REPORT OF AUDITOR

February 29, 1944.

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Winterport:

In accordance with the request of your municipal officers, this department, represented by M. E. Libby, has completed an examination of the accounts of your town officials for the municipal year ended February 15, 1944.

In our opinion, based upon such examination, the accompanying exhibits and schedules fairly present the financial condition of your municipality as of February 15, 1944 and the results of its operations for the municipal year then ended.

COMMENTS

Cash:

All cash recorded as received was found to have been properly accounted for and deposited in the bank currently, with the exception of \$21.50 cash on hand at the close of the year. The receipts are summarized on Exhibit B.

Expenditures were made by check, supported by warrants drawn by the Selectmen, as summarized on Exhibits B and D.

The cash balance reconciled with the last bank statement, as per detail shown on Schedule 1.

Taxes—Property and Poll:

The 1943 tax commitment was added and found to agree with the Assessors' records. The total commitment was accounted for by cash, authorized abatements, discounts, or still remained unpaid.

According to the records, payments received and abatements made on prior years' unpaid taxes appeared to have been credited against the proper balances. The unpaid taxes for the various years are summarized on Schedule 2, with the supporting detail being shown on Schedule 2-a.

All recorded receipts on tax liens and tax acquired property appeared to have been applied against the proper balances. The liens remaining unpaid are summarized on Schedule 3, with the supporting detail being shown on Schedule 3-a; while the tax acquired property is summarized and detailed on Schedule 4.

The cash collection of the current year's taxes was 85.5%; while all taxes collected during 1943, both current and prior, amounted to 105.5%, both as against the current commitment.

Excise Tax:

The excise tax receipts were checked and, according to these records, all collections were accounted for and deposited with the Treasurer. The receipts and disposition of same follows:

Trust Funds:

The trust fund investments were examined and the detail is shown on Schedule 7. The income appeared to have been properly accounted for.

The McKenney Fund, which was included in general cash last year, is now set up as a separate account and the detail of investments of this fund is shown on Schedule 6.

Net Surplus:

Reference to Exhibit A indicates that as of the close of the municipal year there was a Net Surplus in the amount of \$16,731.30, as compared with a Net Surplus of \$14,324.24 shown the year previous. This is a beneficial change of \$2,407.06, the analysis of which is shown on Exhibit E of this report.

General:

All outstanding warrants were paid at the close of the year.

A substantial number of paid bills and payrolls were checked and those examined appeared to be proper charges and correctly recorded.

The records of dog licenses issued by the Town Clerk showed collection in the sum of \$118.40, which amount was paid to the State Treasurer.

The Withholding Tax appeared to have been properly handled and the amount of \$207.50 was due the Internal Revenue Department at the close of the year.

With the exception of cash and trust funds, no external verification was made of your asset and liability accounts.

REPORT CONCERNING FIRE EQUIPMENT

Your Selectmen and Fire Warden Robert Nickerson have been trying ever since May 1943 to secure from the Government, permission or priority to purchase a fire truck and equipment. In June 1943 an application was made to the Government for truck and equipment. We were denied the right to purchase and copy of that denial is printed here for your information. We were informed that we could again apply in Nov. 1943.

It was not until January 1944 that we could again locate any suitable truck chassis and immediately we started another application for permission to purchase. We have not yet heard from this application but are surely hoping the application for priority will be granted.

There is no doubt in our minds and we believe there is none in any citizen's mind but that our fire danger is ever present and very serious.

We advise and strongly urge that you take definite action this year to purchase adequate fire truck and equipment.

REPORT OF THE PUBLIC HEALTH NURSE

1943

The work of another year has been finished. In some ways it has been a hard year. The restrictions on driving, caused by limited supplies of gas and tires; the changes in population, due to civilians working in war industries, and many of the boys being inducted into military service, have made organizing and planning difficult.

We are fortunate, that as yet, there has been no serious epidemics of communicable diseases, though we hear rumors of flu spreading. Should a "flu" epidemic start, could we be certain of controlling it? Are we prepared to take care of the sick in their own homes? Remember there is no chance of hospitalization.

Do you know how many of your citizens and children have been protected against smallpox, typhoid fever, diphtheria and whooping cough? There are immunizing agents which make it unnecessary to be ill with any of the above diseases, may be administered with very little discomfort and time, and procured at very reasonable cost.

Are you acquainted with the plans for Health Education in the schools? Are your children benefited by a hot dish to supplement their lunch brought from home? Have you heeded the teacher's report on hearing and visual defects and sought medical advice? Early attention may save much serious trouble later on.

The health program in your town is yours. Your cooperation is vitally needed to make it successful. There is need for committee organization to help plan for Child Health Conferences and Immunization Clinics. Your town officers and public health nurse will appreciate any assistance you believe you have time and ability to give.

This war your boys are helping to fight can be won only by the closest cooperation among the officers and the men with their allies, backed up by those on the home front producing arms, ammunition, planes, ships, food and clothing. The health of everyone must be maintained.

It is also a fact that any Health or Welfare Program in your town can only be successful to the extent that the parents, officers and children cooperate with each other and any of the agencies which stand ready to help.

The nurse has made forty visits to your town this year. During these visits sixty-four children have been given the tuberculin test; eighteen nursing visits have been made to expectant mothers; fifty-four nursing visits to infants; and sixty-six nursing visits to pre-school children.

Sixteen home visits were made to school children in their homes in an effort to secure corrections for physical defects and to find solutions to other health problems which had been presented by the teachers.

As in the past all crippled children have been followed up and closely supervised by visits to the homes and by the supervision offered by clinics.

During this emergency, with the shortage of doctors and the limited amount of transportation available, it is more important than ever before that each community be aware of its own health problems and to work toward the solution of these problems. This can be accomplished only by the united effort of interested community leaders, organized as a community Health Committee whose purpose should be to learn the needs of the community, to interpret these needs to the citizens, to know the services offered by the public health nurse, to interpret these services to the community, and to stand behind the Health Program.

Let us all cooperate for better health in 1944 for every citizen in the community.

GREETINGS:

For the seventh consecutive year it becomes my duty to present this, my annual, report.

CHANGES

The New Order of the day has not left the schools untouched. Great indeed was the loss from our Committee counsels of the clear-thinking, business-like judgments of our Mr. George Bryant. Mr. Robert Nickerson was elected to succeed Mr. Bryant on the Committee.

We have been most fortunate in finding and selecting teachers for the current school year. As one considers that only 40 per cent as many students are preparing for teaching as in 1939-40, we realize that the teacher situation in Maine is indeed a desperate one. This is true, not only for the immediate future, but for the next ten-year period at hand. Unlike many towns we did not need to employ retired teachers nor persons with inadequate training. For this our citizens and parents are duly grateful.

At the High School, Miss Hawkins left the language department for a more remunerative position as did Mr. Raymond from the eighth grade and Miss Banks from the Commercial Department. These positions were filled with well-trained, experienced teachers. Mr. Sumner Clark, a former teacher in our schools took over the eighth grade; Mrs. Mary Gould, a graduate of the Bay Path Institute Training School, who taught in the Commercial Department of Old Town has done excellent work. Mr. Harold Philbrook, a graduate of Beloit College with an A.B. and also a graduate from New York University with a Master's Degree in Arts in 1938, was secured for the language department.

In the Grade Schools—Miss Myrtle Condon with a year at Colby College and a graduate of Eastern State Normal School in 1942, also a year's experience teaching in Hancock was engaged for Grade 1; Mrs. Florence Philbrook, a graduate of Eastern State Normal School and with several years' experience has been in Grade 3 this year. Miss Helen Carroll, a graduate of Farmington Normal in 1943, was placed in charge of English and Reading; while Miss Helen Powers also of Farmington Normal graduating class of 1943 took over the Social Sciences. Our greatest teacher problem this last year was to secure a well-qualified Principal for the Grade School system. This was made needful by the death, in the summer of Mrs. Elsie Tre-cartin, our former Principal.

After much searching and consideration, and with plenty of candidates to choose from, we secured Mrs. Velma Stanley Teel for this important position. Mrs. Teel is a graduate of the Eastern State Normal School and with several summer sessions at Bates College and the University of Maine. Mrs. Teel has had wide experience in the teaching field including six years teaching of mathematics in the Old Town schools. Two items, among many warrant a mention here. Mrs. Worcester, a member of the Daughters of the American Revolution Committee on Citizenship, interested Mrs. Teel and her teachers in forming Junior Citizenship Clubs. These have done much to create interest in good citizenship among the children. The

Grade School has also done a very creditable bit of work along patriotism—they have set aside each Thursday as War Bond and Savings Stamps sales day; up to the present they have purchased with their dimes and quarters a total of \$671.60.

We hope to retain the services of all our teachers for the coming school year.

The coming of the majority of Frankfort High School students to Winterport High School has been a real asset to our school. They have creditably competed with our own students with pleasure and profit to both groups.

TEXTBOOKS AND SUPPLIES

For the past six-year period we have steadily been replacing and building up a most excellent set of textbooks. The town is fortunate that this has been done. We are now getting books of inferior quality and a drastic shortage in the textbook field is predicted for the coming year. One change, of real benefit has been the Elementary Language books. After careful consideration of many available books in this field, we selected the McKee Language series. Our choice of these books has received many favorable comments not only from our own teachers but a Grade School Principal of a large school system made the remark "Yes, we would have liked to have had McKee language books but it was not made possible for us." A former Winterport teacher, now teaching in New Jersey, upon visiting our schools during the Christmas period said "Oh, you have the McKee language books, so do we." And New Jersey is an up-to-date school State. Our spelling program has been revised and a new spelling book placed in the hands of each pupil this year. In spite of these and other major expenditures our textbook expenditure has been small this year.

Supplies—Our teachers and pupils have not wanted for any needful teaching materials even in scarce and practically non-obtainable items such as Scotch-tape, metal pencil sharpeners, etc. These together with an ample supply of chalk, colored crayons, paper, construction paper and other supplies make both teaching and learning much more pleasant and certainly more efficient.

REPAIRS

For the last few years we have realized how dilapidated was the High School building. We were ready to paint the exterior but help was not available. We did, however, completely renovate every classroom in the High School building with a two-coat paint job for wood-work and walls. This has made these rooms much more attractive. Instead of doing the radiators with metallic paint, as is the custom, we did them over with a flat paint which does not cause a loss of heat. We have added double-hung curtains to another room in the Grade School; these give a maximum of light and air without sunlight glare. Such curtains are expensive over the ordinary type but they relieve eye-strain for the pupil.

SCHOOL PROBLEMS

We are reminded again of the excellent transportation facilities which the town of Winterport provides for all the school children. Few towns in the State provide transportation for High School students.

In the early summer we found ourselves faced, not only with the usual transportation problems for these are always with us, but a much more serious difficulty presented itself. We did not have transportation for the Ellingwood's Corner and River Road children. A new school bus could not be obtained. But those children must be brought to school. Therefore we purchased the 1934 Ford chassis and bus body from Mr. Willard Clark, the former conveyor. We had this bus thoroughly overhauled and newly painted, upholstery re-

paired and general repair job on glass, etc. This bus is now owned by the Town of Winterport and for this unlooked-for expenditure you have not been asked to raise an extra dollar. Instead there is a very creditable balance carried forward for next year. You are, of course, expecting an increase in school askings this year. This is needful because of a decrease in Equalization money for next year. Your Superintending School Committee after much discussion and planning submit the following budget askings for your approval and usual generous consideration:

TOWN WARRANT

STATE OF MAINE

To FRED C. MERRY, a Constable of the Town of Winterport, in
the County of Waldo, GREETINGS:

In the name of the State of Maine, you are hereby requested to notify and warn the inhabitants of the said Town of Winterport, qualified by law to vote in town affairs, to assemble in Union Hall in said town on Monday, March 20, 1944, at 9 o'clock A. M., to act on the following articles, to wit:

Art. 1. To choose a Moderator to preside at said meeting.

Art. 2. To choose a Clerk for the ensuing year.

Art. 3. To choose three or more Selectmen.

Art. 4. To fix the compensation of the Town Treasurer for the ensuing year.

Art. 5. To choose a Town Treasurer.

Art. 6. To fix the compensation of the Collector of Taxes for the ensuing year.

Art. 7. To choose a Collector of Taxes.

Art. 8. To see if the Town will vote to discontinue the so-called Sunken Bridge road leading from Ellingwood's Corner to Newburg road near Newburg.

Art. 9. To fix the compensation of Road Commissioner or Commissioners and wages to be paid men, teams and trucks employed on the highway and to choose one or more Road Commissioners.

Art. 10. To choose one or more members of the Superintending School Committee.

Art. 11. To see what sums of money the town will vote to raise for the support of Common Schools, Free High School, High School Conveyance, Music, Free Textbooks and High School Library, School Supplies and Laboratory Equipment, Repairs, Insurance and Miscellaneous.

Art. 12. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Superintending School Committee to appoint a School Physician and to provide proper facilities for the performance of his duties.

Art. 13. To see if the town will vote to lease the Winterport Municipal Airport, "Fernald Field," and all adjoining land owned by the town, to Roy L. Fernald for a term of ten years, for one dollar per year and exempt from local taxation all buildings, hangers and personal property kept on same and erected thereon by him or his assigns during the period of the lease. Said Roy L. Fernald or his assigns to have the option to renew, for another ten year period, said lease under same terms at two hundred dollars per year.

Art. 14. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to enter into an agreement for the management of lands purchased by the Soil Conservation Service within the town of Winterport, if and providing said Board of Selectmen deem the same advisable.

Art. 15. To see if the town will vote to raise one hundred dollars to erect signs to designate local streets by name and other important unmarked sections of the town and to name a Committee of three to carry out the provisions of this article.

Art. 16. To see if the town will raise and appropriate \$125.00 for public health work in Winterport, said sum to be expended by the Bureau of Health, State Department of Health and Welfare, in cooperation with local authorities, for local service.

Art. 17. To fix the rate of discount, if any, for the prompt payment of taxes and the time when said discount shall cease; to fix the time when the taxes due the town shall become collectible and payable; to determine whether interest shall be charged on taxes remaining unpaid after that date and the rate of such interest; to see if the town will vote to instruct its Collector of Taxes for the ensuing year to collect all such taxes within the limit made by the State law for the collection of taxes and instruct the Municipal Officers to require the Collector to give a bond for his faithful compliance with the vote under this article.

Art. 18. To see what sum the town will appropriate for State Aid road construction (in addition to the amount regularly raised for the care of ways, highways and bridges), under the provisions of Section 19, Chapter 28, Revised Statutes of 1930, or under the provisions of Section 3, Chapter 229, Public Laws of 1937.

Art. 19. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for repairs on the Haley Road.

Art. 20. To see if the town will vote to discontinue the road from the foot of Conant's Hill to top of said hill at the Ebberson place.

Art. 21. To see what sums of money the town will vote to raise for the maintenance of State and State Aid Highways, also for the maintenance of Third Class Highways during the year within the limits of the town, and maintenance of Special Resolve Road.

Art. 22. To see what sums of money the town will vote to raise for the repairs of Highways and Bridges and for clearing snow from the roads the ensuing year, for cutting bushes, for sidewalks, and tarring town streets.

Art. 23. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$200.00 to be used in repairing road from White's Corner North, towards Newburg.

Art. 24. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$300.00 to be used in repairing the Upper Oak Point road.

Art. 25. To see if the town will vote to purchase a new truck and equipment to be used as a Fire Truck and to authorize the Selectmen and Treasurer to borrow not over \$5,000.00 to be used in purchasing Fire Truck and equipment and to sign notes payable \$1,000.00 annually starting in 1944.

Art. 26. To see if the town will vote to raise \$200.00 to cooperate with the Maine Forest Service and the Federal Government in the control of white pine blister rust within the confines of the town.

Art. 27. To see what directions or instructions shall be given the Selectmen about authorizing suit in court for enforcement of liens for unpaid taxes and concerning those cases now pending in court, or act thereon.

Art. 28. To see what action shall be taken about sale or disposal of property deeded to town by Sheriff's Deeds or otherwise, or act thereon.

Art. 29. To see what sums of money the town will vote to raise for Support of Poor, for Salaries of Officers, for Abatement of Taxes, for Hydrant Rental and for other miscellaneous town expenses, for Interest on Town Debt and Discount on Taxes, and for Mother's Aid.

Art. 30. To see what sums of money the town will vote to raise for Memorial Purposes, for Free Library, for Winding Town Clock, for Lighting Streets, for Care of Monument Lot, and also for Care of Town Lots in Oak Hill Cemetery.

Art. 31. To see if the town will vote to discontinue the road leading from Barney Cole place so-called to Hampden line.

Art. 32. To see what sums of money the town will vote to raise for Fire Department Maintenance, Fire Truck Housing and Equipment.

Art. 33. To choose three or more Assessors of Taxes.

Art. 34. To choose three or more Overseers of the Poor.

Art. 35. To choose one or more Constables.

Art. 36. To choose one or more Fire Wardens and fix the compensation.

Art. 37. To choose a Fire Inspector.

Art. 38. To see what action the town will take regarding organizing a Volunteer Fire Department.

Art. 39. To see if the town will authorize the Selectmen and Treasurer to purchase the snow plow now owned by George M. Ritchie if the same is deemed advisable.

Art. 40. To choose one or more Fence Viewers.

Art. 41. To choose one or more Measurers of Wood, Bark and Lumber, Shingles, Clapboards, Hoops and Staves.

Art. 42. To choose one or more Sealers of Leather and Sealers of Weights and Measures.

Art. 43. To see if the town, for the purpose of procuring a temporary loan or loans to and for the use of said town in conducting its municipal business in the current municipal year of 1944 and in anticipation of and to be paid out of the taxes of the current municipal year of 1944, will authorize and direct the Town Treasurer, subject to the approval of the Selectmen, to borrow from time to time during said municipal year, a sum or sums not exceeding in the aggregate the sum of seven thousand five hundred dollars, and to make, execute and deliver the negotiable note or notes of the town therefor, payable within said current municipal year and upon such terms as shall be satisfactory to said Town Treasurer and Selectmen, any debt or debts incurred hereunder to be paid out of money raised by taxation during the present municipal year.

Art. 44. To see how much money the town will vote to raise to pay on outstanding bonds and notes.

Art. 45. To see if the town will vote to instruct all town officials to withhold payment of half of any money due any person who is indebted to the town for taxes or any other purpose until that debt due the town is paid or satisfied.

Art. 46. To see if the town will vote to instruct its Selectmen not to accept any bill against the town unless it is approved by the head of the department of town affairs for which the bill is rendered and unless the same is in proper form.

Art. 47. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen and Treasurer of the town to sell and convey in the name of the Inhabitants of the Town of Winterport, the right, title and interest of the town in and to any or all real estate conveyed to the inhabitants of the town in proceedings for the collection of taxes.

Art. 48. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen and Treasurer of the town to release and convey in the name of the Inhabitants of the Town of Winterport, to the owner at the time of assessment of the tax, or to his heirs or assigns, the right, title and interest acquired by the town in and to any or all real estate conveyed to the Inhabitants of the Town of Winterport in proceedings for collection of taxes, on payment of the amount of debt, interest and charges due on the respective parcels.

Art. 49. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$150.00 for defense purposes.
