

## Warrant for Annual Town Meeting

SOMERSET, SS.

STATE OF MAINE

To Forest Baker, Constable of the Town of Hartland, Greeting:

In the name of the State of Maine you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of said town of Hartland qualified by law to vote in town affairs, to assemble at the Opera House in said town on Monday, the twelfth day of March, A. D. 1923 at ten o'clock A. M. to act on the following articles to wit:

- Art. 1. To choose a moderator to preside at said meeting.
- Art. 2. To choose a town clerk for the ensuing year.
- Art. 3. To hear all reports to be made at said meeting
- Art. 4. To choose three or more selectmen for the year ensuing, and to act upon anything relating thereto.
- Art. 5. To choose three or more overseers of poor for year ensuing and to act upon anything relating thereto.
- Art. 6. To choose three or more assessors for the year ensuing, and to act upon anything relating thereto.
- Art. 7. To choose all necessary officers for the year ensuing, fix their compensation, and to act upon anything relating thereto.
- Art. 8. To choose one or more superintending school committee and to act upon anything relating thereto.
- Art. 9. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the support of common schools and interest on bond, and to act upon anything relating thereto.
- Art. 10. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the purchase of school books, and to act upon anything relating thereto.
- Art. 11. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the repair of school buildings, the purchase of supplies and rent of Academy for the year ensuing, and to act upon anything relating thereto.

- Art. 12. To see if the town will vote to instruct its superintending school committee to arrange with Hartland Academy to furnish instructions to its High School pupils for the year ensuing and to act upon anything relating thereto, and to raise such sums of money as will be necessary to furnish its pupils with free High School instruction.
- Art. 13. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for town charges and to act upon anything relating thereto.
- Art. 14. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for support of poor for year ensuing and to act upon anything relating thereto.
- Art. 15. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise to pay outstanding town debts, and to act upon anything relating thereto.
- Art. 16. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise to be expended on roads and bridges for the year ensuing and to act upon anything relating thereto.
- Art. 17. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise to be expended on sidewalks, for the year ensuing and to act upon anything relating thereto.
- Art. 18. To see what sum of money the town will raise to supply deficiencies in consequence of abatements and discounts for the year ensuing and to act upon anything relating thereto.
- Art. 19. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for Memorial observance.
- Art. 20. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for electric lights for the year ensuing and to act upon anything relating thereto.
- Art. 21. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for cemeteries for the year ensuing and to act upon anything relating thereto.
- Art. 22. To see if the town will vote "Yes" or "No" on the question of appropriating and raising money necessary to entitle the town to State aid as provided in section 19 of chapter 25 of the Revised Statutes of 1916.

- Art. 23. To see if the town will appropriate and raise the sum of \$666.00 for the improvement of the section of State Aid road as outlined in the report of State Highway Commission in addition to amounts regularly raised for care of highways and bridges, the above amount being the maximum which the town is allowed to raise under the provisions of section 18 of chapter 25 of the Revised Statutes of 1916.
- Art. 24. To see if the town will vote to assist the Hartland Band financially in any manner, or to act upon anything relating thereto.
- Art. 25. To see what money the town will vote to raise and appropriate under the provisions of Section 22 of Chapter 130 of the Public Laws of 1913 and to act upon anything relating thereto.
- Art. 26. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the support of the Volunteer Fire Company and to act upon anything relating thereto.
- Art. 27. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for Hartland Free Library.
- Art. 28. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise to pay interest on interest bearing debt.
- Art. 29. To see what action the town will take in relation to the collection of taxes for the year ensuing and to act upon anything relating thereto.
- Art. 30. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$1000.00 for water rental.
- Art. 31. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise to be expended for cutting bushes in highway and to act upon anything relating thereto.
- Art. 32. To see if the town will vote to authorize the superintending School Committee to employ a school physician and to raise a sum of money for same.
- Art. 33. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for maintenance patrol for ensuing year.
- Art. 34. To see what sum of money the town will raise for a music supervisor for the schools.

- Art. 35. To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen to hire money in anticipation of taxes and to pay town debts.
- Art. 36. To see what sum, if any the town will vote to raise in accordance with the provisions of Chapter 154 of the Public Laws of 1917 for the construction of a State Highway extending from north—town line of Cambridge (where said line crosses the road that leads from Elmer Folsom's corner to Parkman Village) in a general southerly direction down what is known as Ham Hill and across Goose Flat, (so-called) to the town line between Cambridge and Ripley; thence across the town of Ripley via Todds Corner so-called; thence across the town of St. Albans via St. Albans Village; thence diagonally across the town of Hartland via Hartland village; thence across the town of Palmyra, southerly, to Pittsfield town line.
- Art. 37. To see if the town will vote to put one electric light on Hubbards Ave.
- Art. 38. To see if the town will vote to build a sewer on Academy Street, and to act upon anything relating thereto.
- Art. 39. To see if the town will vote to raise a sum of money to buy or build two snow scrapers with rollers for breaking winter roads or act upon anything relating thereto.
- Art. 40. To see if the town will vote to raise a sum of money to build a board fence on Goodwin hill so called or to act upon anything relating thereto.
- Art. 41. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$250 to build a snow fence between Ham's Corner and Walter Munn's barn or act upon anything relating thereto.
- Art. 42. To see if the town will vote to raise a sum of money to buy tractor to be used on highway construction or act upon anything relating thereto.
- Art. 43. To see if the town will vote to raise a sum of money for the Great Moose Lake Boat Club or act upon anything relating thereto.
- Art. 44. To see what sum of money the town will raise to widen the Fred Burrill road (so-called) from Fred Burrill residence to R. W. Stafford hill, or act upon anything relating thereto.

The selectmen will be in session at the above named Opera House one hour before said meeting for the purpose of correcting the list of voters.

of Medford, Mass., Assistants, both graduates of Colby College last June. The Principal receives \$2000, the Submaster \$1300 and the two Assistants \$1200. There are 85 pupils enrolled.

I wish to speak most enthusiastically of the Music supervision in the schools. Mrs. Harriet Pease of Connecticut was secured at a salary of \$400 to direct the teaching of vocal music in all the schools and to lead the Academy orchestra. Under her excellent leadership our own competent teachers have accomplished a great deal in the 22 weeks which have elapsed at the time of writing this report Ability to sing with others or to play some instrument will be a source of pleasure to our young people long after they have forgotten the products of Brazil or the names of the Presidents in To those worthy citizens who feel that the cost of music instruction should rest upon the individual parents alone, it should be a sufficient answer that our school children are receiving the services of a specialist for 36 weeks at a cost of less than \$2.50 per pupil.

The School Improvement Fund this year has been used to place what we have termed Library Books in our elementary schools. These have included young people's lives of Washington and Lincoln, some reference material and much general good literature for both upper and lower grades. It is very much worth while to cultivate in boys and girls a taste for good reading. The books have been very much appreciated. We are asking that this fund be continued during the coming year with an appropriation of \$100 which we wish to use for playground apparatus. Our school grounds are without swings, teeter boards, volley balls, or other equipment that bring health and happiness to boys and girls. This should fill a long felt need in our schools.

Two major items of repairing have used up the greater part of the repair funds. The first was the sanatary work at the Ireland School which consisted in clearing out and cementing the cesspool and in placing the primary school toilets from the dark basement onto the first floor. The second large item was Hartland's half of the cost of shingling the Coston's Corner Schoolhouse, at North Hartland. The Fuller's Corner Schoolhouse has been much improved by a thoro painting.

For some time it has been our custom to place particular emphasis on one subject thru the year, while trying to teach

## Report of Superintendent of Schools

For the Year Ending February 28, 1923

Members of the Hartland School Committee:

Directly to you and indirectly to the citizens of Hartland, I make my sixth annual report.

The School Census, or list of persons in town between the ages of 5 and 21, as taken last April, showed an increase from 291 to 314. The common school enrollment for the Fall term was as follows:

Grades I, II, 24; III, IV, 43; V, VI, 28; Fuller's Corner 27; Webber, 16; a total of 190 as compared with 174 a year ago. The attendance has been good during the greater part of the year. Sickness and severe weather have caused many absences during the winter term. Very few absences are due to lack of interest on the part of parents.

The following teachers were continued in the same schools: Grades I, II, Doris Colbath; III, IV, Ada McCrillis, V, VI, Mary Connelly; Fuller's Corner, Linda Carver. Irving Urann of Ellsworth was secured to take Miss Fuller's place in grades VII-VIII at \$23 per week. He was replaced at the end of the fall term by R. C. Raymond of Cambridge at \$25 per week. Blanche Ogden was placed in the Webber School at \$19 per week. The grade teachers receive \$22.50 per week and Mrs. Carver receives \$25. Our salary of \$22.50 has placed an exceptionally strong corps of local teachers in our village schools. This weekly wage minus the price of board is not large enough to attract even fair ability when it is necessary to search over the State for a grade teacher.

Hartland Academy is passing thru the most successful year of any of the six during which I have been acquainted with the institution. An entirely new corps of teachers has succeeded in improving all departments of the school. Not in the past six years has there been an interest in studies, such fine school spirit, such a sane and wholesome program of athletics and physical training. The teachers are: Elmer R. Biggers of Monson, Principal. a graduate of University of Maine, with eight years teaching experience; Ralph Keirstead of Fairfield, Submaster, with two years at Bowdoin College; Edith Harvey of Dover-Foxcroft and Berth Gilliott

the other studies at least as well as before. This year we are giving special attention to the field of English. We have all studied what to teach and how to teach in oral and written composition and Grammar. As a result, the boys and girls are making excellent progress in ability to stand up and speak upon a topic briefly and well and to write an interesting letter or article without glaring mistakes in spelling, punctuation or correct speech. More Grammar has been taught in these two terms than in any previous period twice as long. The pupils in the lower grades are making better progress than ever in that most important of all subjects. Reading.

I have long been particularly interested in the problems of "small town" schools. I have come to the conclusion that the superiority of the famed city schools is due almost entirely to three things: a good teacher, remaining in the same school for a number of years, under good supervision. I confidently look for a much greater efficiency in the schools of country towns because these same factors can be brought Many Rural towns cannot afford, many more to operace. think they cannot afford, the teaching and supervision. Many excellent neople believe that a teacher's stay in one school should be limited to one term, or at most to a year, last ten years have seen much progress along these three lines. however. Most country people desire no Federal and or control of schools. They wish no further extension of State powers. If we are not going to accept the assistance of these agencies, it is squarely up to us to provide a reasonable efficient school thru. our own local resources, even at considerable sacrifice. I feel that Hartland has done well by its schools.

The total per capita cost of schooling the 183 children in common school this year was \$53. The school dollar was divided as follows: Teachers, 39 cents; Fuel, 5; Janitors, 5; Conveyance, 12; Tuition, 3; Repairs, 4; Supplies, 4; High School, 21; Supervision, 4.

I wish to express thru the medium of this report my appreciation of the spirit of courtesy and cooperation shown toward my efforts by the school committee and citizens generally.


