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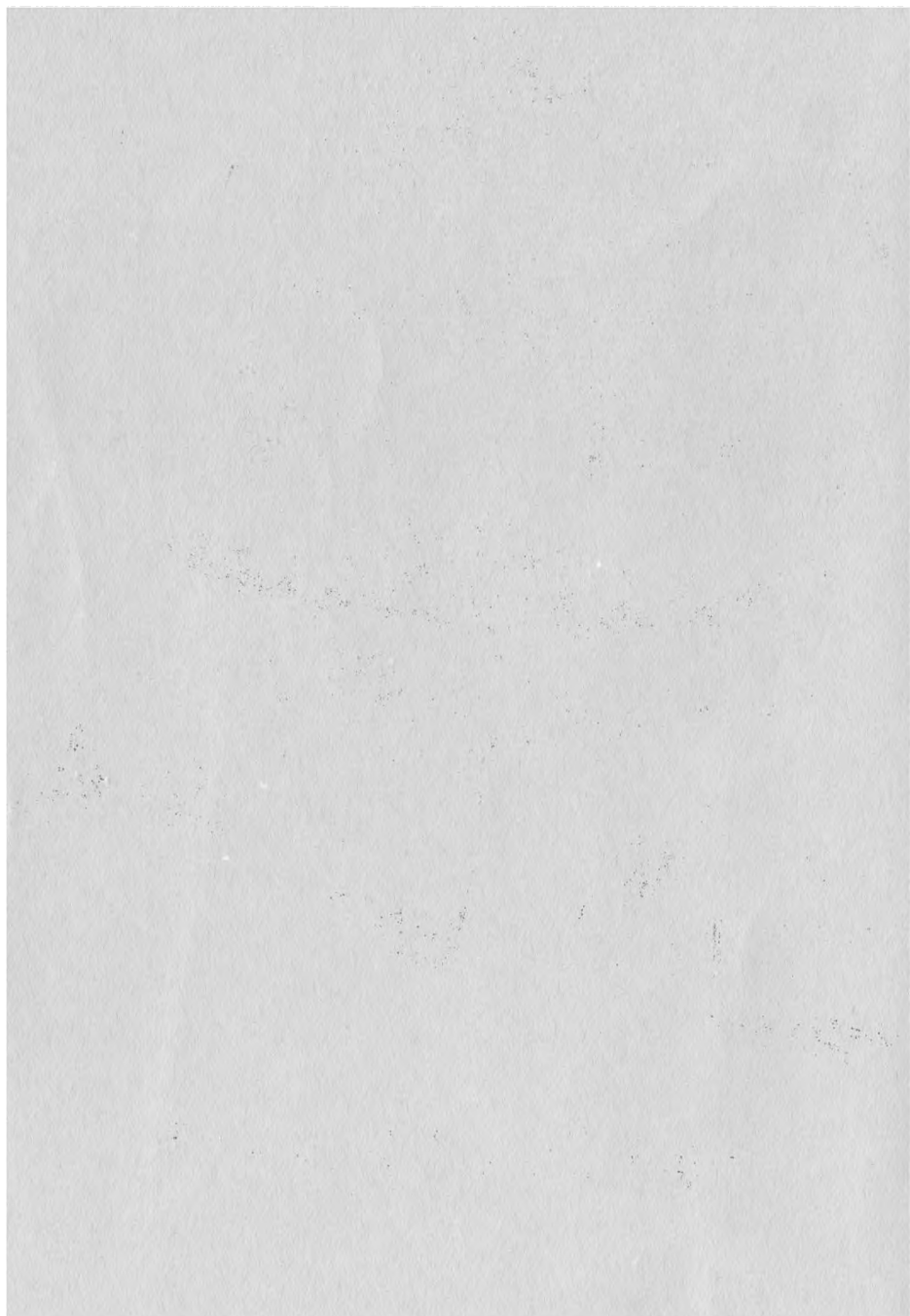

IMPORTANT NOTICE . . .

All taxpayers should read the following and comply with it.
Section 23, Chapter 81, Revised Statutes of 1944.

Before making an assessment, the assessors shall give reasonable notice in writing to the inhabitants, by posting notifications in some public place in town, or shall notify them, in such other way as the town directs, to make and bring into them true and perfect lists of their polls and all their estates real and personal, not by law exempt from taxation, of which they were possessed on the first day of April of the same year. If any resident owner after such notice, or any non-resident owner after being reasonably requested thereto by the assessors, does not bring in his list he is thereby barred of his right to make application to the assessors or to the county commissioners for any abatements of his taxes, unless he offers such list with his application and satisfies them that he was unable to offer it at the time appointed. The request upon non-resident owners may be proved by a notice sent by the assessors to the last known address of the taxpayer or given by any other method that brings notice home to the taxpayer.

An Act Relating to Request for Tax Exemption

R. S., c 81, Sec. 6, sub-sec. X amended, as follows:

In order for a veteran or a blind person to be eligible for tax exemption, he must notify, in writing, the assessors of the municipality where he resides, of his claim for exemption, on or before April 1, 1952, together with proof of entitlement, to be considered for tax exemption in 1952.

Such notification, once made, need not be repeated in succeeding years. If he doesn't do so until later, or after he has received his 1952 tax bill, he is too late for 1952 consideration. However, such formal information at that date is in time for 1953 tax exemption consideration.

Information Relative to Assessing Taxes . . .

That you may more fully understand the authority to abate taxes or regulate the assessment of taxes on certain property please note the following:

The Assessors are the only recognized taxing authority, they in the exercise of their duty are confined to the acts of our Legislative body, as defined in the Revised Statutes and Public Laws of Maine, it has been assumed "erronously" that towns may at any town meeting, vote to abate or exempt certain property or persons from taxation, the assessors may act in accordance with such vote, but in so doing such vote should not be the determining factor for such exemption or abatement. The assessors are absolutely independent in their judgment of any wish or direction by the voters. The voters have nothing to do with the matter of assessing taxes. The assessors, therefore, are the sole judges.

Trusting that the above may fully explain the situation regarding the assessing of taxes.

An Act to Incorporate the Town of Hartland

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in General Court assembled and by the authority of the same, That the township numbred* three in the County of Somerset commonly called Warren Town, as described by the following boundarys be and hereby is incorporated and established as a town by the name of **Hartland** west by Cornville north by Athens and Harmony east by St. Albans and Palmyra southerly by the L of Palmyra so called thence from the west line of said L to the southeast corner of Cornville including the mile and half strip And the inhabitants of the said town of Hartland are hereby vested with all the corporate powers and privilages and shall be also subject to the like duties and requisitions of other corporate towns according to the Constitution and laws of this Commonwealth and any Justice of the Peace for the County of Somerset is hereby empowered upon application therefor to issue a warrant directed to a freehold inhabitant requiring him to notify and warn a meeting of the freeholders and other inhabitants of the said town of Hartland to meet at such convenient time and place as shall be appionted in said warrant for the choice of such officers as towns are by law empowered and required to choose at their annual town meetings.

Approved by the Governor Feby 7, 1820.

First Warrant for Town Meeting in Town of Hartland . . .

To Ambrose Finson Esq. in the town of Hartland

You are hereby required in the name of the Commonwealth of Massachusetts to summons and notify the freeholders and other inhabitants of said town qualified by law to vote in town meetings viz; such as pay to one single tax besides the poll or Polls a sum equal to two thirds of a single poll tax to assemble at Joseph Stewards on monday the thirteenth day of March at ten of the clock in the forenoon to act on the following articles, viz

- 1 To choose moderator
- 2 to choose town clerk
- 3 to choose Selectmen and assessors
- 4 to choose a town Treasurer
- 5 to choose surveyors of highways
- 6 to choose surveyors of bords
- 7 to choose fence vewers
- 8 to choose one or more Tythingmen
- 9 to choose a committee to district the town into highway and school districts
- 10 to choose Pound Keeper
- 11 to choose field drivers
- 12 to choose a collector of taxes
- 13 to choose a constable

And all other business the town thinks proper

Given under my hand seal this third day of of March 1820.

Newcomb, District Manager, in a letter dated August 15, 1950, however, under date of September 28, 1951, Mr. Newcomb wrote: "Owing to the cost of this project and the small return, I was unable to get a work order approved. I realize this extension is needed and that the customers are not getting as good service as we would like to furnish, and will try again for approval on it."

To the Citizens of the Town of Hartland, Maine:

The Trustees are pleased to submit their second annual report of progress covering the various projects completed, partially completed during 1951, and also those contemplated for 1952.

Projects Completed: Last coat of exterior paint; grading in front of school; portable sectional stage for the gymnasium; bicycle rack built for us by the F. F. A. boys; combination tool shed and outdoor canteen; window guards for the gymnasium; and entrance culvert.

Projects Partially Completed: Athletic field drain; have purchased and received a fire door for the boiler room which, when installed, will reduce the fire insurance rate on the building; have purchased and received complete flag pole equipment; have purchased and received an auxiliary sump pump for the boiler room which drain the basement in an emergency in case of power failure which operates automatically by water pressure.

Projects Planned for 1952: Completion of all projects mentioned in the paragraph just above; a sign reading "HARTLAND CONSOLIDATED SCHOOL" to be placed on the front of the gymnasium facing Elm Street; a few shade trees to be set out in rear of the School; power lawn mower; construction of an athletic field as far as our funds will permit.

Our Financial Report as of Jan. 1, 1952 shows cash on hand and unexpended amounting to \$6,092.25, all of which will be used to complete our new School project.

On behalf of the Townspeople the Trustees herewith express their deep appreciation to Isadore Lerner who has given the School a very fine American Flag.

We feel sure that you will be interested to learn that during 1951 the following towns have sent their Committees to inspect our new School; Newport, Pittsfield, Fairfield, Bradford, Rockland, Belfast, Howland, Bradley, East Corinth, Glenburn, Hud-

son, Palmyra, Troy, Hermon, Old Town. Also, 18 teacher students from Farmington Normal School made a special study of our new School and its system.

The Trustees will welcome any constructive criticism and suggestions.

Progress Report on the Mouth Health Program
Hartland — September 1951

To the School Committee of Hartland:

The Sodium Fluoride Program combined with the Mouth Health Project has recently been completed in the town of Hartland. This program, sponsored by the School Committee of Hartland, covered a period of 12 days.

Following the usual custom of these programs, particular age groups were offered a series of Sodium Fluoride applications for partial prevention of anticipated tooth decay. This series consisted of four applications of Sodium Fluoride, with the first application preceded by a professional cleaning. Along with the professional cleaning an examination of the child's mouth was made with mouth mirror and explorer. At the time of examination, individual instruction was given, with attention called to the certain aspect of the patient's mouth which appeared to need more attention. Each child was supervised in toothbrushing and the application of it in relation to his own mouth.

We stress keeping the teeth clean during the sodium fluoride application process, not just because it is only before the first application that the professional cleaning is given but because it effects more interest and personal responsibility for the child. Generally speaking, the children have done very well. The shiny brightness of their teeth after the cleaning seems to be an incentive.

It is established that Sodium Fluoride treatments offered to children at the ages of 3, 7, 10, and 13 will help preserve the first teeth and reduce decay in the permanent teeth. Therefore, it was not only offered to the second, fifth and eighth grades but also to the pre-school children. By working with the pre-school-

ers we are given a chance to talk with the parents to assist them to learn early how they can help their children toward better mouth health.

In addition to the second, fifth, eighth grades and pre-school children receiving Sodium Fluoride applications, the remaining grades were given mouth examinations and instructions in mouth health. Discussions were held in the class-rooms. These discussions covered many things such as the toothbrush and its use, the construction of the tooth, proper diet, dental visits and many others. The topics varied according to what each grade could comprehend.

The total number of children examined was 206. 65 of these received Sodium Fluoride applications. Of the 206 children examined 33 or 16% had no cavities at all or had all dental work completed, 173 or 84% needed dental care, and 123 or 59% had never been to a dentist.

In working with the upper grades, the problem seemed to be correct brushing effort. Because a good many of the seventh and eighth graders do receive dental care, starting dental care sooner and better prevention of tooth decay in general are necessary. We feel that the more concentrated effort should come in the lower grades with particular attention to preventive methods stressed in our education, and actual Sodium Fluoride applications. This prevention, and individual instruction cannot help but gradually and annually bring up the total of children receiving adequate dental care and improved mouth health. It is hoped that both mouth health education and sodium fluoride applications can become an annual part of the Hartland community health program.

Working in Hartland was a very great pleasure. I wish to thank everyone who contributed to making it such fun in accomplishing my work.

TOWN OF HARTLAND

February 11, 1950 to February 10, 1951

An audit has been completed of the books and records of the Town of Hartland for the year ended February 10, 1951. The audit included an examination of the records kept by the Selectmen, Assessors, Tax Collector, Treasurer and Town Clerk.

It is believed that the accompanying balance sheet, together with supporting exhibits and schedules, fairly present the financial position of the Town at February 10, 1951, and the result of its operations for the year then ended.

SCOPE OF AUDIT

The systems of the various town officers were reviewed and the internal controls, accounting records and other supporting evidences were tested by methods and to the extent deemed appropriate. Cash accounts were verified and receipts, disbursements and supporting data were examined. Transactions affecting accounts receivable, taxes receivable and tax liens were reviewed. The records of excise tax receipts were checked in detail. Verifications were made of accounts receivable, unpaid taxes and tax liens. Trust fund investments were examined and income and expenditures were verified with the records. Surety bonds and insurance policies of the Town were examined and listed.

ASSETS

The cash balance of \$12,213.95 at February 10, 1951 was reconciled with the statement furnished by the depository bank.

It was ascertained from the review of the transactions affecting accounts receivable that at the close of the municipal year there were outstanding accounts totaling \$648.94, which is comprised principally of amounts due from the State and other municipalities for poor relief.

The 1950 taxes receivable totaled \$2,177.49 and there remained unpaid prior years' tax accounts in the amount of \$427.59 at February 10, 1951.

Payments received and adjustments made on the tax lien

accounts were properly reflected. There remained at the close of the year unredeemed tax liens totaling \$567.80.

In accordance with the authority granted at the annual town meeting the capital reserve fund balance of \$13,801.89 was transferred to the Hartland School District.

The accounts payable at the year end totaled \$139.66 and are summarized as follows:

REVENUES AND EXPENDITURES

A statement of revenues and expenditures is included in this report which presents a consolidated analysis of the result of operations for the current year. This statement discloses that the available funds exceeded expenditures by \$4,376.49.

Overdrafts were noted in several appropriation accounts. The major overdrafts occurred in the roads and bridges, school repairs and insurance accounts. Overdrafts and unexpended balances are summarized as follows:

The following opinion was rendered by the Department of Attorney General regarding overdrafts:

“The municipal officers are bound by the terms of the articles in the warrant calling the town meeting providing for the expenditure of money. The officers should not spend more than the taxpayers appropriated at town meeting, unless the statute expressly authorizes an expenditure in excess of the appropriation.”

The provisions of Chapter 84, Section 81, of the Revised Statutes of 1944, however, relate to expenditures of monies for highway purposes and permit overdrafts in cases of emergencies to the extent of 15% of the appropriation.

DEBT FUND

The debt fund, which is incorporated in the balance sheet as a separate fund, reflects notes of the Town which are to be retired from future years' revenue. The outstanding notes at February 10, 1951 totaled \$21,288.00.

TRUST FUNDS

At the close of the municipal year, trust fund principals totaled \$9,553.23 and the unexpended income amounted to \$151.84. Of the total funds of \$9,705.07, time deposits and investments amounted to \$8,537.08 and \$1,167.99 is due from the general fund. The amount due from the general fund is comprised of the Ministerial and School Fund of \$1,028.23 and unexpended Cemetery Perpetual Care Fund income of \$139.76.

GENERAL

The excise tax receipts were verified by examination of the copies of receipts retained by the Collector. The collections are summarized as follows:

From an analysis of receipts and deposits, it was ascertained that due to errors in making deposits an amount of \$21.56 was due from the Treasurer at the year end. With the exception of the above mentioned \$21.56, all monies deposited were in agreement with the total recorded receipts.

It was ascertained that all disbursements had been made by check and were supported by warrants issued by the Selectmen, which were substantiated by vouchers and payrolls.

Report of Superintendent of Schools . . .

To the School Committee and Citizens of the Town of Hartland:

It is with pleasure that I submit herewith my annual report of your school system.

We have been operating in the new building for one year now. As far as I know the pupils, teachers and parents are as well pleased with the new plant as ever. The enrollment in the school is remaining constant.

There are three new teachers this year. The school lunch personal is the same. On the whole the past school year has been a successful one.

Our most urgent need for next year is a new 60-passenger bus, for the West Hartland run. We have allowed for this in our next year's budget. Because of the short municipal year just passed, we have enough balance in our Common School account to purchase the bus without an increase in appropriation. However, if at town meeting time the citizens should vote to return to the February 10 closing date it would be necessary to increase our appropriation about \$3,000.00.

During the past year our lunch program has been operated on a sound financial basis. Therefore, it was not necessary to use any of the \$500.00 that was appropriated for school lunch at the last town meeting. However, this fund should be left as a non-lapsing fund so that in future years it would be available for school lunch purposes, if and when needed.

In closing, I wish to thank all persons for their cooperation and support during the past school year.

Audit analysis was on a basis consistent with that of the preceding year, and included all procedures which were considered necessary. Insofar as could be ascertained within the scope of the examination, the financial transactions of the District appear to have been appropriately handled, with such exception as may be noted in the accompanying comments.

Exhibits and schedules incorporated in this report present the result of the financial operations of the District for the period designated.

COMMENTS

HARTLAND SCHOOL DISTRICT March 1, 1950 to February 1, 1951

An audit has been completed of the financial records of the Hartland School District for the period March 1, 1950 to February 1, 1951. It is believed the accompanying balance sheet, together with supporting exhibits and schedules, fairly present the financial position of the District at February 1, 1951, and the result of its operations for the period then ended.

ASSETS

The cash balance as reflected by the records at February 1, 1951 amounted to \$7,261.41 and was reconciled with the balance on deposit January 25, 1951 as per bank statement of the First National Bank of Pittsfield, Maine.

The school building, shown as an asset on the balance sheet, represents the cost of the building and equipment.

At the annual town meeting it was voted to transfer to the Hartland School District the town's capital reserve fund of \$13,801.89. Subsequent to the transfer, certain bonds which were a part of the fund, were cashed at a loss of \$321.00 and there remained invested at February 1, 1951 U. S. Savings Bonds totaling \$5,500.00.

LIABILITIES

The accounts payable of \$24.50 was the amount paid in error to the District by the Town and was due the Town's Cemetery Trust Fund account at the year end.

RESERVES

The reserve for authorized expenditures represents the unexpended balance which has been carried forward to the ensuing year.

SURPLUS

The surplus represents the investment of the School District in the new school building.

DEBT FUND

Serial bonds totaling \$65,000.00 were issued by the District. These bonds, which are to be retired from future revenues, are payable \$5,000.00 annually 1951 to 1953, \$4,000.00 annually 1954 to 1961, and \$3,000.00 annually 1962 to 1967.

GENERAL

The town of Hartland was assessed \$3,850.00 for the period ended February 1, 1951. This assessment was for the following expenses:

From an analysis of receipts and deposits, it was determined that all monies deposited were in agreement with the total recorded receipts.

A corporate surety bond for \$40,000.00 was furnished by the Maine Bonding and Casualty Company covering the Treasurer of the District.

Art. 37. To see if the town will authorize its superintending school committee to contract with the trustees of Hartland Academy, to furnish instruction to its school pupils, who shall be qualified for High School work and shall attend said Academy.

Budget committee recommends yes.

Art. 38. To see what sum the town will vote to raise and appropriate to furnish instruction to its high school pupils.

Budget committee recommends \$9,000.00.

Art. 39. To see what sum the town will vote to raise and appropriate for support of Hartland Free Library.

Budget committee recommends \$900.00.

Art. 40. To see what sum the town will vote to raise and appropriate for care of cemeteries, such sum to be expended under the supervision of the Hartland Cemetery Association, so called.

Budget committee recommends \$750.00.

Art. 41. To see what sum the town will vote to raise and appropriate for payment of interest on debt and tax notes, in addition to any amount of interest collected on taxes and tax liens.

Budget committee recommends \$700.00.

Art. 42. To see what sum if any the town will vote to raise and appropriate to sponsor a Summer Recreational Program for Hartland, any sum to be expended by and such program to be supervised by the School Committee.

Budget committee recommends \$300.00.

Art. 43. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Fifty Dollars (\$50.00) to be paid to the State of Maine Publicity Bureau to be expended and used for advertising the natural resources, advantages and attractions of the State of Maine in accordance with the provisions of Chapter 80, Section 95, of the Revised Statutes of Maine.

Budget committee made no recommendation.

Art. 44. To see if the town will vote to accept the following sum to be invested and the income only to be used for perpetual care of cemetery lot; as follows:

Mrs. Warren Frost #A-16 Pine Grove	\$ 100.00
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Budget committee recommends yes.

Art. 45. To see if the town will vote to have the names printed of paupers not so exempted, in the annual town report, receiving pauper assistance.

Art. 46. To see if the town will vote to ask the assessors to lower or abate the taxes, on the Hartland Hall (Opera House Building and lot), until necessary repairs can be made, or anything relating thereto.

Budget committee no recommendations.

Art. 47. To see if the town will vote to have a committee of twelve citizens appointed to co-operate with the school committee and selectmen in preparing and presenting at the next annual meeting a recommended budget for said meeting.

Budget committee recommends yes.

Art. 48. To see if the town will vote to direct the selectmen to appoint a tax collector for the ensuing year, and authorize them to fix his salary.

Budget committee recommends yes.

Art. 49. To see if the town will vote to ask the assessors to abate taxes on new houses for one year after occupancy, with a tax value of not less than \$1,000.00; and new industries maintaining a payroll of not less than (15) people.

Budget committee recommends yes.

Art. 50. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$400.00 to co-operate with the Maine Forest Service and the Federal Government in control of White Pine Blister Rust, in accordance with Revised Statutes, Chapter 32, Sec. 54.

Budget committee made no recommendation.

Art. 51. To see if the town will vote to extend the benefits of title 11 of the Social Security Act, as adopted March 12, 1951, to become retroactive to January 1, 1951, and any sums necessary for this purpose to be taken from the excise tax receipts, and such sums as are necessary to continue through the current year to be taken from this fund.

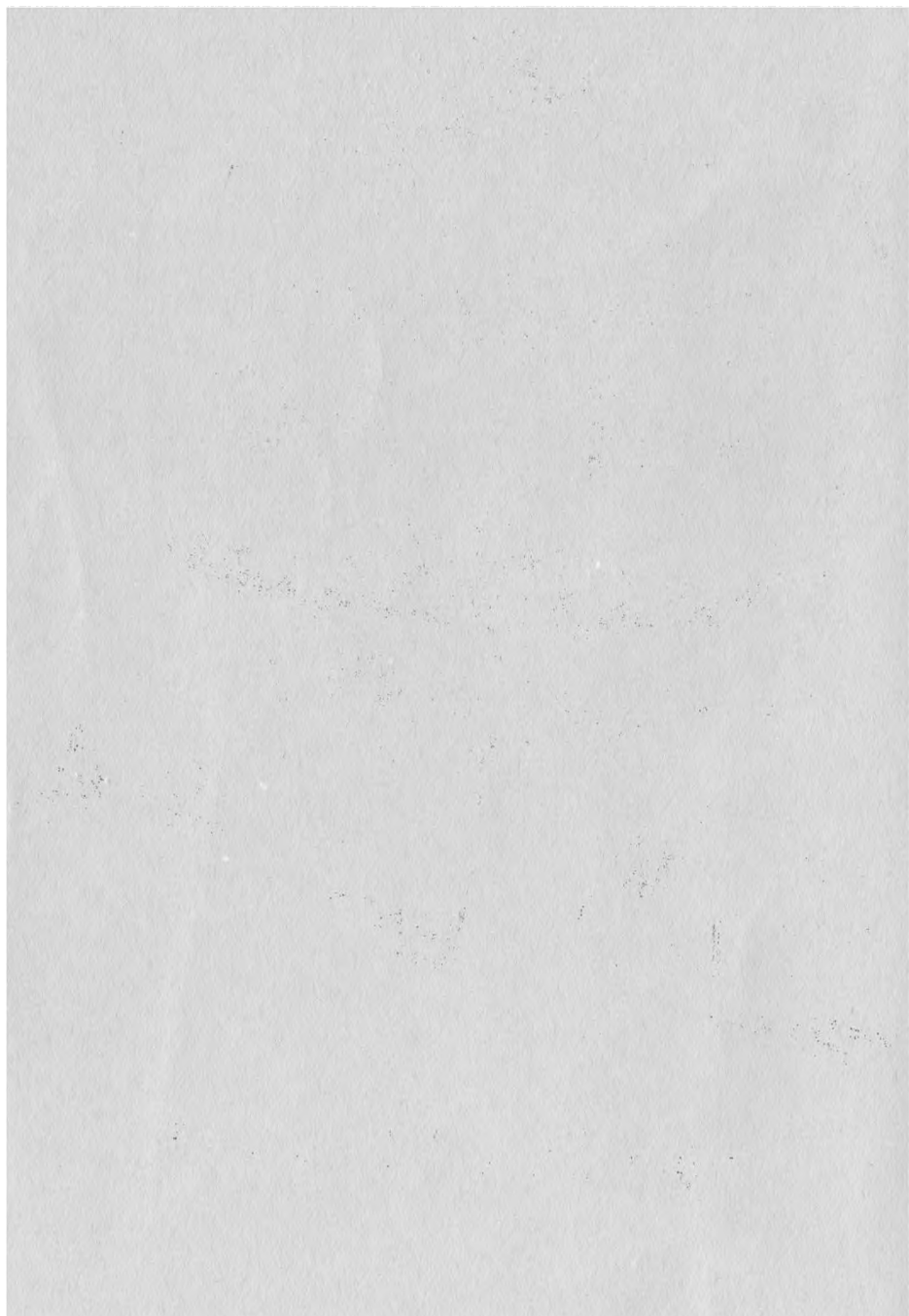
