ANNUAL REPORT OF THE FLANDERS BAY SERVICE, MAINE PUBLIC HEALTH NURSING ASS'N

To the Citizens of the Town of Gouldsboro:

I hereby submit the annual report of the Flanders Bay Nursing Service from January 1, 1929 to January 1, 1930. The Flanders Bay Service, comprising Winter Harbor, Gouldsboro, Sorrento and East Sullivan, is affiliated with the Maine Public Health Nursing Association, and under the direct supervision of the nurse director, Mrs. Theresa Anderson.

The work has gone on with very little variation from the preceding three years. The first four months it was carried on by Miss Bella Davis, who substituted while the local nurse was taking a public health nursing course in Simmons college in Boston. With the exception of the resignation of Mrs. Alice Bassett, the Hancock county nurse, who was supervisor of the local nurse, there is no change in the personnel. Mr. Fletcher Wood is chairman, Mr. Charles A. Small is treasurer and Mrs. Ruby Tracy remains as secretary.

The major part of the service is made possible by the efforts of the summer residents, the rest of the support depending on town appropriations, 80 per cent. of the Christmas Health Seal sale, and of the fees collected by the nurse and turned into the treasury. It is needless to say that nursing care is given freely, regardless of the ability of patient to pay.

The statistical report is as follows: 206 visits of instruction in infant welfare, pre-school, pre-natal, tuberculosis and post partem cases; 401 bedside visits to babies, obstetrical, surgical and medical cases, and T. B.; 112 visits of investigation in reference to T. B., pre-natal and contagious diseases; 140 miscellaneous

in reference to social service, conferences, clinics and in behalf of patients.

Four well-baby and pre-school conferences and clinics were held, assisted by Dr. Taylor, a baby specialist from Philadelphia, who is a summer resident in Winter Harbor, and Dr. Ella Kilgas of New York, also a specialist, who is a summer resident in Sullivan, and by the local physicians who gave advice and vaccinations.

Demonstrations were given by nurse in technique in baby care, habit, training, etc., 88 children receiving examination and advice.

A very successful dental clinic was held in October, 79 children being registered at this clinic, 47 receiving care and instruction. This was not a free clinic for all patients, a few paying for work done.

A pre-natal program was carried out, the nurse visiting regularly these patients, making analysis and giving instructions. This year a mothers' club is being formed, and meets in the nurse's home once a month, where this instruction and advice is given collectively instead of individually.

School reports show that the nineteen schools were visited several times, 644 children receiving full inspection; 37 were examined and excluded by doctor for exposure to measles, skin disease and pink eye; 163 free vaccinations were done; 38 talks on health subjects were given; 50 sanitary inspections were made; 349 notices sent to parents in reference to defects found on school inspection; 106 home calls were made; four children were taken to doctor; 34 were taken to dentist; 3 to oculist.

Thirty-nine vision defects were found, with 35 corrections; 366 defective teeth, with 176 corrections; 163 with symptoms of throat defects, with 91 corrections; 195 with poor posture. 37 were 10 per cent. underweight; 33 were 20 per cent. overweight. There were

7 tubercular contacts. Seventy-three were referred to physician; 190 referred to dentist; 39 to oculist.

Mothers' clubs, 2; conference with dentist and physicians and social service worker, 11; home demonstrations, 10; taken to doctor (other than children), 11; taken to hospital, 18; to sanitarium, 1; to oculist, 1.

In closing this report, the nurse and committee wish to extend thanks and their appreciation to the physicians who gave advice at the clinics, to the teachers and parents for their willing cooperation in carrying out health programs in schools, and to all others who assisted the nurse by their cooperation and encouragement in carrying on her work.

To the Members of the Superintending School Committee and the Citizens of Gouldsboro:

I herewith present my fifth annual report of the conditions, progress and needs of the schools of Goulds-boro:

The schools of Gouldsboro have made very good progress during the year just passed. We have been fortunate, on the whole, in the selection of teachers, and these teachers are exerting their greatest efforts to promote the welfare of the schools. In accordance with our policy of employing only trained teachers, it is worthy to note that of the ten teachers with whom we started this year, seven were normal graduates and the other three had received some normal training and were feachers of successful experience. The teachers with whom we started last school year had had an average normal training of 1.275 years, while those of this year had had an average of 1.6 years of normal training—an increase of 25 per cent.

School Year

In accordance with the law as amended by the legislature of 1929, we are having a 32-week school year instead of the 30-week year heretofore maintained. It would be a real benefit to the children of the town if the school year were lengthened to 36 weeks. This could be brought about gradually by adding a week each year at an additional cost for teachers, at the present wage scale, of \$184 per added week. To raise \$184 means a per capita average of about fifteen cents. To have raised that sum extra last year, for instance; (1928-9) would have meant an increase of about 35 cents on the taxes of a person who paid \$50. The State is favorably disposed toward lengthening the school year and would probably help finance such a project.

Secondary School Pupils

During the fall term we had 39 students enrolled in secondary schools, as follows: First-year students, 12; second-year students, 11; third-year students, 1, and fourth-year students, 15. These students were enrolled in six schools as follows: At Winter Harbor, 19; at Sullivan, 7; at Steuben, 6; at Higgins Classical Institute, 5; at Bar Harbor, 1; and at Bucksport, 1. For these students we are paying the following rates of tuition per pupil per year: At Steuben, \$50; at Winter Harbor, Sullivan and Bar Harbor, \$60, and at the Bucksport Seminary and Higgins Classical Institute, \$100.

Repairs

Major repairs made this year have consisted of painting the West Gouldsboro school building outside and shingling the West Bay building. Minor repairs have been made on all buildings as needed.

Conveyance

The one big problem at the present time is that of conveyance of pupils. If the pupils needing conveyance were all on one road where one conveyance could get them all, they could be handled cheaply and satisfactorily. As it is, they are widely scattered, there

being one or two or more in each of six or seven different localities, making the problem a complicated and expensive one, and one which the citizens should give careful consideration.
