Warrant for Town Meeting

SOMERSET S. S.

STATE OF MAINE

To Carroll L. Ford, Constable of the town of Hartland:

GREETINGS.

In the name of the State of Maine you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of said town of Hartland qualified by law to vote in town affairs to assemble at the Opera House in said town on Monday, the 14th day of March A. D. 1927, at ten o'clock A. M. to act on the following articles, to wit:

Art. 1. To choose a moderator to preside at said meeting.

Art. 2. To choose a town clerk for the ensuing year.

Art. 3. To hear all reports to be made at said meeting.

Art. 4. To choose three or more selectmen for the year ensuing, and to act upon anything relating thereto.

Art. 5. To choose three or more overseers of poor for the year ensuing, and to act upon anything relating thereto.

Art. 6. To choose three or more assessors for the year ensuing, and to act upon anything relating thereto.

Art. 7. To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen to appoint a road commissioner instead of electing one.

Art. 8. To choose all necessary officers for the year ensuing, fix their compensations, and to act upon anything relating thereto.

Art. 9. To choose one or more superintending school committee and to act upon anything relating thereto.

Art. 10. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the support of common schools and interest on bond, and to act upon anything relating thereto.

Art. 11. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the repair of school buildings and to act upon anything relating thereto.

Art. 12. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the purchase of school books and to act upon anything relating thereto.

Art. 13. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the purchase of school supplies and to act upon anything relating thereto.

Art. 14. To see if the town will vote to instruct its superintending school committee to arrange with Hartland Academy to furnish instructions to its High School pupils for the year ensuing, and to act upon anything relating thereto, and to raise such sums of money as will be necessary to furnish its pupils with free High School instruction.

Art. 15. To see if the town will vote to authorize the superintending school committee to continue the Webber school, should it become automatically closed, if in their judgment it seems best to do so.

Art. 16. To see if the town will vote to authorize the superintending school committee to employ a school physician, and to raise a sum of money for the same.

Art. 17. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for music supervisor for the schools.

Art. 18. To see if the town will vote to raise \$1500 as a sinking fund on our school bonds, also \$1425.00 to pay one year's interest, and to act upon anything relating thereto.

Art. 19. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the town charges and to act upon anything relating thereto.

Art. 20. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the support of the poor for the year ensuing, and to act upon anything relating thereto.

Art. 21. To see what sum of money the town will vote to

pay outstanding debts and to act upon anything relating thereto.

Art. 22. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise to be expended on roads and bridges for the year ensuing and to act upon anything relating thereto.

Art. 23. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise to be expended on sidewalks for the year ensuing and to act upon anything relating thereto.

Art. 24. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise to supply deficiencies in consequence of abatements and discounts for the year ensuing and to act upon anything relating thereto.

Art. 25. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for Memorial observance.

Art. 26. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for electric lights for the year ensuing, and to act upon anything relating thereto.

Art. 27. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for cemeteries for the year ensuing, and to act upon anything relating thereto.

Art. 28. To see if the town will vote "Yes" or "No" on the question of appropriating and raising money necessary to entitle the town to State aid as provided in Section 19 of Chapter 25 of the Revised Statutes of 1916.

Art. 29. To see if the town will appropriate and raise the sum of \$666.00 for the improvement of the section of State Aid road as outlined in the report of State Highway Commission in addition to amount regularly raised for care of highways and bridges the above amount being the maximum which the town is allowed to raise under provisions of Section 18 of Chapter 25 of the Revised Statutes of 1916.

Art. 30. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate under the provision of Section 22 of Chapter 130 of the Public Laws of 1913 and to act upon anything relating thereto.

Art. 31. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the support of the Volunteer Fire Company and to act upon anything relating thereto.

Art. 32. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of twenty-five dollars to be paid as salary to the chief of the Volunteer Fire Company for the year ensuing, and to act upon anything relating thereto.

Art. 33. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for Hartland Free Library.

Art. 34. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise to pay interest on interest bearing debt.

Art. 35. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$1000.00 for water rental.

Art. 36. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise to be expended for cutting bushes in the highway and to act upon anything relating thereto.

Art. 37. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for maintenance patrol for ensuing year.

Art. 38. To see what sum the town will vote to raise and appropriate for advertising our natural resources, advantages and attractions under the provision of Chapter 4, Section 59, of the Revised Statutes of Maine, the same to be expended by the Maine Development Association.

Art. 39. To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen to hire money, in anticipation of taxes and to pay town debt.

Art. 40. To see what action the town will take in relation to the collection of taxes for the year ensuing, and to act upon anything relating thereto.

Art. 41. To see how much money the town will vote to raise for the inspection of chimneys.

Art. 42. To see if the town will raise money to provide for the services of a public health nurse, or take any action thereon.

Art. 43. To see if the town will take any action in regard to fixing the age limit for assessing a poll tax or act upon anything relating thereto.

Art. 44. To see if the town will vote to accept the list of Jurors as prepared by the town officers.

The selectmen will be in session at the above named Opera House, one hour before said meeting for the purpose of correcting the list of voters.

REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

February 24, 1927.

To the Citizens and the Superintending School Committee of the Town of Hartland:

I present my second annual report of your schools. Schools were opened in the fall with six teaching positions. After two weeks, at the request of the school officials of Pittsfield, the Bean's Corner school was opened and the children of that neighborhood were transferred from Fuller's Corner school to that school.

Hartland has paid toward the support of Bean's Corner school what it had contracted to pay for conveyance to Fuller's Corner school.

The opening of the fall term found an aggregate enrollment of 226 scholars in the elementary grades with schools, teachers, and enrollment as follows:

Of these 16 are from out of town.

The census of last April found 358 children between the ages of 5 and 20 inclusive; 189 boys and 169 girls. Of these 210 are in the above named schools and 51 are in the secondary school.

In general the attendance has been good. Our schools have been free from contagious diseases, and the health of the children has been remarkably good.

The janitor work in the village schools has been done by Mr. A. B. Deering in a very careful and efficient manner. In the outside schools the teachers have taken care of it at a small weekly wage.

The following conveyance teams have been maintained since schools opened in the fall: Mr. W. A. Chipman conveyed to the village; Mr. Bruce Hillman to Fuller's Corner; and Mrs. Charles Walker to the Webber school.

Mr. Cox conveyed to Fuller's Corner during the first two weeks of the fall term; after that the children attended Bean's Corner school.

The usual necessary supplies consisting of paper, ink, pens, chalk, seat work, board erasers, drawing paper etc., have been furnished and we have tried to buy them where we could get them to the best advantage.

Because of the illness of our Music Supervisor the course in music has been slightly broken into, and we have not asked her to give a report on it.

We were very fortunate in getting Miss Rogers, of Pittsfield, to take Miss Harlow's place for the winter term. The work is going along very nicely. The orchestra seems to be making good progress, and the interest is well maintained.

SECONDARY SCHOOL

The Academy had pretty nearly a complete turnover in teachers owing to the resignation of Prin. Biggers, Mr. Abbott, and Miss Jordan. However, their places were filled with teachers who have proven that no mistake was made in their selection.

There are 89 students, 38 boys and 51 girls, attending the Academy at the present time. Thirty-eight of these are from out of town, mostly from Palmyra and St. Albans.

We are hoping that some arrangements may be made in the near future so that the girls may have the advantage of a domestic science course.

HEALTH

The usual course in physical culture and health hygiene is being continued. We think with excellent results.

The report of the School Physician shows the general physical condition of the children, and his reports to parents regarding conditions of special cases should be acted upon, and corrections made, or treatment given, as the case demands. If this be done, it may mean a life of happiness instead of a life of sorrow.

REPAIRS

Some changes have been made in the heating equipment in the Athens Street school, and the rooms now warm up quite well in not too extremely cold weather.

We advise building a vestibule over the landing to the fire escape. This will protect this exit from the cold winds, and make the upper room warmer.

Other than these, only minor repairs have been made.

We think it might be well to paint the Fuller's Corner school-house this year.

CONCLUSION

In conclusion I express to teachers, parents, and children, my sincere thanks for their kindness toward me, and their sympathy with me, in all matters pertaining to the schools.

Also, I wish to impress upon your minds the thought and sentiment of this quotation:

"The teacher—whether mother, priest, or schoolmaster—is the real maker of history; rulers, statesmen, and soldiers, do but work out the possibilities of co-operation, or conflict, the teacher creates,"
—H. G. Wells.
