Warrant for Annual Town Meeting

SOMERSET ss.

STATE OF MAINE

To Forest Baker, Constable of the town of Hartland:

GREETINGS:

In the name of the State of Maine you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of said town of Hartland qualified by law to vote in town affairs to assemble at the Opera House in said town on Monday, the 12th day of March A. D. 1928, at ten o'clock A. M. to act on the following articles, to wit:

Art. 1 To choose a moderator to preside at said meeting.

Art. 2 To choose a town clerk for the ensuing year.

Art. 3 To hear all reports to be made at said meeting.

Art. 4 To choose three or more selectmen for the year ensuing, and to act upon anything relating thereto.

Art. 5 To choose three or more overseers of poor for the year ensuing, and to act upon anything relating thereto.

Art. 6 To choose three or more assessors for the year ensuing, and to act upon anything relating thereto.

Art. 7 To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen to appoint a road commissioner instead of electing one.

Art. 8 To choose all necessary officers for the year ensuing, fix their compensations, and to act upon anything relating thereto.

Art. 9 To choose one or more superintending school committee and to act upon anything relating thereto.

Art. 10 To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the support of common schools and interest on bond, and to act upon anything relating thereto.

Art. 11 To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the repair of school buildings and to act upon anything relating thereto.

Art. 12 To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the purchase of school books and to act upon anything relating thereto.

Art. 13 To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the purchase of school supplies and to act upon anything relating thereto.

Art. 14 To see if the town will vote to instruct its superintending school committee to arrange with Hartland Academy to furnish instructions to its High School pupils for the year ensuing, and to act upon anything relating thereto, and to raise such sums of money as will be necessary to furnish its pupils with free High School instruction.

Art. 15 To see if the town will vote to authorize the superintending school committee to continue the Webber school, should it become automatically closed, if in their judgment it seems best to do so.

Art. 16 To see if the town will vote to authorize the superintending school committee to employ a school physician, and to raise a sum of money for the same.

Art. 17 To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for music supervisor for the schools.

Art. 18 To see if the town will vote to raise \$1500 as a sinking fund on our school bonds, also \$1,425.00 to pay one year's interest, and to act upon anything relating thereto.

Art. 19 To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the town charges and to act upon anything relating thereto.

Art. 20 To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the support of the poor for the year ensuing, and to act upon anything relating thereto.

Art. 21 To see what sum of money the town will vote to pay outstanding debts and to act upon anything relating thereto.

Art. 22 To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise to be expended on roads and bridges for the year ensuing and to act upon anything relating thereto.

Art. 23 To see what sum of money the town will vote to

raise to be expended on sidewalks for the year ensuing and to act upon anything relating thereto.

Art. 24 To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise to supply deficiencies in consequence of abatements and discounts for the year ensuing and to act upon anything relating thereto.

Art. 25 To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for Memorial observance.

Art. 26 To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for electric lights for the year ensuing, and to act upon anything relating thereto.

Art. 27 To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for cemeteries for the year ensuing, and to act upon anything relating thereto.

Art. 28 To see if the town will vote "Yes" or "No" on the question of appropriating and raising money necessary to entitle the town to State Aid as provided in Section 19 of Chapter 25 of the Revised Statutes of 1916.

Art. 29 To see if the town will appropriate and raise the sum of \$3,000.00, said sum being five times the amount of regular State Aid in one year, under the provisions of Section 21, Chapter 25 of the Revised Statutes of 1916 for the improvement of State Aid Road as outlined in the report of State Highway Commission, in addition to amount regularly raised for care of highways and bridges.

Art. 30 To see if the town will appropriate and raise the sum of \$600.00 for the improvement of the section of State Aid road as outlined in the report of State Highway Commission in addition to amount regularly raised for care of highways and bridges, the above amount being the maximum which the town is allowed to raise under provisions of Section 18 of Chapter 25 of the Revised Statutes of 1916.

Art. 31 To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate under the provision of Section 22 of Chapter 130 of the Public Laws of 1923 and to act upon anything relating thereto.

Art. 32 To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the support of the Volunteer Fire Company and to act upon anything relating thereto.

Art. 33 To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of twenty-five dollars to be paid as salary to the chief of the Volunteer Fire Company for the year ensuing, and to act upon anything relating thereto.

Art. 34 To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for Hartland Free Library.

Art. 35 To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise to pay interest on interest bearing debt.

Art. 36 To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$1,000.00 for water rental.

Art. 37 To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise to be expended for cutting bushes in the highway and to act upon anything relating thereto.

Art. 38 To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for maintenance patrol for ensuing year.

Art. 39 To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$500.00 providing the Diamond Match Company will furnish an equal amount, the same to be expended upon the Burrill road, so-called.

Art. 40 To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen to hire money, in anticipation of taxes and to pay the town debt.

Art. 41 To see what action the town will take in relation to the collection of taxes for the year ensuing, and to act upon anything relating thereto.

Art. 42 To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen to build 500 feet of snow fence near Ham's Corner on Athens road, or act upon anything relating thereto.

Art. 43 To see if the town will raise money to provide for the services of a public health nurse, or take any action thereon.

This action is made legal by the Maine Legislature of 1925: see Section 58, Chapter 140 of the 1925 Statutes.

Art. 44 To see if the town will vote to unite with Palmyra and St. Albans to employ a music teacher.

Art. 45 To see if the town will authorize the Pine Grove Cemetery committee to buy on more land and act upon anything relating thereto.

Art. 46 To see if the town will accept a right of way across land of Wallace Goodwin and Noah Woodbury as laid out by the selectmen, and if so to raise a sum of money to build the same and act upon anything relating thereto.

Art. 47 To see what action the town will take in regard to putting a sewer on Blake Street, so-called, or to act upon anything relating thereto.

Art. 48 To see if the town will vote to sell whatever right it has in the real estate conveyed by James Church to Inhabitants of School District No. 4 in the town of Hartland and authorize the chairman of the board of selectmen to convey the same by quit claim deed.

Art. 49 To see if the town will vote to authorize the Pine Grove Cemetery Committee not to allow any more earth removed from the foot of the bank next to the highway, but to straighten and grade it to protect the trees on said bank.

Art. 50 To see if the town will vote to ratify and confirm the acts of its selectmen in selling and conveying to Charles W. Salisbury, for the sum of one thousand dollars (\$1,000.00) and to Percy J. Lancaster and Margaret Lancaster for the sum of fifty dollars (\$50.00) all of the property mortgaged by Arthur E. Bowie to said town, which mortgage has been foreclosed.

The selectmen will be in session at the above named Opera House, one hour before said meeting for the purpose of correcting the list of voters.

REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the Citizens and Superintending School Committee of the Town of Hartland:

I present my third annual report of your schools.

Schools were opened at the beginning of the school year with seven teaching positions, viz:

Grades VII and VIII, Fausta M. Howes, teacher	38 pupils
Grades V and VI, Mary A. Connelly, teacher	41
Grades III and IV, Ella B. Getchell, teacher	29
Grades I and II, Nina F. Steeves, teacher	58
Grades I and II, Lula M. Buzzell, assistant	
Fuller's Corner, Edna D. Estes, teacher	22
Webber School, Gertrude E. Russell, teacher	16

This was an enrollment of 204 pupils. There are now enrolled in the same schools 221 pupils.

Generally speaking the attendance has been good. Because of the scarlet fever trouble, a few families fearing that their children might contract the disease, have kept them out of school some of the time.

The census of last April found 352 children from 5 to 20 years of age, inclusive, in the town; 180 boys and 172 girls. Of these 204 are registered in the above named schools, 39 are in secondary schools, and several are in other institutions of learning.

The janitor work in the village has been done by Mr. A. B. Deering in a very careful and efficient manner. In the outside schools the teachers have had charge of it, with an allowance of 50 cents a week for the spring and fall terms, and 75 cents for the winter term.

The following named conveyance teams have been maintained: W. A. Chipman to the Village Schools for \$25.00 a week. W. A. Peterson to the Webber School for \$7.00 a week. Bruce Hillman to the Fuller's Corner School for \$10.00 a week. Moses Cox to the Fuller's Corner School for \$5.00 a week. Mrs. E. E. Davis to the Village Schools for \$5.00 a week.

In all thirty-four children have been furnished with conveyance privileges to school.

The usual necessary supplies, consisting of paper, ink, pens, chalk, seat-work, board erasers, drawing paper, etc., have been furnished.

The music work has been directed by Miss Grace Rogers of Pittsfield. The orchestra work is progressing well. The piano class work is going along finely with 37 in the class.

Miss Rogers is a music teacher of broad experience and knows how school music should be done.

If it can be brought about, I think it would be an excellent move for this town to unite with Palmyra and St. Albans to employ a music teacher whose work shall be divided among the three towns.

The Academy has about its usual number of students, 38 from Hartland, 14 from Palmyra, 24 from St. Albans, and 1 from Ripley. The "machinery" of the school seems to be running very smoothly, and good results are being obtained.

The usual course in physical culture and health hygiene, with special emphasis on the dental phase, is being conducted, and the results are very gratifying.

I think we have a corps of teachers whose services we should desire to retain. They are very conscientious, pains-taking, hard-working, efficient teachers, and I specially recommend them for future service.

Our school physician needs no words of comment or commendation from me; we all know him for his excellent worth and for his special interest in our school children.

Although the repairs recommended last year have not all been made I have not changed my mind about them.

I further recommend that a new shed be attached to the Webber schoolhouse, and that toilets be connected with the

schoolroom. Chemical toilets are very satisfactory when properly installed and cared for.

The Fuller's Corner schoolhouse is in need of paint, and the Athens Street School house would stand a good painting all right.

My work with your schools and with the superintending school committee has been very pleasant to me, and I hope it has been profitable to the schools and to the town.

REPORT OF SCHOOL PHYSICIAN

Hartland, February 14, 1928.

To the Superintending School Committee, Hartland, Me.:

The following is my report as School Physician for 1927-28.

All schools have been visited twice, once for physical examination and examination of school buildings and play grounds, and once for general inspection.

Owing to an epidemic of mild scarlet fever in the village, several visits have been made to these schools.

It was considered best to close the Pleasant Street School early in the epidemic for one week. Later all grade schools were closed for two weeks, hoping, thereby, that the unknown source of the disease would clear up. The exposed rooms and books were properly treated and schools again started up with one family in quarantine. Since then one boy from the Pleasant Street School has been reported with the fever making now two families in quarantine.

Your officers have been diligent in attempting to stamp out this disease and have had, for the most part, the hearty co-operation of the people. But, owing to the dread of quarantine or otherwise, some may have been a little careless. Any willful neglect to report communicable diseases is liable under the law.
