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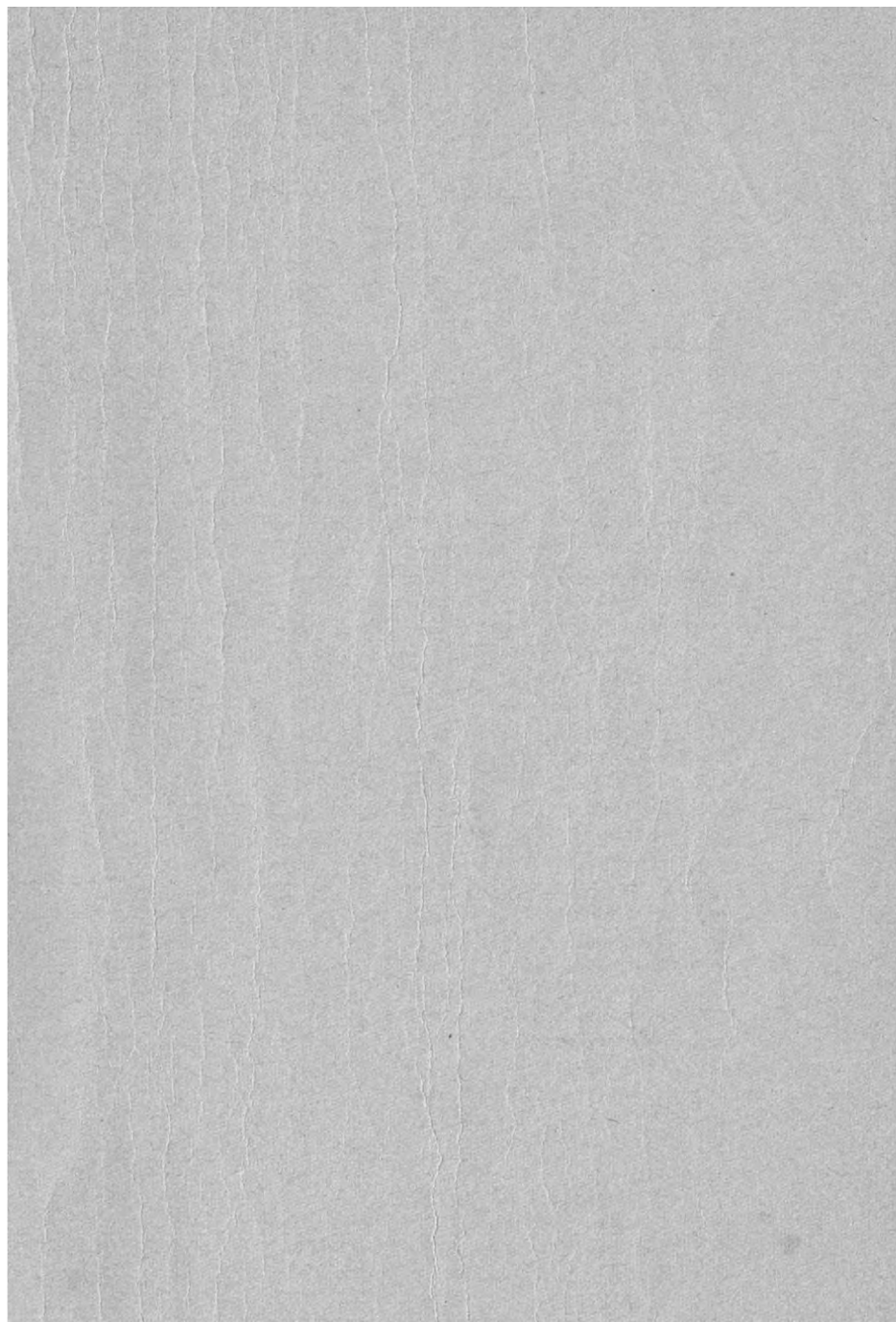

Warrant for Annual Town Meeting

SOMERSET, ss.

STATE OF MAINE

To Forest Baker, a Constable in the Town of Hartland in the County of Somerset, Greeting:

In the name of the State of Maine, you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of the Town of Hartland, in said county, qualified by law to vote in town affairs, to meet in the Opera House, in said town, on Monday, the 13th day of March, A. D. 1939, at ten o'clock in the forenoon, then and there to act on the following articles, namely:

Art. 1. To choose a moderator to preside at said meeting.

Art. 2. To choose all necessary town officers for the ensuing year.

Art. 3. To hear and act on the report of the Selectmen, Assessors, and Overseers of the Poor, Treasurer, Collector of Taxes, Superintendent of Schools, Road Commissioners, Clerk and other town officers.

Art. 4. To see if the town will vote to elect one or more road commissioners, for the ensuing year.

Art. 5. To see if the town will vote to instruct the Selectmen to appoint one or more road commissioners, for the ensuing year.

Art. 6. To see if the town will vote to adopt the Town Agent form of Government, for the ensuing year, define his duties, fix his Compensation, and act upon anything relating thereto.

Art. 7. To see if the town will vote to fix the salary of the Fire Chief at \$50.00, and vote to raise and appropriate said sum, and act upon anything relating thereto.

Art. 8. To see if the town will vote to fix the compensation of all officers required herein to be elected or appointed, for the ensuing year, that have not been acted upon, and fix the compensation for labor on town roads.

Art. 9. To see if the town will vote to fix May 1, 1939 as the date when poll taxes assessed in 1939 shall be paid, and fix December 1, 1939 as the date when other taxes assessed in 1939 shall be paid, and require and authorize its collector of taxes to charge interest from October 1, 1939 at 6% on all taxes remaining unpaid on December 1, 1939 and appropriate any sum received therefrom to the payment of interest on the town debt for the ensuing year.

Art. 10. To see if the town will authorize its collector of taxes for the ensuing year, to allow a discount of 3% on any taxes paid on or before June 15, 1939, and will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500.00, more or less, for this purpose.

Art. 11. To see what sum the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the payment of abatements for the ensuing year.

Art. 12. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$5,200.00, more or less for elementary schools, including teachers' wages, fuel, janitors' services, conveyance, textbooks, reference books and school supplies.

Art. 13. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$400.00, more or less, for repairs, equipment and insurance on school buildings, for the ensuing year.

Art. 14. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$400.00, more or less, for the salary of the superintendent of schools, for the ensuing year.

Art. 15. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$45.00, more or less, for the salary of the superintending school committee, for the ensuing year.

Art. 16. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,300.00 more or less, for tuition in secondary schools, and instruct and authorize its superintending school committee to contract with Hartland Academy, to furnish instruction to its high school pupils, for the ensuing year.

Art. 17. To see if the town will vote to authorize its superintending school committee to employ a school physician, and raise and appropriate the sum of \$100.00, more or less, for this purpose, for the ensuing year.

Art. 18. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$902.50, more or less, for the payment of interest on school building bonds, for the ensuing year.

Art. 19. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,286.03, (this being the sum necessary in addition to the No. 5 dividend of 5% paid in 1938) to retire two school bonds, maturing in 1939. (The above dividend was \$713.97).

Art. 20. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,500.00 for a sinking fund for the retirement of School Building Bonds.

Art. 21. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$4,500.00, more or less, for support of poor, board and care of dependent children, mothers' aid, aid to veterans and veterans' dependents, for the ensuing year.

Art. 22. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000.00, more or less, for repairing roads and bridges and cutting bushes, for the ensuing year.

Art. 23. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,200.00, more or less, for winter and spring roads, purchasing and maintaining snow fences, sanding highways or anything relating thereto, for the ensuing year.

Art. 24. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$475.00, or a sum not to exceed \$30.00 a mile, for maintenance of State aid highways for the ensuing year.

Art. 25. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$554.00, for third class road maintenance, for the ensuing year. (The State Highway Commission state that this sum is necessary).

Art. 26. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for State Aid road construction (in addition to the amounts regularly raised for the care of ways, highways and bridges) under the provisions of Section 19, Chapter 28, Revised Statutes of 1930, or under the provisions of Section 3, Chapter 229, Public Laws of 1937.

Art. 27. To see if the town will vote to authorize the assessors to rescind any money appropriated by the town for State Aid highway construction in excess of the amount required to meet the State apportionment.

Art. 28. To see what sum, if any, the town would recommend to take from the joint state aid account for the purpose of applying bituminous surface treatment to state aid roads, in excess of the requirements of Section 2, Chapter 132, Public Laws, 1935.

Art. 29. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500.00, to be used for sanding and tarring a part of the village streets, and act upon anything relating thereto.

Art. 30. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$376.00, more or less, for street lighting, for the ensuing year.

Art. 31. To see what sum the town will vote to raise and appropriate for decorating the graves of soldiers and sailors and for Memorial Day exercises, said sum to be expended under the direction of the Christopher G. Linn Post, A. L.

Art. 32. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$50.00, more or less, for the care of cemeteries, for the ensuing year.

Art. 33. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$100.00, for repairs to sidewalks, for the ensuing year, and act upon anything relating thereto.

Art. 34. To see what action the town will vote to take regarding snow removal from sidewalks for the ensuing year, and raise and appropriate a sum of money for the same, and act upon anything relating thereto.

Art. 35. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$200.00, for the maintenance of Fire Department, for the ensuing year.

Art. 36. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$75.00, for maintenance and repairs to fire alarm signal, for the ensuing year.

Art. 37. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$350.00, more or less, for the support of Hartland Free Library, for the ensuing year.

Art. 38. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500.00, for hydrant rental, for the ensuing year.

Art. 39. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,250.00, more or less, for the payment of interest on town debt and temporary loans, for the ensuing year.

Art. 40. To see what sum the town will vote to raise and appropriate for repairs and insurance on town buildings, other than school property, for the ensuing year.

Art. 41. To see what sum the town will vote to raise and appropriate for pay of town officers, for the ensuing year; including the agent's salary.

Art. 42. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$850.00, more or less, for miscellaneous town charges, for the ensuing year.

Art. 43. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$125.00, for rent of town hall and selectmen's office, for the ensuing year.

Art. 44. To see if the town will raise and appropriate \$118.00, for public health work in Hartland, said sum to be expended by the Bureau of Health, State Department of Health and Welfare, in cooperation with local authorities.

Art. 45. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for advertising our natural resources, advantages and attractions, under the provisions of Chapter 5,

Section 82, of the Revised Statutes of 1930, said sum to be expended under the direction of the State of Maine Publicity Bureau.

Art. 46. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$50.00, under the provisions of Section 130 of the Public Laws of 1923, for 50-50 Highway, for the ensuing year.

Art. 47. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$300.00, to purchase a lot on which to build a fire house, and act upon anything relating thereto.

Art. 48. To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen to hire money to refund the town debt, when in their judgment it seems best to do so.

Art. 49. To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen to procure a temporary loan or loans in anticipation of taxes for the purpose of paying obligations of the town; such notes to be paid during the current municipal year out of money raised during said current municipal year by taxes; fix the amount thereof, the rate of interest or discount thereon.

Art. 50. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate any sum of money for the reduction of town debt for the ensuing year.

Art. 51. To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen to make a deduction from the pay of any person working for the town, to apply on their taxes, to fix the amount of said deduction and the date it shall apply.

Art. 52. To see if the town will vote to authorize the moderator and town clerk to appoint a committee of twelve citizens to co-operate with the selectmen in preparing and presenting at the next annual town meeting a budget for said meeting.

Art. 53. To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen on behalf of the town to sell and dispose, by private sale, any real estate acquired by the town for non-payment of taxes thereon, on such terms as they deem advisable, and to execute quit claim deeds for such property.

Art. 54. To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen on behalf of the town to sell and dispose of the "Gilbert Place" so called, purchased by the town from the Skowhegan Savings Bank, or any part thereof, on such terms as they deem advisable, and to execute a warranty deed for the same.

Art. 55. To see if the town will vote to instruct the selectmen to insure the members of the Volunteer Fire Company against liability for damages while in the act of preventing fires.

Art. 56. To see if the town will vote to discontinue the watering tub, situated at the intersection of Main street and Pittsfield avenue, and act upon anything relating thereto.

Art. 57. To see if the town will vote to set aside the sum of the taxes on the "Cottage Lots" as described in Book of Plans Number 7, Page 49, as recorded in the Registry of Deeds, together with the taxes on the cottages thereon, said sum to be used to improve the private way leading from the town way to said lots.

Art. 58. To see if the town will vote "yes" or "no" on daylight saving time.

Art. 59. To see if the town will vote to relocate the road in North Hartland, beginning at the dwelling of the late Jerome B. Williams, now occupied by Ivan Small, thence southerly to the Burrill Road so called, said road having been discontinued by vote of the town in 1931, and vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money to repair said road, providing the selectmen can make satisfactory arrangements with the abutters.

Art. 60. To see if the town will vote to authorize and instruct the selectmen to take such action as is necessary, regarding the discontinuing of the Burrill road so called, from the State Aid highway to the intersection of the road mentioned in article 59, and such other portions of the Burrill road as they deem public necessity and convenience does not warrant their further continuance as town roads or ways.

Art. 61. To see if the town will vote to have the Town Line between Hartland and Canaan, perambulated and suitable markers erected, it having been stated that the corner marker at the north-east corner of the Town of Canaan, having been removed.

Art. 62. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$150.00, more or less, for the support and maintenance of the American Legion Free Ice Rink, for the ensuing year, said sum to be turned over to, and expended by, local American Legion Post No. 141, and to act upon anything relating thereto.

Art. 63. To see if the town will authorize the selectmen to take the necessary action to close or discontinue the road leading from the State Aid highway near Fred Hart's place towards Great Moose Lake, or any part of said road, as they deem public necessity and convenience does not warrant further continuance as town ways or roads, or act upon anything relating thereto.

Art. 64. To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen to take the necessary action to close or discontinue the road, from Harold Havey's residence to the Canaan Town line, or act upon anything relating thereto.

Art. 65. To see if the town will vote to accept the following town or traffic ordinance.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE TOWN OF HARTLAND.

Art. 1. Sections of the Town.

Sec. 1. The business section of the town shall comprise that section of Main street between Warren Square on the east and the intersection of Pittsfield Avenue on the west; also that section of Commercial street from Warren Square on the south to C. I. Currie's store on the north.

Sec. 2. The "built up" or "compact" section of the town shall be as defined in the Revised Statutes of Maine and shall be properly marked and designated by traffic signs placed by the Municipal Officers of the town.

Art. 2. Speed limits.

Sec. 1. No person shall drive or operate any automobile, motorcycle or other vehicle within the limits of the "built up" or "compact" or the business sections of the town at a rate of speed in excess of twenty-five miles an hour.

Art. 3. Local stop signs.

Sec. 1. The Municipal Officers are hereby authorized and directed to place stop signs at such intersections as they shall deem proper for the protection and control of traffic; and every vehicle before passing such stop sign and entering such intersection shall come to a full stop, unless otherwise directed by a traffic officer stationed at such intersection.

Art. 4. Parking.

Sec. 1. All vehicles shall stop, stand or park, only on the right hand side of the street, and as closely as practicable to the edge of the curb or side of the road, and parallel with the side of the street, except that in the business section as defined in Art. 1 of this ordinance, and described as follows, "that section of Commercial street, between Warren Square on the south and C. I. Currie's store on the north" may park at an angle with the curb.

Sec. 2. No person, except in case of emergency, or when ordered by an authorized officer so to do, shall stop, stand or park any vehicle in such manner as to obstruct or impede the passage of other vehicles.

Sec. 3. No person shall stand or park any vehicle in any of the following places:

- a. On any sidewalk.
- b. In front of any public or private driveway.
- c. Within ten feet of a fire hydrant.
- d. On any cross walk.
- e. Within fifteen feet of any street intersection.
- f. Within fifteen feet of any stop or traffic sign, installed at the side of the way, or within fifteen feet of any traffic beacon.
- g. On the road-way side of any vehicle which is stopped or parked at the curb or edge of the street, commonly called, "double parking".

Sec. 4. Commercial vehicles for the purpose of loading or unloading, or performing other necessary service, may stop or park in violation of the above laws, but only in such manner as shall not impede the passage of other vehicles, and shall not compel pedestrians to use the streets by such violations; and such commercial vehicles shall not be parked within the business section for any purpose other than the necessary loading or unloading of goods and merchandise.

Sec. 5. "All night parking," so called, is prohibited on any street designated in Art. 1 of these ordinances as the business section, also "all night parking", so called, is prohibited on any street designated in these ordinances, during the season when it becomes necessary to remove snow to make said streets passable.

Art. 6. Penalty.

Sec. 1. Whoever violates any of the foregoing ordinances shall upon conviction, be punished by a fine of not more than ten dollars or by imprisonment for not more than thirty days, or by both such fine and imprisonment.

Art. 7. Jurisdiction.

Sec. 1. The Municipal Court of Pittsfield, Maine shall have exclusive jurisdiction of all prosecutions for all violations of the provisions of these ordinances.

The Selectmen hereby give notice that they will be in session at the above named hall and place of meeting on Monday, the day of said meeting, for the purpose of correcting the list of

voters, from 9 o'clock in the forenoon.

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Hartland:

This is to certify that this department, represented by Mr. Roscoe M. Parsons, has completed an audit of the accounts of your town officials for the municipal year ended Feb. 10, 1939.

The overdraft of \$827.19 for Poor Relief is due largely to the payment of Mothers' Aid, an accumulation from 1931 to 1938 in the amount of \$1,802.67 less reimbursement by the State of \$901.33.

Our report, herewith submitted, was prepared from your town records and, to the best of our knowledge and belief, properly reflects the true financial condition of your municipality as of the above date.

Report of Superintendent of Schools

To the Superintending School Committee and the Citizens of Hartland:

This, my first report as superintendent of the Hartland schools, is submitted for your consideration.

Due to the fact that my acquaintance with the schools is of a comparatively short term, my time has been largely utilized in making a study of the school situation and the method of administration by my predecessor. I have found that the teachers and pupils are working harmoniously and that the general morale of the schools is very good. There has been no change in the teaching personnel in the elementary schools this year. Hartland is very fortunate in having such a corps of well trained, conscientious, and loyal teachers. The work in music has been ably carried on as usual under the direction of Miss Gertrude Thorne.

A study of the statistics of the common schools for the fall term shows that there were 151 pupils not tardy, 37 pupils not absent, and that 206 visits were made by citizens to the various schools. There have been 15 elementary tuition pupils enrolled in the Hartland schools.

It will be noted that the teacher load at the Pleasant Street school is extremely heavy. If ample room were available, this situation could be alleviated by the employment of an additional teacher. In spite of the fact that Mrs. Hogan and Mrs. Steeves have done remarkably good work with the pupils, I feel that an enrollment of 103 pupils is much too large for only two teachers, particularly in mixed grades.

The Seabasticook Teachers' Club which has functioned very efficiently for so many years has been active as usual. The programs have maintained a high professional standard and have been very helpful.

During the fall term an exhibition of the projects, drawings, and study assignments of the pupils in the elementary grades was displayed in several store windows through the kindness of the merchants. The children have taken an active interest in these activities and have shown remarkable skill and aptitude in drawing and creative work.

Thus far our schools have had the good fortune of being free from contagious diseases. I would call your attention to the report of your school physician, Dr. C. A. Moulton, whose conscientious work in the schools is much appreciated.

The conveyance for the past year has been satisfactory. There are 95 pupils conveyed to the various elementary schools. From this number 69 are transported by the town bus, commonly known as the "Orange Bus." This bus has given very good service although some necessary repairs were made during the early winter.

There are 169 pupils including 22 sub-freshmen enrolled in the Academy. The members of the faculty are as follows: Cecil J. Cutts, principal and mathematics; Roger Lowell, science and coach; Beulah McIntyre, French and Latin; Louise Hastings, English; Richard Dunn, social sciences and coach; Rena Allen, home economics; Wesley Oliver, agriculture.

There have been two changes in the faculty this year. Miss Louise Hastings has replaced Miss Catherine Laughton, resigned; and Richard Dunn has filled the vacancy left by Philip Qualey.

The curriculum at the Academy has been enriched by the introduction of two new courses—Agriculture, and Home Economics. A set of buildings adjacent to the Academy grounds, and now known as the Annex, was purchased by the Academy to be used as classrooms and laboratories for these two departments. The desirability of these courses is evident when one considers that over two-thirds of the high school pupils are enrolled in these departments. The trustees and administrators of the Academy should be commended for their progressive attitude in giving to the Academy a well rounded and broadened program to better meet the needs of the pupils whom it serves.

The damage caused by the fire last winter at the Academy building has been repaired. The west wing was completely renovated and the ceilings repaired and walls refinished in the east wing. The interior of the main part of the building was repainted. Last summer new steps were built at the entrances to both the east and west wings.

Recently, an additional supply room has been provided by constructing a partition under the stairway in the basement of the Academy. This space, which is used to store the common school supplies, was much needed since the storage facilities were far from adequate for the needs of both the Academy and the grades.

During the summer a new ceiling was put on at the Fuller's Corner school and the interior was completely refinished. All the desk tops were refinished and a washbowl was installed. Later new shades were purchased for the windows. Complete replacements were made of the swings which were in a hazardous condition.

At the Pleasant Street school 25 desk tops were refinished. New rope was provided for the swings and the flag pole. The water pipes were in such a condition that it was necessary to replace most of the pipes.

The fire-escape at the Pleasant Street school is unprotected from the drip from the eaves. During the winter this freezes on the steps. Some means will need to be provided to protect the steps from the accumulation of ice and snow.

The present heating plant at the Academy is inadequate to heat the building suitably during the very cold weather. A proposed method for increasing the efficiency of the system is the installation of check valves to hold the water in the boiler, and the insulation of the steam pipes which pass through the gymnasium.

The School Committee and Superintendent have carefully estimated the expenditures for next year and recommend the following amounts:

It will be noted that the amounts recommended are the same as those appropriated for last year except the Repairs and Insurance account. The Repairs and Insurance account is increased in anticipation for expenditures for insurance which will come due this next year.

As I close this report, I wish to express my sincere appreciation to the members of the School Committee, the teachers, pupils, and citizens of Hartland for their fine cooperation during the period it has been my privilege to serve the schools of Hartland.
