SUMMARY.

To the Parents and Citizens of the Town of Gouldsboro:

The public school is one of the most important of public institutions, and it is one of the most important of civic duties to see that it is made most efficient for the civic ends for which it is established. Every citizen who fails to exert his influence in favor of all things for the good of the school fails in the performance of one of the highest of his civic duties.

The amount of benefit derived from our schools at the present day, or, in other words, the key to success, we believe is the degree of interest that parents and citizens take in them.

We have employed teachers selected by our best judgment, though all have not proven entirely satisfactory; but an interest manifested in them by the parents and citizens, better acquaintance with them, and even personal talks with teachers about the ins and outs of all school matters will mend many a breach, while the ins and outs discussed with the scholars will enlarge.

As parents, especially mothers, will you not try to feel more interest, and manifest it in the schools the coming year, and see if the work is not more satisfactory to you? Encourage your boy or girl to attend school regularly, and do thorough work. A kind word to a child is never forgotten. Let them know you have an interest in their welfare; visit the schools each term, and investigate for yourselves, and not take the reports of those who

never visit schools, and usually, those who have no scholars, but are first to report them a success or a failure.

TEXT-BOOKS.

The amount appropriated last year for text-books, although seemingly liberal, has been overdrawn. In visiting the several schools for the first time we found the readers in town were not being used by the teachers for the higher classes, and a loud request was being made for supplemental reading even for the third grade's use; so upon the whole, we decided to change the readers, and introduced Baldwin's series in all schools except Corea school, which needs to be supplied the coming term.

We also changed spellers, giving in exchange the old speller, and paying the difference of \$13 per 100. We have to-day to the town's credit with the American Book Co., 158 old readers, with which we are at liberty at any time to purchase new books, and receive a discount of 30 per cent. on the purchase price.

There are other books in town which have been in use a long time, and are worn out and shattered, which are of no value in our schools. I earnestly recommend a change. To meet this overdraw and the supplies needed for another year, we should estimate an appropriation of \$125 sufficient.

REPAIRS.

We have occupied the same schoolhouses as in the past year. As recommended last year, we added new seats to the Corea school-room, increasing its seating capacity to 48, but the room is too small and inconvenient to receive the best results.

The house at Birch Harbor is also too small for the requirements of the district; these two schools are the largest in town, and, with two exceptions, the smallest school-rooms. As these districts are increasing in scholar-

ship (especially Corea) annually, whatever the town may do to meet their demands, let them do it keeping in view their needs for years to come.

We shingled one side of the Pond house and West Bay house, reinsured five, had all schoolhouses cleaned, and all minor repairs made.

The Prospect Harbor primary room and hall need to be sheathed, as the plastering is off and hanging in many places; the upper room also needs repairing and whitening, but would recommend sheathing for both rooms.

The South Gouldsboro house needs a new floor in whole or in part. It was our intention, with the surplus on repair fund, to do this work before another term of school, and we hope it will be carried out by our successors.

We have mentioned a few of the needs of our schoolrooms to make them attractive and comfortable, but there are many others, and we hope the town will be liberal with its appropriations to supply these wants.

The average attendance, this year, has been very good, which is certainly a step in the right direction; but there are many scholars not in attendance who could and should have received the benefits of all these schools, and we trust that the co-operation and support of parents and citizens, with teachers and school officers, will, in years to come, make still greater improvement, and raise the standard nearer to perfection.
