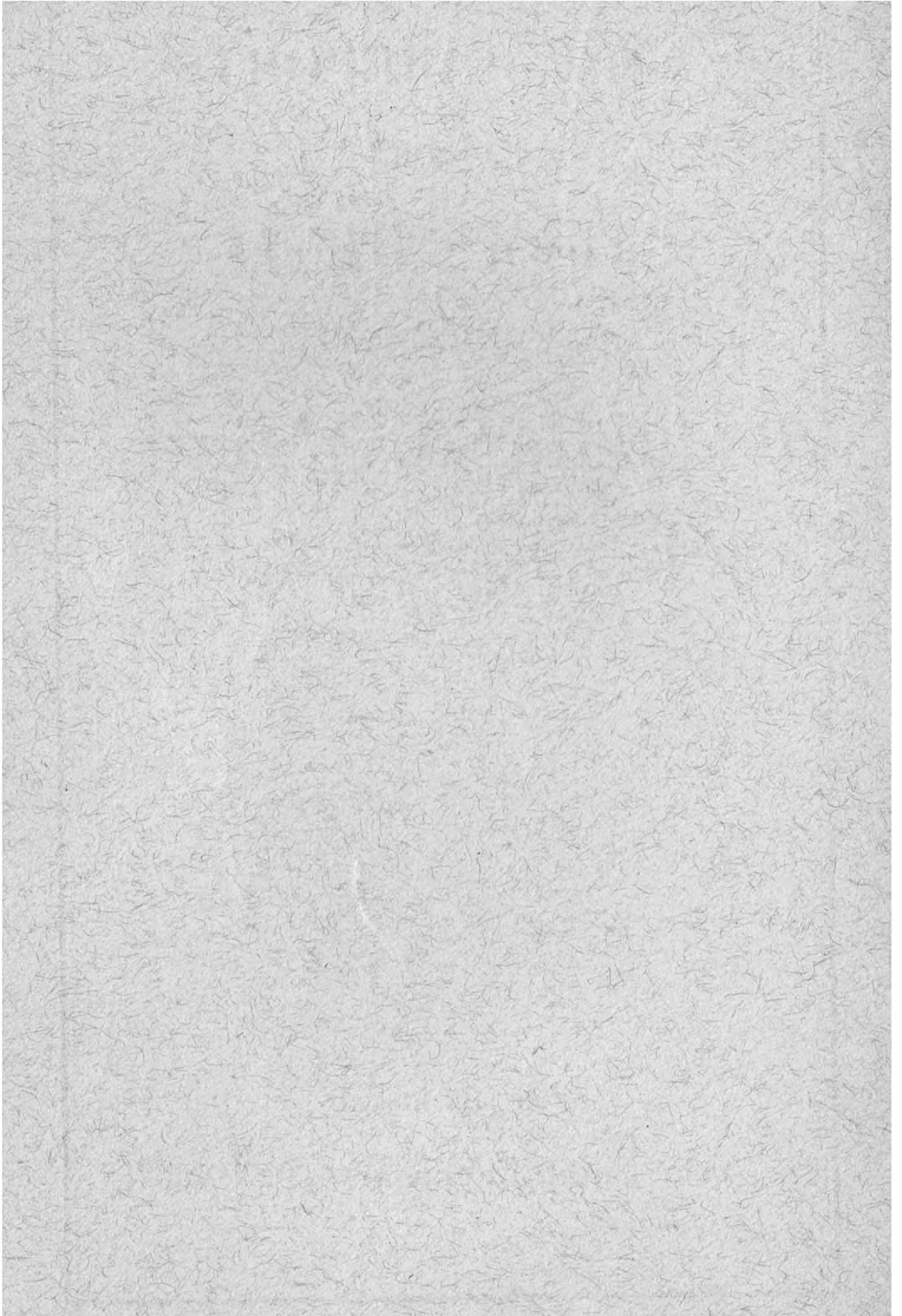

Warrant for Annual Town Meeting

SOMERSET, ss.

STATE OF MAINE

To Forest Baker, a Constable of the Town of Hartland in the County of Somerset, Greeting:

In the name of the State of Maine, you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of the Town of Hartland, in said county, qualified by law to vote in town affairs, to meet at the Opera House, in said town, on Monday, the 14th day of March, A. D. 1937, at ten o'clock in the forenoon, then and there to act on the following articles, namely:

Art. 1. To choose a moderator to preside at said meeting.

Art. 2. To choose all necessary town officers for the ensuing year.

Art. 3. To hear and act on the report of the Selectmen, Assessors and Overseers of the Poor, Treasurer, Collector, Superintendent of Schools, Road Commissioner, Clerk and other town officers.

Art. 4. To see if the town will vote to instruct the Selectmen to appoint one or more road commissioners for the ensuing year.

Art. 5. To see if the town will vote to fix the compensation of all officers required herein to be elected or appointed for the ensuing year, also what compensation for labor on town roads, etc.

Art. 6. To see if the town will vote to fix May 1, 1938 as the date when poll taxes assessed in 1938 shall be paid, and to fix December 1, 1938 as the date when other taxes assessed in 1938

shall be paid, and require and authorize its collector of taxes to charge 6% interest from October 1, 1938 on all taxes remaining unpaid on December 1, 1938 and appropriate any sum received therefrom to the payment of interest on town debt for the ensuing year.

Art. 7. To see if the town will vote to authorize its collector of taxes for the ensuing year to allow a discount of 3% on taxes paid on or before June 15, 1938, and will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500.00, more or less, for the purpose.

Art. 8. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the payment of abatements for the ensuing year.

Art. 9. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$5,200.00, more or less, for elementary schools, including teachers' wages, fuel, janitor's service, conveyance, textbooks, reference books and school supplies.

Art. 10. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$400.00, more or less, for repairs, equipment and insurance on school buildings, for the ensuing year.

Art. 11. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$400.00, more or less, for the salary of the superintendent of schools, for the ensuing year.

Art. 12. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$45.00, more or less, for the salary of the superintending school committee, for the ensuing year.

Art. 13. To see if the town will vote to authorize its selectmen and assessors and overseers of the poor to appoint an agent or clerk, to assume the usual duties of these officers, other than assessing taxes, fix his compensation, or anything relating thereto.

Art. 14. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$997.50, more or less, for the payment of interest on school building bonds, for the ensuing year.

Art. 15. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,300.00, more or less, for tuition in secondary schools, and instruct and authorize its superintending school committee to contract with Hartland Academy, to furnish instruction to its high school pupils, for the ensuing year.

Art. 16. To see if the town will vote to authorize its superintending school committee to employ a school physician, and raise and appropriate the sum of \$100.00, more or less, for this purpose, for the ensuing year.

Art. 17. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,500.00, more or less, for a sinking fund for the retirement of school building bonds.

Art. 18. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$4,500.00, more or less, for support of poor, board and care of dependent children and aid to veterans and veterans' dependents, for the year ensuing.

Art. 19. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000.00, more or less, for repairing roads and bridges and cutting bushes, for the ensuing year.

Art. 20. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,200.00, more or less, for winter and spring roads, purchasing and maintenance of snow fence, sanding highways, or anything relating thereto, for the ensuing year.

Art. 21. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$50.00, under the provisions of Sec. 130 of the Public Laws of 1923, for 50-50 highway, for the ensuing year.

Art. 22. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$575.00, or a sum not to exceed \$30.00 a mile, for maintenance of State aid highways for the ensuing year.

Art. 23. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$514.00, more or less, for third class road maintenance, for the ensuing year.

Art. 24. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$100.00, more or less, for repairs to sidewalks, for the ensuing year.

Art. 25. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$799.50 for State aid road construction (in addition to the amounts regularly raised for the care of ways, highways and bridges) under the provisions of Section 19, Chapter 28, Revised Statutes of 1930, or under the provisions of Section 3, Chapter 229, Public Laws of 1937.

Art. 26. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$876.00, more or less, for street lighting for the ensuing year.

Art. 27. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$75.00, more or less, for decorating the graves of soldiers and sailors and for Memorial Day exercises, and authorize the selectmen to appoint a committee of three to be chosen from the members of Christopher G. Linn Post, A. L. to have charge of the same.

Art. 28. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$50.00, more or less, for the care of cemeteries, for the ensuing year.

Art. 29. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$25.00 for fire chief's salary for the ensuing year.

Art. 30. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$200.00, more or less, for maintenance of fire department for the ensuing year.

Art. 31. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$51.00, more or less, for maintenance of fire alarm signal for the ensuing year, and authorize the selectmen to make other arrangements for the maintenance of said fire alarm signal if possible.

Art. 32. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$350.00, more or less, for the support of Hartland Free Library for the ensuing year.

Art. 33. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500.00 for hydrant rental for the ensuing year.

Art. 34. To see if the town will vote to authorize its selectmen to procure a temporary loan or loans in anticipation of taxes for the purpose of paying obligations of the town; such notes to be paid during the municipal year out of money raised during said current municipal year by taxes, to fix the amount thereof and the rate of interest or discount thereon. The sum of \$8,000.00 is recommended.

Art. 35. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate any sum of money for the reduction of town debt for the ensuing year.

Art. 36. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,350.00, more or less, for the payment of interest on town debt and temporary loans for the ensuing year.

Art. 37. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$50.00, more or less, for repairs on town buildings, other than school property for the ensuing year.

Art. 38. To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen to hire money to refund the town debts, when in their judgment it seems best to do so.

Art. 39. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,700.00, more or less, for pay of town officers for the ensuing year; including a clerk or agent's salary.

Art. 40. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$850.00, more or less, for miscellaneous town charges for the ensuing year.

Art. 41. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$125.00, more or less, for rent of town hall for the ensuing year.

Art. 42. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate any sum of money to defray the expenses of any town W.P.A. project for the ensuing year, or act upon anything relating thereto.

Art. 43. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,286.03, this being the sum necessary in addition to the No. 4, dividend of 5% paid in 1937, to retire two School Building bonds, maturing in 1938. (The above dividend was \$713.97).

Art. 44. To see if the town will vote to authorize its selectmen to make a deduction from the pay of any person working for the town, to apply on their taxes, to fix the amount of deduction and the date it shall apply.

Art. 45. To see if the town will vote to authorize the moderator and town clerk to appoint a committee of twelve citizens to cooperate with the selectmen in preparing and presenting at the next annual town meeting a budget for said meeting.

Art. 46. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500.00, more or less, for the purpose of resurfacing or repairing the following streets: North, Water, Mill, Blake, and Seekins avenue so called.

Art. 47. To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen on behalf of the town to sell and dispose of any real estate acquired by the town for non-payment of taxes thereon, on such terms as they deem advisable, and to execute quitclaim deeds for such property.

Art. 48. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$93.00, for school nursing in the town of Hartland, to be expended under the auspices of the Bureau of Health of the State Department of Health and Welfare.

Art. 49. To see if the town will accept the oxygen tank now in the Scott-Webb Memorial hospital, which tank was purchased by funds raised by public subscription and a dance, and which is now presented to the town by the Outlook Club. Said tank to remain in the said hospital for the benefit of said hospital so long as said hospital remains in existence, except that it may be taken out of the hospital on different cases at the order of any doctor, for use in Hartland and surrounding towns, with the understanding that there is to be no charge to any of the patients for the use of the same, except for the gas or other necessary disbursements incident to maintaining and operating said tank.

Art. 50. To see what action the town will vote to take in regard to repairing or having replaced the highway leading from the Athens road, so called to the Coston's Corner cemetery, in No. Hartland, said road being in an impassable state due to the removal of gravel which has undermined said road.

Art. 51. To see if the town will vote to contact the officials of the American Woolen Co. regarding the condition of the gates in the Upper Dam so called, through its selectmen, and if possible have the said Woolen Co. repair said gates.

Art. 52. To see if the town will vote to relocate the road beginning at the dwelling of the late Jerome B. Williams in North Hartland thence southerly to the road leading from the State Aid highway to the dwelling of the late Richard W. Stafford, said road having been discontinued by vote of the town in 1931, and vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$100.00 to repair said road, providing the selectmen can make satisfactory arrangements with the abutters.

Art. 53. To see if the town will vote to discontinue the Burrill road so called, from the State Aid highway to the intersection of the road leading southerly past the dwelling house of the late Jerome B. Williams, in North Hartland.

Art. 54. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$2,417.83, said sum being the net overdraft for the year ending February 10, 1938. (This is the sum recommended by the Department of Municipal Accounting).

Art. 55. To see if the town will vote to instruct the selectmen to insure members of the volunteer fire company against liability for damages while in the act of preventing fires.

Art. 56. To act upon anything not relating to the raising of money that may legally come before any town meeting.

The selectmen hereby give notice that they will be in session at the above named hall and place of meeting on Monday, the day of said meeting, for the purpose of correcting the list of voters, from 9:30 o'clock in the forenoon.

Report of Audit

Augusta, Maine, March 7, 1938

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Hartland:

This is to certify that this department represented by Mr. G. C. Lewis and Mr. C. G. Hawes, has audited the books of your Selectmen, Collector and Treasurer for the municipal year ending February 10, 1938.

A reconciliation of the accounts of the Treasurer and Collector was made and the books of the Selectmen were carefully examined and, to the best of our knowledge and belief, all of the accounts are correct.

We would recommend that there be raised at your town meeting the amount of the Net Overdraft of the 1937 appropriation accounts, also you will note that we have written off some of the Accounts Receivable which seem to be of no value to the municipality.

The dividend received from impounded balance in the Sinking Fund was carried ahead to 1938 to be applied to your appropriation for retirement of a school bond.

All Accounts Payable, as well as two years' state taxes, were paid during the year just closed, which, we feel, showed good business management on the part of your town officials.

Your Treasurer's report will not show receipt of Bank Stock Tax, Railroad and Telegraph Tax or School Fund for the reason that they were deducted by the State and applied on your state taxes. Proper credits for these items were taken care of on your books, however.

We are submitting herewith Comparative Balance Sheet, Summary of Accounts, Proof of Change in Net Debt, Report of Treasurer, Report of Tax Collector, accompanied by list of un-

collected taxes for the years 1937, 1936, 1935, 1934 and 1933, Cemetery Trust Funds, Interest Bearing Orders, Journal Entries, List of Accounts Receivable and a condensed report of expenditures, receipts and balances, all of which were prepared from your town records and, to the best of our knowledge and belief, properly reflect the true financial condition of your municipal affairs.

Report of Superintendent of Schools

To the Superintending School Committee and Citizens of Hartland:

I herewith submit my annual report of the conditions and progress of your schools.

The current year a new arrangement was made with Hartland Academy whereby the Eighth Grade has been administered as a part of the Academy organization. The group has been known as the Sub-Freshman Class. It has had its own home room but the teaching has been departmental, that is, English has been taught by the English teacher, mathematics by the mathematics teacher, etc. This form of teaching is considered more profitable in Grades Seven and Eight than where all subjects are taught by one teacher. The town pays a lump sum to the Academy for this service equivalent to the cost of an Eighth Grade teacher.

This arrangement was necessary in order to provide adequate room and sufficient teaching force for the Academy pupils and has been of mutual advantage both to the town and the Academy.

The enrollment in the Academy proper has been 150, the largest in its history. The enrollment in the Sub-Freshman class has been 26. This number has filled the second floor to capacity. Five teachers have been employed as follows: Cecil J. Cutts, principal and mathematics; Roger D. Lowell, science; Beulah McIntyre, French and Latin; Catherine C. Laughton, English; Philip P. Qualey, history.

Some changes were necessitated in the elementary schools. Mrs. Evelyn Hogan was transferred to the second and third grades to take the place of Mrs. Ella Getchell, resigned. The other teaching assignments have been the same as last year, namely, Mrs. Nina Steeves, sub-primary and first; Mrs. Mary Connelly, fourth and fifth; Mrs. Ada McCrillis, sixth and seventh; Miss Gertrude Davis, Fuller's Corner. Mrs. Mary Smart of Dexter has substituted as music supervisor for Miss Gertrude Thorne. Miss Thorne expects to resume her work soon.

The evening of February 10 a fire was discovered in the west wing of the Academy building. Prompt and efficient action by the fire company aided by a substantial brick fire wall confined the fire to that wing. The damage in the rest of the building was by smoke.

As soon as the fire was extinguished provision was made for protecting the damaged portion of the building and a watchman employed to keep steam up so as to avoid freezing of the water pipes.

The following Monday and Tuesday adjusters went over the losses and adjustments made as follows: Building, \$3,620.79; contents, elementary, \$542.52; contents secondary \$417.72.

Plans for rehabilitation had been made before the arrival of the adjusters and as soon as they gave the word a force of cleaners was put on and repairs to the damaged portion were underway. On Monday one week later the school re-opened using the main building and east wing. By having the vacation a week earlier than planned only one day of school was actually lost a remarkable achievement under the circumstances. Through the kindness of the Methodist church the vestry of that building was made available for the fourth and fifth grades. Good progress has been made on repairs and before many weeks the damaged portion will be ready for occupancy.

The education measure presented to the last Legislature which would have recognized the State's rightful financial obligation to the schools was reported out and adopted in an inadequate form which would not have benefitted this town and which was later defeated at a referendum election.

There has been a steady and large decrease in the proportion of school expense met by State funds. It is to be hoped that

before many years the State's rightful obligation in providing a minimum educational program will not only be recognized but will be properly met.

During the last five years the total amounts expended by the school department have, as the result of very careful planning and supervision, varied less than \$300 on the common school account which includes teachers' salaries, janitor, conveyance, fuel, books and supplies and this in the face of steadily rising costs.

The school committee and superintendent have been over the budget for next year very carefully. They believe that it is good business management to maintain a reasonable working balance of six or eight hundred dollars to take care of unexpected expenditures. There will be some this year which will not be met by the insurance adjustment and there are always some that cannot be foreseen at this time. The following amounts are recommended to be raised:

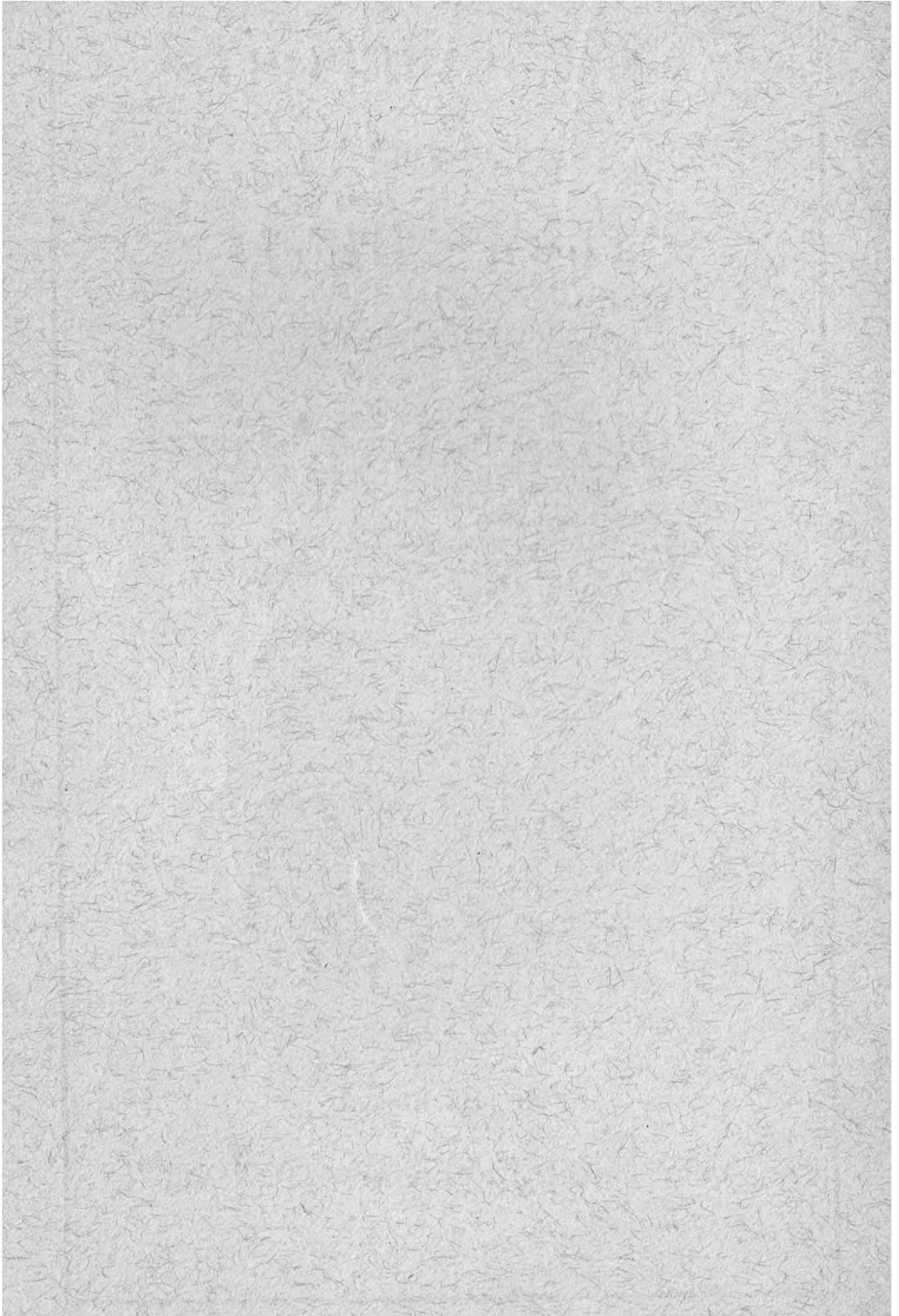
