The loss of Miss Bray's services as teacher during the year has been keenly felt by all concerned. We are, however, fortunate in securing a successor to Miss Bray who has had a great deal of experience and who appreciates our needs and is able to carry out a successful program.

Nearly all the money which was recommended has been expended for Textbooks and Supplies. A like amount will be needed for the next fiscal year for this item.

May I express my appreciation of the co-operation of the Committee and Citizens during the past year.

Report of Audit for Fiscal Year 1938

Aug. 15, 1939

Mr. Chas. H. Turner, Chairman,
Board of Selectmen,
Isle au Haut, Maine.

Dear Sir:

I have examined the records of the town of Isle au Haut for the fiscal year 1938 as required by Chap. 216, Public Laws of 1937. At the close of that year which ended February 1st, 1939, the town was on a definite financial downgrade. A net overdraft of over \$550. as shown in the summary is the approximate amount that the town went into the red. There was also a deficit in the 1937 fiscal year.

The causes of the difficulty in 1938 were chiefly an overdraft in the poor account and an overdraft caused by the payment of a wage bonus to highway labor. It is hard to see how the financial position of the town warrants the payment of any avoidable expense. To avoid possible poor expense consideration should be given by the town therefore, as to whether it wishes to become a plantation. The population of the town is such that the state would then presumably bear its pauper expense. (Chief difficulty would be favorable legislative action. See also Revised Statutes, Chap. 33, Sec. 26.) The change into a plantation would not involve loss of local self-government. Almost the only difference between a town and a plantation is that in a plantation no selectmen or overseers of the poor are elected, the assessors having the necessary powers of these officers. As the poor expense for 1938 was over \$750. and represents nearly 6 mills on the tax rate when paid, elimination of this expense is worth while. It should be pointed out that although the Robinson pauper case (which was the chief cause of poor expense in 1938) was settled, there is no reason to suppose that similar cases may not occur in the future.

As to the wage bonus paid to workers, it is easy to see that they desire it, but it is hard to see how the town can afford it. The overdraft in this account represents over 4 mills on the tax rate when paid. It should also be pointed out that non-residents pay about 75 p. c. of town expenses whether they are necessary or unnecessary.

Unexpended balances or overdrafts in town accounts should not be carried forward from year to year except as required by law. For example, the large unexpended balance in the miscellaneous account for 1938 had insufficient cash to cover it.

Road equipment should properly be accounted for in a separate account charging the amount spent for gasoline, oil, repairs, supplies, etc. and crediting rental for actual use. This will show whether the ownership of such equipment is profitable to the town. If so, the money earned by these tractors and trucks should then be put in a sinking fund toward the purchase of new equipment when the present equipment is worn out. If a loss appears instead of a profit, consideration should be given to the disposal of such equipment.

The books of the town for 1938 were kept neatly and the arithmetical work was correct. It is suggested however, that the state classification and system of accounts would be desirable. This would save work and would also comply with the law in that regard.

A comparative balance sheet and summary of accounts are attached herewith.

It should be noted that the overdraft in the school account listed as an asset was carried forward as required by law. This is proper accounting practise. The overdraft is an asset in the sense that the State, having contributed to the account, may take this overdraft into consideration in regard to further contributions.

On the other hand the road accounts to which the State has contributed show unexpended balances. These are shown on the balance sheet as liabilities since the State may require the money to be spent.

Warrant for Town Meeting

County of Knox

State of Maine

To Hollis B. Nevells, a constable of the Town of Isle au Haut,

Greetings:

In the name of the State of Maine, you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of said Town of Isle au Haut, qualified to vote in town affairs, to assemble at Revere Memorial Hall in said Town, on Monday, March 4, 1940, at nine o'clock in the forenoon, to act on the following articles, to wit:

Art. 1 To choose a moderator to preside at said meeting.

Art. 2 To choose a town clerk for the ensuing year.

Art. 3 To choose a board of selectmen for the ensuing year.

Art. 4 To choose assessors of taxes.

Art. 5 To choose overseers of poor.

Art. 6 To choose a collector of taxes and exise tax and vote his compensation.

Art. 7 To choose a treasurer and vote his compensation.

Art. 8 To choose one or more members of the school board.

Art. 9 To see if the town will vote to elect a road commissioner, one or more, fix his term of office, not to exceed three years, have the selectmen appoint, or they themselves act as commissioners as provided by Chap. 40 of the Public Laws of 1933, or act anything relating thereto.

Art. 10 To choose a sealer of weights and measures.

Art. 11 To choose two or more constables.

Art. 12 To choose a fire warden and vote his compensation.

Art. 13 To choose surveyors of wood and lumber.

Art. 14 To see what sum of money the town will appropriate and raise for current expenses.

Art. 15 To see what action the town will take in regard to school for the ensuing year.

Art. 16 To see if the town will raise and appropriate a certain sum for public health work in Isle au Haut, said sum to be expended by the Bureau of Health, State Department of Health and Welfare, in cooperation with local authorities.

Art. 17 To see what sum of money the town will appropriate and raise for school, including textbooks, supplies and high school tuition.

Art. 18 To see what sum of money the town will appropriate and raise for school house repairs.

Art. 19 To see what sum of money the town will appropriate and raise for the salary of the superintendent of schools.

Art. 20 To see if the town will vote to give the selectmen authority to sell property taken for taxes or act anything relating thereto.

Art. 21 To see if the town will vote to give the school board authority to sell Head Harbor schoolhouse and lot, or act anything relating thereto.

Art. 22 To see what sum of money the town will appropriate and raise for support of poor.

Art. 23 To see what sum of money the town will appropriate and raise for Mothers' Aid.

Art. 24 To see what sum the town will raise and appropriate for State Aid road construction (in addition to the amounts regularly raised for the care of ways, highways and bridges) under the provisions of Section 19, Chapter 28, Revised Statutes of 1930, or under the provisions of Section 3, Chapter 229, Public Laws of 1937.

Art. 25 To see what sum if any, the town would recommend to take from the joint state aid account for the purpose of applying bituminous surface treatment to State Aid Roads, in excess of the requirements of Section 2, Chapter 132, P. L. 1935.

Art. 26 To see what sum of money the town will appropriate and raise for the maintenance of town roads and bridges.

Art. 27 To see what sum of money the town will appropriate and raise for repairs on State Aid Roads.

Art. 28 To see what sum of money the town will appropriate and raise for snow and ice removal.

Art. 29 To see what sum of money the town will appropriate and raise for the maintenance of Revere Memorial Hall.

Art. 30 To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen to issue notes for temporary loans.

Art. 31 To see if the town will vote a certain date, on or before which all taxes will be paid, also decide on a rate of interest for all taxes unpaid after that date, or act anything relating thereto.

Art. 32 To act on any other business that may come before said meeting.

The Selectmen hereby give notice that they will be in session, for the purpose of revising and correcting the list of voters, at Revere Memorial Hall, at 9 o'clock in the forenoon, on date of said meeting.
