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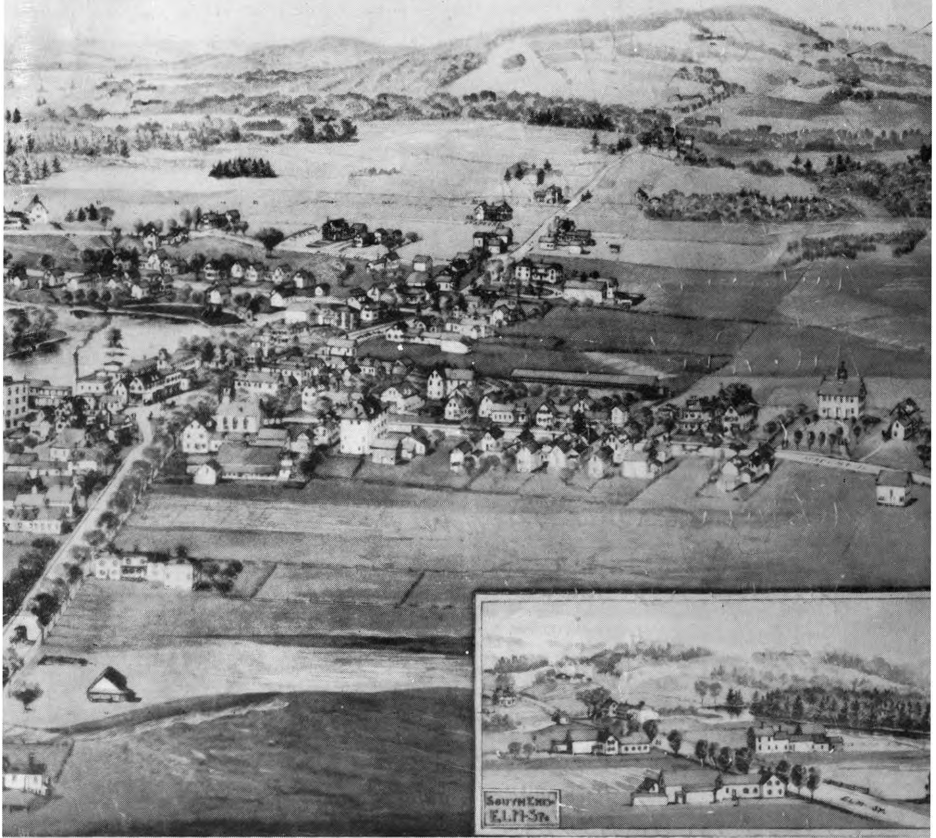

## ***It Has Been Said . . .***

### **THAT TIME MEASURES THE QUALITY OF ALL THINGS**

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Ten years ago, at its annual town meeting, Hartland adopted the Town Manager form of government.

Now would be a good time to evaluate the progress under this plan in Hartland.

Total appropriations have increased 59% in the last 10 years. During this same period school expenditures have increased 136%. Average welfare costs increased 29%, snow removal cost increased 73%, fire department costs increased 94%. Other departments are in comparison.

But, if you own the same property now that you did in 1951, and valuation of the property remains the same, you are paying only 33% more in taxes.

Excise tax collections have increased 74% in this 10 year period. This indicates that we are driving better cars and more of them than we did 10 years ago.

During the last 10 years Hartland has paid:

\$40,000 on School District Bonds; \$14,400 on Sewer Notes and \$2,100 Academy Roof Repair Notes.

Built a Fire Hall (appraised value)	\$22,500
Acquired a Town Hall (appraised value)	79,000

The following streets have been constructed and paved:

Pittsfield Avenue, Main Street, Academy Street, North Street, Pleasant Street and Crosby Street.



New sewers have been laid on:

Pleasant Street, Main Street, and Academy Street. The out-fall end of the Commercial Street sewer has been enlarged and relocated to meet eventual needs in this area.

Highway construction includes:

1 mile on Morrill Pond Road; 1 3/4 miles Ford Hill Road; 1 1/2 miles on Vigue Road; 1/2 mile on Athens Road; Corson's Corner Bridge; Rapid Brook Bridge.

The past 10 years have certainly been years of activity.

During the next few years, Hartland faces a readjustment period. Loss of one of our industries will place a heavier tax burden on all of us. Your Municipal Officers have proposed a budget to meet the minimum needs of our town.

Our long range improvement plan should not be abandoned, and as soon as practicable put in operation again.

## *Superintendent of Schools' Report*

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To the School Committee and Citizens of the Town of Hartland.

It is my privilege to submit to you an annual report of the public schools.

We still have the crowded conditions in our classrooms that has existed for the past several years. Until the time that more classroom space is available these pupils will be working under a great handicap. With the addition of but three rooms, much of this condition would be greatly relieved.

Providing the townspeople decide to raise funds to alter the present Activity Room, making it into three classrooms, or carry on a building program of a larger magnitude, funds will be needed for this. Alteration and/or construction funds would also be needed to pay for the necessary furnishings within the rooms and for the salaries of the additional teachers to carry on the instruction in these rooms. I sincerely hope that some careful thought will be given to this problem.

I personally feel that the superintending school committee, the teaching staff and all connected with the education of your children are making a sincere effort to provide the best media for instruction within the frame work of the physical plant that now exists.

For the sake of economy the Summer School Program has not been recommended this year. In the place of this program we are instituting a different testing program and adding several teaching aids to be used for these pupils needing corrective instruction. I feel that there was a definite benefit from the summer program that was terminated and sincerely hope it will be reinstituted in the foreseeable future.



We had several changes in the teaching staff this year. They are as follows: Mrs. Ethelyn Bowman, Junior Primary; Miss Betty Tolman, Grade 4; Mr. John Wortman, Science and Social Studies in grades six through eight.

Several teaching aids have been added to the building equipment, especially in the science area. For the benefit of the pupils this program of aids should be continued to permit the faculty to take advantage of other inexpensive teaching materials that can be rented for use with them or purchased for a reasonable fee.

#### 1962 — BUDGET — 1963

In the proposed budget we are requesting funds to hire a additional teacher. This will help to strengthen our reading program by giving an opportunity for several pupils to have corrective reading help.

There is included funds for the purchase of a school bus to replace one we are now using.

# ***Report of Public Health Nurse***

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## **MAINE DEPARTMENT OF HEALTH AND WELFARE DIVISION OF PUBLIC HEALTH NURSING BUREAU OF HEALTH**

### **Annual Report of Public Health Nursing Services in Hartland for the year 1961**

The general purpose of public health nursing is to help people and the community as a whole to achieve and maintain optimal health. Your public health nurse carries out this purpose by giving preventive, therapeutic, and rehabilitative services to individuals and families in their homes; through health services in schools; and through organized community programs for prevention of illness and promotion of health.

A summary of public health nursing services given in the town of Hartland during the year 1961 follows:

A series of 3 Child Health Conferences was held. Infant and preschool children were offered physical examinations. Twenty-six diphtheria, tetanus, and whooping cough immunizations and 92 polio immunizations were given.

Referrals have been made to various state and local clinics at the request of the family doctor and home visits have been made to assist families in seeking medical care.

## TOWN OF HARTLAND

FEBRUARY 11, 1961 to JANUARY 31, 1962

An audit has been completed of the books and records of the Town of Hartland for the year ended January 31, 1962.

The records maintained by the Selectmen, Treasurer, Tax Collector, Assessors, and Town Clerk were audited. The system of internal control was reviewed. Accounting records and other supporting evidence were reviewed or tested to the extent deemed necessary under the circumstances.

It is believed that the accompanying balance sheet together with the related financial statements fairly present the financial position of the Town at January 31, 1962, and the result of its operations for the year then ended.

### ASSETS

At the year end, the entire cash balance of \$11,221.84 was on deposit in a savings account in the First National Bank, Pittsfield, Book No. 11341. This was verified by examination of the bank pass book. A checking account is maintained but, as it is the practice to transfer from the savings account to the checking account the exact amount of each warrant, any balance reflected by the bank statement is exactly offset by outstanding checks.

An analysis of the deposits with the Treasurer indicates that tax collections should be deposited by the Tax Collector with the Treasurer more frequently.

During the year, unpaid taxes assessed against real estate on the 1960 commitment amounting to \$3,696.80 were secured by tax liens. All liens had been recorded with the Register of Deeds and all paid liens had been discharged. At the year end, unmatured liens totaled \$978.56. Cash collections on account of tax liens totaling \$230.10 were transferred to tax acquired property.

One parcel of tax acquired property was sold for \$59.73 on which a profit of \$32.13 was realized. Another parcel of tax acquired property carried on the books at a value of \$34.80 was given to an individual with the understanding that he would remove the building on the real estate. Quitclaim deeds were given for both of these properties.

Notes totaling \$11,120.19 were retired during the year leaving a balance in notes payable at the year end of \$43,223.95. Tax Anticipation notes totaling \$84,754.22 were issued and were paid during the year.

#### RESERVES AND SURPLUS

The Cemetery Water Fund amounted to \$882.92 and was invested in a savings account in the First National Bank, Pitts-



field. Interest earned amounted to \$25.88. The savings account was verified by examination of the bank pass book.

Unexpended balances in certain appropriation accounts carried forward to the ensuing year for expenditure amounted to \$10,972.92 as compared with \$6,264.87 at the end of the previous year. The principal increase is reflected in the School Account. A complete analysis of the change in this account may be found

As a result of the year's operations, the unappropriated surplus was reduced \$3,761.33 and totaled \$2,025.90 at the year end. on Exhibit E.

#### TRUST FUNDS

The investments of the trust funds were verified by examination of the bank pass book and physical inspection of the securities. All investments were found to comply with statutory requirements.

A new cemetery perpetual care fund of \$100 was accepted at the last annual Town Meeting. New funds totaling \$700 are now being held pending acceptance at the 1962 annual Town Meeting.

All income received appeared to have been properly recorded and expended in accordance with the terms of the bequests.

#### GENERAL

Excise tax receipts totaled \$7,718.52 and were verified by examination of the copies of the receipts retained by the Tax Collector. The total proceeds received from excise taxes were credited to the Sewer Account in accordance with the vote of the Town.

3. That, tax collections be deposited with the Treasurer more promptly.

Art. 7. To see if the town will vote to instruct its selectmen to appoint the town manager as road commissioner for the ensuing year.

Art. 8. To see if the town will vote to pay the State rate for laborers, foremen and trucks on any town work, \$250 each for the combined office of selectmen, assessors and overseers of the poor, \$100 for town clerk, \$100 for fire chief and \$100 for registrar of voters.

Art. 9. To see when the town will vote to have their taxes committed, when they will make them payable, what rate of interest shall be charged, and from what dates or anything relating thereto.

June 1, Polls — June 1, Estate — October 1, Interest if unpaid December 1, at 6%.

Art. 10. To see if the town will vote to authorize the tax collector to allow a discount for early payment of taxes, and if so, at what rate.

Art. 11. To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen and treasurer to procure loans in anticipation of taxes and to issue notes therefor, or renewals thereof, in accordance with Section 109 of Chapter 91, of the Revised Statutes of 1954 as amended.

Art. 12. To see if the town will vote to construct concrete steps to the Hospital, residence of Jean Moore and residence of William Butterfield, as voted at the annual meeting held March 11, 1961, but not constructed due to the lateness of completion of the sidewalk on Pleasant Street and to use necessary money from the balance of 1961-1962 excise taxes to pay the cost of same.

Art. 13. To see if the town will vote to continue the Capital Improvement Program for the ensuing year with the following projects:

Replace wooden planking and stringers on Iron Bridge with steel girders, corrugated steel flooring and hot top surface at an estimated cost of \$8,500.00.

Construct Mill Street from Main Street to the Iron Bridge with sewer at an estimated cost of \$4,765.00.

Obtain Fireproof safe for office at an estimated cost of \$1,500.00. This was voted at the 1961 annual meeting, but was not purchased as it was felt that a local fireproof safe might be available soon.

Budget Committee made no recommendation.

Art. 14. To see if the town will vote to replank the Iron Bridge with wood plank and raise and appropriate the sum of \$800.00 to pay the cost of same.

Budget Committee made no recommendation.

Art. 15. To see what sum the town will vote to raise and appropriate for repairs to village streets and bridges.

Budget Committee recommends \$1,200.00.

Art. 16. To see if the town will vote to employ two adult traffic guides, under the jurisdiction of the school department, one to be stationed in Warren Square and the other at the intersection of Pittsfield Ave. and Main Street, and to raise and appropriate the sum of \$750.00 for compensation of the guides for the ensuing year.

Budget Committee recommends \$ 750.00.

Art. 17. To see if the town will vote to employ a special officer under the jurisdiction of the selectmen, to perform such work as they may direct and to raise and appropriate the sum of \$350.00 as compensation for said officer.

Budget Committee made no recommendation.

Art. 18. To see what sum the town will vote to raise and appropriate to be expended on winter roads.

Budget Committee recommends \$7,800.00.

Art. 19. To see what sum the town will vote to raise and appropriate for State Aid Construction, (in addition to the amount regularly raised for the care of ways, highways and bridges,) under the provisions of Sections 44 and 49, Chapter 23, Revised Statutes of 1954 as amended.

Budget Committee recommends \$2,664.00.

Art. 20. To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen and treasurer to renew that portion of the State Aid Road Note anticipated on 1963 State Aid Road Construction.

Art. 21. To see what sum the town will vote to raise and appropriate for care of winter sidewalks.

Budget Committee recommended \$ 500.00.

Art. 22. To see what sum the town will vote to raise and appropriate for payment of health and welfare services for the ensuing year.

Budget Committee recommends \$2,500.00.

Art. 23. To see what action the town may wish to take regarding the crowded condition at the Consolidated School.

Budget Committee made no recommendation.

Art. 24. To see if the town will vote to authorize its school committee to contract with the trustees of Hartland Academy to furnish instructions to its school pupils, who shall be qualified for high school work and shall attend said Academy.

Art. 25. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for educational purposes, as follows: instruction, fuel, janitor service, conveyance, supplies, textbooks, board of pupils, health services, administration, secondary tuition, and maintenance of plant and equipment.

Budget Committee recommends \$51,500.00.

Art. 26. To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen to enter into a five year leasing agreement with the Joint School Committee of School Union No. 63 for the purpose of

leasing rooms in the town hall of the town of Hartland, for which they will pay the renovation and construction costs. The annual fee for leasing shall be a sum equal to the cost of heating and lighting these leased rooms. The Joint Committee shall have the right to renew this lease at regular intervals as long as they deem it advisable to maintain a Superintendent of Schools' office in the Town Hall of the Town of Hartland.

Art. 27. To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen and treasurer to issue notes or renewals thereof for the cost of renovation and construction of Superintendent of Schools offices in the town hall. All costs of construction and renovation, including interest on notes, to be paid by the school departments of Athens, Harmony, Hartland, Palmyra and St. Albans by equal annual installments payable over a three year period, on or before August 1 of each year. The amount due annually from each town shall be \$146.20 plus interest.

Art. 28. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for Christmas lighting.

Budget Committee recommends that balance of \$302.46 be carried and \$100.00 be raised and appropriated.

Art. 29. To see what sum the town will vote to raise and appropriate for civil defense for the ensuing year.

Budget Committee recommends that balance of \$358.55 be carried.

Art. 30. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for salaries of town officers.

Budget Committee recommends \$6,350.00.

Art. 31. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for payment of liability and fire insurance and heat for town hall.

Budget Committee recommends \$1,700.00.

Art. 32. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for contingent account, formerly called town charge account.

Budget Committee recommends \$4,000.00.

Art. 33. To see what sum the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the Workman's Compensation Insurance for the ensuing year.

Budget Committee recommends \$400.00

Art. 34. To see what sum the town will vote to raise and appropriate for hydrant rental.

Budget Committee recommends \$4,600.00.

Art. 35. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate for public nursing in Hartland \$250.00. Said amount to be expended by Maine Department of Health and Welfare, Bureau of Health, for local service.

Budget Committee recommends discontinue this service.

Art. 36. To see what sum the town will vote to raise and appropriate for maintenance and improvement of the town dump.

Budget Committee recommends \$1,000.00.

Art. 37. To see what sum the town will vote to raise and appropriate for street lighting for the ensuing year.

Budget Committee recommends \$2,600.00.

Art. 38. To see what sum the town will vote to raise and appropriate for maintenance of Fire Department for the ensuing year.

Budget Committee recommends \$3,000.00.

Art. 39. To see what sum the town will vote to raise and appropriate to be paid to Hartland Volunteer Fire Department for service on Red Network Fire Alarm.

Budget Committee recommends \$100.00.

Art. 40. To see what sum the town will vote to raise and appropriate for repairing roads and bridges in summer and cutting bushes other than village streets.

Budget Committee recommends \$2,500.00.

Art. 41. To see what sum the town will vote to raise and appropriate for care and improvement of cemeteries.

Budget Committee recommends \$1,000.00.

Art. 42. To see what sum the town will vote to raise and appropriate for support of Hartland Free Library.

Budget Committee recommends \$1,600.00.

Art. 43. To see what sum the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the payment of interest on debt and tax notes in addition to any amount of interest collected on taxes and tax liens.

Budget Committee recommends \$1,000.00.

Art. 44. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$3,600.00 as payment on principal and \$144.00 as interest on sewer notes, payable to First National Bank of Pittsfield.

Budget Committee recommends \$3,744.00.

Art. 45. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$75.00 to be paid to the State of Maine Publicity Bureau to be expended and used for advertising the natural resources, advantages and attractions of the State of Maine in accordance with the provisions of Chapter 80, Section 95 of the Revised Statutes of Maine.

Budget Committee recommends \$75.00.

Art. 46. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,000.00 to be expended, in conjunction with TRIF funds received from the State on the Vigue Road.

Budget Committee recommends \$2,000.00.

Art. 47. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$4,920.00 as payment on the principal and interest on Moore Dam Note.

Budget Committee recommends \$4,920.00.

Art. 48. To see if the town will vote to exercise its option to repurchase the Legion Hall from Steeves-McCormack Post No. 141, American Legion, and raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,000.00 as payment for same.

Budget Committee made no recommendation.



Art. 49. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$250.00 to build an ice skating rink on the Consolidated School lot.

Budget Committee recommends \$250.00.

Art. 50. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate to be set aside in a sinking fund each year for eventual repairs or rebuilding of the Moore Dam.

Budget Committee made no recommendation.

Art. 51. To see if the town will vote to accept the following sums to be invested, and the interest therefrom only to be expended on the cemetery lots as follows:

Art. 54. To see if the town will vote to have a committee of 12 citizens appointed to cooperate with the school committee and selectmen in preparing a recommended budget for the next annual meeting.

Art. 55. To see if the town will vote to direct the selectmen to appoint a tax collector and treasurer for the ensuing year and authorize them to fix his salary.

Art. 56. To see if the town will vote to ask the assessors to abate taxes on new homes for 1 year after beginning of construction with a tax value of not less than \$1,000.00; and industries maintaining a payroll of not less than 15 persons.

Art. 57. To act upon any other matters that may legally come before any town meeting.
