Warrant for Annual Town Meeting

SOMERSET, SS.

STATE OF MAINE

To R. E. Nutting, Constable of the Town of Hartland, Greeting:

In the name of the State of Maine you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of said town of Hartland qualified by law to vote in town affairs, to assemple at the Opera House in said town on Monday the TENTH day of March A. D. 1919, at ten o'clock in the forenoon to act on the following articles, to wit:

- Art. 1-To choose two Ballot clerks.
- Art. 2-To choose a moderator to preside at said meeting.
- Art. 3-To choose a town clerk for the ensuing year.
- Art. 4-To hear all reports to be made at said meeting.
- Art. 5—To choose three or more Selectmen for the year ensuing, and to act upon anything relating thereto.
- Art. 6—To choose three or more assessors for the year ensuing, and to act upon anything relating thereto.
- Art. 7--To choose all necessary officers for the year ensuing, fix their compensation, and act upon anything relating thereto.
- Art. 8—To see if the town will vote to elect a special "Municipal Board of Mothers Aid" to consist of the Overseers of the poor ex-officio and two women members, one to be elected for two years, and one for three years, and thereafter for three year terms.
- Art. 9-To choose one or more superintending school committee, and to act upon anything relating thereto.
- Art. 10—To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the support of common schools and interest on bond.
- Art. 11—To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the purchase of school books.
- Art. 12—To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the repair of school buildings, the purchase of supplies, and rent of academy for the year ensuing, and to act upon anything relating thereto.

- Art. 13—To see if the town will vote to instruct its superintending School Committee to arrange with Hartland Academy to furnish instruction to its high school pupils for the ensuing year, and to act upon anything relating thereto, and raise such sums of money as will be necessary to furnish its pupils with free high school instruction.
- Art. 14—To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for enlarging the Pleasant Street school building, or building a new school building as recommended by the school committee, or act upon anything relating thereto.
- Art. 15—To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the support of poor for the year ensuing.
- Art. 16—To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for town charges, and to act upon anything relating thereto.
- Art. 17—To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise to pay outstanding debts.
- Art. 18—To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise to be expended on roads and bridges for the year ensuing, and to act upon anything relating thereto.
- Art. 19—To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise to be expended on sidewalks for the year ensuing, and to act upon anything relating thereto.
- Art. 20—To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise to supply deficiencies in consequence of abatements and discounts for the year ensuing, and to act upon anything relating thereto.
- Art. 21—To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for Memorial observance.
- Art. 22—To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for electric lights for the year ensuing, and to act upon anything relating thereto.
- Art. 23—To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for cemetery fences and care of cemeteries for the year ensuing, and to act upon anything relating thereto.

- Art. 24—To see if the town will vote "Yes" or "No" on the question of appropriating and raising money necessary to entitle the town to State aid as provided in Section 20 of Chapter 130 of the Public Laws of 1913.
- Art. 25—To see if the town will appropriate and raise the sum of \$533.00 for the improvement of the section of State Aid road as outlined in the report of State Highway commission, in addition to the amounts regularly raised for the care of ways, highways and bridges; the above amount being the maximum which the town is allowed to raise under the provisions of Section 19 of Chapter 130 of the Public Laws of 1913.
- Art. 26—To see what sum of money, if any, the town will vote to raise and appropriate under the provisions of Section 22 of Chapter 130 of the Public Laws of 1913, and act upon anything relating thereto.
- Art. 27—To see what sum of money the town will raise for the support of the Volunteer Fire Co. and act upon anything relating thereto.
- Art. 28—To see what sum of money the town will raise for inspecting chimneys for the year ensuing, and to act upon anything relating thereto.
- Art. 29—To see what action the town will take in placing an electric light in front of the fire station, and act upon anything relating to same.
- Art. 30—To see what action the town will take in placing a hydrant in Georgetown in front of the residence of Joseph Fritz, or act upon anything relating thereto.
- Art. 31—To see what action the town will take in regard to purchasing the fire alarm which we have on trial, and act upon anything relating thereto.
- Art. 32—To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for Hartland Free Library.
- Art. 33—To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise to pay interest on interest bearing debt.
- Art. 34—To see what action the town will vote to take in relation to the collection of taxes for the year ensuing, and to act upon anything relating thereto.
- Art. 35—To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise to be expended in maintaining old State road.

- Art. 36—To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$1000.00 for water rental.
- Art. 37—To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise to expend for cutting bushes in highway, and to act upon anything relating thereto.
- Art. 38—To see if the town will vote to authorize the superintending school committee to employ a school physician and raise a sum of money for the same.
- Art. 39—To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for maintenance Patrol for the ensuing year.
- Art. 40—To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise to repair the street leading north from the Shaw place to the St. Albans town line, and to act upon anything relating thereto.
- Art. 41—To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise to gravel the street from the Iron Bridge to Commercial street, thru Georgetown.
- Art. 42—To see if the town will vote to purchase a new Road Machine and raise a sum of money for same.
- Art. 43—To see what action the town will vote to take in relation to the town farm, and to act upon anything relating to same.
- Art. 44—To see what action the town will vote to take in regard to selling the fifty acre timber lot, and to act upon anything relating thereto.
- Art. 45—To see what action the town will take in regard to building a snow fence at North Hartland from Ham's Cor. to land of E. H. Littlefield, or to act upon anything thereto.
- Art. 46—To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen to sell the stone crusher, or build a shed to store same, or act upon anything relating thereto.
- Art. 47—To see what action the town will take in regard to clearing the roadside of wood and lumber from George Goodwin's to Ward Chipman's road so called, or act upon anything relating thereto.
- Art. 48—To see if the town will vote to buy a steel vault or safe for town clerk's use, and raise a sum of money for same.

Art. 49—To see what action the town will take in regard to collecting outstanding accounts from surrounding towns, and private individuals.

Art. 60—To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the Centennial of 1920, and act upon anything relating thereto.

The Selectmen will be in session at the above named Opera House one hour before said meeting for the purpose of correcting the list of voters.

We have been lucky the past year as we have not had only one fire and that was so far out of the village we could not use our apparatus.

Report of School Physician

To the School Board of the town of Hartland.

The following is my report to you of the inspection of your school buildings and the examination of your pupils for the school year 1918 and 1919.

Only two rural schools were in session. The houses and rooms were in good repair and comfortable.

The Pleasant street school building is over crowded. There are 62 registered little ones in a room 22x38x11 feet with the only intake air coming from the cellar through the heat registers.

On a cold day the windows in the cellar are closed giving no free circulation of fresh air. This would give each person, including the teacher, a space of a little over 5x5x8 feet of tainted air.

In the examination of the pupils their conditions were classified as 1st, 2nd and 3rd. Only 3rd class conditions were reported to the parents, 38 pupils were reported who should receive competent medical advice at once.

The following is the medical examination in detail.

TO THE TOWN OF HARTLAND:-

We feel it our duty to say a few words at this time. In the spring of 1918 we made a house to house canvass of the village, and found the sanitary conditions very bad, and we asked every one to help us in improving the conditions, and we are glad to say, in most cases they responded, with the result that conditions were greatly improved, and it was not necessary for us to make the second call.

We know that the town is badly in need of a sewer system, and we hope the time is not far away, when we will have a system installed here.

At a meeting we decided it was best to consult with the Superintendent of School, and the Selectmen in regard to having the schoolhouses fumigated, with the result that each schoolhouse was properly fumigated, including the Academy. We have also fumigated and caused to be otherwise cleaned several other houses this year.

We have investigated all nuisances and where possible they have been abolished or at least made better.

Regarding the Influenza we certainly feel that we were very fortunate here in Hartland, to escape with so few deaths, and we feel very grateful to Dr. C. A. Moulton for his efforts, and advice. The addition of several new state laws has made additional work for us.

There still remains a large amount of work to be done, and we are already planning on a house to house canvass, of the town in the spring.

Now in conclusion will say lets all work together this year, and see that our own premises are properly kept and in so doing you will greatly assist us in our work, and we will all be greatly benefited by the result.

REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOL FOR YEAR ENDING MARCH 1, 1919

Gentlemen of the School Committee:

Directly to you and indirectly to the citizens of the town of Hartland I make my second annual report as Superintendent of Schools. In this report I shall speak of some of the larger matters which have occupied the attention of the schools this year and shall discuss briefly plans for next year.

We have a strong corps of teachers this year but in the case of the village schools neither teachers nor Superintendent have been satisfied with results because of the crowded conditions. A teacher cannot do good work in charge of three grades and fifty or sixty children. We should have only two grades to a teacher next year and are making plans for this.

The fundamentals of Education have received close attention this year with especial emphasis upon Reading. ago we adopted the Progressive Road to Reading by which to teach primary children to read. It has justified our hopes of it and we are getting improved results. In connection with strong work in Reading we have State Travelling Libraries in the Grammar and Intermediate rooms and the rural schools have been supplied from the Hartland Library. We have had the best juvenile literature and it has undoubtedly stimulated pupils' interest in books and school work. Parents do not always realize the value of good books for children nor the harm of bad books.

Because of our inability to secure a teacher we have been unable to teach Music and Drawing in the schools this year. We shall take it up again next year if possible.

We had only put the Fuller's Corner Schoolhouse in good shape when it was struck by lightning, making it necessary to do part of the work over. In accordance with the recommendation of the School Physician we have painted the Grammar room so as to improve the lighting greatly. We shall expect to do the same for the Intermediate room this coming year. The new furnace at the Pleasant St. School has given fine satisfaction and the new toilets installed in the Academy building have greatly improved conditions.

We are asking for a large increase in the Common School fund. This year's account would have been overdrawn by at

least \$600 if our schools had not been closed so long from the epidemic. Other small towns about us have been doing much better for their schools than we have. Hartland is prosperous enough to give its children the standard school year of 36 weeks. Altho our teachers have been paid more than last year, they have been the poorest paid workers in our town. We wish to retain our good teachers with an increase in pay and to fill the places of any others with promising material. We need more money then to bring up our school year to the standard and to pay our teachers more.

At the close of the school year last June, our text books were found to be in a deplorable condition, out of date and worn out. The School Committee examined the books in person and approved an order for better books which is responsible for the overdraft in this department.

One of the most important matters before you at town meeting will be the need of a new school room. In the last two years the attendance in our schools has increased from 156 to 200 and the attendance in the village alone from 116 to 172. We have not made adequate provision for this increased number of children with the result that our work is very seriously handicapped. I consider it impossible to do efficient school work in our village until we have another school-room. Hartland has a bright future industrially and is bound to grow. Under present conditions we cannot hope to teach our children as they should be taught.

The School Committee and Superintendent recommend the following appropriations:

For Common Schools	\$3500.00
For Text Books	300.00
For Repairs and Supplies	600.00

Now that the war is over and our attention is more closely fixed upon matters at home, we shall hope to keep our schools more in the public eye and to give people a better opportunity to observe what we are trying to do. In closing, allow me to express my appreciation of your support and good will in matters pertaining to the schools.
