# Report of Superintendent of Schools

---

TO THE SUPERINTENDING SCHOOL COMMITTEE :

I herewith submit to you, and through you to the citizens of the town, my second annual report as Superintendent of the public schools of Isle au Haut.

While no radical changes in the operation of the schools have taken place during the past year, some minor changes may properly be mentioned. At the beginning of the fall term of 1918 a new course of study was put in the hands of the teachers. This outline of the school work for the year furnishes for the guidance of each teacher complete details of the kind and amount of work for each grade each term, and thus enables a new teacher to avoid loss of time in getting into the routine of her school. This course is the same as that introduced in the schools of Stonington and Deer Isle at the same time. A new and up-to-date series of Arithmetic text books has also been introduced, which does away with the wide gaps between the work of some of the grades and that of the grade following, which was the chief defect of the old books. This was doubly true because a mixture of books from two or three different series were previously in use. A few new and attractive sets of reading books have also been added to the supply on hand, these being chosen after they had been proved to be attractive and interesting to children of the ages for which they were assigned.

In the matter of teachers more frequent changes have taken place than is desirable, although these changes have seem-

ed to be unavoidable under the circumstances. In general I believe that the same teacher should be continued in a school for the entire year if efficient and continuous progress is expected and desired. Every time that a change is made energy and time are lost while pupils and teacher are becoming adjusted and accustomed to each other. Probably no greater benefit could be conferred upon our schools, with less expense, than by providing efficient teachers and then guarding against any except absolutely necessary changes until the end of the school year.

At the end of the spring term of 1917 Miss Gladys Ward of Thorndike, and Miss Clara E. Trott of Stonington closed very successful periods of work with our schools and asked to be released to take up teaching elsewhere. Miss Luella Robbins of Stonington carried on the work of the East Side school with good results during the fall term, at the end of which time another change was made necessary on account of sickness in her home. After considerable delay caused by the present shortage of teachers Miss Littlefield of Bluehill was secured to take up the work and is now in this position. In the Thoroughfare school it became necessary to advance the wages slightly in order to fill the place with a teacher of experience. Miss Josephine Hillman of Troy was selected for the place and is now teaching her second term in this school. She had between five and six years of successful teaching experience behind her, and has proved to be a skillful instructor.

The average of attendance has been excellent during the past three terms, with the exception of the past two terms in the Thoroughfare. Here the attendance of some of the students has been almost perfect while that of others has been so poor as to affect the record to a serious extent. A part of this irregular attendance appears to have been caused

by severe weather conditions, but a larger part seems to have been unnecessary and steps should be taken to prevent this evil.

It is a matter of regret to the Superintendent that the ice conditions in the bay have made travel either impossible during the winter term or else so uncertain that trips seemed likely to cause long delays in returning to other work. For this reason the schools have not been visited during this term as they should have been and other school matters have not had the attention due to them. The usual table of attendance and averages of attendance which should accompany this report are lacking for this reason. It is hoped that this enforced neglect may be made up by more than the required number of visits during the spring term.

All improvements to buildings and equipment mentioned and recommended in the report of 1917 have been made, and the law complied with in regard to the display of the American Flag. The new blackboards in the East Side school are especially appreciated and make the work of both teacher and pupils much more satisfactory. The fresh coats of muresco and varnish have added much, also, to the appearance of the interior of the Thoroughfare building, and teachers and pupils urged to do all in their power to keep these improvements permanent. The next and about the only improvement of immediate need in this building is that of more sanitary toilets as those now in use do not measure up to what should be expected.

The interior of the East Side schoolhouse shows a decided lack of paint and varnish. If the seats and other furniture could be given a coat of varnish or varnish stain, and some of the woodwork of the room were painted, it would add much to the cleanliness of the room as well as giving it a more cheerful and attractive appearance. In a building



which has been in use for so many years the thorough disinfection and cleansing which a little fresh paint gives is worth the cost of the work.

On Jan. 1, 1918, all towns which had not been included in unions for the purpose of supervision were placed in some such union, as the law provides, by the State Superintendent. Many unions of towns previously existing were broken up and arranged in new combinations, which was often necessary in order that every town in the state should be provided for. This union of Isle au Haut, Deer Isle and Stonington, however was not disturbed, and Isle au Haut was decided by the state officials to properly belong in the union which was arranged two years ago and which now stands unchanged. Formerly the several towns decided for themselves what towns, if any, they would unite with, but under the new law this matter is placed wholly in the power of the state.

In September two of our students, who had satisfactorily finished their grammar school courses, began the four year course in the Camden High School. These were Franklin Barton and Floyd Rich. A class of six is expected to finish the work of the grammar school course at the Thoroughfare at the close of the coming spring term.

In closing this report I wish to cordially thank the members of the superintending school committee and other town officers who have assisted in making the work of the year as successful and pleasant as possible, and also those of the citizens and parents who have contributed to the same end.

# Town Warrant

---

TO ALBERT L. RICH, one of the constables of the town of Isle au Haut, Maine, in the county of Knox, GREETING :

In the name of the State of Maine, you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of the said town of Isle au Haut, qualified by law to vote in town affairs, to assemble at Revere Hall in said town, on Monday, March 18, A. D., 1918, at nine o'clock in the forenoon, to act on the following articles, to wit :

Art. 1 To choose a Moderator to preside at said meeting.

Art. 2 To choose a Town Clerk for the ensuing year.

Art. 3 To choose a Board of Selectmen for the ensuing year.

Art. 4 To choose Assessors of Taxes.

Art. 5 To choose Overseers of the Poor.

Art. 6 To choose a Town Treasurer and vote his compensation.

Art. 7 To choose a Collector of Taxes and vote his compensation.

Art. 8 To choose a member of the School Board for three years.

Art. 9 To choose a Town Auditor.

Art. 10 To choose Constables.

Art. 11 To choose a Fire Warden and vote his compensation.

Art. 12 To choose Surveyors of Wood and Lumber.

Art. 13 To see what sum of money the town will raise and appropriate for the support of poor.

Art. 14 To see what sum of money the town will raise and appropriate for the support of public schools.

Art. 15 To see what sum of money the town will raise and appropriate for current expenses.

Art. 16 To see what sum of money the town will raise and appropriate for text books and supplies.

Art. 17 To see what sum of money the town will raise and appropriate for repairs on school buildings.

Art. 18 To see what sum of money the town will raise and appropriate for high school tuition.

Art. 19 To see if the town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$126.91 to pay balance due on insurance of Revere Memorial Hall.

Art. 20 To see if the town will vote "Yes" or "No" on the question of raising and appropriating money necessary to entitle the town to state aid, as provided in Section 20, of Chapter 130 of the Public Laws of 1913.

Art. 21 To see if the town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$300.00 for the improvement of the section of the state aid road as outlined in the report of the state highway commission, in addition to the amounts regularly raised for the care of ways, highways and bridges: the above amount being the maximum which the town is allowed to

raise under the provisions of Section 19, of Chapter 130, of the Public Laws of 1913.

Art. 22 To see what sum of money the town will raise and appropriate for snow bills.

Art. 23 To see what sum of money the town will raise and appropriate for repairs on roads and bridges.

Art. 24 To see if the town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$250.00 and interest, to pay town note.

Art. 25 To see what sum of money the town will raise and appropriate for the maintenance of town hall, or act anything relating thereto.

Art. 26 To see if the town will vote to instruct the town treasurer to hire, with the approval of the selectmen, whatever money that may be required to defray town expenses for the ensuing year.

Art. 27 To see what sum of money the town will raise and appropriate to pay overdraw on state road.

Art. 28 To see what sum of money the town will raise and appropriate for the maintenance of state and state aid highways during the ensuing year, within the limits of the town, under the provisions of Sections 9 and 18, of Chapter 130, of the Public Laws of 1913.

Art. 29 To see what sum of money the town will raise and appropriate for superintendent of schools.

Art. 30 To see what sum of money the town will raise and appropriate for dependents of soldiers as provided in Chapter 276, of Public Laws, of 1917.

Art. 31 To see if the town will vote to decide on a cer-

tain date, on which all taxes should be paid, also decide on a rate of interest for all taxes not paid after that date.

Art. 32 To act on any other business that may come before said meeting.
