IMPORTANT NOTICE

All taxpayers should read the following and comply with it.
Section 35, Chapter 81, Revised Statutes of 1944.

Before making an assessment, the assessors shall give seasonable notice in writing to the inhabitants, by posting notifications in some public place in town, or shall notify them, in such other way as the town directs, to make and bring into them true and perfect lists of their polls and all their estates real and personal, not by law exempt from taxation, of which they were possessed on the first day of April of the same year. If any resident owner after such notice, or any non-resident owner after being reasonably requested thereto by the assessors, does not bring in such list he is thereby barred of his right to make application to the assessors or the county commissioners for any abatement of his taxes, unless he offers such list with his application and satisfies them that he was unable to offer it at the time appointed. The request upon non-resident owners may be proved by a notice sent by the assessors to the last known address of the taxpayer or given by any other method that brings notice home to the taxpayer.

Report of Public Health Nursing

ANNUAL REPORT FOR HARTLAND

January 1, to December 31, 1950

Division of Public Health Nursing

Good Health, both physical and mental, should be the birth-right of every child. We can hope to reach this objective only by combining all our efforts and using every available resource. An active Health Council, which would coordinate the health work already being done in your community, would be invaluable in furthering your efforts.

During the summer the P.T.A. sponsored three Child Health Conferences where the children attending were examined by a physician. The attendance this summer was small due to the whooping cough epidemic. Eleven children were inoculated against diphtheria, whooping cough, and tetanus, and nine were vaccinated against smallpox.

To promote adequate health for both mother and child home visits have been made to mothers before and following delivery and also to infants and preschool children.

An important part of the school health program has been the home visits made by your nurse to help the families plan for correction of defects and to assist them in securing and maintaining the best possible health for the school child. Audiometer hearing tests were given in the schools this fall with excellent results. The new Grammar School with all pupils under one roof, and the hot lunch room, is a definite health advancement.

Clinics for Pediatric, Crippled Children, Cardiac, Speech, and Mental Hygiene Services are made available by the State Department of Health and Welfare. These clinics have been found to be of benefit to children in this community who have been referred by their family physicians for these services.

In July, also through the facilities of the State Department of Health and Welfare, chest x-rays were available for those needing them at the x-ray clinic in Newport. The services of the State Sanatorium were available to those referred for diagnosis, x-ray and medical care.

The help that has been given and the interest shown in the Public Health Nursing Program in your community has been greatly appreciated.

All teachers seem contented and happy—the students are proud of their new institution and volunteer to help keep it in good condition.

Health, in general, was found to be good—disabilities were noted and forwarded to the parents.

I still suggest an examining room which may also be set up for first aid. This will help the physician do a more thorough examination as well as provide a place to treat minor injuries and isolate illness.

Again the town should be proud of their school and indebted deeply to those who brought about the creation of that school whether or not they agree entirely on the program followed. These people gave their time and effort to the best of their ability that our children might enjoy a better chance.

Report of Superintendent of Schools

To the School Committee and Citizens of Hartland:

It is with pleasure that I submit my first report on your schools. This past year has been very eventful as far as your schools are concerned. During the year the new, modern and very practical consolidated school was completed and occupied by all grades. You are all familiar by now with the organization of your school. The citizens of Hartland have something to be proud of because you have afforded the pupils with the physical advantages of an elementary education, comparable to those of any community in the State. It is now up to those people concerned with the administration of the schools to see that modern books, supplies and equipment are made available for the use of the pupils and also to see that the teaching personnel is the best that can be hired for the salaries paid.

To complete the whole program now, a storage building large enough to house three buses should be erected as soon as possible. I feel certain that such a building, over the years, would be a wise investment, money could be saved on minor repairs to the buses, besides, properly housing would prolong the life of a bus.

Financially, the schools are on a sound basis with the exception of the repair and equipment account. During the period of change over supplies and equipment were needed. The P.T.A. helped out on equipment for the lunch program. I would like to take this opportunity to thank the P.T.A. and all people that have aided in organizing this program. I feel that you would have to travel a long way before you would find a better School Lunch, served in a more efficient and pleasant environment.

The repair and equipment account is overdrawn this year because it was necessary to purchase some equipment that we had not anticipated and also that much more repair work was done on the Academy building than was budgeted for. However, in both instances, the repair work and equipment needs will be much less for sometime to come.

For the coming year, we have anticipated increasing costs in both the Elementary school budget and Secondary school budget. Our teaching force must be given an increase in pay and we already know that we must pay more for books and supplies. We have been told that we can expect an increase in Secondary tuition beginning next September.

Soon we must replace both of the present school buses. This year we are asking for an appropriation of \$500 under conveyance to add to the bus depreciation account.

In conclusion I wish to express my appreciation to all for your cooperation during the past year.

To Maurice E. Hall, a Constable of the Town of Hartland in
the County of Somerset, Greetings:

In the name of the State of Maine, you are hereby required to notify and warn the Inhabitants of the Town of Hartland in said County, qualified by law to vote in town affairs to meet and assemble at the Opera House (Avon Theatre) in said town on Monday, the twelfth day of March, A. D. 1951, at ten o'clock in the forenoon, then and there to act upon the following articles, namely:

Art. 1. To choose a Moderator to preside at said meeting.

Art. 2. To choose a Clerk for the ensuing year.

Art. 3. To consider and act upon the report of the municipal officers, and other town officers.

Art. 4. To see if the town will vote to adopt the Town Agent form of government for the ensuing year, authorize its selectmen to appoint such agent, fix his compensation, define his duties, and to act upon anything relating thereto.

Budget committee recommends yes.

Art. 5. To see if the town will vote to elect one selectman for a term of one year; one for a term of two years and one for three years at the Annual Town Meeting, March 12, 1951, and thereafter one each year for a term of three years, providing, however, that vacancies occurring during any fiscal year shall be declared vacant or a special election shall be had to fill the same.

Budget committee recommends yes.

Art. 6. To choose all necessary town officers, town clerk, selectmen; overseers of the poor; assessors; treasurer; school committee for 3 years; one School District trustee; 1 Pine Grove Cemetery committee.

Art. 7. To see if the town will vote to elect one or more Road Commissioners.

Budget committee recommends yes, one.

Art. 8. To see if the town will vote to instruct its selectmen to appoint one or more Road Commissioners for the ensuing year.

Budget committee made no recommendation.

Art. 9. To see if the town will vote to pay the state rate for laborers, foremen and trucks on any town work, and \$225 each yearly for selectmen, \$150 for town treasurer and \$100 for town clerk, \$100 for fire chief.

Budget committee recommends yes.

Art. 10. To see when the town will vote to have their taxes committed, when they will make them payable, and what the rate of interest shall be charged and from what dates, or anything relating thereof.

Budget committee recommends, dates be set and interest rate fixed.

Art. 11. To see if the town will vote to authorize its tax collector to allow a discount for early payment of taxes, and if so what rate.

Budget committee recommends no.

Art. 12. To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen and treasurer to procure loans in anticipation of taxes and to issue notes therefor, or renewals thereof, in accordance with Section 96 of Chapter 80 of the Revised Statutes of 1944, as amended.

Budget committee recommends yes.

Art. 13. To see if the town will vote to authorize and empower the selectmen to sell and convey property acquired by the town by tax process, on such terms as they deem advisable, and execute quit claims deeds for such property.

Budget committee recommends yes.

Art. 14. To see if the town will vote to discontinue the so called Pleasant St. School, upon the written recommendation of the Superintending School Committee.

Budget committee recommends yes.

Art. 15. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money to build a three school bus garage on the site of the new Consolidated School.

Budget committee recommends no.

Art. 16. To see if the town will vote to authorize its selectmen to sell the Pleasant School building.

Budget committee recommends yes.

Art. 17. To see if the town will vote to sell and convey the Pleasant Street School property to the Christopher G. Linn Post #141 American Legion of Hartland, Maine, and establish a price for the said property and authorize and instruct the board of selectmen to execute a deed to convey said property.

Budget committee made no recommendation.

Art. 18. To see whether the town will vote to extend to certain employees of the town the benefits of title 11 of the Social Security Act, to authorize the treasurer to withhold from the wages of said employee the deductions provided for by said act, to authorize the selectmen to take any acts necessary to enter into such a plan with federal and state agencies, and to raise and appropriate a sum of money for the same.

Art. 19. To see if the town will vote to change its fiscal year to end the 31st day of December each year effective with the current year.

Budget committee made no recommendations.

Art. 20. To see if the town will vote to revoke the action previously taken to waive the printing in its annual printed town report an itemized list of receipts and disbursements, and that the town report shall be issued as provided under the provisions of Chap. 80, Sec. 80, of the Revised Statutes of 1944, as amended.

Budget committee recommends no.

Art. 21. To see if the town will vote to construct a sidewalk, either gravel or bituminous material on the westerly side of Pittsfield Avenue, beginning at Main Street and extending in a southerly direction.

Budget committee made no recommendation.

Art. 22. To see if the town will vote to construct a sidewalk of some permanent material, beginning on the westerly side of Mill Street and extending westerly past the Scott-Webb Memorial Hospital and along the easterly side of Pleasant Street.

Budget committee made no recommendation.

Art. 23. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money if any to pay for Christmas street lighting.

Budget committee made no recommendation.

Art. 24. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money if any to pay for disposal of waste paper, etc., from containers to be placed on the main streets in town.

Budget committee made no recommendation.

Art. 25. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of money, as recommended by the County Director of Civilian Defense, for civilian defense for the ensuing year.

Budget committee recommends \$300.00.

Art. 26. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500 for school lunch program.

Budget committee made no recommendation.

Art. 27. To see what sum the town will vote to raise and appropriate for salaries of Town Officers.

Budget committee recommends \$3,600.00.

Art. 28. To see what sum the town will vote to raise and appropriate for contingent account formerly called Town Charge Account.

Budget committee recommends \$1,600.00.

Art. 29. To see what sum the town will vote to raise and appropriate for hydrant rental.

Budget committee recommends \$540.00.

Art. 30. To see if the town will vote to raise \$100.00 for public health nursing in Hartland. Said sum to be expended by the Maine Department of Health and Welfare, Bureau of Health, for local service.

Budget committee recommends yes.

Art. 31. To see what sum the town will vote to raise and appropriate for maintenance and improvement of the town dump.

Budget committee recommends \$1,000 balance of \$400 to be taken from surplus.

Art. 32. To see if the town will vote to have a street light installed on the grounds of the Consolidated School Building, on the pole of the Central Maine Power Co. near the northerly entrance of said building.

Budget committee recommends yes.

Art. 33. To see what sum the town will vote to raise and appropriate for street lighting for the ensuing year.

Budget committee recommends \$1,350.00.

Art. 34. To see what sum the town will vote to raise and appropriate for maintenance, repair to building, and equipment for Fire Co. and building.

Budget committee recommends \$1,800.00.

Art. 35. To see what sum the town will vote to raise and appropriate for repairing roads and bridges in summer, and cutting bushes, other than village streets.

Budget committee recommends \$1,600.00.

Art. 36. To see what sum the town will vote to raise and appropriate for repairs to village streets and applying bituminous surfacing to Water St.

Budget committee recommends \$700.00.

Art. 37. To see what sum the town will vote to raise and appropriate to be expended on winter roads.

Budget committee recommends \$3,500.00.

Art. 38. To see what sum the town will vote to raise and appropriate for State Aid road construction (in addition to the amounts regularly raised for the care of ways, highways and bridges) under the provisions of Sections 25 and 29, Chap. 20, R.S. 1944, as amended.

Budget committee recommends two units \$1,066.00.

Art. 39. To see what sum the town will vote to raise and appropriate for care of winter sidewalks.

Budget committee recommends \$200.00.

Art. 40. To see what sum the town will vote to raise and appropriate for payment of Aid to Dependent Children, Veterans Aid and support of poor.

Budget committee recommends \$2,000.00.

Art. 41. To see what sum the town will vote to raise and appropriate for repairing and constructing sidewalks.

Budget committee made no recommendation, pending result of vote on Articles 21 and 22.

Art. 42. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$45.00 under the provisions of Chapter 37, Section 24, of the Revised Statutes of 1944.

Budget committee recommends yes.

Art. 56. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$400.00 to co-operate with the Maine Forest Service and the Federal Government in control of White Pine Blister Rust, in accordance with Revised Statutes, Chapter 32, Sec. 54.

Budget committee made no recommendation.
