# Report of Superintendent of Schools

---

To the inhabitants of the town of Isle au Haut:

In accordance with the requirements of law I respectfully submit the following report.

It is an easy matter to look back over the work for the past year and see where some conditions could be improved upon, but taking the work and advancement of the schools as a whole we have had an average year, and the best proof that I have to offer for the condition of the schools is the standing of our scholars who are attending higher institutions of education out of town. The hardest condition to contend with in ungraded or rural schools is the constant change of teachers every term or so, and it is impossible to hold an experienced teacher any length of time for the wages paid, and for this reason I would advise consolidating the schools as much as possible, and employ teachers who are graduates thereby being able to retain the services of a good teacher for a number of terms.

A teacher of no more than a dozen children, or even less, should be a teacher in every sense of the word, but to retain such a teacher their wages must be sufficient to hold their interest term after term, to enable her to keep abreast of the best thought of the educational world by attending teachers' conventions, summer schools, etc., whereby they would be a source of inspiration to the children and a help to the whole community in which they work, and the teacher of a rural school should be able to teach any graded school in order to accomplish the best results.

The new school building with the excellent supply of maps, charts, etc., cannot help being a very valuable asset to the school. I would recommend that the appropriation for supplies and repairs be sufficient to have one more slate blackboard placed in the new school building, and for other recommendations I would refer to the amount recommended by the school committee.

# Town Warrant

---

To John K. Collins, one of the Constables of the town of Isle au Haut, Maine, in the County of Hancock, Greeting:

In the name of the State of Maine, you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of of the said town of Isle au Haut, qualified by law to vote in town affairs, to assemble at Revere hall, in said town, on Monday, March 11, A. D. 1912, at nine o'clock in the forenoon, to act on the following articles, to wit:

- 1 To choose a Moderator to preside at said meeting.
- 2 To choose a Town Clerk for the ensuing year.
- 3 To choose a Board of Selectmen for the ensuing year.
- 4 To choose Assessors of Taxes.
- 5 To choose Overseers of the Poor.
- 6 To choose a Town Treasurer and vote his compensation.
- 7 To choose a Collector of Taxes and vote his compensation.
- 8 To choose a Member of the School Board for three years.
- 9 To choose a Town Auditor or Auditors.
- 10 To choose Constables.
- 11 To choose a Road Commissioner.
- 12 To choose Surveyors of Wood and Lumber.
- 13 To choose Truant Officers.
- 14 To see what sum of money the town will raise and appropriate for the support of the poor.
- 15 To see what sum of money the town will raise and appropriate for current expenses.
- 16 To see if the town will vote to continue a school at the East side, or act anything relating thereto.
- 17 To see if the town will vote to continue a school at Head Harbor, or act anything relating thereto.
- 18 To see what sum of money the town will raise and appropriate for the support of the public schools.
- 19 To see what sum of money the town will raise and appropriate for text books and supplies.
- 20 To see what sum of money the town will raise and appropriate for repairs on school buildings.
- 21 To see what sum of money the town will raise and appropriate for the tuition of the high school scholars.
- 22 To see if the town will vote yes or no upon the adoption of the provisions of chapter 112 of the Public Laws of Maine,

for the year 1907, as amended by Chapter 69, Public Laws of 1909, also Chapter 21, Public Laws of 1911, and Chapter 183, Public Laws of 1911, relating to the appropriation of money necessary to entitle the town to state aid for highways for the year 1912.

23 To see if the town will raise and appropriate in addition to the amounts regularly raised and appropriated for the care of way, highways and bridges, the sum of \$200 00 being the maximum amount which the town is allowed to raise under the provisions of Chapter 112 of the Public Laws of Maine for the year 1907, as amended by Chapter 69, Public laws of 1909, also Chapter 21, Public Laws of 1911, and Chapter 183, Public Laws of 1911.

24 To see what sum of money the town will raise and appropriate for cutting bushes from road limits.

25 To see what sum of money the town will raise and appropriate for snow bills.

26 To see what sum of money the town will raise and appropriate for repairs on roads and bridges.

27 To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$260 00 as interest and part payment on town note or act on anything relating thereto.

28 To see if the town will vote to instruct the town treasurer to hire, with the approval of the selectmen, whatever money that may be required to defray town expenses for the ensuing year.

29 To see if the town will vote to accept the new school building in district No. 1 (so called.)

30 To see if the town will vote to accept the list of jurors as made by selectmen.

31 To see what action the town will take for the protection of clams.

32 To act on any other business that may come before said meeting.
