Town Warrant

SAGADAHOC, SS.

To Cornelius T. Willis, Esq., a Constable of Arrowsic,
County of Sagadahoc,—Greeting:

In the name of the State of Maine, you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of said town of Arrowsic, qualified by law to vote in town affairs, to meet at the town house in said town on Monday, the fourth day of March, A. D. 1907, at ten o'clock in the forenoon, to act on the following articles, to wit:

ARTICLE 1—To choose a Moderator to preside at said meeting.

ART. 2—To choose a Clerk for the ensuing year.

ART. 3—To see if the town will vote to accept the reports of the town officers.

ART. 4—To choose Selectmen, Assessors and Overseers of the Poor.

ART. 5—To choose a Treasurer.

ART. 6—To choose a Collector.

ART. 7—To choose a Road Commissioner.

ART. 8—To choose one member of School Committee.

ART. 9—To see what action the town will take in regard to having only one school, and that in the town house the ensuing year.

ART. 10—To see if the town will vote to maintain a school at the South schoolhouse the ensuing year.

ART. 11—To choose a Truant Officer.

ART. 12—To choose a Constable.

ART. 13—To choose an Auditor of Accounts.

ART. 14—To choose a Pound Keeper, and provide a Pound.

ART. 15—To choose Surveyors of lumber, wood and bark, Fence Viewers, a Tythingman, and all other necessary town officers for the year ensuing.

ART. 16—To see if the town will vote to use the school-houses for religious meetings the ensuing year.

ART. 17—To fix a date when taxes for the ensuing year shall become due and payable.

ART. 18—To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the purchase of free text books for the ensuing year.

ART. 19—To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the repairs of schoolhouses for the ensuing year.

ART. 20—To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for contingent expenses for the ensuing year.

ART. 21—To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the support of schools for the ensuing year.

ART. 22—To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the support of the poor for the ensuing year.

ART. 23 – To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the repairs of highways and bridges for the ensuing year.

ART. 24—To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise raise and appropriate to be expended in permanent work upon such highway in said town as has been designated for a State road by the County Commissioners under Chapter 63 of the Public Laws of 1903 of Maine.

ART. 25—To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate to pay interest on notes and town debt.

ART. 26—To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate to pay the tuition of High School pupils.

ART. 27—To see if the town will vote that all persons shall pay tolls on the Arrowsic Bridge the ensuing year.

ART. 28—To see if the town vote to authorize the Selectmen to regulate the tolls on the Arrowsic Bridge.

ART. 29—To see if the town will vote to accept the list of jurors as prepared by the Selectmen.

The Selectmen will be in session at the Town House one-half hour before the time of said meeting for the purpose of correcting the list of voters.

Hereof fail not to make due return of this warrant with your doings to the Town Clerk at the time and place of holding said meeting.
