In accordance with Chapter 16, Section 3, Revised Statutes of 1944 and at your request, the records of the Town of Winterport have been audited by Auditor M. E. Libby for the period February 10, 1946 to February 1, 1947.

The examination was made in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards applicable in the circumstances and included all procedures which were considered necessary. Insofar as could be ascertained within the scope of the examination, the financial transactions of the town appear to have been appropriately handled.

Exhibits and schedules incorporated in this report impartially present the financial position of the town and the result of its operations for the period designated.

Comments and other data incorporated in this report may prove of interest to you. All of which is respectfully submitted.

COMMENTS

Re: Audit of Accounts—Town of Winterport February 10, 1946 to February 1, 1947

Cash:

By a detailed examination of cash receipts and bank deposits, it was ascertained that all cash received had been properly accounted for and promptly deposited in the bank.

Cash on deposit and subject to check at the close of the municipal year was verified at the bank and reconciled with the cash balance as reflected on the records of the Treasurer.

Taxes Receivable:

The 1946 tax commitment reconciled with the records of the Assessors, with the exception of an error of one cent.

Eighty-seven and one-half per cent of the current commitment was represented by cash collections, discounts or abatements.

Payments received on prior years' uncollected taxes appeared to have been applied against the proper accounts.

Requests for verification were mailed on approximately 50% of the uncollected tax accounts.

Tax Liens:

The examination made of the tax lien account indicated that all items were supported by tax liens on file.

Cash receipts totaling \$2,034.51 and adjustments of \$11.32 appeared to have been credited to the proper accounts.

Requests for verification were mailed on all outstanding tax lien accounts.

McKenney Fund:

The Merrill Trust Company of Bangor is the trustee of this Fund and annually remits the income on same to the town. The cash on deposit of \$1,514.52 represents the balance of the unexpended income. Expenditures from this income for worthy poor purposes are made at the direction of the Selectmen.

Notes Payable:

A note of \$1,000 issued to finance the purchase of a fire truck in 1945 was outstanding at the close of the municipal year. This note is due in 1948.

A \$1,000 note maturing in 1947 was paid by appropriation during the 1946 municipal year.

Unappropriated Surplus:

The Unappropriated Surplus was increased during the year under examination by \$1,579.65, which increase resulted from the retirement of the note previously mentioned, and from other unapplied income. A complete analysis of this change is shown on Exhibit E of this report.

Trust Funds:

The trust fund investments were examined and listed and all income appeared to have been properly applied.

General:

The excise tax collections were verified by a detailed examination of the receipts retained by the Collector. Part of this revenue was applied to Highway account, and the balance was carried forward to the ensuing year.

The examination made of a representative number of paid bills and payrolls indicated that the charges were reasonable and had been properly recorded.

The Overlay of \$446.81 was found to be within the legal limit of 5% of appropriations, plus State and County Taxes and was credited to Unappropriated Surplus.

All Withholding Tax deductions were found to have been properly deposited in the depository bank, and the deductions for Teachers' Retirement were found to have been paid to the end of the municipal year.

The records of the town officials were found to be in a satisfactory condition.

A fidelity bond issued by the New York Casualty Company in the sum of \$10,000, covering the Treasurer and Collector, was found on file. This bond appeared to be in proper order and conformed to statutory requirements.

REPORT OF PUBLIC HEALTH NURSE

The following is a report of the Public Health Nursing Service submitted for 1946

The greater part of the nurse's time was spent in home visiting, so that the parents might have the latest information available on standards of health and hygienic care, in order to maintain goodfamily health.

The nurse made 39 visits to your town during which the following nursing visits were made:

3 to Expectant Mothers

17 to Infants

48 to Pre-school Children

20 to School Children

As heretofore, crippled children have been kept under supervision through home visits and attendance at Crippled Children's Clinics.

Tuberculin skin testing was done in the schools and an X-ray Clinic was held in July, giving reactors and contacts of active cases of tuberculosis the opportunity of having a chest X-ray.

One hundred and thirty-nine children had the two prescribed treatments for immunization against diphtheria.

One of the highlights of the Public Health Nursing Program for the year was the conference held in Augusta for lay committee members. We hope that next year your town may be represented at such a meeting.

With community health committees organized and participating in the program, more Child Health Conferences and Immunization Clinics can be held.

Will you help to improve the health of your community?

REPORT OF WINTERPORT FIRE DEPARTMENT

The Winterport Fire Department answered 55 alarms during 1946. Of this number, three local fires resulted in major damage to real estate and one car was destroyed. Two out of town calls resulted in major real estate damage. The remaining 49 alarms were for chimney fires, grass fires, flooded oil burners and other sources, resulting in negligible or indirect water damage only.

The Fire Department is still in need of a considerable quantity of 2½-inch hose. With the installation of the new hydrant at the base of the standpipe, an estimated 1,500 feet of 2½-inch hose, all in good condition and capable of standing maximum operation pressure, should be aboard the truck at all times in order to furnish protection for valuable property at Carleton's Corner. Furthermore, the proper operation of our newest piece of equipment for pulling water out of brooks and deep wells requires 2½-inch hose pressures as high as 150 pounds per square inch. At present there are not more than five fifty-foot lengths of hose fit to stand this extreme pressure for any length of time, and the maximum hose requirements of the new equipment could run as high as twelve lengths.

The tremendous increase in the use of oil for cooking and house heating means that the Fire Department should be better prepared to extinguish fires from this possible source by purchasing inexpensive foam equipment for use with our present booster lines.

To the School Committee and the Citizens of Winterport:

In accordance with the laws of Maine, it is my duty to submit the following report of the condition and progress of the schools for the fiscal year ending February 1, 1947.

This report includes a summary of school finances and a directory of teachers. It is my intent to make this report brief, emphasizing only the most important items of interest.

Some changes in teacher personnel have taken place this year, but the number of changes has been small considering the conditions existing today in the educational field, such as teacher shortages and low salary schedules. We welcome back three former teachers: Mr. Richard Hopkins, Mr. John Carleton and Mrs. Anna Hall. Mr. Hopkins returns to Winterport to assume the duties of high school principal after serving in the same capacity at Sherman High School. Mr. Carleton is now assistant principal at the grammar school after serving in the Army and after completing a year of study at the University of Maine. Mrs. Hall is teaching in the first grade, the same position she held previously. It may be interesting to note that all teachers are properly certified and there has been no cause to employ sanction teachers in this school system.

Transportation of pupils has been a major problem this year. The accident which put the Ford bus off the road has added to the difficulties, but the cooperation of the parents during this period has been excellent.

After the town voted to purchase two new buses at the last town meeting, requests for bids were sent out to five different motor companies. Four bids were submitted, the lowest bidder receiving the order. The buses were expected to be here the last week of August. When they didn't come, the Wayne Body Co. was contacted. Their explanation was that there had been a quota of twenty thousand school buses set by the government last spring and that the amount of steel for the bodies had been reduced by two consecutive orders, so that a maximum of twelve thousand buses were available this year. The delivery date was set ahead to Jan. 8, 1947. Since then there has been a second re-scheduling and we were notified that delivery dates would be March 1 for one bus and April 1 for the second.

The grammar school has a strip-film projector which it purchased last year. This is a proven type of visual education which should not be neglected. For the purpose of building up a film library a set of six films were purchased. In addition to the necessary supplies, the first grade room was equipped with ten folding cot beds to enable the younger children who have to put in a long day at school to get a rest period during the noon hour. A second-hand piano was purchased by Mr. Anthony from funds donated by interested citizens at the beginning of the school year. This fills a long desired need at the school, since so much can be done in the grades with music.

Textbook deliveries have been very slow, due to numerous shortages. Much has been done this year in replacing old books and many have been added. The basic reading series was extended to the third grade. The science series was extended to the sixth grade. To strengthen the English series, workbooks have been supplied in the grades. Among the books purchased were sets of third and fourth grade geographies, fourth grade arithmetics, eighth grade histories, ninth grade general mathematics and general science and junior-senior American histories.

Major expenditures under the repair account have been confined to the following: boiler repair work, including complete sets of grates for both schools, work on fire escapes at the grade school and fencing for the grade school.

The State fire inspectors, on their annual inspection, required a change in the location of the existing escape and recommended a second one on the grammar school. The old fire escape has been moved to the room on the northwest corner and a second was placed on the south side. In addition to this, two more doors have been cut through the walls, making it possible for use of one or both exits without any child entering the hall. The escapes have been lowered and it is planned to have doors at the exits so that they can be used without the hazards of climbing out a window.

The fencing is now stored at the grade building and awaits warmer weather for its erection.

The Parent-Teacher Association is carrying on an excellent program under the direction of its president, Mrs. Irene Tuttle. Supplementary song books were purchased by the organization for each school. The hot lunch committee with Mrs. Thibodeau chairman and Mrs. Gray preparing the lunches reports that during the month of January 3,680 free lunches were served. From this information the scope of the program and its value to the community can be realized. It deserves all the support you can give.

A testing program has been carried out in both schools. The Stanford achievement tests were administered in the grade school and the Iowa tests were given at the high school. The results of these tests in both schools show a strong science program. Our weakest program is in the field of reading. However, the results shown on the grade school reading tests are higher comparatively than those on the high school reading tests. This indicates that the present reading program is correcting this deficiency.

A few years ago, 1941 to be exact, the town authorized the superintending school committee to set in motion plans for a new high school, but due to world conditions it was deemed advisable to

table them for the present. That was seven years ago. A second World War has been fought and now we are in a post-war inflationary period. Educational authorities believe that when the postwar slump occurs, there will be a Federal and State program of aid to education. With public sentiment so strong, it seems inevitable that, when the next economic recession comes, there will be another Public Works program which will be devoted to aiding the smaller communities in expanding their educational program. You will recall it was the P. W. A. which made possible the expansion of our present grade school building. Now is the time for careful planning and appraisal. To this end it is recommended that a committee of citizens of the town be appointed to work with the superintending school committee for the purpose of inquiring into the feasibility of a consolidated twelve-year school, investigating possible sites, plans, costs of operation and maintenance. They are to be instructed to report their findings and make recommendations at a special or next regular town meeting.

School appropriations need to be greater this year. The budget allows for the minimum salary of \$1,500.00 per teacher. It must be remembered that textbooks and supplies are generally up 15-25% over last year. The equalization fund money from the State is estimated at \$1,974.00 for next year. This is a drop of over \$1,300.00 and must be met by local appropriation.

REPORT OF THE HIGH SCHOOL PRINCIPAL

As principal of Winterport High School, I take pleasure in presenting the following report of the school year 1946-1947.

School opened in September with a total enrollment of 96 pupils. With some students leaving school or moving to other towns, and other students enrolling, the total has remained about the same, the number at time of writing being 92.

The school day is run on the rotating schedule system. Seven periods of classes make up the basic schedule, five of these periods of one hour each coming each day. Two advantages of this system are: (1) The hour period enables the teacher to have a short period of supervised study so that the pupils may begin the next day's work with the teacher at hand to help; (2) Each period comes at a different time each day so that no class suffers from having one subject always come at the close of the day when pupils are usually less responsive and mentally alert than at earlier periods.

The school has made good use of the motion picture projector. We have had a great many films from the University of Maine on various subjects, such as X-ray, radar, television, athletics, and different phases of biology. In addition, we have had four regular motion pictures which were presented at assembly programs. All films were selected primarily for educational value, while at the same time great attention was given to the entertainment features.

In extra-curricular activities, basketball has taken up the greater part of the time. This year the sport has been resumed throughout the state, and it is my firm belief that athletics play a prominent part in the development of moral values which lead to good citizenship. However, we must not, in a desire to win, lose sight of the true purposes of the game, which are to provide students a chance to meet students of other schools in friendly competition, and to provide a wholesome entertainment for students and adults.

Basketball has been an expensive activity this year, mainly because of the fact that a great deal of money had to be spent on new uniforms. However, these uniforms, with proper care, will last many years. Transportation to out-of-town games and hiring the hall for games and practice also added to our expense.

Other extra-curricular activities which will be undertaken during the year are baseball, a play, speaking contest, and probably several dances.

Attendance has been quite regular this year, although far from perfect. Work missed from classes can never be adequately made up, no matter how competent or conscientious the student. We realize that it is sometimes necessary to keep pupils out of school, but often by dint of a little inconvenience or sacrifice on the part of the parents a pupil may be able to attend a session which he might miss without the parents' cooperation.

In closing, I wish to thank the school committee, superintendent, and townspeople for making my year at the high school a very pleasant one.

WARRANT

To MORTON L. CARLETON, a Constable of the Town of Winterport, in the County of Waldo, GREETINGS:

In the name of the State of Maine, you are hereby requested to notify and warn the inhabitants of the said Town of Winterport, qualified by law to vote in town affairs, to assemble in Union Hall in said town on Monday, March 17, 1947, at 9:30 o'clock A. M., to act on the following articles, to wit:

- Art. 1. To choose a Moderator to preside at said meeting.
- Art. 2. To choose a Clerk for the ensuing year.
- Art. 3. To choose three or more Selectmen.
- Art. 4. To fix the compensation of the Town Treasurer for the ensuing year.
 - Art. 5. To choose a Town Treasurer.
- Art. 6. To fix the compensation of the Collector of Taxes for the ensuing year.
 - Art. 7. To choose a Collector of Taxes.
- Art. 8. To fix the compensation of Road Commissioner or Commissioners and wages to be paid men, teams and trucks employed on the highway and choose one or more Road Commissioners.

- Art. 9. To choose one or more members of the Superintending School Committee.
- Art. 10. To see what sums of money the town will vote to raise for the support of Common Schools, Free High School, Repairs, Insurance and Miscellaneous.
- Art. 11. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Superintending School Committee to appoint a School Physician and to provide proper facilities for the performance of his duties.
- Art. 12. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$2,000.00 for the purchase of two new school busses and authorize the selectmen and treasurer to negotiate a loan not to exceed \$3,000.00 to cover the balance.
- Art. 13. To see if the Town will vote to instruct the Superintending School Committee to appoint a committee of three citizens to work with the school committee for the purpose of inquiring into the feasibility of a consolidated twelve year school; investigating possible sites, plans, costs of operation and maintenance. They to be instructed to report their findings and make recommendations at a special or regular town meeting.
- Art. 14. To see if the town will raise and appropriate \$125.00 for public health nursing in Winterport, said sum to be expended by the State Bureau of Health for local service.
- Art. 15. To fix the rate of discount, if any, for the prompt payment of taxes and the time when said discount shall cease; to fix the time when the taxes due the town shall become collectible and payable; to determine whether interest shall be charged on taxes remaining unpaid after that date and the rate of such interest; to see if the town will vote to instruct its Collector of Taxes for the ensuing year to collect all such taxes within the limit made by the State law for the collection of taxes and instruct the Municipal Officers to require the Collector to give a bond for his faithful compliance with the vote under this article.

- Art. 16. To see whether or not the town will vote to raise the sum of Fifty Dollars (\$50.00) to be paid to the State of Maine Publicity Bureau to be expended and used for advertising the natural resources advantages and attractions of the State of Maine in accordance with the provisions of Chapter 80, Section 95, of the Revised Statutes of Maine.
- Art. 17. To see if the town will vote to accept THE SUNDAY AMATEUR SPORTS LAW (Revised Statutes 1944, Chap. 121, Sec. 40).
- Art. 18. To see if the town will vote to appropriate a sum of money to be expended under the direction of the selectmen for the purpose of cutting grass and bushes in all public cemeteries within the limits of the town. Said work to be done previous to May 30 if possible. This article shall not apply to the so called Oak Hill Cemetery located near Winterport village or to the Pilgrims Home Cemetery located near the Monroe town line.
- Art. 19. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500.00 for the extension of the town sewer on Main Street, starting at the corner of Church and Main Streets and running along Main Street about 450 feet to the residence of F. Philip Foley.
- Art. 20. To see if the town will vote to purchase from the Estate of the late Ellery Bowden 2586 shares of the Winterport Union Hall Corporation as appears by 12 certificates thereof at 50c per share, and to authorize the Treasurer of the Town to pay for the same the sum of \$1,293.00 upon endorsement and assignment of said certificates and said shares by the administratrix of the Estate of the late Ellery Bowden. Said certificates to be endorsed and assigned to the Inhabitants of the Town of Winterport.
- Art. 21. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$1,293.00 for the purchase of 2586 shares of Union Hall Corporation stock, and what sum of money the town will vote to raise for repairs to Union Hall.

- Art. 22. To see what sums of money the town will vote to raise for the maintenance of State and State Aid Highways, also for the maintenance of Third Class Highways during the year within the limits of the town.
- Art. 23. To see what sums of money the town will vote to raise for the repairs on Highways and Bridges and for clearing snow from the roads for the ensuing year, for cutting bushes and tarring town streets.
- Art. 24. To see what sum the town will raise and appropriate for State Aid road construction (in addition to the amounts regularly raised for the care of ways, highways and bridges) under the provisions of Sections 25 and 29, Chap. 20, R. S. 1944, as amended.
- Art. 25. To see what sums of money the town will vote to raise for Support of Poor, for Salaries of Officers, for Abatement of Taxes, for Hydrant Rental, for maintenance of Public Dump and Sewers, for Care of Abbot Park, and for other Miscellaneous town expenses, for Interest on Town Debt and Discount on Taxes, and for Aid to Dependent Children.
- Art. 26. To see what sums of money the town will vote to raise for Memorial Purposes, for Free Library, for Street Lighting, for Care of Monument Lot, and also for Care of Town Lots in Oak Hill Cemetery.
- Art. 27. To see what directions or instructions shall be given the Selectmen about authorizing suit in court for enforcement of liens for unpaid taxes and concerning those cases now pending in court, or act thereon.

- Art. 28. To see whether or not the Town will vote to enter into a contract with Central Maine Power Company for a term of ten (10) years, whereby, in consideration of the furnishing of street lighting service to the Town during the term of said contract, all as more fully set forth in the contract, copy of which has been presented to this meeting, the Town will pay for such street lighting service in accordance with the Company's municipal Street lighting rate-contract basis.
 - Art. 29. To see what action the Town will take with reference to authorizing the Selectmen to execute and deliver the contract referred to in the preceding Article.
- Art. 30. To see what sums of money the town will vote to raise for the Fire Department Maintenance, and Equipment.
 - Art. 31. To choose three or more Assessors of Taxes.
 - Art. 32. To choose three or more Overseers of the Poor.
 - Art. 33. To choose a Fire Inspector.
 - Art. 34. To choose one or more Constables.
 - Art. 35. To choose one or more Fence Viewers.
 - Art. 36. To choose one or more Measurers of Wood, Bark and Lumber, Shingles, Clapboards, Hoops and Staves.

- Art. 37. To choose one or more Sealers of Leather and Sealers of Weights and Measures.
- Art. 38. To see if the town, for the purpose of procuring a temporary loan or loans to and for the use of said town in conducting its municipal business in the current municipal year of 1947 and in anticipation of and to be paid out of the taxes of the current municipal year 1947, will authorize and direct the Town Treasurer, subject to the approval of the Selectmen, to borrow from time to time during said municipal year, a sum not exceeding in the aggregate the sum of seven thousand five hundred dollars, and to make, execute and deliver negotiable note or notes of the town therefor, payable within said current municipal year and upon such terms as shall be satisfactory to said Town Treasurer and Selectmen, any debt or debts incurred hereunder to be paid out of money raised by taxation during the present municipal year.
- Art. 39. To see how much money the town will vote to pay on outstanding notes.
- Art. 40. To see if the town will vote to instruct its Selectmen not to accept any bills against the town unless it is approved by the head of the department of town affairs for which the bill is rendered and unless the same is in proper form.
- Art. 41. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen and Treasurer of the town to sell and convey in the name of the inhabitants of the Town of Winterport, the right, title and interest of the town in and to any or all real estate conveyed to the inhabitants of the town in proceedings for collection of taxes.

Art. 42. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen and Treasurer of the town to release and convey in the name of the Inhabitants of the Town of Winterport, to the owner at the time of the assessment of the tax, or to his heirs or assigns, the right, title and interest acquired by the town in and to any or all real estate conveyed to the Inhabitants of the Town of Winterport in proceedings of collection of taxes, on payment of the amount of debt, interest and charges due on respective parcels.

Art. 43 To see if the town will vote to elect a committee of five to plan for the future development of the Winterport Airport.

The Selectmen hereby give notice that they will be in session at the Selectmen's Office on Saturday March 15th from 10:00 to 12:00 A. M. and 2:00 to 4:00 P. M. for the purpose of correcting the list of voters.
