To the Superintending School Committee and the Citizens
of the Town of Hartland.

It is a privilege to submit to you an annual report of the
Public School.

Since our grade loads in the lower elementary are larger,
the School Committee has found it necessary to divide the
first grade into two rooms and have two combination grade
rooms. The pupil loads in grade two through five were such
that they felt this was the only possible solution under the
circumstances.

As a result of relocating the departmentalized grades in
the new addition much of the congestion, formerly experienced,
has been relieved. There have been several educational aids
added to the equipment through the School Committee and
with the assistance of the P.T.C.C., which have broadened the
curriculum, especially, in the science areas.

The testing program, as well as the recently formulated
curriculum revision study groups, will help the faculty to
broaden the educational program of the students. It will also,
give greater assistance to the individual needs of each student.

The Principal has been assigned the Remedial Reading
instruction for the elementary grades. His schedule also calls
for part time supervision, administration and pupil guidance.
This program has already, begun to show an improvement in
individual accomplishments for those experiencing educational
frustrations.

The enrollment this year increased by about 5 per cent
while the indications for the next five years lead me to be-
lieve that our enrollment will increase from 2 to 5 per cent
annually with our present community housing.

Our faculty changed this year as a result of the resignation
of Mrs. Madeline Anderson, Mr. Peter Nichols and (recently)
Mr. John Wortman. Mrs. Jennie Burns was hired to teach

Junior Primary, Mrs. Charlotte Stafford Departmental English-Reading and Mr. John Keenan, Departmental Social Studies-Science. There were two additions to our staff. Mrs. Mildred Weeks began teaching a combination grade in March and Mrs. Thera Finnemore combination grades 2-3 in September.

It appears that the curriculum we are able to offer the elementary student will continue to improve under the program studies which have begun. As the faculty become acquainted with the newer practices and after careful analysis other improvements will be recommended to you. The necessity for change and upgrading of the curriculum is, as I am sure you realize, brought about as a result of the increased scholastic accomplishments required of today's youth—tomorrow's adult citizens.

The budget, presented to you elsewhere in this report by the Superintending School Committee, does call for a major increase for teachers and for tuition. Both of these requests are a direct reflection of an increase in the numbers of persons involved.

The physical plant at the elementary appears to be large enough to accommodate the present and near future needs for this age group. It would appear that some serious thought should be given to the problem which will be facing you after this period of time. You will be faced with a problem similar to that experienced recently. With this thought in mind, it would seem that it would be advantageous to formulate a Committee to evaluate the possible avenues for these childrens education and their perspective results.

In conclusion, I wish to compliment the faculty for their professional attitude, and their interest in community activities. May I compliment you upon your choice of school committeemen. It has been a pleasure to work with you through your School Committee and your faculty for your children's future.

Examination of pupils of Hartland Consolidated School in the 1963-64 period revealed health standards in general to be very good. Cards were sent home to parents when a disability was correctable.

From the safety standpoint it is recommended that a standard type of fire extinguisher be adopted, the door to the boiler room should swing outward, the toilet seats should be washed frequently with a dilute Lysol or Sulfanapthal solution to keep infectious hepatitis at a minimum.

All utensils in the school lunch would be safer for use if wrapped in a napkin following boiling and drying with dry heat.

The students appeared alert and the educational standards are apparently excellent.

Annual Report of Public Health Nursing Services in Hartland for the year 1963

Through the cooperation of local persons, health activities have continued with increased participation and interest.

A series of 4 child health conferences were held offering immunizations and physical examinations to all infant and preschool children. The following immunizations were given: diphtheria, tetanus and whooping cough—45; polio—42; and smallpox—7.

Orthopedic, Pediatric, Cardiac, Cleft Palate Evaluation, Hard of Hearing, Speech and the Clinic for Mentally Retarded Preschool Children are conducted by the State Department of Health and Welfare. Referrals to these clinics have been made upon request by the family physicians. Home visits were made to give nursing care and guidance in helping patients and families carry out the doctor's instructions for treatment.

A major responsibility of the public health nurse is one of education and guidance. The nurse works with all citizens of the community including school personnel, doctors and others interested in prevention of disease, promotion of health and rehabilitation.

Your public health nurse wishes to thank everyone who, in any way, helped to promote better health in your community.

TOWN OF HARTLAND

FEBRUARY 1, 1963 to JANUARY 31, 1964

An audit has been completed of the books and records of the Town of Hartland for the year ended January 31, 1964.

The records maintained by the Selectmen, Treasurer, Tax Collector, Assessors and Town Clerk were audited. Accounting records and other supporting evidence were reviewed or tested to the extent deemed necessary under the circumstances.

It is believed that the accompanying balance sheet together with the related financial statements fairly present the financial position of the Town at January 31, 1964, and the result of its operations for the year then ended.

ASSETS

It is still the practice to deposit all monies into a savings account and to transfer from the savings account to the checking account the exact amount of the warrant. Thus, the balance of the checking account should be offset by outstanding checks. In reconciling the checking account at the year end, it was noted that the outstanding checks exceeded the bank balance by \$374.97. This was caused by protested checks deposited in the savings account being charged to the checking account. The cash balance of \$8,566.57 was accounted for as follows:

An analysis of the deposits with the Treasurer indicates that tax collections were deposited by the Tax Collector with the Treasurer more frequently after September 1963.

During the year, unpaid taxes assessed against real estate which totaled \$2,697.32 were secured by tax liens. All liens had been recorded and all paid liens had been discharged. Waivers had been obtained when partial payments were accepted. Unmatured tax liens totaled \$1,687.24 at the year end. Cash collections on tax liens totaled \$2,115.95 and matured liens of \$136.20 were transferred to tax acquired property. Sales of tax acquired property amounted to \$95.72 of which \$29.72 represented profit on sale.

LIABILITIES

Tax anticipation notes totaling \$93,264.37 were issued and paid during the year.

Notes totaling \$6,967.00 were issued during the year and notes totaling \$17,261.30 were retired. At the year end, notes outstanding totaled \$19,260.63 compared with \$29,554.93 at the end of the previous year. Notes outstanding were confirmed with the holder.

RESERVES AND SURPLUS

The cemetery water fund amounted to \$950.80 and was invested in a savings account in the First National Bank, Pittsfield. Interest earned amounted to \$38.98. The savings account was verified by examination of the bank passbook.

Unexpended balances in certain appropriation accounts carried forward to the ensuing year for expenditure amounted to \$6,779.38 which represented \$1,551.75 from the balance carried at the end of the previous year.

As a result of the current year's operations, the unappropriated surplus was increased \$5,448.62 and totaled \$8,794.15 at the year end.

TRUST FUNDS

The investments of the trust funds were verified by examination of the bank passbooks and physical inspection of

the securities. All investments were found to comply with statutory requirements.

During the year, stocks costing \$10,497.51 were sold for \$18,444.66. The gain on the sale of \$7,947.15 has been set up as appreciation of trust funds.

All income received appeared to have been properly recorded and expended in accordance with the terms of the bequests.

New trust funds totaling \$400 were accepted at the last Town Meeting and new funds totaling \$550 are being held pending acceptance at the 1964 Town Meeting.

GENERAL

Excise tax receipts totaling \$8,054.13 were verified by examination of the copies of the receipts retained by the Tax Collector. The Tax Collector overdeposited \$3.27 which amount has been set up as an account payable. At the annual meeting, it was voted to transfer \$500 of excise tax receipts to Mill Street. The balance of \$7,554.13 was not appropriated and was credited directly to surplus.

The balance in the school account was verified with the Office of the Superintendent of Schools.

Supplemental taxes of \$311 were collected during the year. These had not been committed to the Tax Collector.

A new Town Manager, Treasurer, and Tax Collector was appointed in September, 1963, and the 1963 taxes were re-committed to the new Tax Collector in a total amount.

RECOMMENDATIONS

The following recommendations appear to be worthy of your consideration.

1. That, the detail of the tax commitment be added and compared with the valuation book.
2. That, supplemental taxes be committed to the Tax Collector.
3. That, a trial balance be taken of the accounts in the ledger at the end of each month.

WARRANT FOR ANNUAL TOWN MEETING

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STATE OF MAINE

COUNTY OF SOMERSET

To Thomas L. Stephenson, a constable in the Town of Hartland,
in the County of Somerset,

GREETINGS:

In the name of the State of Maine, you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of the Town of Hartland in said County, qualified by law to vote in town affairs, to meet and assemble at the Hartland Town Hall in said town, Saturday, the 21st day of March, A.D. 1964 at ten o'clock in the forenoon, then and there to act upon the following articles.

Art. 1. To choose a moderator to preside at said meeting.

Art. 2. To choose a clerk for the ensuing year.

Art. 3. To choose all necessary town officers, selectmen, overseers of the poor, assessors, school committee member for 3 years, school district trustee for 3 years, Pine Grove Cemetery Committee Member for 3 years.

Art. 4. To see if the town will vote to elect one or more road commissioners for the ensuing year.

Art. 5. To see if the town will vote to instruct its selectmen to appoint the town manager as road commissioner for the ensuing year.

Art. 6. To see if the town will vote to pay the state rate for laborers, foremen and trucks on any town work, \$300 each for the combined office of selectmen, assessors and overseers of the poor, \$100 for town clerk, \$100 for fire chief and \$100 for registrar of voters.

Art. 7. To see when the town will vote to have their taxes committed, when they will make them payable, what rate of interest shall be charged, and from what dates or anything relating thereto.

June 1, Polls — June 1, Estate — October 1, Interest if unpaid December 1, at 6%.

Art. 8. To see if the town will vote to authorize the tax collector to allow a discount for early payment of taxes, and if so at what rate.

Art. 9. To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen and treasurer to procure loans in anticipation of taxes and to issue notes therefor, or renewals thereof, in accordance with Section 109 of Chapter 91, of the Revised Statutes of 1954 as amended.

Art. 10. To see if the town will vote to pay the Town Hall Furnace Note of \$5,997.00 and interest of \$89.96 from the balance of 1963-1964 Excise Taxes.

Budget Committee recommends \$6,086.96

Art. 11. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$970.00 as principal and \$30.00 as interest on the Fire-Proof Room note, payable to the First National Bank of Pittsfield.

Budget Committee recommends \$1,000.00

Art. 12. To see what sum the town will vote to raise and appropriate for repairs to village streets and bridges.

Budget Committee recommends \$2,700.00

Art. 13. To see if the town will vote to employ two traffic guides under the jurisdiction of the school department, one to be stationed in Warren Square, and the other at the intersection of Pittsfield Ave. and Main Street, and to raise and appropriate the sum of \$850.00 for compensation of the guides for the ensuing year.

Budget Committee recommends \$850.00.

Art. 14. To see if the town will vote to employ a special officer under the jurisdiction of the selectmen, to perform such work as they may direct and to raise and appropriate the sum of \$350.00 as compensation for said officer.

Budget Committee recommends \$350.00.

Art. 15. To see what sum the town will vote to raise and appropriate to be expended on winter roads.

Budget Committee recommends \$10,000.00.

Art. 16. To see what sum the town will vote to raise and appropriate for State Aid Construction, (in addition to the amount regularly raised for the care of ways, highways and bridges,) under the provisions of Section 44 and 49, Chapter 23, Revised Statutes of 1954 as amended.

Budget Committee made no recommendation.

Art. 17. To see what sum the town will vote to raise and appropriate for payment of health and welfare services for the ensuing year.

Budget Committee recommends \$3,000.00.

Art. 18. To see if the town will vote to authorize its school committee to contract with the trustees of Hartland Academy to furnish instruction to its school pupils, who shall be qualified for high school work and shall attend said Academy.

Art. 19. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for educational purposes, as follows: instruction, fuel, janitor service, conveyance, supplies, textbooks, board of pupils, health services, administration, secondary tuition and maintenance of plant and equipment.

Budget Committee recommends \$80,000.00.

Art. 20. To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen and town treasurer to issue renewals of the note held by First National Bank, Pittsfield on Superintendent of Schools Office. The principal and interest on the note to be paid by the School Departments of Athens, Harmony, Hartland, Palmyra and St. Albans.

Art. 21. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for Christmas lighting.

Budget Committee recommends \$200.00.

Art. 22 To see what sum the town will vote to raise and appropriate for Civil Defense for the ensuing year.

Budget Committee made no recommendation.

At. 23. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for salaries of town officers.

Budget Committee recommends \$7,100.00.

Art. 24. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for maintenance of Town Hall.

Budget Committee recommends \$2,500.00.

Art. 25. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for Contingent Account, formerly called town charge account.

Budget Committee recommends \$4,000.00.

Art. 26. To see what sum the town will vote to raise and appropriate for Workman's Compensation Insurance for the ensuing year.

Budget Committee recommends \$500.00.

Art. 27. To see what sum the town will vote to raise and appropriate for hydrant rental.

Budget Committee recommends \$4,600.00.

Art. 28. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate for public health nursing in Hartland \$250.00. Said amount to be expended by Maine Department of Health and Welfare, Bureau of Health, for local service.

Budget Committee made no recommendation.

Art. 29. To see what sum the town will vote to raise and appropriate for street lighting for the ensuing year.

Budget Committee recommends \$2,800.00.

Art. 30. To see what sum the town will vote to raise and appropriate for maintenance of the town dump.

Budget Committee recommends \$1,000.00.

Art. 31. To see what sum the town will vote to raise and appropriate for maintenance of Fire Department for the ensuing year.

Budget Committee recommends \$3,000.00.

Art. 32. To see what sum the town will vote to raise and appropriate to be paid to Hartland Volunteer Fire Department for service on Red Network Fire Alarm.

Budget Committee recommends \$100.00.

Art. 33. To see what sum the town will vote to raise and appropriate for repairing roads and bridges in summer and cutting bushes other than village streets.

Budget Committee recommends \$4,000.00.

Art. 34. To see what sum the town will vote to raise and appropriate for care and improvement of cemeteries.

Budget Committee recommends \$1,500.00.

Art. 35. To see what sum the town will vote to raise and appropriate for support of Hartland Free Library.

Budget Committee recommends \$1,600.00.

Art. 36. To see what sum the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the payment of interest on debt and tax notes in addition to any amount of interest collected on taxes and tax liens.

Budget Committee recommends \$1,200.00.

Art. 37. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$75.00 to be paid to the State of Maine Publicity Bureau to be expended and used for advertising the natural resources, advantages, and attractions of the State of Maine in accordance with the provisions of Chapter 80, Section 95 of the Revised Statutes of Maine.

Budget Committee makes no recommendation.

Art. 38. To see what sum if any to be expended in conjunction with T.R.I.F. funds received from the State of Maine on the Huff Hill Road.

Art. 39. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$4,350.00 as payment on the principal and interest on Moore Dam Note.

Budget Committee recommends \$4,350.00.

Art. 40. To see if the town will vote to use the balance of \$131.65 in the skating rink account for the improvement of the rink during the ensuing year.

Art. 41. To see if the town will vote to accept the following sums to be invested, and the interest therefrom only to be expended on the cemetery lots as follows:

Art. 42. To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen to contract with the Central Maine Power Company for a period of 10 years for street lighting.

Art. 43. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$235.00 for Hartland's ad in the Somerset County promotional booklet sponsored by the County Commissioners.

Budget Committee recommends \$235.00.

Art. 44. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$15.00 toward the support of the activities of the Somerset County Soil Conservation District.

Budget Committee no recommendation.

Art. 45. To see if the town will vote to add an amendment to Articles 6 and 7 of the Town of Hartland Traffic Ordinance adopted by the vote of the Town of Hartland at its annual meeting held March 10, 1941.

Violators of Article 4 of the Parking Ordinance shall be adjudged to pay to the Town Clerk the sum of one dollar for each and every offense. Upon failure to pay the fine, within 15 days; all courts in the County of Somerset, having jurisdiction over misdemeanors, occurring in the Town of Hartland, shall have jurisdiction over continuation or appeal from such violation.

Art. 46. To see if the town will vote to join the sewer systems of B. W. Hanson Company, the First National Bank of Pittsfield, Hartland Branch, and Hartland Variety Store into the town sewer at the corner of Commercial Street and Academy Street and to see what sum if any the town will vote to raise and appropriate to do same.

Budget Committee made no recommendation.

Art. 47. To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen to sell and convey property acquired by town tax process, and on such terms as they deem advisable and execute quitclaim deeds for such property after properly advertising such property.

Art. 48. To see if the town will vote to have the names printed in the annual report of persons receiving assistance from town health and welfare funds, provided such persons are not exempt by law.

Art. 49. To see if the town will vote to have a committee of 12 citizens appointed to cooperate with the school committee and selectmen in preparing a recommended budget for the next annual meeting.

Art. 50. To see if the town will vote to direct the selectmen to appoint a tax collector and treasurer for the ensuing year and authorize them to fix his salary.

Art. 51. To act upon any other matters that may legally come before any town meeting.

Art. 52. To see if the town will vote to construct a sewer system on Blake and Commercial and to decide how this construction should be financed.
