Warrant for Annual Town Meeting

SOMERSET, ss.

STATE OF MAINE

To Owen H. Rowe, a Constable of the Town of Hartland in
the County of Somerset,

Greeting:

In the name of the State of Maine, you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of said Town of Hartland, in said county, qualified by law to vote in town affairs, to meet in the Opera House, in said town, on Monday, the eleventh day of March, A. D. 1940, at ten o'clock in the forenoon, then and there to act on the following articles, namely:

Art. 1. To choose a moderator to preside at said meeting.

Art. 2. To choose all necessary town officers for the ensuing year.

Art. 3. To hear and act on the report of the Selectmen, Assessors and Overseers of the Poor, Treasurer, Collector of Taxes, Superintendent of Schools, Road Commissioners, Town Clerk and other town officers.

Art. 4. To see if the town will vote to elect one or more road commissioners, for the ensuing year.

Art. 5. To see if the town will vote to instruct the Selectmen to appoint one or more road commissioners, for the ensuing year.

Art. 6. To see if the town will vote to adopt the Town Agent form of Government, for the ensuing year, define his duties, fix his compensation, and act upon anything relating thereto.

Art. 7. To see if the town will vote to fix the compensation of all officers required herein to be elected or appointed, for the ensuing year, that have not been acted upon, and fix the compensation for labor on town roads.

Art. 8. To see if the town will vote to authorize its collector of taxes for the ensuing year, to allow a discount of 3% on any taxes paid on or before June 15, 1940, and will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for this purpose.

Art. 9. To see what action the town will take relating to the collection of taxes for the ensuing year.

Art. 10. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the payment of abatement of taxes for the ensuing year.

Art. 11. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for support of elementary schools, for the ensuing year, including teachers' wages, fuel, janitors' services, conveyance, textbooks, reference books and school supplies.

Art. 12. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for repairs, equipment and insurance on school buildings, for the ensuing year.

Art. 13. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate, for salary of the superintendent of schools, for the ensuing year.

Art. 14. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate, for tuition in secondary schools, and authorize its superintending school committee to contract with, Hartland Academy, to furnish instruction to its high school pupils, for the ensuing year.

Art. 15. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate, for salary of the superintending school committee, for the ensuing year.

Art. 16. To see if the town will vote to authorize its superintending school committee to employ a school physician, and raise and appropriate the sum of \$100.00, more or less, for this purpose.

Art. 17. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for pay of town officers, for the ensuing year, including the Agent's salary.

Art. 18. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate, for miscellaneous town charges, for the ensuing year.

Art. 19. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$125.00, more or less, for rent of Town Hall and selectmen's office, for the ensuing year.

Art. 20. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for repairs and insurance on town buildings, other than school property, for the ensuing year.

Art. 21. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$250.00, more or less, for support of Fire Department and maintenance of fire alarm, for the ensuing year.

Art. 22. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500.00, for hydrant rental, for the ensuing year.

Art. 23. To see what action the town will take regarding renewing the existing contract with the Hartland Water Co. or making a new contract (as the existing contract expires January 1, 1941), to furnish water for town purposes.

Art. 24. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Hartland Water Co. to construct a chlorinating station in the south side of the right-of-way on the Athens Road, so called, just west of Withee Brook, subject to the approval of the abutting land owner, the Public Utilities Commission and the State Highway Commission.

Art. 25. To see if the town will vote to erect and maintain a street light near the residence of Frank Nevens.

Art. 26. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate, for street lights, for the ensuing year.

Art. 27. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate, for repairing roads and bridges, cutting bushes, etc. for the ensuing year.

Art. 28. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate, for winter and spring roads, purchasing snow fence and maintaining the same, sanding highways or anything relating thereto.

Art. 29. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for State Aid road construction (in addition to the amounts regularly raised for the care of ways, highways and bridges) under the provisions of Section 19, Chapter 28, Revised Statutes of 1930, or under the provisions of Section 3, Chapter 229, Public Laws of 1937.

Art. 30. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$438.00, or a sum not to exceed \$30.00 a mile, for maintainance of State Aid highways for the ensuing year.

Art. 31. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$505.00, for the maintenance of improved sections of third class roads, or to be used in conjunction with the State apportionment for the construction of third class roads.

Art. 32. To see what sum, if any, the town would recommend to take from the joint State Aid account for the purpose of applying bituminous surface treatment to State Aid roads, in excess of the requirements of Section 2, Chapter 132, P. L. 1935.

Art. 33. To see what sum, if any, the town would recommend to take from the third class apportionment for the purpose of applying bituminous surface treatment to Third Class Roads, in excess of the requirements of Section 1, Chapter 207, P. L. 1939.

Art. 34. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate, for the purpose of repairing the upper bridge so called at Mill and Water Streets.

Art. 35. To see what sum of money, if any, the town will vote to raise and appropriate, for the purpose of sanding and tarring some of the village streets, and act upon anything relating thereto.

Art. 36. To see what sum, if any, the town will vote to raise and appropriate, for repairing sidewalks, for the ensuing year, and act upon anything relating thereto.

Art. 37. To see what sum, if any, the town will vote to raise and appropriate, for snow removal from sidewalks for the ensuing year, and act upon anything relating thereto.

Art. 38. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$400.00, more or less, for support of Hartland Free Library, for the ensuing year.

Art. 39. To see what sum the town will vote to raise and appropriate for decorating the graves of soldiers and sailors and for Memorial Day exercises, said sum to be expended under the direction of the Christopher G. Linn Post, No. 141, A: L.

Art. 40. To see what sum the town will vote to raise and appropriate, for the care of cemeteries, for the ensuing year.

Art. 41. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$807.50, for the payment of interest on school building bonds, for the ensuing year.

Art. 42. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1000.00, for the payment of interest on town debt and temporary loans, for the ensuing year.

Art. 43. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$3000.00, for support of poor, board and care of dependent children, mothers' aid, aid to veterans and veterans' dependents, for the ensuing year.

Art. 44. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1286.03 (this being the sum necessary in addition to the No. 6 dividend of 5%, in the amount of \$713.97 paid in 1939), to retire two school bonds, maturing in 1940.

Art. 45. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate \$50.00 for public health work in Hartland, said sum to be expended by the Bureau of Health, State Department of Health and Welfare, in cooperation with local authorities.

Art. 46. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for advertising our natural resources, advantages and attractions, under the provisions of Chapter 5, Section 82, of the Revised Statutes of 1930, said sum to be expended under the direction of the State of Maine Publicity Bureau.

Art. 47. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate, to purchase a lot on which to build a fire house, or act upon anything relating thereto.

Art. 48. To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen to hire money to refund the town debt, when in their judgment it seems best to do so.

Art. 49. To see what sum the town will vote to raise and appropriate, for reduction of town debt for the ensuing year.

Art. 50. To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen to procure a temporary loan or loans in anticipation of taxes for the purpose of paying obligations of the town; such notes to be paid during the current municipal year out of money raised during said current municipal year by taxes; fix the amount thereof, and the rate of interest or discount thereon.

Art. 51. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Town Clerk and Moderator to appoint a committee of twelve citizens to co-operate with the selectmen in preparing and presenting at the next annual town meeting a budget for said meeting.

Art. 52. To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen on behalf of the town to sell and dispose of any real estate acquired by the town for non-payment of taxes thereon, on such terms as they deem advisable, and to execute quit claim deeds for such property.

Art. 53. To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen on behalf of the town to sell and dispose of that part of the "Gilbert Place" so called, situated in the town of Canaan, and purchased from the Skowhegan Savings Bank, on such terms as they deem advisable, and to execute a warranty deed for the same.

Art. 54. To see if the town will vote to instruct the assessors to abate the taxes assessed on the real estate now owned by the American Legion, for the year 1939, this property having been purchased from J. E. & E. L. Fuller, since April 1, 1939.

Art. 55. To see if the town will vote to put a nominal value of \$50.00 on the American Legion real estate, for purposes of taxation.

Art. 56. To see if the town will vote to instruct the fire chief to report to the town agent or the selectmen, all fires as they occur, including chimney fires. They have to make a report to the Insurance Commissioner of any fire within two weeks after the fire occurs.

Art. 57. To see what action the town will take in regard to furnishing extra school room, and raise and appropriate a sufficient sum of money to pay for same, and to act upon anything relating thereto.

Art. 58. To see if the town will vote to add to the Pine Grove Cemetery Committee or Association, twelve citizens interested in this cemetery, who will elect a President, Secretary, Treasurer and Trustees; and to see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$200.00, to be added to the sum already pledged by lot owners for the maintenance of a full time caretaker of Pine Grove Cemetery.

Art. 59. To see if the town will vote to make a coal bin outside of the Academy building, as a preventive of fires, and raise and appropriate a sum of money for the same, and to act upon anything relating thereto.

Art. 60. To see if the town will vote to accept the sum of one hundred fifty dollars, to hold in trust, from the estate of Harrison Worthen, the interest to be used for the care of the Harrison Worthen lot, in Pine Grove Cemetery.

Art. 61. To see if the town will vote to accept the sum of fifty dollars, to hold in trust, from Maud A. Cook, the interest to be used for the care of the Judson Currier lot in Pleasant Street Cemetery and the Ham lot in North Hartland Cemetery. There has been more promised on this account.

Art. 62. To see if the town will vote to accept the sum of one thousand dollars, (five hundred each) from Margaret J. and Marion F. Morrison, to be invested as they may direct. In consideration of this acceptance by the town, the Town of Hartland is to grade the George Morrison lot in Pleasant Street Cemetery, the income from this fund is to be used for the care of the George Morrison lot, in said cemetery; any income over and above what is needed for this purpose shall be used for the general care and upkeep of Pleasant Street Cemetery alone.

Art. 63. To act upon anything not relating to the raising of money that may legally come before any town meeting.

The selectmen hereby give notice that they will be in session at the above named hall and place of meeting on Monday, the day of said meeting, for the purpose of correcting the list of voters, from 9:30 o'clock in the forenoon.

Report of Superintendent of Schools

To the Superintending School Committee and the Citizens of Hartland:

This, my first annual report as superintendent of your schools, will be somewhat different from reports of the past. I propose to devote most of this space to describing conditions of the schools as I have found them. The teaching force in the elementary schools is the same as last year, with the exception of Mrs. Ruth Thomas who has been added to the force to lighten the teacher load in the primary grades. I find the teachers working diligently although greatly handicapped by over-crowded conditions.

The statistics in the table above are for the fall term which closed Dec. 15, 1939. Since that time there has been five new elementary pupils enter our schools.

At the opening of school in September, we found that there were 39 pupils entering the sub-primary class, this number combined with 23 pupils in the first grade was too many to expect any one teacher to teach. Realizing that a good beginning was essential in the lower grades the committee made arrangements to add another teacher to the force and move the first grade into a room by themselves. Hence the so called church school. While this arrangement may not be very satisfactory I do feel that both

grades have been able to accomplish much more than could possibly have been done with two teachers occupying the same room. Looking forward to next September and our present pupils advancing one grade all along the way I see 30 pupils entering the sub-primary grade. This number is a check-up of youngsters that will be five years of age by Sept. 1, 1940. Our present sub-primary will be first grade. Thirty-nine and thirty will make sixty-nine pupils slated for the same room. Personally I can see no other solution than to continue the extra teacher and separate room. As has been true this year it means an increased budget for rent, fuel, janitor, etc.

The same overcrowded conditions exists in all rooms this year except Mrs. McCrillis'. The present seventh grade is small in number. Next September as this grade moves to the eighth grade in the Academy seventeen pupils will move into this room to take their place. Thus filling all grade rooms to overflowing. While this condition exists we cannot expect teachers to perform miracles and accomplish all that they are expected to accomplish.

It is impossible to know what the future will bring but it is a fact that the present school population is too large for the accommodations.

The problem now is to increase accommodations to take care of the pupils. If something is not done we will soon find that our elementary graduates will be poorly trained when they enter high school.

The only solution that I can see is a building large enough to accommodate the first seven grades and adding one more teacher to the present staff. This would leave the Academy more room which is badly needed. It would add the seventh grade to the Academy making it a six year secondary school, which has many advantages over the four year high school.

The enrollment at the Academy is large this year. There are approximately 175 students and about one-half of these are tuition pupils. The faculty remains the same as last year except in the departments of English and Agriculture. Mary Ford is now teacher of English and Sewell Milliken is head of the Agricultural Dept. The addition of Agriculture and Home Economics has been an asset to Hartland and surrounding communities. In a school of this size there are a small percentage of students preparing for college, therefore these courses meet a need of a

great majority of students that are not preparing for college. The addition of a Commercial course in the future would be a wise move. A course in elementary book-keeping is already found in the curriculum. Instruction in typewriting would be beneficial to nearly all students. The typewriter like all machines is a labor and time saving device. If we could operate one with some degree of speed and accuracy it would be to our advantage. There is a growing demand for the use of the typewriter and people that can operate one.

I find a splendid spirit of cooperation in the school. Faculty and students alike take an active interest in the curricula and extra-curricula activities, classroom activities, assemblies, athletics and social activities show evidence of this spirit of co-operation.

Repairs to the fire escape at the Pleasant Street school were completed this past fall. Repairs to the extent of approximately \$200.00 were done on the Academy heating plant. A check valve in the furnace and new valves in the radiators throughout the building has enabled Mr. Deering to keep the building reasonably warm this year. An estimated \$15.00 will be needed to repair a leak in the boiler. This should be done this summer.

If it is deemed advisable to continue the church vestry school next year, and if arrangements can be made to use the building, we should install another flush closet. One toilet is not adequate for both boys and girls.

Total expenditures this year are about \$1,180.00 more than last year. The explanation is that more money was expended as follows: Teachers, janitors, conveyance, fuel and repairs to Academy furnace and insurance. There has been an overdraft in the common school account of \$442.05. Therefore it will be necessary to increase the appropriations this year, enough to take care of this overdraft.

We have asked for an appropriation of \$50.00 for a school nurse. I have talked this matter over with the school physician, teachers and several parents. It is agreed that a school nurse, to do follow up work after the physician has made his examination would do a great deal of good for the majority of pupils. A nurse through home visits or by her contact with such organization as the Red Cross and the various clinics can get a great deal of remedial work done.

It is time to consider the matter of a school bus again. The

present orange bus is a 1936 model. Naturally it is reaching the point where it requires more gas, oil and repairs to keep it in safe operating condition. The question is whether or not the increased operating expenses, including depreciation, make it desirable to operate the same bus another year.

Beginning this fiscal year it is my plan to spend Monday and Friday at the office. Tuesday at Palmyra, Wednesday in the schools of Hartland, and Thursdays in St. Albans. I find it necessary to budget my time similar to the plan mentioned above, although it is not always possible to adhere strictly to that schedule.

In the future school payrolls will go to Mr. Whitney on Friday of every second week during the school year. Bills for repairs, supplies, etc., will be included on the payroll at the end of each month.

May I have your cooperation in these matters? If personal conferences can be conveniently arranged for Monday or Friday of any week, and if your bills for the school department are presented before the second payroll each month, it will be greatly appreciated.

In conclusion, I wish to express my appreciation for the fine support and cooperation given me by the school committee, teachers, parents, pupils, and townspeople.

Report of Public Health Nursing Service

The public health nursing service covers the nurse supervision of expectant mothers, infants, preschool and school age children. The report covers this general program and it is for this purpose which we are asking to have money raised to help continue the work by supplementing what is already being paid from State Bureau of Health funds. The work is carried largely through home visits and child health conferences. These contacts are made for the purpose of giving help in meeting the health needs of the family through advice and demonstration of methods of care in the home.

The encouragement of parents in the care of the family is most gratefully received. Through the nurse's home visits, medical supervision is urged where needed for treatment or correction of defects.

The importance of using the proper diet for maintenance of health and normal growth is discussed with families and aid given in planning food budgets.

The protection of children with communicable diseases, the protection of others from those who are ill and immunization against certain diseases is stressed. Whenever possible, child health conferences are held with the local people making the choice of examining physician and the State Bureau of Health paying for his services. The nurse is always alert to any crippling condition in children and with the consent of the physician, the services of the crippled children clinics, which are held in several sections of the State, are recommended to the family.

As other defects are found, the nurse calls these conditions to the attention of the parents with recommendations to secure advice from physician or dentist regarding care or treatment. In cases where the cost of corrective work cannot be assumed by the family, the nurse endeavors to enlist the interest of groups or agencies to assist in meeting these needs.

No Child Health Conference was held in the summer, but we will try to hold several small ones next summer.

Plans will be made to hold a toxoid clinic in the spring.
