Warrant for Annual Town Meeting

SOMERSET, ss.

STATE OF MAINE

To Owen H. Rowe, a Constable in the Town of Hartland in the County of Somerset. Greeting:

In the name of the State of Maine, you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of the town of Hartland, in said county, qualified by law to vote in town affairs, to meet at the Opera House, in said town, on Monday, the tenth day of March, A. D. 1941, at ten o'clock in the forenoon, then and there to act on the following articles, namely:

Art. 1. To choose a moderator to preside at said meeting.

Art. 2. To hear and act upon the report of the Selectmen, Assessors and Overseers of the Poor, Treasurer, Collector of Taxes, Superintendent of Schools, Road Commissioners, Town Clerk and other town officers.

Art. 3. To choose all necessary town officers for the ensuing year.

Art. 4. To see if the town will vote to elect one or more road commissioners, for the ensuing year.
Budget Committee recommend pass.

Art. 5. To see if the town will vote to instruct the Selectmen to appoint one or more road commissioners, for the ensuing year.
Budget Committee recommend yes.

Art. 6. To see if the town will vote to adopt the Town Agent form of Government, for the ensuing year, define his duties, fix his compensation. and act upon anything relating thereto.

Budget Committee recommend yes.

Art. 7. To see if the town will vote to fix the compensation of all officers required herein to be elected or appointed, for the ensuing year, that have not been acted upon, and fix the compensation for labor on town roads, and act upon anything relating thereto.

Budget Committee recommend, same as 1940, except labor on roads.

Art. 8. To see if the town will vote to authorize its collector of taxes for the ensuing year, to allow a discount for the early payment of taxes, fix the rate of discount and time of allowing the same.

Budget Committee recommend 3% on or before June 15, 1941.

Art. 9. To see what action the town will take relating to the collection of taxes for the ensuing year.

Budget Committee recommend same as 1940.

Art. 10. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the abatement of taxes, and the payment of discounts on taxes, for the ensuing year.

Budget Committee recommend \$600.00.

Art. 11. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for support of elementary schools, for the ensuing year, including teachers' wages, fuel, janitors' services, conveyance, textbooks, reference books and school supplies.

Budget Committee recommend \$7,500.00.

Art. 12. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for repairs, equipment and insurance on school buildings, for the ensuing year.

Budget Committee recommend \$450.00.

Art. 13. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate, for salary of the superintendent of schools, for the ensuing year.

Budget Committee recommend \$400.00.

Art. 14. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate, for tuition in secondary schools, for the ensuing year, and authorize its superintending school committee to contract with Hartland Academy, to furnish instruction to its high school pupils.

Budget Committee recommend "yes" and raise \$2,300.00.

Art. 15. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate, for salary of the superintending school committee, for the ensuing year.

Budget Committee recommend \$45.00.

Art. 16. To see if the town will vote to authorize the superintending school committee to employ a school physician, for the ensuing year, and raise and appropriate the sum of \$100.00, more or less, for this purpose.

Budget Committee recommend "yes" and raise \$100.00.

Art. 17. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for pay of town officers, including the Town Agent's salary, for the ensuing year.

Budget Committee recommend \$1,750.00.

Art. 18. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate, for miscellaneous town charges, including rent of Opera House and selectmen's office, etc. for the ensuing year.

Budget Committee recommend \$925.00.

Art. 19. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for repairs and insurance on town buildings, other than school property, for the ensuing year.

Budget Committee recommend \$50.00.

Art. 20. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$250.00, more or less, for support of Fire Department and maintenance of fire alarm, for the ensuing year.

Budget Committee recommend \$500.00.

Art. 21. To see what action the town will take regarding a contract with the Hartland Water Co., to furnish water for town purposes, and what sum of money if any, they will vote to raise and appropriate for this purpose, or anything relating thereto.

Budget Committee recommend action be taken by voters.

Art. 22. To see if the town will vote to authorize its selectmen to relocate the hydrant near the residence of Rae Randlett, or place a new hydrant at or near the residence of Glenn L. Carle, providing terms can be arranged with the Hartland Water Co. for this purpose.

Budget Committee recommend action be taken by voters.

Art. 23. To see what action if any the town will take regarding changing electric lights on Pleasant Street, the light on pole No. 12 of Central Maine Power Co. change to pole No. 13 of above Company, and light on pole No. 18 of Central Maine Power Co. change to pole No. 17, of above Company.

Budget Committee recommend "yes" relocate.

Art. 24. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate, for street lights, for the ensuing year.

Budget Committee recommend \$888.00.

Art. 25. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate, for repairs to roads and bridges, cutting bushes, etc., other than village streets, for the ensuing year.

Budget Committee recommend \$800.00 and \$25.00 to be used on H. A. Elliott road.

Art. 26. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate, for winter and spring roads, purchasing and maintaining snow fence, sanding highways or anything relating thereto.

Budget Committee recommend \$1,200.00.

Art. 27. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for State Aid construction (in addition to the amounts regularly raised for the care of ways, highways and bridges) under the provision of Section 19, Chapter 3, Revised Statutes of 1930, or under the provisions of Section 3, Chapter 229, Public Laws of 1937.

Budget Committee recommend one and one-half units \$799.50.

Art. 28. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$438.00, or a sum not to exceed \$30.00 a mile, for maintenance of State Aid highways for the ensuing year.

Budget Committee recommend \$435.00.

Art. 29. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$656.00, for the maintenance of improved sections of third class roads, or to be used in conjunction with the State apportionment for the construction of third class roads, this sum is the amount necessary, as stated by the State Highway Commission.

Budget Committee recommend \$656.00.

Art. 30. To see what sum, if any, the town would recommend to take from the joint State Aid account for the purpose of applying bituminous surface treatment to State Aid roads, in excess of the requirements of Section 2, Chapter 132, Public Laws of 1935.

Budget Committee recommend "Pass".

Art. 31. To see what sum, if any, the town would recommend to take from the third class apportionment for the purpose of applying bituminous surface treatment to Third Class Roads, in excess of the requirements of Section 1, Chapter 207, Public Laws of 1939.

Budget Committee recommend "Pass".

Art. 32. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate, for the purpose of repairing the upper bridge, so called at Mill and Water Streets, and for the purpose of applying bituminous surface treatment to some of the village streets, and maintenance of said village streets.

Budget Committee recommend \$800.00.

Art. 33. To see what sum of money, if any, the town will vote to raise and appropriate, for repairing sidewalks, for the ensuing year and act upon anything relating thereto.

Budget Committee recommend \$150.00.

Art. 34. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate, for snow removal from sidewalks for the ensuing year, and act upon anything relating thereto.

Budget Committee recommend \$50.00.

Art. 35. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$400.00 for support of Public Library, for the ensuing year..

Budget Committee recommend \$400.00.

Art. 36. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for decorating the graves of soldiers and sailors and for Memorial Day exercises, said sum to be expended under the direction of the Christopher G. Linn Post, No. 141, A. L.

Budget Committee recommend \$50.00.

Art. 37. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate, for the care of cemeteries, for the ensuing year, said sum to be expended under the supervision of the Hartland Cemetery Association.

Budget Committee recommend \$300.00.

Art. 38. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$712.50, for payment of interest on school building bonds, for the ensuing year.

Budget Committee recommend \$712.50.

Art. 39. To see what action the town will take regarding the purchase of a pumper, raise and appropriate a sum of money for the same, or anything relating thereto.

Budget Committee recommend matter be investigated by committee.

Art. 40. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$900.00, for payment of interest on town debt and temporary loans, for the ensuing year.

Budget Committee recommend \$900.00.

Art. 41. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$3,000.00, for support of poor, board and care of dependent children, mothers' aid, aid to veterans and veterans' dependents, for the ensuing year.

Budget Committee recommend \$3,000.00.

Art. 42. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,286.03, to retire two school bonds, maturing May 1, 1941, this being the sum necessary in addition to the No. 7 dividend of 5%, in the amount of \$713.97.

Budget Committee recommend \$1,286.03.

Art. 43. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$50.00, for public health nursing in Hartland, said sum to be expended by the State Bureau of Health, for local service.

Budget Committee recommend \$50.00.

Art. 44. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for advertising our natural resources, advantages and attractions, under the provisions of Chapter 5, Section 82, of the Revised Statutes of 1930, said sum to be expended under the direction of the State of Maine Publicity Bureau.

Budget Committee recommend "Pass".

Art. 45. To see if the town will vote to accept the deed from the Hartland Mills, Inc., for part of the vacant lot opposite the Hartland Tanning Co. plant, and vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$250.00, to build a retaining wall on the west side of said lot.

Budget Committee recommend "yes" and raise \$250.00.

Art. 46. To see if the town will vote to authorize its selectmen to hire the money to refund the town debt, when in their judgment it seems best to do so.

Budget Committee recommend "Yes'.

Art. 47. To see what action the town will take regarding reduction of town debt, for the ensuing year, or act upon anything relating thereto.

Budget Committee recommend use excise taxes and unexpended balances.

Art. 48. To see if the town will vote to authorize its selectmen to procure a temporary loan or loans in anticipation of taxes for the purpose of paying obligations of the town; such notes to be paid during the current municipal year out of money raised during said current municipal year by taxes; fix the amount thereof, and the rate of interest or discount thereon.

Budget Committee recommend "Yes".

Art. 49. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Town Clerk and Moderator to appoint a committee of twelve citizens to co-operate with the selectmen in preparing and presenting at the next annual town meeting a budget for said meeting.

Budget Committee recommend "Yes".

Art. 50. To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen on behalf of the town to sell and dispose of any real estate acquired by the town for non-payment of taxes thereon, on such terms as they deem advisable, and to execute quit-claim deeds for such property.

Budget Committee recommend "Yes".

Art. 51. To see what action the town will take in regard to furnishing extra school room, and raise and appropriate a sufficient sum of money to pay for same, and to act upon anything relating thereto.

Budget Committee recommend "Yes".

Art. 52. To see if the town will vote to accept the sum of \$100.00, to hold in trust, from the estate of Calvin Blake, the interest to be used in the care of the Calvin Blake lot in Pleasant Street Cemetery.

Budget Committee recommend "Yes".

Art. 53. To see if the town will vote to accept the sum of \$100.00 to hold in trust. from Margaret F. White, the interest to be used in the care of the White and Patterson lot in Pleasant Street Cemetery.

Budget Committee recommend "Yes".

Art. 54. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$200.00, for the purpose of controlling the White Pine Blister Rust in the town of Hartland, the above sum to be used for local labor, and to be supplemented with 50 per cent from the State, or with W.P.A., if available.

Budget Committee recommend "Pass".

Art. 55. To see if the town will vote to accept the following town or traffic ordinance.

Budget Committee recommend "Yes".

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE TOWN OF HARTLAND

Art. 1. Sections of the Town.

Sec. 1. The business section of the town shall comprise that section of Main Street between Warren Square on the east and the intersection of Pittsfield Avenue on the west; also that section of Commercial street from Warren Square on the south to C. I. Currie's store on the north.

Sec. 2. The "built up" or "compact" section of the town shall be as defined in the Revised Statutes of Maine, 1930, Section 69, of Chapter 29, sub-division (d); and shall be properly marked and designated by traffic signs placed by the Municipal Officers of the town.

Art. 2. Speed limits.

No person shall drive or operate any automobile, motorcycle or other vehicle within the limits of the "built up" or "compact" or the business section of the town at a rate of speed in excess of twenty-five miles an hour.

Art. 3. Local stop signs.

Sec. 1. The Municipal Officers are hereby authorized and directed to place stop signs at such intersections as they deem proper for the protection and control of traffic; and every vehicle before passing such stop sign or entering such intersection shall come to a full stop, unless otherwise directed by a traffic officer stationed at such intersection.

Art. 4. Parking.

Sec. 1. All vehicles shall stop, stand or park, only on the right hand side of the street, and as closely as practicable to the edge of the curb or side of the road, and parallel with the side of the street, except that in the business section as defined in Art. 1 of this ordinance and described as follows, "that section of Commercial street, between Warren Square on the south and C. I. Currie's store on the north, vehicles may park at an angle with the curb.

Sec. 2. No person, except in case of emergency, or when ordered by an authorized officer to do, shall stop, stand or park any vehicle in such manner as to obstruct or impede the passage of other vehicles.

Sec. 3. No person shall stand or park any vehicle in any of the following places:

- a. On any sidewalk.
- b. In front of any public or private driveway.
- c. Within ten feet of a fire hydrant.
- d. On any cross walk.
- e. Within fifteen feet of any street intersection.
- f. Within fifteen feet of any stop or traffic sign, installed at the side of the way, or within fifteen feet of any traffic beacon.
- g. On the road-way side of any vehicle which is stopped or parked at the curb or edge of the street, commonly called, "double parking".

Sec. 4. Commercial vehicles for the purpose of loading or unloading, or performing other necessary service, may stop or park in violation of the above laws, but, only in such manner as shall not impede the passage of other vehicles, and shall not compel pedestrians to use the streets by such violations; and such commercial vehicles shall not be parked within the business section, as defined in Sec. 1, of Art. 1, of this ordinance, for any purpose other than the necessary loading or unloading of goods and merchandise.

Sec. 5. "All night parking", so called, is prohibited on any street designated in these ordinances, during the season when it becomes necessary to remove snow to make said streets passable.

Art. 6. Penalty.

Sec. 1. Whoever violates any of the foregoing ordinances shall upon conviction, be punished by a fine of not more than twenty dollars.

Art. 7. Jurisdiction.

Sec. 1. All Courts in the County of Somerset, having jurisdiction over misdemeanors occurring in the town of Hartland, shall have jurisdiction of prosecution for violation of the provisions of these ordinances.

Art. 54.

To act upon anything not relating to the raising of money that may legally come before any town meeting.

The selectmen hereby give notice that they will be in session at the above named hall and place on Monday, the day of said meeting, for the purpose of correcting the list of voters, from 9:30 o'clock in the forenoon.

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Hartland:

In accordance with your request, this department, represented by Mr. R. M. Parsons, has completed an examination of the accounts of your town officials for the municipal year ended February 10, 1941.

Our report, herewith submitted, was prepared from your town records and, to the the best of our knowledge and belief, properly reflects the true financial condition of your municipality as of the above date; subject however to a probable shrinkage in the final settlement of the unpaid taxes and tax liens, also to a substantial shrinkage in the balance of impounded cash.

The data obtained by us is summarized in the following:

COMMENTS

Cash:

All cash recorded as received appeared to have been properly accounted for and deposited in the bank, with the exception of \$227.54 cash on hand.

The expenditures were made by check from properly authorized warrants.

The cash balance was reconciled as of February 10, 1941.

Tax Liens:

As far as could be determined, all income from tax liens has been properly accounted for. Unpaid lists are not included in this report, as copies of same are in the hands of your Selectmen for printing in your town report.

Trust Funds:

The investments of Cemetery Trust Funds were checked and are shown on Schedule 3. The income withdrawn appears to have been properly accounted for.

The Ministerial and School Fund has been used by your town and is carried as a liability.

Taxes:

The 1940 tax commitment was added and found to be in agreement with the records of the Assessors.

The abatements were checked for authority.

Lists of unpaid taxes were prepared for all years, copies of which were left with your Selectmen for printing.

General:

All entries on the books of your town officers appeared to be properly supported by subsidiary records.

It would appear that in the future when any amount is received from the Fidelity Trust Company as dividend on the impounded balance of cash, it would be more easily understood if the credit went directly to the appropriation account for payment of bonds. As we understand it, it is the intention of your town to use any dividend received from this fund to decrease the appropriation for bond retirement. This procedure would eliminate the necessity of transfers from one account to another.

With the exception of cash and trust funds, no direct verification was made of your asset or liability accounts.

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Report of Superintendent of Schools

February 10, 1941

To the Superintending School Committee and the Citizens of Hartland:

It is a pleasure to submit my second annual report on your schools. The following table of statistics gives much information regarding the teachers and enrollment of pupils. You will notice in this table that the enrollment of pupils is on the increase. Year after year as each grade moves ahead the rooms of the upper grade teachers are becoming crowded. The attendance was very good during the fall term but the epidemic of colds has cut the attendance down somewhat during the past seven weeks.

The church vestry school was discontinued this year and we could not seem to find any suitable place to house the first grade. As a compromise measure we decided to have a one session school day for the sub-primary and the first grade children. As a result we have the first grade attending the forenoon session and the sub-primary in the afternoon. Mrs. Steeves handles both sessions of school with an enrollment of 66 pupils. The orange bus makes a complete run over the bus route at noon taking the first grade pupils home and bringing the sub-primary children back to the afternoon session. This plan seems to solve our housing problems temporarily. I do hope we won't consider it a final solution to the extent that we won't consider more room necessary. The present arrangement is satisfactory as far as the beginning class is concerned. However, there is very little time for the teacher to give individual attention to any pupil who may need it. I question whether the first grade will be getting full benefits from a half day's work. Time alone will give the answer. The teacher load is still way above for teacher efficiency.

REPAIRS

We are planning to repair the toilets, sinks and lights at the Pleasant St. school. The toilets are unsanitary as are the sinks. Two rows of lights should be installed in order to improve the lighting conditions. There will be minor repairs on the toilets at Fuller's Corner and some minor repairs at the Academy building.

The enrollment at the Academy is somewhat smaller than a year ago. Two new teachers were secured to fill the vacancies caused by the resignation of Mr. Lowell and Miss McIntyre. Mr. Carl McGraw and Miss Marjorie Towle, both Colby graduates, are doing well in their respective positions.

Dr. Moulton has carried on his fine work as usual this year. In addition the County Nurse gave hearing tests to all pupils from the fourth grade through the Academy. The audiometer was used for these tests. The tuberculin test was given, followed by the X-rays where they were needed.

· HEALTH DAY

It is proposed to have a health day in the schools. It will take place sometime in May. The program for the day will be somewhat as follows: The forenoon will be devoted to play. The up-

per grade pupils will devote their energies in athletic contests such as foot races and jumping. The lower grades will play games similar to their regular playground periods. The purpose of such activity is to teach cooperation and good sportsmanship as well as developing the body physically and mentally. The afternoon programs will take place in the Grange hall. Every pupil will have some part in the entertainment. There will be a display of work done in the schools during the year. The hours will be the regular school hours with a picnic lunch at noon.

BUDGET

With the appropriation last year we have been able to take care of last year's overdraft and have a balance in the common school account of \$544.71. An appropriation of \$7,500.00 should allow us to continue next year and have a balance at the end of the year. In addition to the usual number of books purchased each year, it is planned to purchase a new series of Arithmetics for all grades.

The matter of a new school bus should be given serious consideration this year. The estimate budget for repairs and insurance asks for a \$50.00 increase. This will be needed to make the changes needed at the Pleasant St. school.

In conclusion I wish to leave these few reminders. I will be at the office here on Mondays and Fridays of each week when schools are in session. I will be in the schools of Hartland every other Tuesday. All bills against the School Department should be itemized and given to me. Wood bids are usually called for by Jan. 1 of every year.

I wish to thank the School Committee, Citizens and Teachers for their fine spirit of cooperation during the past year.

Report of Public Health Nursing Service

"Adequate provision to assure satisfactory growth and development and protection of the health of children is a public responsibility warranting special consideration and emphasis in any program directed toward the better health of the people as a whole. Upon what is done to assure physical and mental health during maternity, infancy, childhood, and youth depends the vigor and health of the adult population."

The above quotation is taken from the report of a conference on "Children in a Democracy" held in Washington last spring at which leaders in many fields of child care discussed the problems of youth and ways to solve these problems.

Public health is concerned with securing and maintaining better health for all members of the community. Recognizing that whatever is done to assure physical and mental health during maternity, infancy, childhood, and youth will affect the health of the adult population, we have, as in the past, placed most emphasis on the work with the pregnant mother, the infant, and the pre-school child.

During the past year 23 prenatals have been visited, at the request of the family physician in some cases, and in others to see that the mothers register with doctors so that they may have adequate care.

Infants are visited as soon after birth as possible and followed at regular intervals. This also applies to preschools. One malnourished baby visited frequently at request of physician. This case was also reported by the sheriff's department. Preschool, with eczema, was admitted to hospital for treatment. This was necessary as mother did not follow physician's instructions.

No Well Child Conference has been held for the past two years as everyone was overworked in 1938 when 69 attended a conference one afternoon. Perhaps in the future several small clinics could be held throughout the year.

In May, tuberculin tests were given to 300. The majority of these were school children. The four reactors were x-rayed in June.

A meeting was held at the Academy with the School Superintendent and teachers to discuss school problems. Audiometer tests were given in October. 111 showed hearing defects. Home visits will be made to the reactors to see that they have had medical attention.

The Physiotherapist has been of great value in visiting homes of crippled children and helping with their exercises.
