REMARKS.

The spring term of school was taught by Miss Georgie M. Reed, and was a fine school both in order and in the advance made by the pupils in their studies. Length of term 10 weeks. Number of pupils attending 31. Average number 27. Number not tardy 30. Number not absent one half day 7.

The fall term was taught by Mr. John H. Carter, who is also a fine teacher and kept the interest of his pupils. Length of term 10 weeks. Number of pupils attending 33. Average number 30. Number not tardy 22. Number not absent one half day 12.

The fall term was also taught by Mr. Carter. Length of term 8 weeks. Number of pupils attending 31. Average number 28. Number not tardy 22. Number not absent one half day 7.

By the act of Legislature requiring all schools not maintaining an average of eight pupils for the school year to be suspended, unless other wise voted by the town, our schools were consolidated and transportation furnished those living at the greatest distance away. I think it has been a benefit to the pupils from the smaller school and no injury to the other, and the expense has been no more, if as much, as maintaining both schools for the same number of weeks, and I should advise the same course for the coming year, and until the number of pupils will warrant maintaining two schools.
