SAGADAHOC, SS.

To Cornelius T. Willis, Esq., a Constable of Arrowsic,
County of Sagadahoc, GREETING:

In the name of the State of Maine, you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of said town of Arrowsic, qualified by law to vote in town affairs, to meet at the town house, in said town, on the 4th day of March, A. D. 1912, at 10 o'clock A. M., to act on the following articles, to wit:

Art. 1. To choose by ballot a Moderator to preside at said meeting.

Art. 2. To choose by ballot a Town Clerk for the ensuing year.

Art. 3. To see if the town will vote to accept the reports of the town officers.

Art. 4. To choose by ballot Selectmen, Assessors and Overseers of Poor for the ensuing year,

Art. 5. To choose by ballot a Treasurer for the ensuing year.

Art. 6. To choose by ballot a Collector of Taxes for the ensuing year.

Art. 7. To choose by ballot a Road Commissioner for the ensuing year.

Art. 8. To choose by ballot one member of the School Committee for three years.

Art. 9. To choose by ballot a Constable for the ensuing year.

Art. 10. To choose by ballot a Truant Officer for the ensuing year.

Art. 11. To choose by ballot a Pound Keeper and provide a pound for the ensuing year.

Art. 12. To choose by ballot Surveyors of Lumber Wood and Bark for the ensuing year.

Art. 13. To choose by ballot an Auditor of Accounts, for the ensuing year.

Art. 14. To choose all other necessary town officers for the ensuing year.

Art. 16. To see if the town will vote to allow the use of the school houses for religious meetings for the ensuing year.

Art. 15. To fix a date when taxes for the ensuing year shall become due and payable.

Art. 17. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the purchase of free text-books for the ensuing year.

Art. 18. To see what sum of money the town will vote

to raise and appropriate for the repair of school houses for the ensuing year.

Art. 19. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for contingent expenses for the ensuing year.

Art. 20. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the support of schools for the ensuing year.

Art. 21. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the support of poor for the ensuing year.

Art. 22. To see if the town will vote "yes or no" upon the adoption of the provisions of chapter 112 of the Public Laws of Maine, 1907, as amended by chapter 69, Public Laws of 1909, relating to the appropriation of money necessary to entitle the town to State aid for highways for the year 1912.

Art. 23. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate in addition to the amount regularly raised and appropriated for the care of highways, ways and bridges under the provisions of chapter 112 of the Public Laws of Maine for the year 1907, as amended by chapter 69, Public Laws of 1909.

Art. 24. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the repair of highways and bridges for the ensuing year.

Art. 25. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate to pay on town debt and interest on notes for the ensuing year.

Art. 26. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate to destroy brown-tail moths' nests for the ensuing year.

Art. 27. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to act as agents for the Arrowsic bridge for the ensuing year.

Art. 28. To see if the town will vote to maintain a school at the South school house for the ensuing year.

Art. 29. To see if the town will vote to accept the list of jurors as prepared by the town officers.

Art. 30. To see if the town will vote to charge interest on all taxes not paid within a given time during the ensuing year, and if so to fix a time and date.

Art. 31. To see if the town will vote to grant a discount on all taxes paid within a given time during the ensuing year, and if so to fix a time and date.

The Selectmen will be in session at the town house one-half hour before time of said meeting, for the purpose of correcting the list of voters.

Hereof fail not to make due return of the warrant, with your doings to the Town Clerk, at the time and place of holding said meeting.
