Report of Public Health Nurse

ANNUAL REPORT FOR HARTLAND

January 1, to December 31, 1949

Division of Public Health Nursing

Health is now defined as a state of complete physical well-being, not merely the absence of disease or infirmity. Healthy development of the child is of basic importance. The ability to live harmoniously in a changing world is essential to such development.

Through the development of a Health Council, composed of all groups interested in child health, your community could find ways of working together to provide the best kind of nursing service for the future. Only through joint action can problems be solved and real progress take place.

Since it is recognized that care during the prenatal period greatly influences the health of the mother and baby, visits have been made to prenatal and postnatal mothers, as well as infants and pre-school children.

Three very successful Child Health Conferences, sponsored by the P.T.A., had a total attendance of 79. Diphtheria and tetanus immunizations were given to 29 children, 27 had the whooping cough inoculations and 12 were vaccinated against smallpox.

In the school health program your nurse has continued to serve in an advisory capacity. Home visits have been made to children referred by the teachers because of some special problem. This has meant a more concentrated service to those children actually needing nursing supervision.

Services of the Department of Health and Welfare Crippled Children Clinics have been available to those who were referred by their family physician.

Your nurse is grateful for the cooperation of the physician, P.T.A., school personnel and the general public.

School Physician's Report

The general health of the children of the Hartland schools was found by examination to be good in the 1949-1950 school year. Many defects have been corrected that heretofore existed thus laying the foundation for better health in the days to come.

Light, heat, and ventilation have been improved upon thus making working conditions better.

Cumulative records were not available for comparison of previous years.

Much controversy has resulted in the School Boards of the various towns regarding health examinations. To these might I say that a proper examination room is not provided to allow the removal of a child's clothing, the latter which I do not believe is practical or prudent unless indicated. If necessary to remove all clothing, arrangements can be made for these children to report, with their parents, to the school physician's office free of charge or their own family physician might be consulted.

The average lesion which causes crippling and death-producing results should be picked up in a routine examination without the removal of all clothing, as suggested. Certainly the major catastrophies can be averted.

It was planned by the various school boards to remove clothing and examine all children once in three years, i.e., several grades each year. In this manner a child would be seen every three to six years. Many preventable conditions would not be discovered by this method as many adverse conditions might not be discovered in this lapse of years.

Personally I believe the school physician, whoever he or she might be, should be invited to at least one School Board meeting per year to converse on child health.

Correctable maladies and potential health hazards should be referred to your school physician via the Superintendent of Schools' office. In the child whose parents cannot afford to pay for the correction of conditions, I am sure a means would be provided that these children can enjoy good health. I certainly would be only too glad to assist all I can.

Report of Superintendent of Schools

To the School Committee and Citizens of Hartland:

This is my fourth annual report on your schools.

As I have now left the employ of your school system, I would like to make this report of a review in nature.

I can speak only in commendation of the citizens of Hartland. The following analysis will be unbiased and sincere in nature.

Your town boasts of a good school system insofar as the curriculum is concerned. You have a fine teaching force and it seems as though it improves each year. The encouragement for "In Service" training does much to keep teachers abreast of the times. The addition of Miss Doris Johnson and the return of Mrs. Edythe Libby, improved our strength this year. As for your teachers, I give them my whole-hearted endorsement.

As for the physical aspects of your school system, I believe your town has made a great step forward. When the new school is erected, Hartland will truly move much closer to the realm of idealism.

The financial outlay may seem large but one should weigh the results against this sacrifice before criticizing. Since the elementary school is the basis for all future learning, there cannot be too great an emphasis placed upon it. What more people need is to see at first hand what the schools offer and then greater respect would be held for the cost. When you consider the youngsters of all of the people when they first enter your schools and then you observe these same individuals as they graduate from our schools, you can readily observe that a great change has been accomplished.

In closing this report, I wish to pay respect to your town as a whole for its excellent spirit of cooperation during my three years as your school administrator. I have never found a chore

too large but that some group was always ready to help. Your youngsters were cooperative at all times. The teachers have earned for themselves a place of high respect in my esteem. The school committee have been my closest advisors and I have found them ready at all times to help whenever same was needed. My stay in your town will long hold pleasant memories for me.

To Harold A. Emery, a Constable of the Town of Hartland in
the County of Somerset, GREETING:

In the name of the State of Maine you are hereby required to notify and warn the Inhabitants of the Town of Hartland in said County, qualified by law to vote in town affairs to meet and assemble at the Opera House in said town on Monday, the thirteenth day of March, A. D. 1950 at ten o'clock in the forenoon, then and there to act upon the following articles, namely:

Art. 1. To choose a Moderator to preside at said meeting.

Art. 2. To hear and act upon the report of the municipal officers, and other town officers.

Art. 3. To see if the town will vote to adopt the Town Agent form of government for the ensuing year, authorize its selectmen to appoint such agent, fix his compensation, define his duties, and to act upon anything relating thereto.

Budget committee recommends yes.

Art. 4. To choose all necessary Town Officers.

Art. 5. To see if the town will vote to elect one or more Road Commissioners.

Budget committee recommends no.

Art. 6. To see if the town will vote to instruct its selectmen to appoint one or more Road Commissioners for the ensuing year.

Budget committee made no recommendation.

Art. 7. To see if the town will vote to pay the state rate for laborers, foremen and trucks on any town work, and \$200 yearly for the selectmen, \$150 for town treasurer, \$100 for town clerk, and \$100 for fire chief.

Budget committee recommends yes.

Art. 8. To see if the town will vote to fix May 1, as the date when poll taxes shall be due and payable, and December 1, as the date when other taxes shall be due and payable, and authorize its collector to collect interest at 6% from October 1, 1950 on all taxes for the current year remaining unpaid on December 1, 1950, and credit all such sums received therefrom to the payment of interest on town debts for the ensuing year.

Budget committee recommends yes.

Art. 9. To see if the town will vote to authorize its tax collector to allow a discount for early payment of taxes, and if so what rate.

Budget committee recommends no.

Art. 10. To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen and treasurer to procure loans in anticipation of taxes and to issue notes therefor, or renewals thereof, in accordance with Section 96 of Chapter 80 of the Revised Statutes of 1944 as amended.

Budget committee recommends yes.

Art. 11. To see if the town will vote to authorize and empower the selectmen to sell and convey property acquired by the town by tax process, on such terms as they deem advisable, and execute quitclaim deeds for such property.

Budget committee recommends yes.

Art. 12. To see what sum the town will vote to raise and appropriate for salaries of Town Officers.

Budget committee recommends \$3,500.00.

Art. 13. To see what sum the town will vote to raise and appropriate for Town Expenses, including rents, repairs and insurance, etc., other than school buildings, audit and contingent expense items.

Budget committee recommends \$1,600.00.

Art. 14. to see what sum the town will vote to raise for Hydrant Rental, etc.

Budget committee recommends \$520.00.

Art. 15. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$100.00 for Public Health Nursing in Hartland. Said sum to be expended for local health service, by the Maine Department of Health and Welfare.

Budget committee recommends yes.

Art. 16. To see what sum the town will vote to raise and appropriate for maintenance and improvement of the Town Dump.

Budget committee recommends \$1,500.00

Art. 17. To see what sum the town will vote to raise and appropriate for application of gravel and bituminous surface to Blake, Seekins and North Streets.

Budget committee recommends \$1,700.00.

Art. 18. To see if the town will vote to have a Street Light installed on the Canaan Road or State Aid Road No. 2, near the residence of Vernard V. Stedman, on pole No. 016 of the Central Maine Power Co.

Budget committee recommends yes.

Art. 19. To see what sum the town will vote to raise and appropriate for Street Lighting for the ensuing year.

Budget committee recommends \$1,350.00.

Art. 20. To see what sum the town will vote to raise and appropriate for maintenance of and purchase of equipment for the Volunteer Fire Company and Fire Department.

Budget committee recommends \$1,200.00.

Art. 21. To see what sum the town will vote to raise and appropriate for repairing and maintenance of Town Roads and Bridges and Cutting Bushes (other than village streets).

Budget committee recommends \$2,000.00.

Art. 22. To see what sum the town will vote to raise and appropriate for repairs and maintenance of Village Streets.

Budget committee recommends \$500.00.

Art. 23. To see what sum the town will vote to raise and appropriate for Snow Removal, Sanding Highways, Maintaining Snow Fence or anything relating to winter roads.

Art. 24. To see what sum the town will vote to raise and appropriate for State Aid Road construction (in addition to the amounts regularly raised for the care of ways, highways, and bridges) under the provisions of Section 25, Chapter 20, of the Revised Statutes of 1944 as amended.

Art. 25. To see what sum the town will vote to raise and appropriate for removal of snow from sidewalks.

Budget committee recommends \$200.00.

Art. 26. To see what sum the town will vote to raise and appropriate for CHARITIES and CORRECTIONS, etc.

Budget committee recommends \$2,500.00.

Art. 27. To see what sum the town will vote to raise and appropriate for Repairing and Constructing Sidewalks.

Art. 28. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$45.00, the same to be expended under the provisions of Chapter 37, Section 24, of the Revised Statutes of 1944.

Art. 34. To see what sum the town will vote to raise and appropriate for Memorial Day, any sum to be expended under the direction of Christopher G. Linn Post, No. 141, A. L.

Budget committee recommends \$100.00.

Art. 35. To see what sum the town will vote to raise and appropriate for general care of cemeteries, any sum to be expended under the supervision of the Hartland Cemetery Association, so-called.

Budget committee recommends \$500.00.

Art. 36. To see what sum the town will vote to raise and appropriate for payment of interest on debt and tax notes, in addition to any amount of interest collected on taxes and tax liens.
