Warrant for Annual Town Meeting

SOMERSET, ss.

STATE OF MAINE

To Forest Baker, Constable of the Town of Hartland in the County of Somerset and State of Maine,

GREETING:

In the name of the State of Maine you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of the Town of Hartland qualified by law to vote in town affairs to meet at the Opera House in said Town on Monday, the fifteenth day of March, A. D. 1937, at ten o'clock in the forenoon to elect a

Moderator to preside at said meeting,

Town Clerk,

To hear all reports to be made at said meeting,

To elect Three Selectmen,

Three Assessors,

Three Overseers of the Poor,

A Treasurer,

Collector of Taxes,

Two members of the Superintending
School Committee,

One or more Road Commissioners

and other usual town officers, and then and there to act upon the following articles to wit:

ARTICLE 1. To see if the town will vote to instruct the selectmen to appoint one or more road commissioners for the ensuing year.

ARTICLE 2. To see if the town will vote to fix the compensation of all officers required herein to be elected or appointed for the ensuing year.

ARTICLE 3. To see if the town will vote to fix December 1, 1937 as the date when all taxes assessed in 1937 shall be paid, and require and authorize its collector of taxes to charge 6% interest from that date if not paid until thereafter and appropriate any sum received therefrom to the payment of interest on town debt for the ensuing year, or act upon anything relating thereto.

ARTICLE 4. To see if the town will vote to authorize its collector of taxes to allow a discount for early payment of and in anticipation of taxes assessed during 1937, fixing the rate or rates thereof and the date or dates when same shall apply for the ensuing year, or anything relating thereto.

ARTICLE 5. To see if the town will vote to raise any sum of money and appropriate the same for abatements, discounts and the cost of collection of taxes for the ensuing year.

ARTICLE 6. To see if the town will raise any sum of money and appropriate the same for common schools for text books and supplies, lights, telephone, etc., for the ensuing year, or anything relating thereto.

ARTICLE 7. To see if the town will vote to raise any sum of money and appropriate the same for repairs, equipment and insurance on school buildings for the ensuing year.

ARTICLE 8. To see if the town will vote to raise any sum of money and appropriate the same for the salary of the superintendent of schools.

ARTICLE 9. To see if the town will vote to raise any sum of money and appropriate the same for the salary of the superintending school committee.

ARTICLE 10. To see if the town will vote to raise any sum of money and appropriate the same for the payment of interest on school building bonds for the ensuing year, or anything relating thereto.

ARTICLE 11. To see if the town will vote to authorize its superintending school committee to contract with Hartland Academy to furnish instruction to high school pupils and to raise any sum of money and appropriate the same for tuition in secondary schools for the ensuing year, or act upon anything relating thereto.

ARTICLE 12. To see if the town will vote to authorize the superintending school committee to employ a school physician and to raise any sum of money and appropriate the same for such purpose for the ensuing year, or act upon anything relating thereto.

ARTICLE 13. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$1,500.00 and appropriate the same for the sinking fund for retirement of school bonds for the ensuing year, or anything relating thereto.

ARTICLE 14. To see if the town will vote to raise any sum of money and appropriate the same for the support of the poor and the board and care of dependent children for the ensuing year, or act upon anything relating thereto.

ARTICLE 15. To see if the town will vote to raise any sum of money and appropriate the same for the maintenance of roads and bridges and clearing bushes from the right of way for the ensuing year.

ARTICLE 16. To see if the town will vote to raise any sum of money and appropriate the same for the removal of snow and sanding roads, erecting snow fence, such sum to be available to May 1, 1938.

ARTICLE 17. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate under the provisions of Sec. 130 of the Public Laws of 1923 the sum of \$50.00 for 50-50 highway.

ARTICLE 18. To see if the town will vote to raise any sum of money, not exceeding \$30.00 per mile and appropriate the same for maintenance of state aid highways for the ensuing year as provided in Sec. 18 of Chapter 28 of the Revised Statutes of 1930.

ARTICLE 19. To see if the town will vote to raise any sum of money and appropriate the same for the maintenance of third class roads for the ensuing year as provided in Sec. 50 of Chapter 28 of the Revised Statutes of 1930.

ARTICLE 20. To see if the town will vote to raise any sum of money and appropriate the same for the maintenance or improvement of sidewalks for the ensuing year.

ARTICLE 21. To see if the town will vote "Yes" or "No" on the question of raising and appropriating money necessary to entitle the town to state aid as provided in Sec. 20 of Chapter 28 of the Revised Statutes of 1930.

ARTICLE 22. To see if the town will vote to raise any sum of money and appropriate the same for the improvement of State Aid Highway as outlined in the report of the State Highway Commission (in addition to the amount regularly raised for the care of ways, highways and bridges) under the provisions of Sec. 19 of Chapter 28 of the Revised Statutes of 1930, or under the provisions of Sec. 3 Chapter 175, Public Laws of 1933, or act upon anything relating thereto.

ARTICLE 23. To see if the town will vote to raise any sum of money and appropriate the same for lighting streets etc., for the ensuing year.

ARTICLE 24. To see if the town will vote to raise any sum of money and appropriate the same for Memorial Day observance for the ensuing year.

ARTICLE 25. To see if the town will vote to raise any sum of money and appropriate the same for the care of cemeteries for the ensuing year.

ARTICLE 26. To see if the town will vote to raise any sum of money and appropriate the same to pay the Chief of the volunteer Fire Company for the ensuing year.

ARTICLE 27. To see if the town will vote to raise any sum of money and appropriate the same for maintenance of equipment and supplies for the Fire Department for the ensuing year.

ARTICLE 28. To see if the town will vote to raise any sum of money and appropriate the same for the maintenance of Fire Alarm signal for the ensuing year, or act upon anything relating thereto.

ARTICLE 29. To see if the town will vote to raise any sum of money and appropriate the same for the support of Hartland Free Library for the ensuing year.

ARTICLE 30. To see if the town will vote to raise any sum of money and appropriate the same for hydrant rental for the ensuing year.

ARTICLE 31. To see if the town will authorize its selectmen and treasurer to negotiate a temporary loan or loans in anticipation of taxes, which shall specify that they are to be paid out of money raised during the current year by taxes, to fix the amount thereof and the rate of interest or discount thereon for the ensuing year.

ARTICLE 32. To see if the town will vote to raise any sum of money and appropriate the same for the reduction of town debt for the ensuing year.

ARTICLE 33. To see if the town will vote to raise any sum of money and appropriate the same for the payment of interest on the town debt and temporary loans for the ensuing year.

ARTICLE 34. To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen to hire money to refund the town debts, when in their judgment it seems best to do so.

ARTICLE 35. To see if the town will vote to raise any sum of money and appropriate the same for the maintenance of town buildings and insurance on the same for the ensuing year.

ARTICLE 36. To see if the town will vote to raise any sum of money and appropriate the same for the pay of town officers for the ensuing year, or act upon anything relating thereto.

ARTICLE 37. To see if the town will vote to raise any sum of money and appropriate the same for other town charges for the ensuing year.

ARTICLE 38. To see if the town will vote to raise any sum of money and appropriate the same for the rent of the town hall for the ensuing year.

ARTICLE 39. To see if the town will vote to raise any sum of money and appropriate the same to defray the expense of any W.P.A. project, or act upon anything relating thereto.

ARTICLE 40. To see if the town will vote to raise two thousand dollars and appropriate the same to retire two School Building bonds, or act upon anything relating thereto.

ARTICLE 41. To see if the town will vote to authorize its selectmen and assessors to fix a maximum valuation on the machinery, fixtures and stock in trade of the Hartland Tanning Co., Inc., of \$100.00 for the period of ten years.

ARTICLE 42. To see if the town will vote to authorize its selectmen to repay such sums of money to R. E. Nutting as he can furnish receipts for. This money having been received from the town in the auditor's settlement with R. E. Nutting as treasurer, or act upon anything relating thereto.

ARTICLE 43. To see if the town will vote to authorize its selectmen to make a deduction from the pay of any person working for the town, to apply on their taxes, to fix the amount of this deduction and the date it shall apply, or act upon anything relating thereto.

ARTICLE 44. To see if the town will vote to authorize the moderator and town clerk to appoint a committee of twelve citizens of the town to cooperate with the selectmen in preparing and presenting at the next annual meeting a budget system for said meeting.

ARTICLE 44A. To see if the town will vote to change the date of the end of the fiscal year from February 20, to February 10, or act upon anything relating thereto.

ARTICLE 45. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$200 to entitle the town to "White Pine Blister Rust Control" by the Federal Government.

ARTICLE 46. To see if the town will vote to transfer the Cemetery Trust Funds from the Savings Bank and have them invested in some reliable security; to elect a cemetery committee to oversee the Pine Grove Cemetery, or act upon anything relating thereto.

ARTICLE 47. To see if the town will vote to raise any sum of money and appropriate the same for the purpose of graveling North Street, Water Street and Mill Street, or act upon anything relating thereto.

ARTICLE 48. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate any sum of money for the purpose of patrolling the main streets Saturday nights and the nights before any holidays, or act upon anything relating thereto.

The selectmen will be in session at the above named Opera House one hour before said meeting for the purpose of correcting the list of voters.

Report of Superintendent of Schools

To the Superintending School Committee and Citizens of Hartland:

I herewith submit my annual report of the condition and progress of your schools.

There has been an increase in enrollment in the elementary schools during the current year of thirty pupils or better than a 15% increase over last school year. This has made a serious problem for us and one that is likely to be increasingly troublesome. With renewed industrial activity it is safe to assume that there will be a steady increase in enrollment from year to year. Sooner or later, and if the same percentage of increase continues for a year or two it will certainly be sooner, more room must be found to house our boys and girls. This applies to the Academy as well as to the elementary grades as there has been a considerable increase in enrollment in the secondary grades. The following table shows the enrollment by rooms for the present school year:

Fortunately the rooms at the Primary School are large and the children small. Otherwise it would have been impossible to have taken care of them all with the existing facilities. As it is, the Sub-primary and First Grade with an enrollment of 61 pupils has taxed that large room. This room has been seriously overcrowded. In order to meet the situation at all the Sub-primary children have been dismissed at recess in both morning and afternoon. That has still left a substantial number of children who come on school buses who have to be under the supervision of the teacher although her teaching time after recess is largely devoted to the First Grade. Mrs. Steeves has

done very well with a difficult situation and is to be commended for her willingness to make the best of it.

In general the textbooks are in good condition and for the most part up to date. New music texts and health readers have been added in some grades this year and there are always worn out books to be replaced.

The conveyance situation has been excellent this past year. At the beginning of the fall term the Academy placed in service a modern school bus. Grade children on the Pittsfield road have been conveyed on this bus. The green bus has conveyed the children from North Hartland and the orange bus has conveyed the West Hartland pupils. By this arrangement children have not had to leave their homes unduly early in the morning and have been returned in good season at night. There has been no waiting at the school for long periods either night or morning. All Academy pupils on or adjacent to established conveyance routes in town have been conveyed free of charge, a service which has been well patronized and I trust appreciated by both pupils and parents. A high grade of conveyance service has been supplied at low cost to the town.

The chassis of the new bus which went into service in January, 1936, was paid for out of 1935 funds. The body has been paid for during the current year. The total cost was \$621 toward which the State Department of Education made a contribution of \$500 from the Special Project Division of the Equalization Fund. The net cost to the town for the body was \$121. The Academy bus was purchased out of their own funds entirely.

Repairs this year have been largely minor in nature except for the outside painting of the Fuller's Corner building. New swings and seesaws were added at each school and an outdoor basketball court provided for the Grades at the Academy building.

The enrollment at the Academy is the largest in history. The services of at least a part time teacher must be had another year providing this enrollment continues in order for the school to maintain its rating. I would again suggest that the Eighth Grade be administered with the Academy. Such an arrangement would make for flexibility and economy both in the use of the limited classroom space and in the distribution of teacher time. It would seem that with the excellent cooperation now existing between the Academy and the Grade schools that this might be brought about.

I trust the time is not far distant when there will be a wider offering of courses for our young people at the Academy. There

are at present two courses open to students, the Classical and the Civic. These prepare for college and also give a general foundation in language, science, history and mathematics, the old traditional offerings with as much modernization as possible. These do not meet the needs of a large majority of present day young people and should be supplemented by courses in business, agriculture and home economics. Such courses would be of much value to the great majority of our students who for one reason or another are unable to attend schools beyond the Academy.

The new bill to equalize educational costs in Maine is now before the Legislature. It provides that the State will pay one-half the cost of a minimum program. Had this bill been in operation during the past school year Hartland would have received \$4,779.00 from the State instead of \$1,654.15 which would have made possible a substantial decrease in the school appropriation and a consequent reduction of the local tax rate.

This bill is now before the Legislature and will be acted upon within the next month. If you are interested in a proposition which will mean so much to Hartland may I urge you to write or telephone or see personally Senators Cook and Friend and Representative Jewett urging them to support the bill. If the people back home make their wishes known in no unmistakable manner the bill will pass. Otherwise, the best we can hope for is some inadequate legislation which will not take care of the situation. By what right can one who does not do everything in his power to secure the passage of this bill complain about the costs of schools?

It is fitting that mention should be made of the passing of Frank L. Griffith long a member of the School Committee. Mr. Griffith from his long acquaintance with and knowledge of the school situation was a valuable member of your Committee and gave freely of his time and advice. His uncontested re-election last March showed the appreciation of his fellow citizens for his faithful services to the community. Mr. Lloyd V. Cookson was appointed to fill Mr. Griffith's place until town meeting.

To the Inhabitants of Hartland, Maine:

This is to certify that we have audited the accounts of your town, as kept by the town officers, and the enclosed statements and reports, prepared from your town records, are correct to the best of our knowledge and belief.

Enclosed please find reports of your Town Treasurer and Tax Collector, a Comparative Financial Statement for two years, a Reconciliation of the Treasurer's Cash, a Summary of Overdraft and Unexpended Balances, a Schedule of Interest Bearing Orders held against the Town, a Schedule of Cemetery Trust Funds, and a Schedule of Unpaid Bills as of February 20, 1937.

Without doubt the outstanding criticism to be made is the fact that for the past two years there have been uncollected taxes amounting to over \$5,000.00 each year. Wherein the entire Tax Commitment is approximately \$30,000.00 the uncollected tax at the end of each year is considerably large. If this condition continues to exist the financial standing of your Town is very apt to suffer. It is our opinion that [this situation be given serious thought and remedies provided for at your Town Meeting.

During this audit it was discovered that since the year 1850 the Ministerial and School Fund of Hartland has been omitted from the Liabilities of the Town. This fund amounts to \$1,028.23. Enclosed in this report is a copy of the report of its Trustees in 1850 and as this fund is a permanent Liability to a town we have included it in this year's report.

May we take this opportunity to express our appreciation for the many courtesies extended us during the audit of your Town Records.
