Warrant For Annual Town Meeting

SOMERSET, SS.

State of Maine

To Linwood Randlett, Constable of the Town of Hartland:

GREETING:

In the name of the State of Maine you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of said town of Hartland qualified by law to vote in town affairs to assemble at the Opera House in said town on Monday the 9th day of March A. D. 1931, at ten o'clock A. M. to act on the following articles, to wit:

Art. 1—To choose moderator to preside at said meeting.

Art. 2—To choose a town clerk for the ensuing year.

Art. 3—To hear all reports to be made at said meeting.

Art. 4—To choose three or more selectmen for the year ensuing, and act upon anything relating thereto.

Art. 5—To choose three or more overseers of poor for the ensuing year, and to act upon anything relating thereto.

Art. 6—To choose three or more assessors for the year ensuing, and to act upon anything relating thereto.

Art. 7—To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen to appoint a road commissioner or act upon anything relating thereto.

Art. 8—To choose all necessary officers for the year ensuing, fix their compensation, and to act upon anything relating thereto.

Art. 9—To choose one or more superintending school committee, and to act upon anything relating thereto.

Art. 10—To see what action the town will take in relation to the collection of taxes for the ensuing year, and to act upon anything relating thereto.

Art. 11—To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the support of common schools and interest on bond, and to act upon anything relating thereto.

Art. 12—To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the repair of school buildings and to act upon anything relating thereto.

Art. 13—To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for school supplies and to act upon anything relating thereto.

Art. 14—To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the purchase of school books, and to act upon anything relating thereto.

Art. 15—To see if the town will vote to instruct the superintending school committee to arrange with Hartland Academy to furnish instructions to the high school pupils for the year ensuing, and to act upon anything relating thereto, and to raise such sums of money as will be necessary to furnish its pupils with free high school instruction.

Art. 16—To see if the town will vote to close the Webber School as recommended by the S. S. Committee.

Art. 17—To see if the town will vote to authorize the superintending school committee to employ a school physician and to raise a sum of money for the same.

Art. 18—To see if the town will vote to instruct the S. S. Committee to buy a school transport chassis, and raise money for same, or act upon anything relating thereto.

Art. 19—To see if the town will vote to instruct the selectmen to sell the Starbird and Bean's Corner school-houses.

Art. 20—To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for music supervisor for the schools.

Art. 21—To see if the town will vote to raise \$1,500.00 as a sinking fund on our school bonds, also \$1,425.00 to pay one year's interest, and to act upon anything relating thereto.

Art. 22—To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for town charges, and act upon anything relating thereto.

Art. 23—To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the support of the poor for the year ensuing, and to act upon anything relating thereto.

Art. 24—To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise to pay outstanding debts and to act upon anything relating thereto.

Art. 25—To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise to be expended on roads and bridges for the ensuing year and to act upon anything relating thereto.

Art. 26—To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise to be expended on sidewalks for the ensuing year and to act upon anything relating thereto.

Art. 27—To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise to supply deficiencies in consequences of abatements and discounts for the year ensuing and thing relating thereto.

Art. 28—To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for Memorial observances.

Art. 29—To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for electric lights for the year ensuing and to act upon anything relating thereto.

Art. 30—To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for cemeteries for the year ensuing and to act upon anything relating thereto.

Art. 31—To see if the town will vote “yes” or “no” on the question of appropriating and raising money necessary to entitle the town to State aid as provided in Section 19 of Chapter 25 of the Revised Statutes of 1916.

Art. 32—To see what sum of money, if any, the town will vote to raise in accordance with the provisions of Chapter 154 of the Public Laws of 1917, as amended by Chapter 157 of the P. L. of 1919; the construction of a State Aid highway through the towns of Hartland, Cornville, Athens and Solon; beginning at the Hartland-Pittsfield town line and extending in a general northerly direction by the way of Fuller’s Corner to Hartland Village; thence in a general northwesterly direction to the Hartland-Athens town line; thence through the town of Athens to the Athens-Cornville town line; thence through the town of Cornville to the Cornville-Athens town line; thence through the town of Athens by the way of Athens Village to the Athens-Solon town line; thence in a general westerly direction to the State highway in Solon Village.

Art. 33—To see if the town will appropriate and raise the sum of \$600.00 for the improvement of the section of State Aid road as outlined in the report of State Highway Commission in addition to amount regularly raised for care of highways and bridges, the above amount being the maximum which the town is allowed to raise under provisions of Section 18 of Chapter 25 of the Revised Statutes of 1916.

Art. 34—To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate under the provision of Section 130 of the Public Laws of 1923 and to act upon anything relating thereto.

Art. 35—To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the support of the Volunteer Fire Company, and act upon anything relating thereto.

Art. 36—To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$25.00 to be paid as salary to the chief of the Volunteer Fire Company for the year ensuing and act upon anything relating thereto.

Art. 37—To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for Hartland Free Library.

Art. 38—To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise to pay interest on interest bearing debt.

Art. 39—To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$1,000.00 for water rental.

Art. 40—To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise to be expended for cutting bushes in the highway and to act upon anything relating thereto.

Art. 41—To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for maintenance of patrol for ensuing year.

Art. 42—To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen to hire money, in anticipation of taxes, and to pay the town debt.

Art. 43—To see if the town will vote to raise money to provide for the services of a public health nurse, or take any action thereon.

Art. 44—To see if the town will vote to unite with Palmyra and St. Albans to employ a music teacher.

Art. 45—To see if the town will vote to adopt the following town ordinance, viz: That there shall be no parking of automobiles on the west side of Commercial Street between Hamilton's Corner and the door opening into the drug store from said street, also no parking of automobiles on the north or south side of Main Street between Hamilton's Corner and the east line of the first bridge. Also that a stop sign be placed on Blake Street and Commercial Streets where they enter Main.

Art. 46—To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen to appoint an officer to enforce the traffic rules, or act upon anything relating thereto.

Art. 47—To see if the town will vote to instruct the assessors to reduce the valuation of the property of the American Woolen Company, or any other property in the town of Hartland and to act upon anything relating thereto.

Art. 48—To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of fifty dollars to be expended on the road leading from the State Aid road to the dwelling house of Willis Briggs.

Art. 49—To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$250.00 to tar Commercial Street from Main Street to Georgetown Street near Methodist Church.

Art. 50—To see if the town will vote to accept the sum of \$100.00 from the Etta Barner estate, as a trust fund, the income from same to be used to defray expense of perpetual care of their family lot in the Village Cemetery.

Art. 51—To see if the town will vote to accept the sum of \$100.00 for the perpetual care of the Allen Webber lot in Pleasant St. Cemetery.

Art. 52—To see if the town will vote to accept the sum of \$100.00 for the perpetual care of the lot of the late William and Lydia G. Soule in Pine Grove Cemetery.

Art. 53—To see if the town will vote to discontinue the following highways:

(a) Beginning at the homestead of Bruce Hillman thence southerly to the highway leading westerly from Bean's Corner, so called.

(b) Beginning at the State Aid road near the home of Bertha Walker thence easterly to the Old Taws farm, so called.

(c) Beginning at the house on the Charles White farm in North Hartland thence southerly and westerly past the Belle Austin farm to the old Alfred Stafford farm, so called.

(d) Beginning at the dwelling house of Jerome Williams in North Hartland thence southerly to the road leading from the State Aid road westerly past the F. S. Burrill farm, so called.

The selectmen will be in session at the above named Opera House, one hour before said meeting for the purpose of correcting the list of voters.

Report of Superintendent of Schools

To the S. S. Committee and Citizens of the Town of Hartland, the following is a report of the schools for the municipal year 1930-31.

The school census last April was 333, 166 boys and 167 girls. There are 211 elementary pupils enrolled in the schools of the town, and 5 attending the Colson's Corner Union school in Athens. A total of 216 elementary pupils. There are 55 town students attending the Academy, making a total of 271 elementary and secondary students.

The epidemic of measles at the beginning of the fall term interfered with the progress of the school work to quite an extent. At the present time the attendance is very high and the grade of work being done very satisfactory. The supervised study plan of work has been continued in the upper grades in all of the elementary schools. We feel, that from the results obtained in the grades and those of the freshmen class in the Academy, it is a workable plan. It places the pupils more on their own resources, under careful teacher guidance. The study period is long enough, so that the pupils learn and see for themselves the need of concentration. After several years of this work in the grades, we feel that the pupils are, at least, going to know how to study when they enter high school.

The S. S. Committee voted to close the Webber School Jan. 10, 1931, and transport the pupils to the Village. Mr. Wm. McLellan was hired for the transportation. Roads being kept open through the winter have made school conveyance an easier problem than in the past. The school was closed on account of cost of maintenance, and for the added advantages of the Village schools.

Teachers report many visits from the parents and friends of the pupils and schools. This shows that the people of Hartland are school spirited, and that their one desire is to give their boys and girls a good opportunity for an education.

Of course it is a known fact, that the rooms in the Pleasant Street school building are crowded beyond their capacity. To take care of this condition, the S. S. Committee and I recommended, and I believe it is approved by a number of the Academy trustees, that the eighth grade be moved into an upstairs room

of the Academy. This will arrange the grades as follows: Sub primary and first grade, grades II and III in the Pleasant Street School, and grades IV and V; VI and VII in the intermediate and grammar rooms of the Academy.

The music in the grades has made good progress. In the Academy, under a new plan, where music is made a requirement for all students, the work has improved over that of last year. The grammar school orchestra has had a successful year, while in the Academy a lack of interest and cooperation still exists.

Mr. Deering's janitor work in the Village schools speaks for itself and needs no further comment from me. The outside schools have also been well taken care of.

Conveyances for the year are as follows: W. A. Chipman, West Hartland to Village, \$25 per week; Arthur Grignon, Canaan line through Bean's Corner to Fuller's Corner, \$9.00 per week; Charles Walker, North Hartland to Webber (part of fall), \$7.00 per week; Alton Macpherson, Palmyra line to Fuller's Corner, \$6.50 fall and spring, \$7.00 per week, winter; Bruce Hillman, Hillman's to Fuller's Corner, \$3.50 per week; Bertha Bragg, North Hartland to Webber, part of fall and winter terms, \$7.00 per week; Wm. McLellan, North Hartland to Village, beginning Jan. 12, 1931, \$18.00 fall and spring, \$20.00 winter.

All necessary supplies have been furnished.

New arithmetics for all grades have been bought and furnished and new geographies for grades VI and VII. A new method of reading is being tried out with the sub primary of the Pleasant Street School, and books have been furnished for that grade. I recommend that new English books be bought next year.

The Academy has had a very satisfactory year. The work has progressed smoothly, and athletics have improved. Mr. Lyseth, State Agent for Secondary Schools, visited the Academy recently and spoke very highly of the building and work being done. He also was much in favor of the plan to move the eighth grade upstairs.

Dr. Moulton's work in the schools, as School Physician, has been very carefully carried out. His yearly examination and inspection are of greatest importance to our school system. Conditions, unknown to parents, are found, reported and corrected, which otherwise might have resulted in a serious handicap to the child so afflicted.

Repairs were not as extensive as in years past. All wood surface on the outside of the Academy was painted two coats last summer. New individual chair desks have been bought and installed in the Fuller's Corner School. These add to the appearance of the room, as well as, to the comforts of the children.

The State gave a special amount of \$100 toward these desks.

This has been another enjoyable and interesting year of work with the boys and girls, S. S. Committee, teachers, parents, and friends of the schools. And I hope that my services have been acceptable in return for the splendid cooperation, which I have received.

MUSIC REPORT

No recent year has shown more advancement in the grades than the present. This is due to the fact that pupils have been carefully graded. In the first and second grades much time has been devoted to the less musical children. This will mean much in the grades beyond in the years to come.

The making of two classes last year in grades three and four has brought good results. The school at West Hartland has always done excellent work in music and has in it children who show much ability and interest in this subject. There has been marked improvement in the singing of four part music in grades seven and eight, and quite difficult music is being studied. The high school program was arranged so that practically every student could attend chorus. The whole school had always had this privilege if they desired it, as it has previously been required in the two lower classes and elective in the two highest. The present plan has its disadvantages which I will not attempt to discuss in a brief report. The introduction of music as a regular subject in the surrounding rural schools has made a great improvement among pupils entering high school, a condition that is sure to keep on improving as the music in the rural schools becomes more advanced. The combination of orchestra

and chorus during the junior-senior music period has added to the enjoyment of the work. The grammar school orchestra, as last year, is large and quite capable for a town of this size. A goodly number have started the study of instruments this year and should make good orchestra material later. A **greater variety** of instruments is much to be desired. The orchestra needs violas, cellos, a double bass oboe, French horns, etc.

During the summer vacation and early fall session an extensive epidemic of measles was prevalent. Nearly every susceptible pupil was ill with this disease. Also many cases of mumps dis-

turbed the spring term, so that these two diseases will not find many victims in the schools for a few years at least. Very few skin diseases are found at the beginning of the fall term when the inspection is made, but later there seems to develop cases of impetigo, a contagious skin disease. It has been found necessary to exclude some of these from school during treatment. Otherwise, absences on account of ill health have been about normal.
