Warrant for Town Meeting

Somerset, ss.

State of Maine.

To F. S. Burrill, Constable of the Town of Hartland, Greeting:

In the name of the State of Maine you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of said town of Hartland qualified by law to vote in town affairs, to assemble at the Opera House in said town on Monday the twelfth day of March A. D. 1917, at nine o'clock in the forenoon to act on the following articles, to wit:

Art. 1—To choose a Moderator to preside at said meeting.

Art. 2—To choose a Town Clerk for the ensuing year.

Art. 3—To hear all reports to be made at said meeting.

Art. 3½—To see if the town will vote to elect its Board of Selectmen, Assessors and Overseers of Poor for the following periods, the first for one year, the second for two years and the third for three years, and after the first year, each member elected to fill the vacancy caused by the retiring member, to be elected for three years, members to be advanced each year until retirement.

Art. 4—To choose three or more Selectmen for the year ensuing, and to act upon anything relating thereto.

Art. 5—To choose three or more Assessors for the year ensuing, or to act upon anything relating thereto.

Art. 6—To choose all the necessary officers for the year ensuing, fix their compensation, or act upon anything relating thereto.

Art. 7—To choose one or more Superintending School Committee, or to act upon anything relating thereto.

Art. 8—To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for town charges, or to act upon anything relating thereto.

Art. 9—To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the support of common schools and interest on bond.

Art. 10—To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the purchase of school books.

Art. 11—To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the repair of school buildings, the purchase of supplies and rent of Academy for the ensuing year, and to act upon anything relating thereto.

Art. 12—To see if the town will vote to instruct its Superintending School Committee to arrange with Hartland Academy to furnish instruction to its High School pupils for the ensuing year and act upon anything relating thereto, and raise such sums as will be necessary to furnish its pupils with free High School instruction.

Art. 13—To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the support of poor for the ensuing year.

Art. 14—To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise to pay town debts.

Art. 15—To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise to be expended on roads and bridges for the ensuing year, or act upon anything relating thereto.

Art. 16—To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise to be expended upon sidewalks for the ensuing year, or act upon anything relating thereto.

Art. 17—To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise to supply deficiencies in consequence of abatements and discounts for the ensuing year, or act upon anything relating thereto.

Art. 18—To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for Memorial observance.

Art. 19—To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for electric lights for the ensuing year, or act upon anything relating thereto.

Art. 20—To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for Cemetery fences and care of Cemeteries for the ensuing year and act upon anything relating thereto.

Art. 21—To see if the town will vote 'yes' or 'no' on the question of appropriating and raising money necessary to entitle the town to State Aid as provided in section 20 of chapter 130 of the Public Laws of 1913.

Art. 22—To see if the town will appropriate and raise the sum of \$533.00 for the improvement of the section of State Aid road as outlined in the report of State Highway Commission, in addition to the amounts regularly raised for the care of ways, highways and bridges; the above amount being the maximum which the town is allowed to raise under the provisions of section 19 of chapter 130 of the Public Laws of 1913.

Art. 23—To see what sum of money, if any, the town will vote to raise and appropriate under the provisions of section 22 of chapter 130 of the Public Laws of 1913, or act upon anything relating thereto.

Art. 24—To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for Fire Department or act upon anything relating thereto.

Art. 25—To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for Hartland Free Library.

Art. 26—To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise to pay interest on interest bearing debt.

Art. 27—To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to refund the interest bearing debt, when the same can be done at a lower rate of interest.

Art. 28—To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to hire money with which to pay town debts.

Art. 29—To see what action the town will vote to take in relation to the collection of taxes for the ensuing year, and act upon anything relating thereto.

Art. 30—To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise to be expended in maintaining old State Roads.

Art. 31—To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$1000.00 for water rental.

Art. 32—To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise to expend for cutting bushes in highway, and act upon anything relating thereto.

Art. 33—To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise to defray the expense of inspecting chimneys.

Art. 34—To see what action the town will take, if any, in regard to changing the location of the road leading by the residence of Melvin Ford, Tucker Hill so called, or act upon anything relating thereto.

Art. 35—To see what action the town will take in regard to having part of its fire hose on the west side of the river near the residence of N. M. Webb, or act upon anything relating thereto.

Art. 36—To see what schools the town will authorize the superintending school committee to run for the ensuing year or act upon anything relating thereto.

Art. 37—To see what action the town will take in regard to a new school building for the village and act upon anything relating thereto.

Art. 38—To see what action the town will take regarding a Definite Plan of School Building Improvement and to act on anything relating thereto.

Art. 39—To see if the town will vote to accept in trust the sum of one hundred dollars from the estate of Rebecca Larrabee, the same to be put at interest in some savings bank to be approved by the judge of our Probate court, and the income from said one hundred dollars to be expended each year on the cemetery lot of Rebecca Larrabee, by Ellen M. Randlett so long as she lives, and at her decease by some person to be named by the judge of our Probate Court.

Art. 40—To see if the town will purchase two dummie policemen, for village or act upon anything relating thereto.

Art. 41—To see if the town will vote to measure the highways of the town as requested by the highway commission, and raise a sum of money for the same.

Art. 42—To see if the town will vote to authorize the Superintending School Committee to employ a school Physician, and raise a sum of money for the same.

Art. 43—To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$1000.00 to pay on town debt, or act upon anything relating thereto.

Art. 44—To see if the town will vote to raise the additional sum of \$200.00 to be expended in connection with the amount raised in 1916 and unexpended, to improve the road leading past the F. S. Burrill Farm, or act upon anything relating thereto.

Art. 45—To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$300.00 to grade a piece of road running from Bean's Corner to Merrifield Corner so called in West Hartland, or act upon anything relating thereto.

Art. 46—To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise to be expended for guide boards as the law requires.

The Selectmen will be in session at the above named Opera House one hour before said meeting for the purpose of correcting the list of voters.

Report of Chief of Fire Department

I report to the town in regard to its fire apparatus as follows:

Volunteer Fire Co., 45 men, 3 hose reels, 1 hook and ladder truck well equipped, 1200 feet of hose on the reels, but some will have to be thrown away in the spring. Last year the town raised \$300.00 for the purchase of hose. There was \$200 of this used as we thought that would fill our reels and we would buy a little every year. I wish to say in regard to chimneys that as there was no appropriation for the inspection of chimneys and I went over those in the thickly settled part of the village and those found bad were fixed except two or three.

We have been very lucky this year in regard to fires and I hope we continue so.

Report of School Physician

At the beginning of the fall terms, as shown from the detailed report, I inspected each school, giving each pupil a separate examination for defects that might unfavorably affect their comfort and standing in their school work. A record of each pupil was made and is on file. Also an inspection of the school buildings and grounds was made. I need not criticise the faulty buildings for this will be found in your superintendent's report. I wish to especially call your attention to the unsightly, filthy conditions of every one of the outhouses visited. The remedy will also be found in the modern schoolhouse plan outlined by the State. I found a few throats that should receive surgical attention. But by far the greater number were suffering from defective teeth and unhealthy gums.

The attention of the parents was called to these faults either by the pupils themselves or by cards sent through the mail.

I am certain the next inspection will show the wisdom of this annual examination.

Schools have been closed on account of danger from contagious diseases in only one instance. A case of infantile paralysis in the Bean's Corner school caused that to be closed for a time by the health authorities.
