### REPORT OF AUDITOR

February 25, 1946.

In accordance with Chapter 16, Section 3, Revised Statutes of 1944 and at your request, the records of the town of Winterport have been audited by Auditor Millard E. Libby for the period February 18, 1945 to February 9, 1946 inclusive.

The examination was made in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards applicable in the circumstances and included all procedures which were considered necessary. Insofar as could be ascertained within the scope of the examination, the financial transactions of the town appear to have been satisfactorily handled.

Exhibits and schedules incorporated in this report impartially present the financial position of the town and the result of its operations for the period designated.

Comments and other data incorporated in this report may prove of interest to you. All of which is respectfully submitted.

Re: Audit of the Town of Winterport February 18, 1945 to February 9, 1946

Cash: All cash recorded as received was found to have been properly accounted for and was deposited in the bank, with the exception of \$5.40 which was on hand.

Expenditures were made by check from properly authorized warrants.

The cash balance of \$12,816.41 reconciled with the amount reported by the depository bank.

#### Accounts Receivable:

The receivables include \$1,600 of special resolves due from the state and \$16 due from the Town of Monroe for charity supplies.

#### Taxes Receivable:

The 1945 tax commitment was reconciled with the Assessors' records. \$40,672.87, or 87.8% of the total assessment of \$46,311.50 charged to the Tax Collector, was represented by cash collections, abatements, or discounts; while \$5,638.63, or 12.2%, remained uncollected.

A reserve of \$483.53 was set up to provide for possible losses on collection of taxes receivable.

The detail of the several years' uncollected taxes was in agreement with the respective control accounts. Approximately 15% of the uncollected tax accounts were verified by letter.

#### Tax Liens:

The tax liens on file were examined. Payments had apparently been properly credited and the detail of uncollected liens was in agreement with the control account.

### Tax Acquired Property:

The amount of \$419.35 was realized from the sale of tax acquired property during the year and \$36.70 was adjusted or charged off, leaving a balance of \$1,136.38 at February 9, 1946.

#### McKenney Fund:

Cash of \$1,352.69 on deposit represents the unused income of this fund. The Merrill Trust Company is trustee and the town receives the income only. This fund is for worthy poor and is to be expended at the discretion of the Selectmen.

#### Notes and Bonds Payable:

Bonds payable of \$2,000, representing the entire amount outstanding, were retired during the year under examination.

Notes amounting to \$2,000 remain outstanding and are to be retired in the next two years.

#### Surplus:

An increase of \$2,594.21 was noted in the unappropriated surplus, which was principally due to the retirement of bonds and notes by appropriation.

#### **Trust Funds:**

The trust fund investments were verified and the income was properly accounted for.

#### General:

A large percentage of the payrolls and vouchers were checked and all so examined appeared to be reasonable and proper charges.

The excise tax revenue was verified by examination of the Collector's copies of receipts issued and the income had been deposited with the Treasurer.

It was necessary to check the Treasurer's payments in detail in order to prove the cash balance.

The surety bonds covering the Treasurer and Collector were examined and appeared adequate.

# REPORT OF PUBLIC HEALTH NURSE

1945

The following is a report of the Public Health Nursing Service carried in your town for the year 1945.

The nurse has made 34 visits to the town. During these visits the following nursing visits were made: three to expectant mothers, 37 to infant and 95 to preschool children.

In school work 30 nursing visits were made and teachers given an opportunity to discuss health program.

As in previous years crippled children have been kept under supervision with home nursing visits and attendance at Crippled Children's Clinics.

There is much need for immunization programs if the community is to be safeguarded against such diseases as smallpox, diphtheria, whooping cough and typhoid fever.

For making plans for health activities for 1946 a well organized community Health Committee can do much to improve cooperation among the several departments responsible for health education, namely: Town Officers, Health Officer, School Personnel and the Public Health Nurse.

Since community participation is essential for a successful health program, the chief aim of the nurse for 1946 is committee organization. Your assistance is vitally needed.

# REPORT OF WINTERPORT VOLUNTEER FIRE DEPARTMENT

During the year ending February 1, 1946, the Fire Department was called out on 39 alarms, an average of a fire every nine days throughout the year. Of this total, two fires resulted in complete losses, and the other 37 fires produced negligible or no damage to dwellings.

Interest in the work of the Fire Department and cooperation with it are on the increase, due to three factors:

First, the town officials have been most cooperative in making purchases of equipment needed to increase the efficiency of the department. Purchases of both 1½-inch and 2½-inch hose have kept the truck loaded to its full hose capacity, and fittings have been procured to allow the use of both sizes at major fires. Alterations in the design of the truck have increased the length of booster hose which can be carried, and this extra hose is now in use. A new scaling ladder and a new extension ladder, both built for fire department use, have replaced older and lighter equipment and increased the safety for climbing firemen.

Second, the town is now paying the regular members of the Fire Department on a monthly basis for time accumulated during the month. Payment is usually made to men who turn out regularly for all alarms, but payment is made also to other than regular members who do outstanding work at individual fires.

In the third place, some adverse publicity directed at the department has reacted favorably in driving home the fact that an organized department actually does exist, and that it is trying to accomplish results against handicaps that are, at times, almost impossible to overcome. Once fully appreciated and understood, many of the main problems of this strictly volunteer department will be overcome by increased aid from the willing citizens of the town.

With the spirit of cooperation which exists today, the town will have an improved Fire Department in the coming year. More equipment is needed but at the present time most items are needed only to supplement equipment already in use. No major purchases are under consideration at present.

The most important point requiring action during the coming year is to provide a building to house the fire truck and the department's equipment. This is very important, since the present set-up allows no means of caring for hose and drying it after each use. This lack of care results in such failures as was experienced at a recent fire when six lengths of 2½-inch hose burst under pressures of less than 100 pounds, causing delays in the delivery of water which might have been extremely serious. The material saving to the town in owning a proper fire house with provision for drying hose will be considerable. The sincere cooperation of all property owners and renters is urged to bring about this most important improvement in the affairs of the Winterport Fire Department.

To the School Committee and the Citizens of Winterport:

In accordance with the Laws of Maine relating to Public Schools, I have the honor to submit the following report on the conditions and progress of the schools in Winterport for the year ending Feb. 1, 1946.

Once again I am pleased to report that your schools have been successfully staffed with capable teachers. There have been four changes made in the teaching personnel, two at each school. Miss Mary Young is teaching language in the high school, replacing Mrs. Margaret Nelson, who resigned after twelve years of faithful service. Miss Aileen Holman, social studies teacher, filled the vacancy caused by the resignation of Mrs. Thelma Kennedy, who has rejoined her husband just returned from service. At the grammar school Mrs. Edith Averill was elected to fill the vacancy created when Miss Myrtle Condon resigned to take a better position in the schools of Sanford. Mrs. Celia Wallace was elected teacher of the fifth grade to fill the vacancy left by Miss Leda Knapp, and Mrs. Miriam Snyder of Bucksport was elected teacher of the third grade. Mrs. Snyder resigned after seven weeks to accept a position in her home town. Mrs. Ruth Anthony was elected to take her place.

Labor and materials have been very short again this year. However, some very important improvements have been made. A new door was hung at the northwest entrance of the grammar school, replacing the old one which had been repaired so many times that it would have been false economy to attempt to repair it again. A new ceiling has been put in the boys' basement at the high school. The heating systems in both buildings have been cleaned thoroughly and new valves were put in so that the systems could be balanced. The greatest improvement of all has been the installation of new lavatories with the addition of runing hot water. From the viewpoint of health and sanitation, this is a very forward stride. Soap, towels and hot water are now available to everyone. It has been necessary to do much grading around the building foundations to prevent the washing of the gravel. It would seem advisable in the near future to tar near the foundations to prevent this action. A coat of tar at the entrances of the buildings would do much to reduce the quantity of mud tracked into the classrooms where it dries and causes dust. Appropriations for repairs another year will need be greater to cover the present deficit and allow for some much-needed fencing at the schools.

Several textbook changes have been made. The science series in the grammar school have been extended to include the fifth grade. A complete set of dictionaries has been placed in both schools to accommodate the largest class. This makes it possible for each pupil to have an individual dictionary with which to work when classes in this study are being conducted. Other sets purchased were sixth grade geographies, sixth grade histories, civics, freshman literature, and problems of democracy. This latter set was purchased to provide-for a new course in social problems, a course recommended and much needed in all high schools. In addition, a modern set of 1946 World Book Encyclopedias has been purchased for the high school library.

The matter of conveyance constitutes a real problem. The two town-owned buses have reached the point wherein it would be poor economy to try to maintain them for operation after this year.

It is our duty to provide safe, comfortable and economical transportation. Their safety will be questionable, although everything possible is being done to keep them in safe operating condition. We know they are not comfortable. And certainly, they are not economical when in one year the costs of maintenance amounts to more than six hundred dollars.

I wish to call the attention of all citizens who are interested in the future of the schools of Winterport to two very important articles which your Superintending School Committee has had included in the warrant for consideration at Town Meeting. They are: Article 12, pertaining to the purchase of school buses, and Article 13, concerning the use of the proceeds from the sale of lots in the Cushing Cemetery Lot. Your sincere consideration and support of these articles is needed if we are to be prepared today for the future.

In closing, I wish to thank the Committee and Town Officers for their fine cooperation, and all others who have contributed to the welfare of the schools.

# WARRANT

WALDO, ss.

To MORTON L. CARLETON, a Constable of the Town of Winterport, in the County of Waldo, GREETINGS:

In the name of the State of Maine, you are hereby requested to notify and warn the inhabitants of the said Town of Winterport, qualified by law to vote in town affairs, to assemble in Union Hall in said town on Monday, March 18, 1946, at 9 o'clock A. M., to act on the following articles, to wit:

- Art. 1. To choose a Moderator to preside at said meeting.
- Art. 2. To choose a Clerk for the ensuing year.
- Art. 3. To choose three or more Selectmen.
- Art. 3a. To see if the town will vote to adopt the Town Manager form of government.
- Art. 4. To fix the compensation of the Town Treasurer for the ensuing year.

- Art. 5. To choose a Town Treasurer.
- Art. 6. To fix the compensation of the Collector of Taxes for the ensuing year.
  - Art. 7. To choose a Collector of Taxes.

- Art. 8. To fix the compensation of Road Commissioner or Commissioners and wages to be paid men, teams and trucks employed on the highway and choose one or more Road Commissioners.
- Art. 9. To choose one or more members of the Superintending School Committee.
- Art. 10. To see what sums of money the town will vote to raise for the support of Common Schools, Free High School, High School Conveyance, Free Textbooks and High School Library, School Supplies and Laboratory Equipment, Repairs, Insurance and Miscellaneous.
- Art. 11. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Superintending School Committee to appoint a School Physician and to provide proper facilities for the performance of his duties.
- Art. 12. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$2,000.00 for the purchase of two new school busses and authorize the selectmen and treasurer to negotiate a loan not to exceed \$5,000.00 to cover the balance.

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- Art. 13. To see if the town will vote to set aside the proceeds from the sale of lots of the Cushing Cemetery Lot, so called, over and above the first \$5,000.00 and the cost of surveying and laying out of said lots, as a Capital Reserve Fund for the construction of a school building.
- Art. 14. To see if the town will raise and appropriate \$125.00 for public health nursing in Winterport, said sum to be expended by the State Bureau of Health for local service.

- Art. 15. To fix the rate of discount, if any, for the prompt payment of taxes and the time when said discount shall cease; to fix the time when the taxes due the town shall become collectible and payable; to determine whether interest shall be charged on taxes remaining unpaid after that date and the rate of such interest; to see if the town will vote to instruct its Collector of Taxes for the ensuing year to collect all such taxes within the limit made by the State law for the collection of taxes and instruct the Municipal Officers to require the Collector to give a bond for his faithful compliance with the vote under this article.
- Art. 16. To see if the town will vote to appropriate the sum of \$200.00 to cooperate with the Maine Forest Service and the Federal Government in the control of the White Pine Blister Rust in accordance with Revised Statutes, Chapter 11, Sec. 62-63-64.
- Art. 17. To see whether or not the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Fifty Dollars (\$50.00) to be paid to the State of Maine Publicity Bureau to be expended and used for advertising the natural resources, advantages and attractions of the State of Maine, in accordance with the provisions of Chapter 80, Section 95, of the Revised Statutes of Maine.
- Art. 18. To see what sums of money the town will vote to raise for the maintenance of State and State Aid Highways, also for the maintenance of Third Class Highways during the year within the limits of the town.
- Art. 19. To see what sums of money the town will vote to raise for the repairs of Highways and Bridges and for clearing snow from the roads for the ensuing year, for cutting bushes for sidewalks, and tarring town streets.
- Art. 20. To see what sum the town will raise and appropriate for State Aid road construction (in addition to the amounts regularly raised for the care of ways, highways and bridges) under the provisions of Sections 25 and 29, Chapter 20, R. S. 1944, as amended.

- Art. 21. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$300.00 to be used in repairing the Upper Oak Point road.
- Art. 22. To see if the town will vote to raise \$150.00 to be used in repairing the Twining Road.
- Art. 23. To see if the town will vote to reopen the John Arey Road from the Lufkin place to the Hackett place, and what sum of money if any, the town will raise and appropriate therefor or act thereon.
- Art. 24. To see what sum of money, if any, the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the purchase of new snow plowing equipment.
- Art. 25. To see what sum, if any, the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the construction of a sewer on Mechanic Street, starting at the intersection of Mechanic and Parsonage Streets and running along Mechanic Street about 400 feet toward Holmes Street.
- Art. 26. To see if the town will vote to place a Fire Hydrant between the Standpipe and Oak Street.
- Art. 27. To see what sum of money, if any, the town will vote to raise and appropriate for either rent, purchase, or construction of a building suitable for the housing of the fire truck and equipment.
- Art. 28. To see what directions or instructions shall be given the Selectmen about authorizing suit in court for enforcement of liens for unpaid taxes and concerning those cases now pending in court, or act thereon.
- Art. 29. To see what action shall be taken about the sale or disposal of property deeded to town, Sheriff's Deed or otherwise, or act thereon.

- Art. 30. To see what sums of money the town will vote to raise for Support of Poor, for Salaries of Officers, for Abatement of Taxes, for Hydrant Rental and for other miscellaneous town expenses, for Interest on Town Debt and Discount on Taxes, and for Aid to Dependent Children.
- Art. 31. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for Memorial Purposes, for Free Library, for Winding Town Clock, for Lighting Streets, for Care of Monument Lot, and also for Care of Town Lots in Oak Hill Cemetery.
- Art. 32. To see what sums of money the town will vote to raise for the Fire Department Maintenance, and Equipment.
  - Art. 33. To choose three or more Assessors of Taxes.
  - Art. 34. To choose three or more Overseers of Poor.
  - Art. 35. To choose one or more Constables.
  - Art. 36. To choose a Fire Inspector.

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- Art. 37. To choose one or more Fence Viewers.
- Art. 38. To choose one or more Measurers of Wood, Bark and Lumber, Shingles, Clapboards, Hoops and Staves.
- Art. 39. To choose one or more Sealers of Leather and Sealers of Weights and Measures.

- Art. 40. To see if the town, for purpse of procuring a temporary loan or loans to and for the use of said town in conducting its municipal business in current municipal year of 1946 and in anticipation of and to be paid out of the taxes of the current municipal year 1946, will authorize and direct the Town Treasurer, subject to the approval of the Selectmen, to borrow from time to time during said municipal year, a sum not exceeding in the aggregate the sum of seven thousand five hundred dollars, and to make, execute and deliver negotiable note or notes of the town therefor, payable within said current municipal year and upon such terms as shall be satisfactory to said Town Treasurer and Selectmen, any debt or debts incurred hereunder to be paid out of money raised by taxation during the present municipal year.
- Art. 41. To see how much money the town will vote to pay on outstanding notes.
- Art. 42. To see if the town will vote to instruct its Selectmen not to accept any bills against the town unless it is approved by the head of the department of town affairs for which the bill is rendered and unless the same is in proper form.
- Art. 43. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen and Treasurer of the town to sell and convey in the name of the inhabitants of the Town of Winterport, the right, title and interest of the town in and to any or all real estate conveyed to the inhabitants of the town in proceedings for collection of taxes.

Art. 44. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen and Treasurer of the town to realease and convey in the name of the Inhabitants of the Town of Winterport, to the owner at the time of the assessment of the tax, or to his heirs or assigns, the right, title and interest acquired by the town in and to any or all real estate conveyed to the Inhabitants of the Town of Winterport in proceedings of collection of taxes, on payment of the amount of debt, interest and charges due on respective parcels.
