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Warrant for Annual Town Meeting

SOMERSET, ss.

STATE OF MAINE

To Owen H. Rowe, a Constable in the Town of Hartland in
the County of Somerset. Greeting:

In the name of the State of Maine, you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of the Town of Hartland, in said county, qualified by law to vote in town affairs, to meet at the Opera House, in said town, on Monday, the eighth day of March, A. D. 1943, at ten o'clock in the forenoon, then and there to act on the following articles, to wit:

Art. 1. To choose a moderator to preside at said meeting.

Art. 2. To hear, and act upon the report of the selectmen, assessors and overseers of poor, treasurer, collector of taxes, superintendent of schools, road commissioners, town clerk and other town officers.

Art. 3. To choose all necessary officers for the ensuing year.

Art. 4. To see if the town will vote to elect one or more road commissioners for the ensuing year.

Budget committee recommend pass.

Art. 5. To see if the town will vote to instruct the selectmen to appoint one or more road commissioners for the ensuing year.

Budget committee recommend yes.

Art. 6. To see if the town will vote to adopt the town agent form of government for the ensuing year, define his duties, fix his compensation, and act upon anything relating thereto.

Budget committee recommend yes.

Art. 7. To see if the town will vote to fix the salary of the selectmen at \$5.00 a day, the treasurer's salary at \$150.00 a year and the town clerk at \$50.00 a year.

Budget committee recommend yes.

Art. 8. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$3,000.00 for pay of town officers for the ensuing year, including the town agent's salary of \$2,000.00.

Budget committee recommend yes.

Art. 9. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$800.00 for miscellaneous town charges, for the ensuing year, including rent of Opera House and selectmen's office.

Budget committee recommend yes.

Art. 10. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$300.00, more or less, for repairs and insurance on town buildings for the ensuing year.

Budget committee recommend yes.

Art. 11. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500.00, more or less, for civilian defense for the ensuing year.

Budget committee recommend yes.

Art. 12. To see if the town will vote to authorize its collector of taxes for the ensuing year to allow a discount for the early payment of taxes, or act upon anything relating thereto.

Budget committee recommend no.

Art. 13. To see what action the town will take relating to the collection of taxes for the ensuing year.

Budget committee recommend same as 1942.

Art. 14. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$200.00, more or less, for abatement of taxes for the ensuing year.

Budget committee recommend yes, \$200.00.

Art. 15. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$8,500.00, more or less, for support of elementary schools for the ensuing year, including teachers' wages, fuel, janitors' services, conveyance, textbooks, reference books and school supplies, and to act upon anything relating thereto.

Budget committee recommend yes.

Art. 16. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$525.00, more or less, for repairs, equipment, and insurance on school buildings and equipment for the ensuing year.

Budget committee recommend yes.

Art. 17. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$425.00, more or less for salary of superintendent of schools for the ensuing year.

Budget committee recommend yes, \$425.00.

Art. 18. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$75.00, more or less, for salary of superintending school committee, for the ensuing year.

Budget committee recommend yes, \$75.00.

Art. 19. To see if the town will vote to authorize the superintending school committee to employ a school physician for the ensuing year, and raise the sum of \$100.00, more or less for this purpose.

Budget committee recommend yes, \$100.00.

Art. 20. To see if the town will vote to authorize its superintending school committee to contract with Hartland Academy, to furnish instruction to its high school pupils, and raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,800, more or less, for high school tuition, or act upon anything relating thereto.

Budget committee made no recommendation, owing to lack of necessary information regarding tuition rate for 1943.

Art. 21. To see what action the town will vote to take regarding school lunches for the ensuing year, and what sum of money they will vote to raise and appropriate for this purpose, if any.

Budget committee recommend hot lunches.

Art. 22. To see if the town will vote to cancel the obligation of the Hartland Volunteer Fire Co., said obligation having been incurred in the purchase of the "PUMPER" now being used by the fire company, the amount of said obligation is now \$964.00.

Budget committee recommend yes.

Art. 23. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$550.00, more or less, for support of Fire Department for the ensuing year.

Budget committee recommend yes, \$550.00.

Art. 24. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500.00, more or less, to pay the Hartland Water Co. for water for town uses for the ensuing year, and hydrant rental.

Budget committee recommend yes.

Art. 25. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$880.00, for street lighting for the ensuing year.

Budget committee recommend yes.

Art. 26. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$50.00 for public health nursing in Hartland, said sum to be expended by the State Bureau of Health, for local service.

Budget committee recommend yes.

Art. 27. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,200.00, more or less, for repairs to roads and bridges, cutting bushes, etc., other than village streets, for the ensuing year.

Budget committee recommend yes.

Art. 28. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500.00, more or less, for maintaining the village streets and bridges for the ensuing year, and applying bituminous surface treatment, if possible, to such streets that have been previously so treated.

Budget committee recommend yes.

Art. 29. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for state aid road construction (in addition to the amounts regularly raised for the care of ways, highways and bridges) under the provisions of Section 19, Chapter 28, Revised Statutes of 1930, or under the provisions of Chapter 213, Public Laws of 1941.

Budget committee recommend one and one-half units \$799.50, if funds are available from the State.

Art. 30. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$495.00, or a sum not to exceed \$30.00 a mile, for maintenance of state aid highways for the ensuing year.

Budget committee recommend \$495.00.

Art. 31. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$467.00 for maintenance of improved sections of the third class roads, or to be used in conjunction with the state apportionment for the construction of third class roads.

Budget committee recommend yes.

Art. 32. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,500.00, more or less, for winter and spring roads, purchasing and maintaining snow fence, sanding highways or anything relating thereto.

Budget committee recommend yes.

Art. 33. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$50.00 for removal of snow from sidewalks for the ensuing year.

Budget committee recommend yes.

Art. 34. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,800.00 for support of poor, A. D. C. (formerly mother's aid), board and care of neglected children and aid to veterans and veterans' dependents.

Budget committee recommend yes.

Art. 35. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$400.00 for support of public library for the ensuing year.

Budget committee recommend yes.

Art. 36. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$50.00, more or less, for Memorial day purposes, said sum to be expended under the direction of the Christopher G. Linn Post No. 141, A. L.

Budget committee recommend yes, \$50.00.

Art. 37. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$400.00 for general care of cemeteries for the ensuing year, said sum to be expended under the supervision of the Hartland Cemetery Association.

Budget committee recommend yes, \$400.00.

Art. 38. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$900.00 for payment of interest on school building bonds, refunding bonds and temporary loans.

Budget committee recommend yes.

Art. 39. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$3,285.03 to retire two school bonds, number 19 and 20, maturing May 1, 1943, also two refunding bonds number 1 and 2 maturing August 1, 1943; this being the sum necessary in addition to the number 8 dividend of 5%, in the amount of \$713.97, on the school bonds.

Budget committee recommend yes.

Art. 40. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$200.00 to cooperate with the Maine Forest Service and the Federal Government in the control of the White Pine Blister Rust in accordance with Revised Statutes, Chap. 11, Secs. 62-63 and 64.

Budget committee recommend pass.

Art. 41. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money, if any, to assist in defraying the expenses of the Maine State Guard Reserves.

Budget committee made no recommendation, this article was not presented for consideration.

Art. 42. To see if the town will vote to authorize its selectmen on behalf of the town to sell and dispose of the "Gilbert Place" so called, situated in the Town of Hartland and Canaan, on such terms as they deem advisable, and execute a warranty deed for the same.

Budget committee recommend yes.

Art. 43. To see if the town will vote to authorize its selectmen on behalf the town to sell and dispose of certain piece of land, on Pittsfield Avenue, between the road or private way leading from Pittsfield Avenue to Hunter-Rhoades saw mill, and the Maine Central Right of Way, approximately 80 by 400 feet, to Hunter-Rhoades Lumber Co. on such terms as they deem advisable, and execute a warranty deed for the same, or act upon anything relating thereto.

Budget committee recommend yes.

Art. 44. To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen and treasurer to make temporary loans in anticipation of taxes and to issue and negotiate notes therefor, or renewals thereof, or any notes in place of the original notes when paid, to an amount which shall not at any time exceed in the aggregate the total tax levy of the preceding municipal year, all such notes to mature and to be paid during the municipal year in which they are issued out of money raised during such current year by taxes, in accordance with the provisions of the R. S. Maine 1930, Section 83, Chapter 5, as amended.

Budget committee recommend yes.

Art. 45. To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen on behalf of the town to sell and dispose of any real estate acquired by the town for non-payment of taxes thereon, on such terms as they deem advisable, and to execute quitclaim deeds for such property.

Budget committee recommend yes.

Art. 46. To see if the town will vote to rescind the vote of the town at its Annual Meeting holden March 12, 1917, whereby the town voted to accept in trust the sum of \$100.00, the income to be expended for perpetual care of Rebecca Larrabee's cemetery lot by some person named by the Judge of our Probate Court.

Art. 47. To see if the town will vote to accept the sum of \$50.00 from Charles F. Wilbur, to be held in trust, the income to be used for care of said Wilbur's lot in Pine Grove Cemetery, being one-half of lot No. 207, also the sum of \$300.00 from Rita Palumbo, Executrix of Myra Miller's estate, the income to be used for care of A. W. Miller lot in Pine Grove Cemetery, being lot No. 75, also the sum of \$100.00 from Doris Marr, the income to be used for care of west one-half of lot No. 234, being the Marr lot, also the sum of \$100.00 as described in the preceding article, the income to be used for care of Rebecca Larrabee's lot in Pine Grove Cemetery, being lot No. 29, or act upon anything relating thereto.

Budget committee recommend yes.

Art. 48. To see if the town will vote to authorize the town clerk and moderator to appoint a committee of twelve citizens to cooperate with the selectmen in preparing and presenting at the next annual town meeting a budget for said meeting.

Budget committee recommend yes.

Art. 49. To see if the town will vote to discontinue the road leading from the Burrill road, so called, southerly past the so called Charles White farm, thence westerly to the Alfred Stafford farm.

Budget committee recommend yes.

Art. 50. To see if the town will vote to authorize its selectmen on behalf of the town to sell and dispose of a piece of land, on Pittsfield Avenue, between Pittsfield Avenue and the road or private way leading from Pittsfield Avenue to Hunter-Rhoades saw mill, being the parcel just north of the new sand shed, on such terms as they deem advisable, and execute a warranty deed for the same, or act upon anything relating thereto.

Budget committee did not consider this article, it was not available.

Art. 51. To see if the town will adopt an ordinance regulating the construction of buildings, and providing for the appointment and duties of a building inspector.

Budget committee recommend yes.

Art. 52. To see if the town will vote to withdraw the town's checking account from the Depositors Trust Company, Skowhegan and deposit the same in the First National Bank, Pittsfield, Me.

The selectmen hereby give notice that they will be in session at the above named hall and place on Monday, the day of said meeting, for the purpose of correcting the list of voters.

In accordance with the request of your municipal officers, this department, represented by R. M. Parsons, has completed an examination of the accounts of your town officials for the municipal year ending February 10, 1942.

Our report herewith submitted, was prepared from your town records, and to the best of our knowledge and belief, properly reflects the true financial condition of your municipality as of that date; subject however to a probable shrinkage in the final settlement of unpaid taxes, and to a probable 100% shrinkage in the impounded cash.

COMMENTS

All cash as received was properly deposited.

Expenditures were made by check from properly authorized warrants.

The check book balance was reconciled with the bank. Cash on hand, in the amount of \$12.86, was not verified, but by a later verification of the cash balance, it appeared to be correct as of February 10, 1942.

TAXES:

The 1941 tax commitment was added, and after an adjustment of \$.30 was made, it agreed with the Assessor's records. The total commitment was accounted for by cash to the Treasurer, abatements and discounts, or was uncollected as shown by your town report for the year ending February 10, 1942. The prior years uncollected taxes were checked, and accounted for by cash to the Treasurer, abatements, and taxes still uncollected, which are shown in your town report for the year ending February 10, 1942.

TAX LIENS AND DEEDS:

All tax liens and deeds were checked and reconciled, and all payments appeared to be properly recorded. Inasmuch as the annual report shows uncollected taxes, tax liens and deeds in detail, they are not included in this report.

EXCISE TAXES:

The excise taxes were checked and were found as reported. The trust fund investments were examined and listed as reported in your town report. All income appeared to have been properly accounted for.

GENERAL:

A partial check was made of paid bills, payrolls and cancelled checks, and as far as our examination went, all appeared to be proper charges and correctly recorded.

The dog tax records were examined and found to be properly accounted for.

With the exception of cash and trust funds, no external verification was made of your asset or liability account.

Report of School Physician

380 pupils were examined in Hartland schools during 1942 session.

The predominating correctable disabilities were listed and the parents notified.

Schools which previously had a school physician were notably freer from illness due to correction at an earlier date, as urged by their previous school medical attendant, C. A. Moulton of Hartland, through whose tireless efforts, their health was made more secure for the future.

How can we further safeguard our children's future?

First, as noted at the time of their examination a correction of dietary deficiency. In other words, see that they eat the right kind of foods.

All children should have either orange, grapefruit, tomato, or pineapple juice at least once a day. Three out of every five children show evidence of vitamin C deficiency in school. Vitamin B, a second offender, due to its lack, as shown by our examination can be supplied by ingestion of bread, vegetables, meat, eggs, coarse cereals, milk, etc.

Vitamin D lack as shown by faulty bone formation and poor teeth in many instances might well be supplied by some form of cod liver oil.

Secondly, the teeth of many children are poor—a trouble which the parents should seek to correct. Here we should give them food which they have to chew—not prepare food that is soft and goes down easy without chewing. Cod liver oil should be given, if possible, winter and summer. Exposure to the sun is very important in the summer, that is, get their clothes off if in any way possible in the summer months.

Milk should be given freely and in some form or other to the amount of a pint to a quart daily. This supplies the necessary minerals to make strong teeth and bones. I am sorry to see that milk has been removed from the schools this past year. In my opinion there is no substitute for pure wholesome milk in building strong bodies and alert minds. Therefore, I would recommend that an effort be made to have this useful food included as a part of each and every school's curriculum.

Not only buy your child a toothbrush but see that he or she

uses it twice daily. This forms a massage of the gums which is necessary for good teeth.

Thirdly, many parents will note that their children have been marked on their throat and hearing. A child who has had abscesses in his or her ears in the past, definitely will have a recurrence of the same if the cause is not removed. Frequent "gatherings" or ear abscesses means difficult hearing and often paves the way to mastoid and more serious difficulties. If the adenoids are removed a child usually does not have recurring abscesses of the ear as that is the most common cause of this condition in an indirect way. Hence removal of tonsils and adenoids usually help prevent subsequent ear disease and improve ear disease of long standing.

Fourthly, have your child take all inoculations and tests as recommended by the State Department of Health. This helps prevent epidemics and will do no harm to the child—every child should be inoculated against smallpox, diphtheria, and typhoid fever.

Fifthly, I further recommend a better system of ventilation for the schoolrooms. In many instances the windows are opened directly on the pupils when a change of air is indicated. Further, the screening of the windows to prevent flies and other insects will help many of the schools to have fewer empty seats due to illness. Many schools have non-adjustable seats which indirectly affect your child's health due to the fact they do not fit the seat, hence poor posture and poor health. Some schools have poor lighting systems, in which the black board is mottled or shaded. This too should be corrected.

In summarizing may I impress you with the fact that "an ounce of prevention is worth a pound of cure". If we wish to prevent future troubles to our children by giving them the right diet, rest, school surroundings, and hygiene we are doing well for them not only for today but for years to come where they will need their healthy bodies and minds to meet the future and have a much better chance than any of us had.

Report of the Public Health Nurse

1942

Frequently we, as Public Health Nurses, are asked this question, "Just what do you do?" Perhaps the reason we hear this so often is that we do not advertise ourselves enough. To the following we are well known; families with babies and small children and many with school children; selectmen; health officers; town clerks; and teachers. However families without children as a rule, have little knowledge of our work. Therefore, this year, in my report I will try and explain more about what we do.

Our work as Public Health Nurses is an effort to insure that every baby is born healthy, is kept in good health throughout the childhood and school years by adequate nutrition, prevention of communicable diseases, good dental care, correction of possible defects and good clean housing. The adult which this child becomes, cannot help but be more healthy than one who has not had this care.

Therefore you will be interested to know that in your town during the past year visits have been made to fourteen expectant mothers and to thirty-one infants. Health supervision was given to fifty-seven preschool children. School children have been seen in school followed by home visits when necessary. Audiometer tests for hearing were given in all schools to three hundred and ninety-one pupils and follow-up visits are being made to those with hearing defects. One service rendered to school children, that cannot be measured in figures, are the conferences the Public Health Nurse has held with the teachers concerning the growth and development of the school child and planning for health protection services.

Children with orthopedic defects have either been seen at the Crippled Children's Clinics or visited to help the mothers carry out clinic recommendations or to encourage them to attend clinics when they receive notification. In addition to the above work there is a constant effort on the part of the nurse to plan for community protection. The war has made this more important than ever.

Smallpox vaccinations were given in February to one hundred and thirty-two and diphtheria toxoid was given to two hundred and thirty-four. A second dose of toxoid will be given

as soon as possible to insure immunization. Typhoid inoculations were given in July to about three hundred.

Future plans include follow-up work with children found with defects during the school physician's inspections. It is hoped that several tonsil clinics can be held when the weather is warmer.

The cooperation the selectmen, health officer and town clerk have given the Public Health Nurse has been invaluable.

The work of the nurse could be greatly enhanced and a great deal of time saved for the town by the organization of a permanent Local Health Committee. With such a committee your nurse could another year plan better health protection for your community.
