To Collingwood C Shea, a constable of Arrowsic, County of Sagadahoc,

GREETINGS:

In the name of the State of Maine, you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of said town of Arrowsic, qualified by law to vote in town affairs, to meet at the town house in said town on Monday, the sixth day of March, A. D., 1922, at ten a. m., to act on the following articles, to wit;

- Art. 1 To choose by hallot a moderator to preside at said meeting.
- Art. 2 To choose by ballot a town clerk for the ensuing year.
- Art. 3 To see if the town will vote to accept the reports of the town officers.
- Art. 4 To choose selectmen, assessors and overseers of the poor and all other necessary town officers.
- Art. 5 To see if the town will vote to allow the use of the schoolhouses for religious meetings for the ensuing year.
- Art. 6 To fix a date when taxes for the ensuing year shall become due and payable.
- Art. 7 To see what sum of money the town will vote to

- raise for the purchase of free text-books for the ensuing year.
- Art. 8 To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the repair of schoolhouses for the ensuing year.
- Art. 9 To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for contingent expenses for the ensuing year.
- Art. 10 To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the support of schools for the ensuing year.
- Art. 11 To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the support of poor for the ensuing year.
- Art. 12 To see if the town will vote yes or no on the question of appropriating and raising money necessary to entitle the town to state aid as provided in Sec. 20 of Chap. 130 of the Public Laws of 1913.
- Art. 13 To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the improvement of the section of state aid road, as outlined in the report of the state highway commissioner, in addition to the amount regularly raised for ways, highways and bridges under the provisions of Sec. 19 of Chap. 130 of the Public Laws of 1913.
- Art. 14 To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the repair of highways and bridges for the ensuing year.
- Art. 15 To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise to pay town debt and interest for the ensuing year.
- Art. 16 To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for high school tuition for the ensuing year.

- Art. 17 To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for maintenance of state aid highway during the year within the limits of the town under the provisions of Sec. 18, of Chap. 130 of the Public Laws of 1913.
- Art. 18 To see if the town will authorize the treasurer, with the approval of the selectmen, to procure a loan or loans of such sums of money as may be necessary to pay demands against the town for the municipal year.
- Art. 19 To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen to act as agents of Arrowsic bridge for the ensuing year.
- Art. 20 To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the salary of superintendent of schools for the ensuing year.
- Art. 21 To see if the town will vote to maintain a school at the South schoolhouse for the ensuing year.
- Art. 22 To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for completing toilets at schoolhouses.
- Art. 23 To see if the town will vote to accept the list of jurors as prepared by the town officers.
- Art. 24 To see what action the town will take in regard to the purchase of a safe for the protection of the town books.

The selectmen will be in session at the town house onehalf hour before the appointed time of said meeting for the purpose of correcting the list of voters.

Hereoffail not and make due return of this warrant with

your doings to the town clerk at the time and place of holding said meeting.

Arrowsic has shared in the State Equalization Fund for several years, on account of the generous appropriation for school purposes, and expected to this year, as the appropriations were not less than last year, but so many towns increased largely the amounts raised for school and municipal purposes that Arrowsic was below the average in the state, instead of above, as formerly, and consequently did not share as heretofore, which accounts for the overdraw.

It is expected that the new School Fund Law passed by the legislature last winter will bring a measure of relief to the smaller towns of the state.

Under the late law town are required to put their toilet facilities at school houses in clean and sanitary condition by 1924, under penalty, consequently at least half must be done the coming year, so a large amount for repairs should be appropriated.

The teacher shortage question, brought about by the war, has passed the crisis, and more teachers are now available than for the past three years, which have been the most difficult for school officials in the history of education in this country.

While wages have not become lower for teachers of training or experience, more are available to select from.

The price of books is slowly, very slowly, declining, though still far above normal before the war.

The average wages in the elementary schools of the state the past year has been over twenty dollars per week for women teachers.

The teachers employed in Arrowsic have worked conscientiously, and both schools are in excellent condition, both in discipline maintained and progress made.

No changes have been made in the books in use, only such replenishing as seemed absolutely necessary since the prices remained so high.

Health Crusade work has been done in both schools the entire year, also physical training to some extent, and a start made in the winter in serving the hot lunch at the noon hour.
