

Warrant for Annual Town Meeting

SOMERSET ss. STATE OF MAINE To Forest Baker, Constable of the Town of Hartland:

GREETINGS:

In the name of the State of Maine you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of said town of Hartland qualifield by law to vote in town affairs to assemble at the Opera House in said town on Monday, the 18th day of March A. D. 1929, at ten o'clock A. M. to act on the following articles, to wit:

- Art. 1. To choose a moderator to preside at said meeting.
- Art. 2. To choose a town clerk for the ensuing year.
- Art. 3. To hear all reports to be made at said meeting.
- Art. 4. To choose three or more selectmen for the year ensuing, and to act upon anything relating thereto.
- Art. 5. To choose three or more overseers of poor for the year ensuing, and to act upon anything relating thereto.
- Art. 6. To choose three or more assessors for the year ensuing, and act upon anything relating thereto.
- Art. 7. To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen to care for the roads and expend the road money.
- Art. 8. To choose all necessary officers for the year ensuing, fix their compensation, and to act upon anything relating thereto.
- Art. 9. To choose one or more superintending school committee and to act upon anything relating thereto.
- Art. 10. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the support of common schools and interest on bond, and to act upon anything relating thereto.

- Art. 11. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the repair of school buildings and to act upon anything relating thereto.
- Art. 12. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the purchase of school books and to act upon anything relating thereto.
- Art. 13. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the purchase of school supplies and to act upon anything relating thereto.
- Art. 14. To see if the town will vote to instruct the superintending school committee to arrange with Hartland Academy to furnish instructions to its High School pupils for the year ensuing, and to act upon anything relating thereto, and to raise such sums of money as will be necessary to furnish its pupils with free High School instruction.
- Art. 15. To see if the town will vote to authorize the superintending school committee to continue Webber school, should it become automatically closed, if in their judgement it seems best to do so.
- Art. 16. To see if the town will vote to authorize the superintending school committee to employ a school physician, and to raise a sum of money for the same.
- Art. 17. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for music supervisor for the schools.
- Art. 18. To see if the town will vote to raise \$1,500.00 as a sinking fund on our school bonds, also \$1,425.00 to pay one year's interest, and to act upon anything relating thereto.
- Art. 19. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for town charges and to act upon anything relating thereto.
- Art. 20. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the support of the poor for the year ensuing, and to act upon anything relating thereto.

- Art. 21. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise to pay outstanding debts and to act upon anything relating thereto.
- Art. 22. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise to be expended on roads and bridges for the ensuing and to act upon anything relating thereto.
- Art. 23. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise to be expended on sidewalks for the enusing year and to act upon anything relating thereto.
- Art. 24. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise to supply deficiencies in consequencies of abatements and discounts for the year ensuing and act upon anything relating thereto.
- Art. 25. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for Memorial observances.
- Art. 26. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for electric lights for the year ensuing and to act upon anything relating thereto.
- Art. 27. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for cemeteries for the year ensuing and to act upon anything relating thereto.
- Art. 28. To see if the town will vote "Yes" or "No" on the question of appropriating and raising money necessary to entitle the town to State Aid as provided in Section 19 of Chapter 25 of the Revised Statutes of 1916.
- Art. 29. To see what sum of money, if any, the town will vote to raise in accordance with the provisions of Chapter 154 of the Public Laws of 1917, as amended by Chap. 157 of the P. L. of 1919; for the construction of a State Aid highway through the towns of Hartland, Cornville, Athens and Solon; beginning at the Hartland-Pittsfield town line and extending in a general northerly direction by the way of Fuller's Corner to Hartland

Village; thence in a general northwesterly direction to the Hartland-Athens town line; thence through the town of Athens to the Athens-Cornville town line; thence through the town of Cornville to the Cornville-Athens town line; thence through the town of Athens by the way of Athens Village to the Athens-Solon town line; thence in a general westerly direction to the state highway in Solon Village.

- Art. 30. To see if the town will appropriate and raise the sum of \$3,000.00, said sum being five times the amount of regular State Aid in one year, under the provisions of Section 21 Chapter 25 of the Revised Statutes of 1916 for the improvement of State Aid Road as outlined in the report of State Highway Commission in addition to amount regularly raised for care of highways and bridges.
- Art. 31. To see if the town will appropriate and raise the sum of \$600.00 for the improvement of the section of State Aid road as outlined in the report of State Highway Commission in addition to amount regularly raised for care of highways and bridges, the above amount being the maximum which the town is allowed to raise under provisions of Section 18 of Chapter 25 of the Revised Statutes of 1916.
- Art. 32. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate under the provision of Section 130 of the Public Laws of 1923 and to act upon anything relating thereto.
- Art. 33. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$200.00 to be expended in North Hartland on the Club House Road so called.
- Art. 34. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$500.00 to rebuild Elm Street from Warren Square southerly to Palmyra town line in Hartland Village, with gravel.
- Art. 35. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the support of the Volunteer Fire Company and act upon anything relating thereto.
- Art. 36. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of twenty-five dollars to be paid as salary to the chief of the Volunteer Fire Company for the ensuing year, and to act upon anything relating thereto.

- Art. 37. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for Hartland Free Library.
- Art. 38. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise to pay interest on interest bearing debt.
- Art. 39. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$1,000.00 for water rental.
- Art 40. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise to be expended for cutting bushes in the highway and to act upon anything relating thereto.
- Art. 41. To se if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$500.00 to rebuild Elm Street, beginning at the Palmyra town line and working north.
- Art. 42. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for maintenance of patrol for ensuing year.
- Art. 43. To see if the town will vote to raise a sum of money for the Hartland Band and act upon anything relating thereto.
- Art. 44. To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen to hire money, in anticipation of taxes and to pay the town debt.
- Art. 45. To see what action the town will take in relation to the collection of taxes for the year ensuing, and to act upon anything relating thereto.
- Art. 46. To see what sum of money the town will vote to grant and raise to be expended and used for advertising the natural resources, advantages and attractions of the State of Maine.
- Art. 47. To see if the town will raise money to provide for the services of a public health nurse, or take any action thereon.
- Art. 48. To see if the town will vote to unite with Palmyra and St. Albans to employ a music teacher.

The selectmen will be in session at the above named Opera House, one hour before said meeting for the purpose of correcting the list of voters.

textbook on "The Progressive Methods of Teaching," by Martin J. Stormzand, Professor of Education, Occidental College.

Special emphasis is being given to the study of reading, especially on the pupils speed of reading, and comprehension of material read. The results already obtained, have been most gratifying. Miss Florence Piper Tuttle, foremost educator on the subject of reading in the Eastern United States, will be with us for three days during the first of the spring term. She will go into the schoolroom and work with the teachers. All citizens whether having children attending school or not, are invited to attend Miss Tuttle's demonstrations.

Janitor work in the schools has been done in a very efficient manner, especially in the village. Mr. Deering certainly deserves much credit for the cleanliness of the building.

Eighteen dollars a week of the amount of Mr. Peterson's conveyance has been for children, whose parents are temporary residents, residing at the Diamond Match Co. lumber camps. The town is reimbursed by the State to the amount of \$221.20. The number of scholars conveyed has varied from 35-40, this meaning total conveyance of all teams.

All necessary supplies have been furnished. The total amount of the supply account is considerably larger this year, due to the small amount of supplies on hand at the beginning of the year.

Miss Grace Rogers of Pittsfield was elected music supervisor by the joint committee of the school union. Miss Roger's work has been satisfactory, and it is hoped that it will be possible to send both, the Academy and Grammar school orchestras to Lewiston this coming May. Last spring at Waterville, the Academy orchestra made a very creditable record, and all members are now inquiring about the trip to Lewiston.

The Academy with an enrollment of 104 students is having a very prosperous year. A great deal of interest is being shown by the students in their school work, and also in the outside activities and athletics. This prosperity shows that the Principal, Mr. Murray and his corps of teachers are putting their

best efforts into the work. We should certainly endeavor to retain them for future service.

The work of our school physician, is one of the most important branches of service that our schools can render. The preservation of health should come first, and attention to the growing youngster is building for a healthy adult life. Parents should make special effort to see that their children have medical attention, whenever it is advised by our school physician. His worthy work and special interest in our schools and school children need no comment from me. They are appreciated by both parents and children.

A new shed has been attached to the Webber schoolhouse, also toilets have been connected and the lighting rearranged to comply with state requirments. This completes the remodelling of school buildings in the town of Hartland. Mr. Griffith should be complimented on the cost of the work at the Webber school. The total cost being only \$308.72.

I recommend that the Fuller's Corner and Athens St. school-houses have a coat of paint on the outside. Also that the Fuller's Corner schoolhouse roof be shingled.

At this time allow me to express my appreciation of the spirit of courtesy and cooperation to the citizens and superintending school committee of Hartland.

MUSIC REPORT

With the valued help and cooperation of your grade teachers, Hartland schools have made very good progress in music the past year. The school at Fuller's Corner is taught in two groups. North Hartland has only eight pupils but good work is done in both schools. The grades in the Athens St. school will have covered a good years work by the end of the winter term, and are preparing to give operettas in the near future. Much individual help is given the less musical children in the lower grades. Part singing is begun and very well done in gardes five and six and these grades have also a piano class. Hartland being one of the few towns in the State to take up this work.

Three and four part singing is done in grades seven and eight. The grammar grades also have an orchestra of sixteen players that we feel is a great credit to these two schools. The number of players will be increased by the opening of the spring term. The high school orchestra took part in the state contest in Waterville last May and made a very good showing. We hope to enter the Lewiston contest this year. The high school chorus is elective in the two upper classes, but is required in the lower classes. Much good part music is being studied. Music appreciation will be given in the spring term in all grades.


