# Warrant for Town Meeting

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Somerset, ss.,

State of Maine.

To Fairfield Nevens, Constable of the town of Hartland,  
Greeting:

In the name of the State of Maine, you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of said town of Hartland qualified by law to vote in town affairs, to assemble at the Opera House in said town on Monday, the 11th day of March, A. D. 1912, at nine o'clock in the forenoon to act on the following articles, to wit:

Art. 1. To choose a Moderator to preside at said meeting.

Art. 2. To choose a town clerk for the ensuing year.

Art. 3. To hear all reports to be made at said meeting and act upon anything relating thereto.

Art. 4. To choose three or more selectmen for the year ensuing.

Art. 5. To choose three or more Assessors for the year ensuing.

Art. 6. To choose all the necessary officers for the year ensuing and fix their compensations.

Art. 7. To see if the town will vote to elect a Road Commissioner or act upon anything relating thereto.

Art. 8. To choose one or more superintending school committee.

Art. 9. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for town charges.

Art. 10. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the support of common schools and interest on bond.

Art. 11. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the purchase of school books.

Art. 12. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the repair of school buildings, and purchase of school supplies and rent of Academy for the ensuing year.

Art. 13. To see if the town will vote to instruct its superintending School committee to arrange with Hartland Academy to furnish instructions to its High School pupils for the ensuing year and act upon anything relating thereto, and raise

such sums of money as may be necessary to furnish its pupils free High school instruction.

Art. 14. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the support of poor for the ensuing year.

Art. 15. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise to pay town debts for the ensuing year.

Art. 16 To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise to be expended on roads, bridges and sidewalks and to act upon anything relating thereto, and to see what instructions the town will give its officers who may have charge of the construction or repairs of highways.

Art. 17. To see if the town will vote yes or no upon the adoption of the provision of Chapter 69 of the Public laws of Maine for the year 1909 relating to the appropriation of money necessary to entitle the town to state aid for highways for the year 1912, and raise \$300.00 in addition to any amount provided for in Article 16 of this warrant.

Art. 18. To see what action the town will take in regard to permanent improvements on the road between this village and Bert Spaulding's.

Art. 19. To see what action the town will take in regard to the action taken in Art. 33, of the town Warrant of 1910.

Art. 33. To see if the Town will vote to amend Art. 32 of the Town Warrant of March 1907, to read as follows:

To see if the Town will vote to exempt from taxation, for a period of five years from date of purchase or lease, the Plant Machinery and Stock formerly known as the W. H. Moore Lumber and Woodworking Co.

Provided however that the purchaser or lessee maintains an average monthly pay roll of at least \$600.00, among employees directly connected with said plant, during the above named period.

Art. 20. To see what action the town will take upon request of the Linn Woolen Co., to rebate on the Moor Saw Mill the 1910 tax.

Art. 21. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise to supply deficiencies in consequence of abatements and discounts.

Art. 22. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for Memorial Day observance.

Art. 23. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for electric lights and act upon anything relating thereto.

Art. 24. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for care of cemeteries.

Art. 25. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for fire department.

Art. 26. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for Hartland Free Library.

Art. 27. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise to pay interest bearing debts.

Art. 28. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to refund the interest bearing debt of the town, when the same can be done at a lower rate of interest.

Art. 29. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to hire money with which to pay town debts.

Art. 30. To see what action the town will take in relation to the collection of taxes for the ensuing year and act upon anything relating thereto.

Art. 31. To see if the town will vote to accept such proposition as the Hartland Water Co. shall submit to said town at said meeting for furnishing water to said town and the citizens thereof, for fire protection, and other public uses, and appoint a committee to make a contract in the name of the said town with said Hartland Water Co.

Art. 32. To see if the town will vote to extend the hydrant pipe line along Elm St., to the Palmyra town line, and raise money for the same and act upon anything relating to our present system.

Art. 33. To see if the town will furnish a suitable room for holding criminal hearing and to raise a sum of money for the same.

Art. 34. To see what action the town will take in regard to the proposed union of towns in maintaining a county Poor farm in the place of separate Town farms.

The Selectmen will be in session at the above named Opera House one hour before said meeting for the purpose of correcting the list of voters.

# Superintendent's Report

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Gentlemen of the School Board:

In presenting you with my second annual report, it gives me pleasure to say that our schools as a whole have been very satisfactory. Three terms out of the twenty-five have not been all that could be asked. In one instance I place the blame on the teacher and in the other two the pupils have been equally at fault. In one instance if the parents had shown more desire to co-operate there would have been better results. The parents have a duty to perform if there is to be a good school and I wish to make it emphatic that just as long as that duty is left undone there will not be a marked degree of success in that school.

Teachers.

In all seventeen teachers, including the high, have been employed this year. Of this number sixteen are experienced teachers having had from two to twenty-six terms experience, and nine have had professional training. It has been my aim to keep a teacher in the same school for a year if she has proven satisfactory as more and better results are to be accomplished in this way. While this report will show a break between the spring and fall terms there will really be six teachers in the same school for the school year, fall, winter and spring term.

The Course of Study.

There have been no changes in the course of study this year excepting that Algebra has been dropped from the grades. I feel that this study has no place in the common schools and those pupils who enter the Academy without any knowledge of Algebra are doing better work than many who had taken it in the grades. The average pupil who has a knowledge of algebra when they enter a higher school feel that they know the subject and will not have to study very hard to pass. Consequently many fail. We have adopted a course of study and a set of by-laws together with the "rules and regulations" that we expect to follow. A copy of these will be placed in the hands of every family who have pupils in the schools at the opening of the spring term.

### Reports.

A change has been made in the method of reports this year. A yearly rank card has been furnished to every pupil. This one card will show the rank for the year. This card is to be taken home by the pupil at regular intervals and are to be signed by the parent or guardian and returned to the school. At the end of the year the pupil is to keep the card. A card with duplicate ranks are to be left at my office that the superintendent may know the standing of every pupil.

### Rural Schools.

One term has been a failure and one or two others have not been all that one could wish. In the first case the teacher was much at fault while in the other the pupils and the parents themselves played an important part in detracting from the usefulness of the school. While the teaching power of men and women go a long way toward making a successful school it is not necessarily a fact that teaching power alone will make a successful school. There must be co-operation from the home as well as willingness in the school to submit to the right thing to have what we are looking for, a good school.

### Village Schools.

The village schools have been under the instruction of experienced and efficient teachers. At the close of the fall term there was a prospect of a record year but during the winter term sickness has caused a material setback to these schools. There are quite a number of pupils that cannot possibly complete the work during the spring term. For those who cannot complete the work there will be no other way than another year in the same grade as it will be a serious menace to the usefulness of the school to allow those pupils to pass that cannot do the work in the next grade. The teachers have been faithful and the pupils have worked well. Everything, except the measles, has been satisfactory in these schools.

### Academy.

This school has been maintained as a high school until July 1, since which time it has been an academy in the strict

sense of the word. A new course has been added, the English, which is giving satisfaction. The third teacher on the faculty gives ample time for the recitation periods and a spare period for each teacher. This spare period is of great value as there is good use made of it in giving assistance to the students.

In this school there were 45 students registered in the fall term, and 41 in the winter term. The average attendance for the fall term was 39. The average for the winter term will be somewhat less as there has been sickness in this school. Of the number registered fifteen are tuition students.

There are as follows: Seniors, 6; Juniors, 7; Sophomores, 9; Freshmen, 22; Special I. Studies: Latin, 15; French, 17; Mathematics (Arith. Alg. Geom. Bk-kp.), 44; English, (Gram. Rhet. Literature and Composition) 45. History, (Am. Eng. General), 35; Science, (Physics and Physical Geography), 25.

With the improvements in the building, the revised and enlarged course of study, larger teaching force and the establishing of The Hartland Academy Debating society makes this one of the strong schools in this section of the state.

#### In Conclusion.

Our schools on the whole have been more satisfactory and better work done than last year. In the making of a school there must be co-operation as the home and the schools are working for the same ends—the making of the future citizen. In several instances there is need of more co-operation from the home but in the main I have received more useful suggestion and greater help from the home than last year which goes to show that there is a genuine interest in our schools.

For the many kindly suggestions I am very grateful and I can assure you that they have been greatly appreciated.
