

Warrant for Annual Town Meeting

SOMERSET, SS.

STATE OF MAINE

To J. R. Picken, Constable of the town of Hartland, Greetings:

In the name of the State of Maine you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of said town of Hartland qualified by law to vote in town affairs, to assemble at the Opera House in said town on Monday the EIGHTH day of March A. D. 1920, at ten o'clock in the forenoon to act on the following articles, to wit:

Art. 1—To choose a moderator to preside at said meeting.

Art. 2—To choose a town clerk for the ensuing year.

Art. 3—To hear all reports to be made at said meeting.

Art. 4—To choose three or more selectmen for the year ensuing and to act upon anything relating thereto.

Art. 5—To choose three or more assessors for the year ensuing, and to act upon anything relating thereto.

Art. 6—To choose all necessary officers for the year ensuing, fix their compensation, and to act upon anything relating thereto.

Art. 7—To see if the town will vote to elect a special "Municipal Board of Mothers' Aid" to consist of the overseers of the poor ex-officio and two women members, one to be elected for two years and one for three years, and there after for three year terms, and to act upon anything relating thereto.

Art. 8—To choose one or more superintending school committee, and to act upon anything relating thereto.

Art. 9—To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for support of common schools and interest on bond, and to act upon anything relating thereto.

Art. 10—To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the purchase of school books, and to act upon anything relating thereto.

Art. 11—To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the repair of school buildings, the purchase of supplies, and rent of Academy for the year ensuing, and to act upon anything relating thereto.

Art. 12—To see if the town will vote to instruct its superintending school committee to arrange with Hartland Academy to furnish instructions to its high school pupils for the ensuing year, and to act upon anything relating thereto, and to raise such sums of money as will be necessary to furnish its pupils with free high school instruction.

Art. 13—To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for support of poor for year ensuing, and to act upon anything relating thereto.

Art. 14—To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for town charges, and to act upon anything relating thereto.

Art. 15—To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise to pay outstanding town debts, and to act upon anything relating thereto.

Art. 16—To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise to be expended on roads and bridges for year ensuing, and to act upon anything relating thereto.

Art. 17—To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise to be expended on sidewalks for the year ensuing, and to act upon anything relating thereto.

Art. 18—To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise to supply deficiencies in consequence of abatements and discounts for the year ensuing, and to act upon anything relating thereto.

Art. 19—To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for Memorial observance.

Art. 20—To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for electric lights for the year ensuing, and to act upon anything relating thereto.

Art. 21—To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for cemetery fences and care of cemeteries for the year ensuing, and to act upon anything relating thereto.

Art. 22—To see if the town will vote "Yes" or "No" on the question of appropriating and raising money necessary to entitle the town to State aid as provided in Section 20 of Chapter 130 of the public laws of 1913.

Art. 23—To see if the town will appropriate and raise the sum of \$533.00 for the improvement of the section of State Aid road as outlined in the report of State Highway Commission, in addition to the amounts regularly raised for the care of ways, highways and bridges; the above amount being the maximum which the town is allowed to raise under the provisions of Section 19 of Chapter 130 of the Public Laws of 1913.

Art. 24—To see what sum of money, if any, the town will vote to raise and appropriate under the provisions of Section 22 of Chapter 130 of the Public Laws of 1913, and to act upon anything relating thereto.

Art. 25—To see what sum of money the town will raise for support of the Volunteer Fire Co. and to act upon anything relating thereto.

Art. 26—To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for inspection of chimneys for the year ensuing, and to act upon anything relating thereto.

Art. 27—To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for Hartland Free Library.

Art. 28—To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise to pay interest on interest bearing debt.

Art. 29—To see what action the town will take in relation to the collection of taxes for the year ensuing, and to act upon anything relating thereto.

Art. 30—To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise to be expended in maintaining old State road.

Art. 31—To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$1000.00 for water rental.

Art. 32—To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise to expend for cutting bushes in highway, and to act upon anything relating thereto.

Art. 33—To see if the town will vote to authorize the superintending school committee to employ a school physician and to raise a sum of money for same.

Art. 34—To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for maintenance Patrol for ensuing year.

Art. 35—To see what action the town will take in regard to collecting outstanding accounts from surrounding towns, and private individuals.

Art. 36—To see if the town will raise a sum of money to purchase a cart or sled for the firemen for winter use, and to act upon anything relating thereto.

Art. 37—To see what sum of money if any the town will vote to raise for the purpose of purchasing a tractor for the building of summer roads and winter road breaking, and to act upon anything relating thereto.

Art. 38—To see if the town will vote to assist the Hartland Band financially in any manner, or to act upon anything relating thereto.

Art. 39—To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for Centennial of 1920, and to act upon anything relating thereto.

Art. 40—To see if the town will vote to revise the jury box and except list of jurors as prepared by town officers.

The selectmen will be in session at the above named Opera House one hour before said meeting for the purpose of correcting the list of voters.

Report of the Superintendent of Schools

YEAR ENDING MARCH 1st, 1920

Gentlemen of the School Committee:

Directly to you and indirectly to the citizens of Hartland I make my report for the year just ended.

Strong emphasis has been laid upon the common branches this year, especially Spelling and Penmanship. The Thorndike Standard Spelling Tests were given in the schools during the fall term and the pupils, as in St. Albans and Palmyra, were found to average about two grades below the Standard. These tests will serve as a basis for improved work in spelling.

All the teachers attended a two day Institute on the teaching of the Palmer Method of Business Writing, under the instruction of an expert. This method was introduced into the schools six years ago and is now used quite generally thruout the State. A marked improvement in the teaching of Penmanship has taken place since the Institute in October.

The State Course of Study, which has been in preparation for several years was issued to the schools this summer. We have complied with its requirements as far as possible with our present textbooks and equipment.

1920 is the Centennial Year of Maine's Statehood. With this in mind, the schools have devoted a period each week to the history and Geography of Maine. We plan to continue this work, as familiarity with one's state is as practical as any work in History or Geography.

A unique feature since cold weather came has been the serving of a warm lunch at the Grammar School under the direction of Mrs. Connelly and Miss Fuller. Those who must carry a lunch to school have brought something to contribute to the meal and from 15 to 20 children have been saved from a cold dinner each day.

The addition to the Primary School building was an absolute necessity. Without it we should have had three schools of 50 pupils each and would have received poor returns for the money paid for their maintenance as the teachers could not

have done justice to the schools. We regret that its total cost was so much greater than the original estimate but the price of practically every item used in its construction had advanced sharply when the work was begun. The building is modern, well heated, lighted and ventilated and would be a credit to any town.

This year the town gives its children the standard school year of 36 weeks. Many smaller and less prosperous towns as well as larger ones have taken this step. 36 weeks is none too long for a child to learn thoroly the work of each grade.

The teachers, pupils and parents at Fuller's Corner have cooperated in the giving of entertainments for the benefit of the school. A school improvement League has been organized and already a fine clock has been purchased and other things are being planned for.

The outlook for teachers for next year is very serious. Teachers are still leaving the profession steadily. Miss Florence Hale, State Agent for Rural Schools, told the Grange lecturers of the state, assembled in Convention, that there are 80 schools in the state closed for lack of teachers and, which is fully significant, that 80 more ought to be closed because of incompetent teachers. The only solution is a wage scale sufficiently high to keep teachers from going into other work. This places a heavy burden upon the towns but it must be shouldered if we are to have any schools worthy of the name. A federal appropriation must save the schools from disaster.

During the coming year we plan to undertake only the most necessary repair work. The increased cost of books and supplies will make needful an increased amount for these items.

The school dollar has been divided as follows this year: Teachers, 36 cents; janitors, 5 cents; fuel, 6 cents; conveyance, 17 cents; books, 4 cents; repairs, 4 cents; supplies, 5 cents; grade school tuition 1 cent; High School, 22 cents. The total per pupil cost of schooling the 189 pupils in common schools has been \$35.

Let me express at this time my appreciation of the courtesy and cooperation shown by the School Committe and citizens.
