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Warrant for Annual Town Meeting

SOMERSET, ss.

STATE OF MAINE

To Owen H. Rowe, a Constable in the town of Hartland in the
county of Somerset. Greeting:

In the name of the state of Maine, you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of the town of Hartland, in said county, qualified by law to vote in town affairs, to meet at the Opera House, in said town, on Monday, the ninth day of March, A. D. 1942, at ten o'clock in the forenoon, then and there to act on the following articles, namely:

Art. 1. To choose a moderator to preside at said meeting.

Art. 2. To hear and act upon the report of the selectmen, assessors and overseers of poor, treasurer, collector of taxes, superintendent of schools, road commissioner, town clerk and other officers.

Art. 3. To choose all necessary officers for the ensuing year.

Art. 4. To see if the town will vote to elect one or more road commissioners for the ensuing year.

Budget committee recommend pass.

Art. 5. To see if the town will vote to instruct the selectmen to appoint one or more road commissioners for the ensuing year.

Budget committee recommend yes.

Art. 6. To see if the town will vote to adopt the town agent form of government for the ensuing year, define his duties, fix his compensation, and act upon anything relating thereto.

Budget committee recommend yes.

Art. 7. To see if the town will vote to fix the compensation of all officers required herein to be elected or appointed for the ensuing year, that will not be acted upon in any following article, and fix the compensation for labor on town roads, and act upon anything relating thereto.

Budget committee recommend same as 1941, except labor on roads be the same as paid by the state for 1942.

Art. 8. To see if the town will vote to authorize its collector of taxes for the ensuing year to allow a discount for the early payment of taxes, fix the rate of discount and time of allowing the same, and appropriate a sum of money for the same.

Budget committee recommend pass article.

Art. 9. To see what action the town will take relating to the collection of taxes for the ensuing year.

Budget committee recommend same as 1941.

Art. 10. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$300.00, more or less, for abatement of taxes for the ensuing year.

Budget committee recommend yes.

Art. 11. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$7,500.00, more or less, for support of elementary schools for the ensuing year, including teachers' wages, fuel, janitors' services, conveyance, textbooks, reference books and school supplies, and to act upon anything relating thereto.

Budget committee recommend yes, \$7,500.00.

Art. 12. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$800.00, more or less, for repairs, equipment, and insurance on school buildings for the ensuing year.

Budget committee recommend yes, \$800.00.

Art. 13. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$400.00 for salary of superintendent of schools for the ensuing year.

Budget committee recommend yes, \$400.00.

Art. 14. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$45.00 for salary of the superintending school committee for the ensuing year.

Budget committee recommend yes, \$45.00.

Art. 15. To see if the town will vote to authorize the superintending school committee to employ a school physician for the ensuing year, and raise and appropriate the sum of \$100.00, more or less, for this purpose.

Budget committee recommend yes, and raise \$100.00.

Art. 16. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$400.00, to be used for the purpose of installing a stoker in the Academy building and extending the chimney on said building, providing that the Hartland Academy furnishes a like amount for this purpose.

Budget committee recommend yes.

Art. 17. To see if the town will vote to authorize its superintending school committee to contract with Hartland Academy, to furnish instruction to its high school pupils, and raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,800.00 for this purpose.

Budget committee recommend yes, \$2,800.00.

Art. 18. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,150.00 for pay of town officers for the ensuing year, including the town agent's salary of \$1,500.00.

Budget committee recommend yes.

Art. 19. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$925.00 for miscellaneous town charges, including rent of Opera House and selectmen's office for the ensuing year.

Budget committee recommend yes.

Art. 20. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$100.00 for repairs and insurance on town buildings, other than school property, for the ensuing year.

Budget committee recommend yes.

Art. 21. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$300.00 for Civilian Defense for the ensuing year.

Budget committee recommend yes.

Art. 22. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$800.00 for support of fire company and maintenance of fire alarm for the ensuing year.

Budget committee recommend yes.

Art. 23. To see what action the town will take regarding a contract with the Hartland Water Company to furnish water for town purposes, and raise and appropriate the sum of \$500.00 for this purpose, for the ensuing year.

Budget committee recommend \$500.00, and action be taken by voters.

Art. 24. To see what action the town will vote to take regarding moving the fire siren from the Davis block to the Hartland Mills Inc. building on the southside of Main street, and raise and appropriate the sum of \$51.00 for this purpose.

Budget committee recommend moving fire siren and raise \$51.00.

Art. 25. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$888.00 for street lights for the ensuing year.

Budget committee recommend yes.

Art. 26. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$100.00 to be expended on the lot opposite the Hartland Tanning Co., Inc., plant, said lot to be used as a parking lot.

Budget committee recommend yes.

Art. 27. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$50.00 for public health nursing in Hartland, said sum to be expended by the State Bureau of Health for local service.

Budget committee recommend yes.

Art. 28. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$875.00 for repairs to roads and bridges, cutting bushes, etc., other than village streets, for the ensuing year.

Budget committee recommend yes.

Art. 29. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$350.00 for maintenance of village streets and bridges, and applying bituminous surface treatment to the village streets that have previously been so treated.

Budget committee recommend yes.

Art. 30. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for state aid road construction (in addition to the amounts regularly raised for the care of ways, highways and bridges) under the provisions of section 19, chapter 28, revised statutes of 1930, or under the provisions of chapter 213, public laws of 1941.

Budget committee recommend a sum that will be matched by the state in the ratio of \$2.00 for each \$1.00 raised by the town.

Art. 31. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$495.00, or a sum not to exceed \$30.00 a mile, for maintenance of state aid highways for the ensuing year.

There has been no recommendation from the state highway commission, however, there are 16½ miles of state aid highways in Hartland which will necessitate the above sum, the budget committee have recommended this sum.

Art. 32. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$473.00 for the maintenance of the improved sections of the third class roads, or to be used in conjunction with the state apportionment for the construction of third class roads.

Budget committee recommend this amount, this being the amount necessary, as stated by the state highway commission.

Art. 33. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,200.00 for winter and spring roads, purchasing and maintaining snow fence, sanding highways or anything relating thereto.

Budget committee recommend \$1,200.00.

Art. 34. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$150.00 to build and repair sidewalks for the ensuing year.

Budget committee recommend yes.

Art. 35. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$50.00 for removal of snow from sidewalks for the ensuing year.

Budget committee recommend yes.

Art. 36. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,500.00 for support of poor, aid to dependent children (formerly mothers' aid), board and care of neglected children, and aid to veterans and veterans' dependents for the ensuing year.

Budget committee recommend yes.

Art. 37. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$400.00 for support of public library for the ensuing year.

Budget committee recommend yes.

Art. 38. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$50.00 for Memorial day purposes, said sum to be expended under the direction of the Christopher G. Linn Post, No. 141, A. L.

Budget committee recommend yes.

Art. 39. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$400.00 for general care of cemeteries for the ensuing year, said sum to be expended under the supervision of the Hartland Cemetery Association.

Budget committee recommend yes.

Art. 40. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$617.50 for payment of interest on school building bonds for the ensuing year.

Budget committee recommend yes.

Art. 41. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$900.00 for payment of interest on town debt and temporary loans for the ensuing year.

Budget committee recommend yes.

Art. 42. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,000.00 to retire two school bonds, number 17 and 18, maturing May 1, 1942.

Budget committee recommend yes.

Art. 43. To see if the town will vote to accept a deed from Hartland Mills Inc. for the building known as the "Old Carding Mill", now occupied by the Hartland Volunteer Fire Co.

Budget committee recommend yes.

Art. 44. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for advertising our natural resources, advantages and attractions, under the provisions of chapter 5, section 82, of the revised statutes of 1930, said sum to be expended under the direction of the State of Maine Publicity Bureau.

Budget committee recommend pass.

Art. 45. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$200.00 for the purpose of controlling the white pine blister rust disease in the town of Hartland, the above sum to be used for local labor, supplemented with state and federal funds, dependent upon funds made available by the co-operating agencies.

Budget committee recommend pass.

Art. 46. To see if the town will vote to authorize its selectmen and treasurer to hire money to refund the town debt, when in their judgment it seems best to do so.

Budget committee recommend yes.

Art. 47. To see what action the town will take regarding reduction of town debt for the ensuing year, or act upon anything relating thereto.

Budget committee recommend using excise taxes and unexpended balances.

Art. 48. To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen and treasurer to make temporary loans in anticipation of taxes and to issue and negotiate notes therefor, or renewals thereof, or any notes in place of the original notes when paid, to an amount which at any time shall not exceed in the aggregate the total tax levy of the preceding municipal year, all such notes to mature and to be paid during the municipal year in which they are issued out of money raised during such current year by taxes, in accordance with the provisions of R. S. Maine 1930, section 83, chapter 5, as amended.

Budget committee recommend yes.

Art. 49. To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen on behalf of the town to sell and dispose of any real estate acquired by the town for non-payment of taxes thereon, on such terms as they deem advisable, and to execute quit-claim deeds for such property.

Budget committee recommend yes.

Art. 50. To see if the town will vote to accept the sum of \$200.00 from E. A. Linn, conservator for Otho L. Linn, to be held in trust, the income to be used for care of William Linn lot, in Pine Grove Cemetery, being lot No. 20, also the sum of \$100.00 from Fred Palmer, to be held in trust, the income to be used for care of Sabrah Bennett lot in Pine Grove Cemetery, being lot No. 17, also the sum of \$100.00 from Fred Palmer, to be held in trust, the income to be used for care of Thomas Palmer lot in Pleasant Street Cemetery, being lot No. 49, and the sum of \$100.00 from Lena and Gertrude Davis, to be held in trust, the income to be used for care of Fred Davis lot in Pine Grove Cemetery, being lot No. 191.

Budget committee recommend yes.

Art. 51. To see if the town will vote to authorize the town clerk and moderator to appoint a committee of twelve citizens to co-operate with the selectmen in preparing and presenting at the next annual town meeting a budget for said meeting.

Budget committee recommend yes.

Art. 52. To see if the town will vote to discontinue the road leading from the Burrill road, so called, southerly past the so called Charles White farm, thence westerly to the Alfred Stafford farm.

Budget committee recommend yes.

Art. 53. To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen to take necessary action to discontinue the road from the residence of the late Moses Ames, (now occupied by Ernest McDougal) southwesterly, to the center of the bridge across the outlet of Morrill Pond, which is the Canaan town line.

Budget committee recommend yes.

Art. 54. To see if the town will vote to amend section 5, of article 4, of the town or traffic ordinance, adopted March 10, 1941, said section as amended shall read, "Allnight parking" so called, is prohibited on any street within the "built up" or "compact" section of the town, during the season when it becomes necessary to remove snow to make said streets passable.

Budget committee recommend yes.

Art. 55. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for purchase of a school bus.

Budget committee made no recommendation.

The selectmen hereby give notice that they will be in session at the above named hall and place on Monday, the day of said meeting, for the purpose of correcting the list of voters.

Report of Superintendent of Schools

February 20, 1942

To the Superintending School Committee and
the Citizens of Hartland:

I am pleased to submit my third annual report on the progress of your schools. The following table gives the information regarding the teachers, enrollment of pupils and attendance.

The total enrollment in the elementary schools is 31 more pupils than we had last year. In spite of the fact that we put the addition on the Pleasant street school and that Palmyra took most of their tuition pupils into their own schools, we were not able to help out our crowded condition to any extent.

REPAIRS

Extensive repair work was done to the Pleasant street school during the summer. The Webber school building was moved from its former location and made an addition to the Pleasant street building. The result is a much needed room which is very satisfactory. \$1,000.00 was appropriated for this project. Approximately \$1,050.00 was spent on the building outside the heating plant. The problem of heating the building was given much thought. The question was whether to build a chimney and use a stove, which would make three fires to attend, or to have a new central heating plant for all three rooms. It was finally decided to put in a new hot air furnace using a blower system to force the air through the building.

This plant cost the town \$650.00 installed. This heating plant will heat the whole building satisfactorily, if enough fuel is used.

The building also needed new plumbing. The old flushes, wooden framed sinks and unsanitary bubblers were replaced with new bowls, lavatories and bubblers. We have paid for part of this plumbing out of the regular repair account. The balance will have to be paid out of repair money appropriated this year. We also put in a new trough urinal in the Academy building. This was to replace the old unsanitary urinal. Repairs for next year should include rewiring the old rooms in the Pleasant street school for more efficient lighting. Also wiring the Fullers corner school building for lights.

SCHOOL LUNCHESES

I would like to see a hot school lunch, served at noon, to our bus children next year. It should begin in November and be carried through until warm weather. This can be done if parents and organizations show enough interest. Surrounding towns are doing some fine things for their children at noon. If we can get surplus commodities, W.P.A. cooks and helpers and the children will pay five cents a meal, a full course dinner could be served. If any club or organization cares to participate in this project please contact me. If you feel that there is interest and time enough for another organization in town, such as a Parent-Teachers Association, I would be glad to help get it organized. This organization is helpful regarding school matters. It is like all other clubs, you get out of it exactly

what you put into it. If you feel that there is a need of such an organization here, please make it known.

SCHOOL BUS

We have been informed from higher sources that the school bus situation is acute. The chance of getting a new bus in 1942 is fair if the order is placed in the near future. I believe that we must purchase a new bus this year. Also that we should still keep the old bus. The trade-in allowance of the old bus would be very little and it would be on hand in case of an emergency.

BUDGET

At the public budget meeting I was given the impression that the per capita cost in the elementary schools had been greatly increased since my arrival as superintendent of schools. If this is the consensus of opinion around town please compare the figures for the fiscal year ending February 10, 1939, (the year previous to my coming as superintendent), and the fiscal year ending February 10, 1942. From the town reports of these years you will find the following figures for elementary schools.

The above figures are for comparison only. They prove to me that the per capita costs, basis of total enrollment and maintenance were less for the past year than they were previous to my coming to Hartland. The latest available statistics on a state-wide basis of total enrollment and maintenance show that the per capita costs are \$41.77 or approximately \$6.75 per pupil more than the town of Hartland expends for common schools. \$6.75 multiplied by the present enrollment of 266 pupils would mean approximately \$1,795.50 more for elementary schools. This increased appropriation would enable the committee to add other teachers to our present force, thus bringing the teacher load to somewhere near normal. The school

committee would be able to pay their teachers a salary equal to the average salary for elementary teachers in the state of Maine. By doing this the town would not be exceeding the state per capita cost of elementary schools.

Report of Public Health Nursing Service

"The health of the child is the strength of the nation" could be the slogan for public health nurses. Whatever is done to improve physical and mental health during the prenatal, infancy, childhood and youth periods will help secure better health for the community. For this reason we stress particularly the work with the pregnant mother, the infant and the pre-school child in our program. Therefore we try to contact the expectant mothers as early as possible. Some are reported by their physicians, some by neighbors, relatives or friends. When the physicians report these cases we visit them to help them carry out their instructions. Those not reported by physicians are seen to advise them to secure early care during pregnancy and to help them with their plans. Only two visits are made to those without medical care. If on the third visit it is found that a physician has not been engaged then visits are discontinued.

Visits are usually made monthly to the town clerk to secure a list of new babies recorded. Infant mortality is greatest during the first month so we try to contact these infants as early as possible. We plan to visit infants and pre-school children regularly in an effort to keep them under medical supervision and to discuss immunization against smallpox and diphtheria. In the past year work and much time has been spent on neglected and malnourished children with little progress made. One infant died because it was not possible to watch the family all the time.

School visits are made to help the teachers with their problems, check on children with doubtful hearing and vision, to encourage hot lunches especially during the winter months and to carry out a general immunization program. Homes are visited to discuss needed corrections with parents. In towns where school work is done the school superintendent is visited during the summer or early in the school year to learn his plans for the year. We also are working on a plan for group meetings of teachers and nurses in the various district for exchange of ideas.

Selectmen are visited frequently to discuss problems.

Beside work of the kind mentioned above a child has been referred to pediatric services for diagnosis. Visits have been

made to children carried by the Crippled Children's services to see if instructions have been followed, to learn reasons for not attending clinic and to plan for further treatment. Appointments have also been made for vision examination and corrections.

Arrangements were made for reactors from tuberculin tests in 1939 to return for second x-rays.

Plans for next year should include an immunization program against diphtheria, and for repeating tuberculin tests if possible. A large number of pupils have already been vaccinated against smallpox.
