REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the Superintending School Committee and Citizens of the Town of Peru:

I hereby submit my second annual report of the Peru Schools:

The past year has been one of difficulty in maintaining schools because of the continuing increasing cost of living, which is necessarily reflected in the need for higher salaries and larger amounts expended for books, supplies, fuel, conveyance, and high school tuition. The teacher shortage is still acute and will continue to be so for some time, and there is no relief in sight in the near future in school maintenance.

The fact that our school has continued to offer the best possible facilities in elementary education has been wholly due to the conscientious and efficient work of the teachers and the willingness of the School Board and citizens to support an adequate program.

Martha Griffin, teacher of Grades three and four, resigned last June in order to acept a position at Dixfield where she could teach within a few minutes' walk of her home. Aileen Sherwood was elected to fill the vacancy and has been doing excellent work in these grades. The Primary Room has had over fifty pupils enrolled this year. We do not anticipate any higher enrollment next year, but it is apparent that if our primary grades should increase, it will be necessary to divide these grades and secure another teacher.

HIGH SCHOOL TUITION

The total number registered at different high schols for the Fall Term beginning last September is sixty-one. Of these, three left school during the term, leaving fifty-nine enrolled at the present time. Eleven Seniors will be removed from the list by graduation next June and about that number will be added in September as Freshmen, so that we should anticipate paying tuition for at least sixty next year. The cost this past year has been over \$7000.00 for High School Tuition. Advances in rates now in effect will mean a sum approaching \$8000.00 for next year.

Athalie Child, unable to attend school because of illness, has been receiving special tutoring at home in order to complete the work of the Senior year. For this the town pays a sum equal to the per capita cost of secondary education at the nearest high school and the State pays the balance. By arrangement with Superintendent Peakes and Principal Brown of Rumford, Athalie will, upon completion of her work, be granted a Stephens High diploma.

REPAIRS AND EQUIPMENT

The major item under Repairs and Equipment this past year has been installation of two new furnaces at a cost of approximately \$1,200.00. Money for these was raised in a special appropriation at the last town meeting and was not included in the regular School Department funds. The furnaces are giving good satisfaction.

Five hundred dollars was raised last year for this account and we received \$35.00 in refund on a piano, making \$535..00 available. Expenditures were \$557.57, leaving an overdraft of \$22.57. There was an overdraft in 1946 of \$281.80, so that the total overdrawn in the account is \$307.37. During this past year we have spent \$105.50 on pianos and tuning, \$78.05 for asbestos-base roof coating, \$179.65 for applying coating to the roof, a brick incinerator, and routine repairs and upkeep, \$10.00 for mowing grass, and \$184.37 for supplies and materials.

A telephone was installed at the school and is proving to be a valuable addition. This was provided for under Office Expense.

Some exterior painting should be done this coming summer. One coat applied now would result in ultimate saving.

FINANCES

Our expenditures for school purposes during 1947 have been approximately what we anticipated in the budget. The

continuing high cost of living is being reflected in the higher cost to maintain schools. We are paying more for salaries, conveyance, high school tuition, books, and supplies of all kinds. To maintain our school at its present level and pay tuition on about sixty high school pupils, it will be necessary to increase the school department budget by over ten per cent. Our total receipts during this last year were \$21,956.18 and our total expenditures \$21,887.82. There are overdrafts in Repairs and Equipment and Superintendence amounting to \$330.97, and unexpended balances in Common schools, Office Expense, and the Gammon Gift Fund, amounting to \$399.33. Subtracting the overdrafts from the unexpended balances leaves \$68.36, the amount of cash on hand.

CONCLUSION

Our most pressing need is the provision of an adequate water supply. During periods of drought the present source

will not yield sufficient water for the school and the homes which use the same source. Upon several occasions during the past fall we have had to resort to hauling water in order to keep school in session.

Mr. Gerrish has kept our classrooms in excellent condition, and we do not anticipate any extensive repair work this coming year with the exception of the desirability of exterior painting mentioned under Repairs and Equipment.

If, because of increased enrollment in the Primary Grades, it should become necessary to employ another teacher and convert a part of the lunchroom into a classroom, we shall have to expend a considerable amount for a partition in the room, for additional seating, and other classroom appliances. We hope we shall not have to do this, but it is a distinct possibility.

I am deeply grateful for the cooperation and interest of the Superintending School Committee, the other town officials, the teaching staff, parents and pupils in the attempt to offer Peru pupils the best possible in educational facilities.

WARRANT FOR ANNUAL TOWN MEETING

To Rollins Kidder, a Constable of the Town of Peru in the County of Oxford,

Greeting:

You are required, in the name of the State of Maine, to notify and warn the inhabitants of the Town of Peru, qualified to vote in town affairs to assemble at the Town Hall, in said Town on Monday, the First day of March A. D. 1948, at 10 o'clock in the forenoon, to act on the following articles to wit:

- Art. 1. To choose a moderator to preside at said meeting.
- Art. 2. To choose a Clerk for the ensuing year.
- Art. 3. To see if the Town will accept the report of the several Town Officers.
- Art. 4. To see if the Town will vote to instruct the Selectmen to appoint one or more Road Commissioners for the ensuing year.
- Art. 5. To see if the Town will vote to elect one or more Road Commissioners.
 - Art. 6. To fix compensation of the collector of taxes.
- Art. 7. To choose all necessary Town Officers, Selectmen, Assessors, Overseers of Poor, Fence Viewers, Surveyors of Wood and Lumber, Tax Collector, Road Commissioner, Treasurer, Sexton, Superintending School Committee, Constables, Fire Chief and Health Officer.
- Art. 8. To see how much money the town will vote to raise for the maintenance and Support of Schools, the Poor Maintenance, Repair and Maintenance of Roads and Bridges, the Maintenance of State and State Road and Third Class Roads, Town Officers and to defray all other necessary Town charges.
- Art. 9. To see if the Town will vote to raise the salary of the Clerk and Treasurer from \$350.00 to \$450.00 or take any action thereto.
- Art. 10. To see if the Town will vote to raise \$100.00 for Public Health Nursing. Said sum to be expended by the State Bureau of Health for local service.
- Art. 11. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for Reconstruction of Third Class Road to make it acceptable as State Aid.
- Art. 12. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for State Aid Road Construction in addition to the amounts regularly raised for the care of Highways and Bridges

under the provisions of Sections 25 and 29, Chapter 20, Revised Statutes, 1944, as amended.

- Art. 13. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for Special Resolve Road Maintenance.
- Art. 14. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for Snow Removal.
- Art. 15. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise to continue to widen, resurface and tar Pleasant Street or take any action thereto.
- Art. 16. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise to construct a piece of improved road on West side of Worthley Pond, said construction to begin at end of present Special Resolve Road and to be of same type and width.
- Art. 17. To see what action the Town will take in regard to plowing driveways.
- Art. 18. To see if the Town will vote to instruct its Superintending School Committee to open and maintain a school at the East Peru School House.
- Art. 19. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise for Town owned building, repair and maintenance.
- Art. 20. To see what action the Town will take in regard to the lot sold to Walter Byron.
- Art. 21. To see if the Town will vote to raise \$250.00 to purchase land and fence the same between West Peru School Lot and Spear Stream or take any action thereto.
- Art. 22. To see if the Town will vote to take any action about the water supply at West Peru School and raise money for same.
- Art. 23. To see if the Town will vote to accept a Cemetery Lot Trust Fund of \$200.00 from the late Clementine Simpson of Rumford buried in the DeMerritt Cemetery.
- Art. 24. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for the maintenance of Peru Fire Department.
- Art. 25. To see if the Town will vote to sell the pumper received last year or take any action thereto.
- Art. 26. To see if the Town will vote to make some arrangments with Dixfield and Rumford so they can be called in case of fire.
- Art. 27. To see if the Town will vote to purchase a power shovel.
- Art. 28. To see if the Town will vote to raise money for a new Garage and Fire Station.
- Art. 29 To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for equipment for the new Fire Truck.

- Art. 30. To see what action the Town will take about the Worthley Pond dump and raise money for same.
- Art. 31. To see if the Town of Peru will vote to adopt the following By-Law:

By-Law Relating to Fireworks

- Section 1. It shall be unlawful for any person, firm or corporation to sell, offer for sale, display for sale, or give away any fireworks, firecrackers, pyrotechnics of every kind and description, and devices for discharging the same, within the limits of the Town of Peru.
- Section 2. It shall be unlawful for any person to use, fire, discharge or explode any fireworks, firecrackers or other pyrotechnics within the Town of Peru.
- Section 3. The Board of Selectmen may issue permits for public pyrotechnic displays when the same are to be under the control of a competent person or persons, and when the Board of Selectmen is satisfied that proper precautions will be taken to protect life and property.
- Section 4. Nothing in this ordinance shall be construed to prohibit a duly licensed dealer or broker from selling fireworks to any person or organization holding a permit for a public pyrotechnic display issued under the provision of section 3 of this ordinance, or from selling fireworks at wholesale to be shipped or delivered beyond the limits of the Town of Peru.
- Section 5. The provisions of this ordinance shall not apply to the sale, possession or use of ammunition, firearms, dynamite, flares and explosive devices for signalling purposes, or to blank cartridges for theatrical purposes or for signal purposes in athletic contests or sport events.
- Section 6. Any person, firm or corporation violating any provision of this ordinance shall be guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon conviction thereof shall be subject to a fine not exceeding twenty (\$20.00) dollars for each offense. Each sale in violation hereof shall constitute a separate offense.
- Section 7. All fireworks, firecrackers and pyrotechnics of every kind and description shall, when the same are found and taken by virtue of a search warrant, or are found in the possession or under the control of any person arrested for the violation of the provisions of this ordinance, be safely kept by the direction of

the court or magistrate having cognizance of the case so long as may be necessary for their being used as evidence on any trial. Upon final judgment, all such articles shall be declared forfeited by the court, and ordered destroyed.

- Section 8. Any ordinance or part thereof inconsistent herewith is hereby repealed.
- Section 9. If any section of this ordinance, or part thereof, be declared invalid for any reason, it shall not affect the validity of the remainder of this ordinance.
- Art. 32. To see if the Town will vote to raise money for the maintenance of Town lights.
- Art. 33. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the selectmen to enter into a 10 yr. contract with the Rumford Light Co. for furnishing 62 street lights and lighting service in West Peru.
- Art. 34. To see if the town will vote to allow the selectmen to sell and convey by quit claim deed any or all property acquired by tax lieus.
- Art. 35. To see if the Town will authorize the Town Treasurer with the approval of the selectmen to hire such sums of money as may be necessary to pay Town charges and Town debts in anticipation of the colelction of taxes and to issue and negotiate the notes of the Town for the money so borrowed to an amount not exceeding in the aggregate the total tax levy for the preceding municipal year as temporary loans to be paid during the year 1948 by the taxes.

Art. 36. To transact an yother business that may legally come before said meeting.

The Selectmen give notice that they will be in session at the Town hall in Peru at 9 o'clock in the forenoon on the 1st day of March, A. D. 1948, for the purpose of correcting the list of voters.

COMMENTS

Re: Audit of Accounts — Town of Peru February 2, 1946 to February 1, 1947 CASH

The cash receipts were checked and found to be correctly recorded.

The cash balance of \$11,316.33 was reconciled with the depository and it was determined that an overage of \$39.30 existed in the Treasurer's cash. The records of the Treasurer were checked to the date of the audit and the overage still existed, but the reason for it was not determined nor explained. It was suggested that a Treasurer's Receipt be drawn for the amount of \$39.30.

Expenditures were made by check from properly authorized warrants.

ACCOUNTS RECEIVABLE

The items in this account total \$1,558.68 and are current, with the exception of \$209.56 which is due from the State for charity and which has been questioned by the Department of Health and Welfare.

TAXES RECEIVABLE

The 1946 tax commitment was checked and found to be in agreement with the records of the Assessors. Approximately 98% of this commitment was collected or abated. The taxes remaining unpaid on this commitment totaled \$1,458 and are shown on Schedule A-9.

The transactions affecting prior years' taxes were checked and found to be in order, with the exception of an overpayment of \$1.50 by the Tax Collector.

ACCOUNTS PAYABLE

The item of \$1.50 in this account is due the Tax Collector.

TRUST FUNDS

The saving passbooks covering the investment of the Cemetery Perpetual Care Funds were examined and it was voted that the interest earned is withdrawn annually and any unexpended income is carried in the General Fund.

Expenditures made during the year appeared to be in order.

SURPLUS

The Unappropriated Surplus of \$10,077.38 at the beginning of the municipal year was decreased \$6,007.08 during the year, due to appropriations of \$9,726.08 made at the annual town meeting for capital expenditures and a net gain of \$3,719.00 as the result of current operations.

GENERAL

Corporate surety bonds were furnished by the Tax Collector and the Treasurer.

The excise tax receipts were added and checked and all collections were found to have been deposited with the Treasurer, with the exception of \$1.37 which was set up as an account receivable.

Paid vouchers and payrolls on file were examined to the extent deemed necessary and so far as could be determined from this examination, all appeared to be proper charges and recorded correctly. It was noted, however, that invoices substantiating expenditures in the School Department were not on file.

During the course of the examination of the records of the

Treasurer, it was noted that a checkbook balance is not maintained.

RECOMMENDATIONS

It is recommended,

THAT, the Treasurer maintain a checkbook balance and that he reconcile this balance with the cashbook and depository monthly.
