STATE OF MAINE

To Forest Buker, Constable of the Town of Hartland,

GREETING:

In the name of the State of Maine you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of said town of Hartland qualified by law to vote in town affairs to assemble at the Opera House in said town on Monday, the ninth day of March A. D. 1925, at ten o'clock A. M. to act on the following articles, to wit:

Art. 1. To choose a moderator to preside at said meeting.

Art. 2. To choose a town clerk for the ensuing year.

Art. 3. To hear all reports to be made at said meeting.

Art. 4. To choose three or more selectmen for the year ensuing, and to act upon anything relating thereto.

Art. 5. To choose three or more overseer of poor for the year ensuing, and to act upon anything relating thereto.

Art. 6. To choose three or more assessors for the year ensuing, and to act upon anything relating thereto.

Art. 7. To choose all necessary officers for the year ensuing, fix their compensations; and to act upon anything relating thereto.

Art. 8. To choose one or more superintendent school committee and to act upon anything relating thereto.

Art. 9. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the support of common schools and interest on bond and to act upon anything relating thereto.

Art. 10. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the repair of school buildings and to act upon anything relating thereto.

Art. 11. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the purchase of school books and to act upon anything relating thereto.

Art. 12. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the purchase of school supplies and to act upon anything relating thereto.

Art. 13. To see if the town will vote to instruct its superintending school committee to arrange with Hartland Academy to furnish instructions to its High School pupils for the year ensuing and to act upon anything relating thereto, and to raise such sums of money as will be necessary to furnish its pupils with free High School instruction.

Art. 14. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for town charges and to act upon anything relating thereto.

Art. 15. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the support of poor for the year ensuing, and to act upon anything relating thereto.

Art. 16. To see what sum of money the town will vote to pay outstanding debts and to act upon anything relating thereto.

Art. 17. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise to be expended on roads and bridges for the year ensuing and to act upon anything relating thereto.

Art. 18. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise to be expended on sidewalks for the year ensuing and to act upon anything relating thereto.

Art. 19. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise to supply deficiencies in consequence of abatements and discounts for the year ensuing and to act upon anything relating thereto.

Art. 20. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for Memorial observance.

Art. 21. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for electric lights for the year ensuing, and to act upon anything relating thereto.

Art. 22. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for cemeteries for the year ensuing, and to act upon anything relating thereto.

Art. 23. To see if the town will vote "Yes" or "No" on the question of appropriating and raising money necessary to en-

title the town to State aid as provided in section 19 of chapter 25 of the Revised Statutes of 1916.

Art. 24. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of twenty-five dollars to be paid as salary to the chief of the Volunteer Fire Company for the year ensuing, and to act upon anything relating thereto.

Art. 25. To see if the town will appropriate and raise the sum of \$666.00 for the improvement of the section of State Aid road as outlined in the report of State Highway Commission in addition to amount regularly raised for care of highways and bridges the above amount being the maximum which the town is allowed to raise under the provisions of section 18 of chapter 25 of the Revised Statutes of 1916.

Art. 26. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate under the provision of section 22 of chapter 130 of the Public Laws of 1913 and to act upon anything relating hereto.

Art. 27. To see if the town will vote to assist the Hartland Band financially in any manner or act upon anything relating thereto.

Art. 28. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the support of the Volunteer Fire Company and to act upon anything relating thereto.

Art. 29. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for Hartland Free Library.

Art. 30. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise to pay interest on interest bearing debt.

Art. 31. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$1000.00 for water rental.

Art. 32. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise to be expended for cutting bushes in the highway and to act upon anything relating thereto.

Art. 33. To see if the town will vote to authorize the superintending school committee to employ a school physician, and to raise a sum of money for the same.

Art. 34. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for maintenance patrol for ensuing year.

Art. 35. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for music supervisor for the schools.

Art. 36. To see if the town will raise a sum of money to drill a well at Fuller's Corner schoolhouse.

Art. 37. To see if the town will vote to raise \$1500.00 as a sinking fund on our school bonds, also \$712.50 to pay six months' interest, and to act upon anything relating thereto.

Art. 38. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$300.00, the amount left by Mrs. J. Goodspeed in 1914, and deposit same in Skowhegan Savings Bank and to act upon anything relating thereto.

Art. 39. To see what sum the town will vote to raise and appropriate for advertising our natural resources, advantages and attractions under the provisions of chapter 4, section 59 of the Revised Statutes of Maine the same to be expended by the Maine Development Association.

Art. 40. To see if the town will vote to build a sewer on Academy Street and to act upon anything relating thereto.

Art. 41. To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen to hire money, in anticipation of taxes and to pay town debts.

Art. 42. To see what action the town will take in relation to the collection of taxes for the year ensuing, and to act upon anything relating thereto.

Art. 43. To see what action the town will take, if any, in relation to the unpaid taxes of the years 1916, 1917, 1918, and 1919.

Art. 44. To see if the town will vote to assess a tax, not to exceed \$50.00 each year for a term of five years on mill, machinery and stock of a wood working industry to be operated by D. A. Corson of Harmony, Me.

Art. 45. To see if the town will vote to instruct its road commissioner and his successors in office, to maintain and keep in repair for public use the private way known as Webb Avenue, or act upon anything relating thereto.

Art. 46. To see if the town will vote to instruct its road commissioner and his successors to office, to maintain and keep in

repair for public use, the private way known as Seekins Street, or act upon anything relating thereto.

The selectmen will be in session at the above named Opera House, one hour before said meeting for the purpose of correcting the list of voters.

REPORT OF SUPT. OF SCHOOLS

To the Citizens of Hartland, Greetings:

I herewith submit my eighth annual report as Superintendent of Schools. It contains comments on the past year's work and suggestions for the new year.

I am very glad to report that in my opinion the progress being made in our six elementary schools is the best yet. While we have always had excellent teaching in most of our schools, this has often been offset by poor work in some particular case. Each school is efficient this year.

The School Census in April showed 353 young people between the ages of 5 and 21 resident in the town, as compared with 314 the previous year. The teachers and enrolment are as follows:

Grades VII-VIII—Elsie Emery, 47 pupils.

Grades V-VI—Mary Connelly, 44 pupils.

Grades III-IV—Edna Lenfest, 34 pupils.

Grades I-II—Doris Colbath, 49 pupils.

Fuller's Corner—Gertrude Davis, 26 pupils.

Webber—Linda Carver, 10 pupils.

This gives a total of 210 pupils, the largest we have ever had. Each teacher receives \$22.50 per week.

I have realized more with each year the value of our music work. It seems to me from numerous comments which I hear that our citizens generally entertain the same feeling. Our

Music Supervisor this year is Doris Harlow of Mexico. She receives a salary of \$950 of which our town pays \$380. She combines the qualities of a true musician with those of a real school teacher. The ability and cooperative spirit of our own teachers have made it possible for her to advance our pupils rapidly.

While striving to maintain all school branches at a high teaching efficiency, it is our custom to give particular emphasis to some phase of the work which needs up-building. This year our special interest has been given to HEALTH.

The work has three divisions. The first is formal gymnastics, the chief purposes of which are to correct round shoulders and similar defects and to give relaxation and exercise to muscles which have been cramped in a school desk for an hour or more.

The second division is Health instruction. This differs from the old Physiology study with its lists of bones and muscles because it deals with Hygiene and the laws acquiring and maintaining good health. It will be interesting to know that our schools are following the Pennsylvania State Health Course, which is the work of Dr. Chas. H. Keene, formerly of Palmyra.

The third type of Health work is the Health Crusade, which is a plan whereby children actually do Health chores, such as brushing the teeth, drinking milk, etc. It is not enough to know what ought to be done, pupils must form the habit of doing it. We have had the cordial cooperation of parents in this work, without which we could not have attained such a satisfactory degree of success.

There are approximately 100 students in the Academy this year, of whom about 60 are from Hartland; 40 pay tuition at the rate of \$60 per year. E. R. Biggers continues his work as principal. Alton Perry of Randolph is sub-master. The two assistants are Mary Drisko of Columbia Falls and Mildred Stephens of Auburn. I consider that the Academy is running the best it has yet. The school is placing strong emphasis upon studies and at the same time is providing a program of athletics, debating, music, dramatics, etc., which train for life as surely as do books. The excellent quality of the teachers is contributing to a very effective school. I can speak highly, also, of the splendid spirit of the students who are doing their part to make Hartland Academy a fine school.

I cannot praise enough our fine new school building. While it is not perfect, it is a splendid schoolhouse for a little town

like ours. There are no luxuries nor fads in it, but it is modern in every important particular and none too large. Those who are familiar with the building situation today feel that we have received an unusually good return for our money. You may not be aware of how often it happens that buildings are held up when partly built until from \$10,000 to \$50,000 additional is provided.

The interest which Hartland people take in their schools was plainly shown by the promptness with which citizens and organizations volunteered schoolrooms after the fire. Conditions at best were hard for pupils and teachers but the people took a sympathetic and understanding attitude which made it possible for us to do a good year's work in spite of handicaps.

The only important repair item this year has been the work on the Webber schoolhouse. Shingling, painting, steel-ceiling and other items have made a different building which is neat and attractive. This has been partly responsible for the much better progress which the children are making educationally.

The total per capita cost of schooling our 202 pupils in common school this year has been approximately \$46. The school dollar has been divided as follows: Teachers, 38 cents; fuel, 4; janitors, 4; conveyance, 10; tuition, 3; high school, 29; books, 4; supplies, 2; repairs, 2; music, 4.

In conclusion, I wish to express my sincere appreciation of the spirit of cooperation which Hartland people have extended to their schools and to me.
