions caused by people disposing garbage on the sides of the public highways. This practice must be stopped.

I must impress upon the minds of the parents of children that measles, mumps, chickenpox and whooping cough are diseases reportable to the Health Officer regardless of whether there has been a doctor call on the patient.

I thank the townspeople for the fine cooperation I have received in the past year and trust they will continue to help improve health conditions in the town.

ANNUAL REPORT OF PUBLIC HEALTH NURSING, 1941

1941 has been an interesting and challenging year. So much has occurred throughout the world, as well as in our own country.

Standing on the threshold of 1942, the door has been suddenly opened before us and we are shocked at what we behold.

As we stand here and get our bearings, we know we are faced with grave responsibilities, responsibilities we may have to carry for a long time, and only as we are physically and mentally fit to contend with these problems, will we be able to carry on. It has been said that our first line of defense is in our homes. The bulwarks of our nation are forged in the homes of our people. Thus we, as a nation, can withstand the rigors of the fight ahead only to the extent that our men and women, boys and girls, are willing and able to take up the torch, stand firm and carry on.

The responsibility for the health of our people lies in our public health programs that are being carried on in our communities and homes. For a successful and effective health program, we must look to the cooperation of everyone in the community.

The following is the report of the public health program carried on in your community for 1941, the local officials and the Bureau of Health cooperating.

ACTIVITIES

Supervision through home visiting was given to antepartums, postpartums, infants, preschool children, school children and adults. The parents were given instructions in personal hygiene,

the importance of medical supervision, nutrition, infant and child care and training, and immunization.

A Child Health Conference was held under the auspices of the Legion Auxiliary; the attendance was small and the physician unable to attend.

The tuberculin test was given in the high school. There was an excellent response. Arrangements will be made for all reactors and contacts to have a chest x-ray early in the new year.

A total of 61 home visits was made, the nurse contacting 22 individual homes and giving supervision to the following:

4 Antepartums

4 Postpartums

12 Infants

24 Preschools

Interviews were held with interested individuals in regard to the program. Plans for the next year should include the organization of a community health committee, in order to extend the health activities and allow the nurse more time for supervision in the homes.

To the Citizens of the Town of Winterport:

We, as your selectmen for the past three years, would like to take this opportunity to explain to you briefly a few things which are vital to you and affect you all directly or indirectly.

First the taxation setup has needed for some time a leveling off that is a readjustment of valuation by the assessors so that all taxpayers, especially real estate owners, would be assessed a nearer equal per cent on a true valuation in fairness to all. For over two years we have been working in cooperation with the State assessors on this problem with Mr. Holley, former State assessor, and Mr. Hill, his successor, and they have given us splendid assistance. Also we feel that we should explain that their attitude was to help us improve the town's taxation system, not the State's. It was proved to us that Winterport was one of the lowest in per cent valuation in the County of Waldo and that fact was causing our rate to climb out of bounds as the people felt it necessary to raise quite large appropriation totals to cover necessary school, road and town expenses. Whatever total of valuation a town has figured against the money appropriated is what determines the rate of taxation, therefore the community which is fortunate enough to have a large valuation and does not raise appropriations out of line with sound judgment and also in consideration of the necessity for certain and needed appropriations, is the town that will have the lowest rate and also the soundest financial setup and taxation setup. an earlier an th

Of course no town should have a valuation so high that their State tax would go higher than the State fixes it but this is not a danger that hardly any, if any, town would experience. The State tax is based on more than most towns' total valuation report, that is, they add so much more according to their checkup on valuation. The State tax for Winterport is a certain amount regardless of

how much less our assessors may set our valuation, therefore, Winterport should gradually increase their valuation somewhat more up to a certain bracket, providing they can at the same time lower the tax rate, and not otherwise. If your assessors had not levelled off and therefore had more total valuation in 1941 our rate would have been between 83 and 85 mills based on the amount which was appropriated in 1941. That is too high a rate. So is 75 mills. In fact, we would like to sometime see a rate of between 55 and 65 mills. There are a few ways it could come about. One is to raise less money, another is to not raise any more than now and have a higher valuation on what we have to value. We feel that Winterport has had a good year in 1941. The unpaid bills are over \$3,900.00 less this year than last year and the surplus is increased nearly \$5,000.00. The appropriation for unpaid bills last year was sound and has helped the town's financial situation greatly. We are recommending \$2,000.00 this year instead of \$3,000.00.

We should have a volunteer Fire Department with the call men

paid a reasonable amount on an hourly basis when called out. They should be organized and instructed so that efficiency and speed would be available in emergency.

WINTERPORT SCHOOL REPORT

To the Superintending School Committee and the Citizens of the Town of Winterport:

For the fifth time it becomes my privilege and duty to make the annual school report. The financial statement will be found at the end of this report.

We had expected a material decrease in school enrollment this past year but such has not been the case. Although some families have moved away yet others have come in to maintain practically the same enrollment.

SCHOOL PROGRESS

TEACHERS

As school opened in September we found, with one exception, the same teachers in the elementary school. Miss Shirley Curtis took the place of Miss Virginia Vannah, who had married and moved to another town. However, in November, Mr. Arthur Doe, principal of the grade schools, resigned to take a supervisory po-

sition in Aroostook State Normal School and Mr. Sumner Clark, a former principal of this building, was secured to take over this work. In the high school, Mr. Arthur Webb, with three years of experience in Monroe High School, was secured as principal and teacher of Science and Mathematics. Mr. Richard Hopkins who had taught for one year in Stockton Springs was secured as an extra teacher for the high school. A marked improvement has been noted in the high school this year. As Miss Blodgett, supervisor of music, resigned to go back to a former position as supervisor of music in York, Mr. Kenneth Matthews, a graduate of the Boston University College of Music, was secured for this position. We have been fortunate to have had such good teachers in our school system this past year. We are hopeful for next year.

TEXTBOOKS

Five years ago we started upon a long-term program for school textbooks and teaching materials. Because of that wise planning

our books are now in very good condition. Had not this been done our schools would find it difficult to secure proper teaching equipment in the years just ahead. Textbooks will of necessity be much higher in price and likewise hard to get. Many new books have been purchased for the grade schools; especially noteworthy are the reading books for grade four. For three years we have been looking for the right book for this grade. We selected "Sails Set for Treasure Land." This is a work-type reader with lessons on "How to Study," dictionary work and many other features of modern day teaching. We are pleased with the selection.

We are not yet satisfied with our reading program and results. Very shortly we will undertake a reading testing program with a battery of tests to check on results in reading for the four lower grades. Many new books have been purchased for the high school, among them new reference books in science, complete sets for the following—grade eight science, chemistry, tenth year English grammar, tenth year literature, and Functional Method for Shorthand. A substitute teacher commented most favorably on our selection of "Jaffe" for chemistry.

TRANSPORTATION

A survey of transportation over the past five-year period shows marked improvement. One new school bus has been purchased without any extra expense to the town, and a new and larger bus has been ordered and is now past due for delivery. Mr. Clements' old bus has been replaced by a fine new bus and we consider the equipment in very good shape. You will notice an article in the town warrant asking you to authorize the proper town officials to purchase a new school bus and to sign notes in the name of the town for part payment for same. This does not mean an extra appropriation this year nor in the future. The present town bus will be turned in as a down payment and the balance will be financed from present school monies. Our school children are well served by transportation service. Have you stopped to think that we are one of the few towns which furnishes high school transportation and for this the town only raises \$450.00 a year?

REPAIRS

Sometimes we forget that both of our present school buildings were built previous to 1855. This year minor repairs have been made on the elementary school building. New double-hung curtains have been placed in the primary room. Previous use of this type of curtain demonstrated its efficiency. New seats have been purchased for grade six; these have been a real improvement over the old type. At the high school building considerable time and money was spent last summer in minor repairs. As there will be heavy insurance premiums due this next year no major repairs are contemplated. The interior woodwork of the elementary building is badly in need of varnish, especially the window sash. It will be wise to keep this building in a good state of repair.

SCHOOL PROBLEMS

After your vote at last town meeting authorizing the superintending school committee to set in motion plans for a new high school building, in view of world conditions it was deemed advisable to give up such plans for the present. We still have a crowded

condition in the primary room. Other pupils are now being cared for comfortably. A proposition was made to the superintending school committee to purchase the Flemant house, so-called, and make it into a two-room schoolroom. This plan was carefully investigated by competent workmen. It was then decided, that inasmuch as the expenditure would be considerable to make structural changes, lighting, basement facilities, heating, and other changes, and that we would then have only a make-shift school building, that such a plan would not be advisable. We then considered the possibility of an addition of two rooms to the present elementary building. This could be done at an approximate cost of \$4,000.00. In view of present tax conditions in Winterport and the nation, and the likelihood of not being able to obtain proper building materials it was decided not to recommend such a program.

Within the past five years, three full-time teachers have been added to the teaching staff of Winterport schools, an extra teacher in the primary room, an extra teacher in the high school and a full-time supervisor of music. With the exception of a small appropriation for music, which does not begin to cover the cost of this instruction, these teachers have worked with us at not an extra dollar of cost in appropriations.

All school expenditures will be high next year and in the years just ahead. One paper item alone has advanced over forty per cent since last September. In spite of necessarily increased costs for the schools, we are not asking for any increase in school appropriations. The following budget has been recommended by the superintending school committee. Only by careful planning and experienced buying will these askings be sufficient:

STATE OF MAINE

To FRED C. MERRY, a Constable of the Town of Winterport, in the County of Waldo, Greetings:--

In the name of the State of Maine you are hereby requested to notify and warn the inhabitants of the said Town of Winterport, qualified by law to vote in town affairs to assemble in Union Hall in said town on Monday, March 23, 1942, at 9 o'clock A. M. to act on the following articles, to wit:

Art. 1 To choose a Moderator to preside at said meeting.

Art. 2 To choose a Clerk for the ensuing year.

Art. 3 To choose three or more Selectmen.

Art. 4 To fix the compensation of the Town Treasurer for the ensuing year.

Art. 5 To choose a Town Treasurer.

Art. 6 To fix the compensation of the Collector of Taxes for the ensuing year.

Art. 7 To choose a Collector of Taxes.

Art. 8 To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise to pay unpaid outstanding bills against the Town or act thereon.

Art. 9 To fix the compensation of Road Commissioner or Commissioners and wages to be paid men, teams and trucks employed on the Highway and to choose one or more Road Commissioners.

Art. 10 To choose one or more members of the Superintending School Committee.

Art. 11 To see what sums of money the town will vote to raise for the support of Common Schools; Free High School; High School Conveyance; Music; Free Textbooks and High School Library; School Supplies and Laboratory Equipment; Repairs, Insurance and Miscellaneous.

Art. 12 To see if the Town will vote to authorize the

Superintending School Committee to appoint a School Physician and to provide proper facilities for the performance of his duties.

Art. 13 To see if the town will authorize the proper town officials to sign a note for the purchase of a new school bus.

Art. 14 To see whether or not the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$50.00 for advertising our natural resources, advantages and attractions, under the provisions of Chapter 5, Section 82 of the Revised Statutes. Said money to be expended through the State of Maine Publicity Bureau.

Art. 15 To see what action the town will take to relieve crowded conditions in the School Buildings and to appropriate a sum of money for same, or act thereon.

Art. 16 To see if the town will raise and appropriate \$125.00 for public health work in Winterport, said sum to be expended by the Bureau of Health, State Department of Health and Welfare, in cooperation with local authorities.

Art. 17 To fix the rate of discount, if any, for the prompt payment of taxes and the time when said discount shall cease; to fix the time when the taxes due the town shall become collectible and payable; to determine whether interest shall be charged on taxes remaining unpaid after that date and the rate of such interest; to see if the town will vote to instruct its Collector of Taxes for the ensuing year, to collect all such taxes within the limit made by the State Law for the collection of taxes and instruct the Municipal Officers to require the Collector to give a bond for his faithful compliance with the vote under this article.

Art. 18 To see what sum the town will appropriate for State Aid road construction (in addition to the amount) regularly raised for the care of ways, highways and bridges under the provisions of Section 19, Chapter 28, Revised Statutes of 1930, or under the provisions of Section 3, Chapter 229, Public Laws of 1937.

Art. 19 To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$300.00 to be used in tarring town streets.

Art. 20 To see what sum, if any, the town would recommend to take from the third class apportionment for the purpose of applying bituminous surface treatment to THIRD CLASS ROADS, in excess of the requirements of Section 1, Chapter 207, Public Laws of 1939.

Art. 21 To see what sums of money the town will vote to raise for the maintenance of State and State Aid Highways, also for the maintenance of Third Class Highways during the year within the limits of the town, and maintenance of Special Resolve road.

Art. 22 To see what sums of money the town will vote to raise for the repairs of Highways and Bridges, and for clearing snow from the roads the ensuing year, for cutting bushes, and for sidewalks.

Art. 23 To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$500.00 to build the road leading from the Roy Nealley Place toward town line.

Art. 24 To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$500.00 to finish Treat Road.

Art. 25 To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$500.00 to build road on Boston Road so called or act thereon.

Art. 26 To see if the town will vote to continue sewer from Willow Street and Lincoln Ave. to West side of Main Street and to continue same sewer from its present end near Water Street to between high and low water mark.

Art. 27 To see what action the town will take regarding widening the road on Elm Street, from the Abbott Place so called, West to Route No. 139.

Art. 28 To see if the town will vote to appropriate a sum of money to complete the resurfacing and tarring of the Cole's Corner Road, so called, from the Thibodeau farm to Carleton's Corner.

Art. 29 To see if the town will vote to discontinue the road from the Meadow Road to the cemetery.

Art. 30 To see if the town will vote to accept a deed to the Larrabee Place so called.

Art. 31 To see if the town will vote to install a street light at Bald Hill Cove at the corner of Main Highway and the Baker Road.

Art. 32 To see if the town will vote to raise \$200.00 to co-operate with the Maine Forest Service and the Federal Government in the control of white pine blister rust within the confines of the town.

Art. 33 To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to continue W. P. A. projects.

Art. 34 To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for town's share of W. P. A. project expense.

Art. 35 To see what directions or instructions shall be given the Selectmen about authorizing suit in court for enforcement of liens for unpaid taxes and concerning those cases now pending in court or act thereon.

Art. 36 To see what action shall be taken about sale or disposal of property deeded to town by Sheriff's Deeds or otherwise or act thereon.

Art. 37 To see if the town will vote to increase the salary of the First Selectman from \$400.00 a year to \$600.00

Art. 38 To see what sums of money the town will vote

to raise for Support of Poor, for Salaries of Officers, for Abatement of Taxes, for Hydrant Rental and for other miscellaneous town expenses, for interest on Town Debt and Discount on Taxes, and for Mothers' Aid.

Art. 39 To see what sums of money the town will vote to raise for Memorial Purposes, for Free Library, for Winding Town Clock, for Lighting Streets, for Care of Monument Lot and also for Care of Town Lots in Oak Hill Cemetery.

Art. 40 To see what action the town will take regarding purchase of new Fire Truck.

- Art. 41 To choose three or more Assessors of Taxes.
- Art. 42 To choose three or more Overseers of the Poor.
- Art. 43 To choose one or more Constables.

Art. 44 To choose one or more Fire Wardens and fix the compensation.

Art. 45 To choose a Fire Inspector.

Art. 46 To see if the Town will vote to raise the amount of \$600.00 for Fire Truck service or act thereon.

Art. 47 To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for Fire Department maintenance.

Art. 48 To see what action the town will take regarding organizing a Volunteer Fire Dept.

Art. 49 To see what action the town will take in conjunction with the Town of Frankfort, in regard to building dam on Marsh Stream at West Winterport to help control flood condition.

Art. 50 To see what action the town will take in regard to a Town Manager, and he be some neutral person, and what wages shall be paid for such.

Art. 51 To choose one or more Fence Viewers.

Art. 52 To choose one or more Measurers of Wood, Bark and Lumber, Shingles, Clapboards, Hoops and Staves.

Art. 53 To choose one or more Sealers of Leather and Sealers of Weights and Measures.

Art. 54 To see if the town, for the purpose of procuring a temporary loan or loans to and for the use of said town in conducting its municipal business in the current municipal year of 1942 and in anticipation of and to be paid out of the taxes of the current municipal year of 1942, will authorize and direct the Town Treasurer, subject to the approval of the Selectmen, to borrow from time to time during said municipal year, a sum or sums not exceeding in the aggregate, the sum of seven thousand five hundred dollars, and to make, execute and deliver the negotiable note or notes of the town therefor, pay-

able within said current municipal year and upon such terms as shall be satisfactory to said Town Treasurer and Selectmen, any debt or debts incurred hereunder to be paid out of money raised by taxation during the present municipal year.

Art. 55 To see how much money the town will vote to raise to pay on outstanding bonds and notes.

Art. 56 To see if the town will vote to instruct all town officials to withhold payment of half of any money due any person who is indebted to the town for taxes or any other purpose until that debt due the town is paid or satisfied.

Art. 57 To see if the town will vote to instruct its Selectmen not to accept any bill against the town unless it is approved by the head of the department of town affairs for which the bill is rendered and unless the same is in proper form.

Art. 58 To see if the town will vote to authorize the

Selectmen and Treasurer of the town to sell and convey in the name of the Inhabitants of the Town of Winterport, the right, title and interest of the town in and to any or all real estate conveyed to the inhabitants of the town in proceedings for the collection of taxes.

Art. 59 To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen and Treasurer of the town to release and convey in the name of the Inhabitants of the Town of Winterport, to the owner at the time of assessment of the tax, or to his heirs or assigns, the right, title and interest acquired by the town in and to any or all real estate conveyed to the Inhabitants of the Town of Winterport in proceedings for collection of taxes, on payment of the amount of debt, interest and charges due on the respective parcels.

Art. 60 To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$500.00 for Defense purposes.

Art. 61 To choose a Town Agent.

Art. 62 To see if the town will vote to elect a committee of five to select a Town Agent.

Art. 63 To see what sum of money or salary the town will vote to pay the Town Agent.

Art. 64 To see if the town will vote to procure from the federal or state government or one of its agencies such fire fighting equipment and apparatus as hose trucks, pumpers, hook and ladder trucks and other fire fighting devices that can be procured therefrom for the proper and necessary protection of the Winterport Airport and appurtenances, a national defense area, as well as for our local municipal needs at no cost to the town.

Art. 65 To see if the town will elect a committee of three or more citizens to act for the town on the preceding article and to appropriate an amount not exceeding \$500.00 to defray the necessary expenses of said committee.
