LETTER OF TRANSMITTAL

To the Selectmen and Citizens of the Town of Hartland:

It is with pleasure that I submit to you an annual report for the year ending January 31, 1973.

I would like to take this opportunity to briefly outline some of the progress made during the 1972-1973 fiscal year, also make a few recommendations and express my sincere appreciation for the support and courtesy given me by the citizens of Hartland.

Pollution abatement remains the largest, and probably the most expensive, project facing the Town at this time. Much progress has been made this past year and it is expected that sometime this spring the project will be advertised for bids and that construction may get underway sometime this summer. The latest cost estimates, which includes a Federal grant increase of \$324,670.00, is as follows:

Federal monies are available only when the project is 25%, 50%, and 75% complete. Final payment will be received only after the facility is completed and operating satisfactorily.

One of the stipulations which the State and Federal Government requires is that the Town adopt a Sewer Ordinance, a copy of which may be found in the Warrant. I strongly recommend that this ordinance be adopted, for without State and Government funding, which pays for 85% of the eligible costs, this project would become impossible for the Town of Hartland and its one major Industry, to finance.

Another problem, which all Towns and Cities are faced with, is the Air Pollution Control Regulation 10.2, which requires the cessation of open burning at municipal and private dumps by July 1, 1974. I believe very few towns have all the answers to this one yet, but, unless the law is repealed, it is something that we must comply with and it will be costly.

This past year the Town received \$8,534.40 of State Revenue Sharing money. This amount was deducted from the amount to be raised by taxation, thus keeping the tax rate as low as possible.

In the last two months of our fiscal year the Town received Federal Revenue Sharing, for the year 1972, in the amount of \$40,546.00. This is a five year program and if our tax effort remains fairly constant the Town should be receiving nearly the same amount for the next four years. This will be a great help, financially, in solving some of our immediate problems. I would recommend that the Revenue Sharing money received in 1972 be used to construct the remaining ineligible sewer lines, which the Town must have completed within the next couple of years.

Some of the projects which were completed last year were: A new sidewalk to the Consolidated School. A new sewer line on Water and Bridge Streets. Alterations and a new roof covering for the Fire Hall. A new Hot-Top Playground, sponsored by the Hartland-St. Albans Lions Club. Extensive repairs and a new Liner for the Swimming Pool. This was accomplished well within our budget, thanks to the many men and machine hour donated by civic minded citizens and our local Contractors. North Street, Bridge Street and Water Street were resurfaced and I would recommend that Crosby Street be resurfaced in 1973.

Our roads and Bridges account shows a sizable unexpended balance this year. This is due to the fact that I did not get the gravel surface on some of the dirt roads which was planned. I would recommend that a similar amount be raised again this year and hopefully more will be accomplished in 1973.

A section of T.R.I.F. road was constructed this year. For the past several years all T.R.I.F. roads in the Town of Hartland have been nearly 100% constructed with State Funds, which this year, amounted to \$2,337.00. At the cost of construction today this builds less than 500 ft. of road. I would suggest that the Town raise an additional \$2,000.00 to be put with the State money this year.

In keeping with the poster on the front cover of our Town Report, I would suggest that the Town raise an additional \$ for a much needed paint job and a new set of front steps for the Town Hall.

Once again I wish to thank all the Service Organizations in our Town for the great job they are doing. Tax dollars cannot buy the feeling of good will, neither can they replace many of the extra services, donated by our various Service Organizations.

It has been a pleasure working with the Selectmen, the Town Officials, the Employees, and the Citizens of the Town of Hartland. I thank you for your assistance and cooperation.

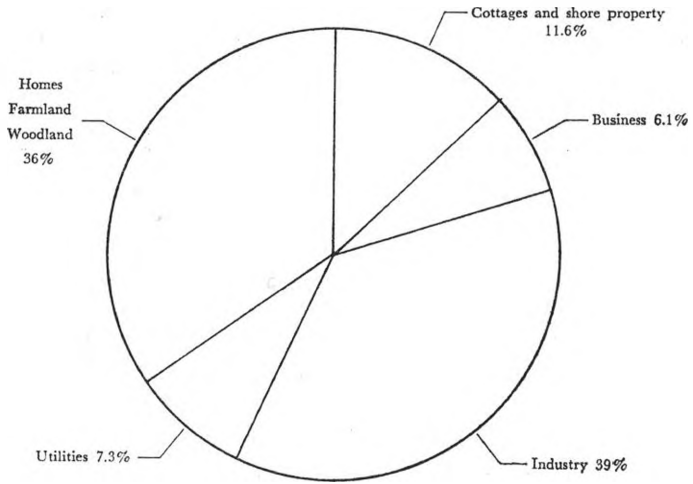

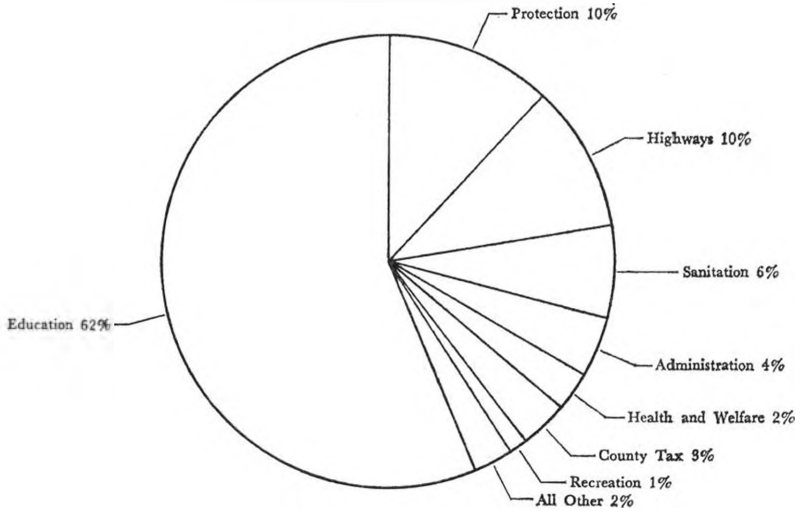

The examination was conducted in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards applicable in the circumstances and included all procedures which were deemed necessary. Insofar as could be determined within the scope of the examination, the financial transactions of the Town appear to have been appropriately handled.

Exhibits and schedules incorporated in this report present the financial position of the Town at January 31, 1973, and the results of its operations for the year then ended.

TOWN OF HARTLAND

An audit has been completed of the books and records of the Town of Hartland for the year ended January 31, 1973.

The records maintained by the Town Manager, Tax Collector, Assessors and Town Clerk were audited. The system of internal control was reviewed. Accounting records and other supporting evidence were examined or tested to the extent deemed necessary under the circumstances.

It is believed that the accompanying balance sheet together with the related financial statements fairly present the financial position of the Town at January 31, 1973, and the result of its operations for the year then ended.

ASSETS

All cash receipts were promptly deposited in the bank in accordance with statutory requirements and the cash balance amounted to \$29,592.98 at the year end which represented an increase of \$16,772.49 over the balance at the close of the previous year. The cash balance was reconciled as follows:

The Town's share of Federal revenue sharing amounted to \$40,546 which was deposited in a savings account and earned interest of \$208.92. This can be spent only upon specific authorization from the Town and then for only certain purposes.

The Town's share of State revenue sharing amounted to \$8,534.40 and was used to reduce the tax commitment as required by statute.

The total assessment charged to the Tax Collector which included supplemental taxes was accounted for as follow:

All collections were promptly deposited with the Treasurer in accordance with the requirements of the statutes. Cash collections on prior years taxes totaled \$10,690.84 and prior years taxes receivable totaled \$740.86 at the year end.

During the year uncollected 1971 taxes assessed against real estate were secured by tax liens. Collections of \$6,708.31 were received during the year and one lien of \$7.80 matured and was transferred to tax acquired property. Unmatured tax liens totaled \$3,560.11 at the year end.

One piece of tax acquired property was sold for \$65.71, the amount of the matured tax lien.

LIABILITIES

Tax anticipation notes of \$100,000 were issued and paid during the year and all bills were paid during the year in which they were received. There is no outstanding long-term indebtedness.

RESERVES AND SURPLUS

The Cemetery Water Fund earned \$74.23 in interest during the year and amounted to \$1,410.68 at the year end. This was invested in a savings account in the Maine National Bank. The Pine Grove Cemetery Fund was increased by \$434.89 as a result of sales of lots and interest earned and expenditures for the purchase of land amounted to \$226.10. This left a balance of \$3,815.13 which is invested in a savings account in the Maine National Bank. The balances in certain operating accounts which were carried forward to the current year for expenditure totaled \$12,698.56. The principal amount being the unexpended balance of \$11,420.40 in the Sewer Construction account. At the annual meeting, it was voted to allocate the excise tax collections for the period February 1, 1972, to January 31, 1973, to sewer construction. These collections totaled \$17,976.82 and sewer construction cost \$6,566.42.

The unappropriated surplus was increased by \$3,089.21 as a result of the current years operations and totaled \$40,804.37 at the year end. Appropriations from surplus made at the annual meeting totaled \$21,534.00. This account is analyzed in detail on Exhibit E of this report.

TRUST FUNDS

The investments of the trust funds were verified by physical inspection of the securities and bank passbooks. All income earned appeared to be properly accounted for and all expenditures appeared to have been made in accordance with the terms of the bequests. New trust funds accepted at the annual meeting totaled \$550 and currently \$700 in new funds are being held pending acceptance at this years' meeting.

GENERAL

A corporate surety bond issued by the Aetna Casualty and Insurance Co. covered Edgar Woodman, Town Manager, for \$15,000.

WARRANT FOR ANNUAL TOWN MEETING

STATE OF MAINE

COUNTY OF SOMERSET

To Edgar R. Woodman, a constable in the Town of Hartland, in the County of Somerset.

GREETINGS:

In the name of the State of Maine, you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of the Town of Hartland in said County, qualified by law to vote in town affairs, to meet and assemble at the Hartland Town Hall in said town, Saturday, the Seventeenth day of March, 1973 A.D. at ten (10) o'clock in the forenoon, then and there to act on the following articles.

Art. 1. To choose a moderator to preside at said meeting.

Art. 2. To choose a clerk for the ensuing year.

Art. 3. To choose necessary town officers, selectmen, overseers of the poor and assessors.

Art. 4. To elect a resident of Hartland to serve on the Board of Directors of School Administration District #48 for a three year term.

Art. 5. To see if the town will vote to elect one or more road commissioners for the ensuing year.

Art. 6. To see if the town will vote to instruct its selectmen to appoint a road commissioner for the ensuing year.

Art. 7. To see if the town will vote to pay the state rate for laborers, foremen and trucks on any town work, \$100.00 for Town Clerk, \$100.00 for Registrar of Voters, \$200.00 for Fire Chief and \$700.00 each for the combined office of selectmen, assessors and overseers of the poor.

Art. 8. To see when the town will vote to have their taxes committed, when they will make them payable, what rate of interest will be charged, and from what dates or anything relating thereto. June 1, Polls and Estate, October 1, interest if unpaid December 1, at 8 per cent.

Art. 9. To see if the town will authorize the tax collector to allow a discount for early payment of taxes, and if so, at what rate.

Art. 10. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for contingent account.

Budget Committee recommends: \$5,500.00

Art. 11. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for salaries of town officers.

Budget Committee recommends: \$12,860.00

Art. 12. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for maintenance and improvement of the town dump.

Budget Committee recommends: \$2,600.00

Art. 13. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the maintenance of Fire Department for the ensuing year.

Budget Committee recommends: \$4,500.00

Art. 14. To see if the town will vote to raise \$600.00 to help support the Hartland and St. Albans Emergency Unit.

Budget Committee recommends: Yes

Art. 15. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the town's share of Social Security.

Budget Committee recommends: \$1,300.00

Art. 16. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for Workmen's Compensation Insurance for the ensuing year.

Art. 23. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for repairs to Village Streets.

Budget Committee recommends: \$6,500.00

Art. 24. Shall an ordinance entitled "Building Code for the Town of Hartland" be enacted?

Sec. 1. **Scope:** The provisions of this chapter shall apply to new construction, alterations and additions, relocation and replacement of any building or part thereof.

Sec. 2. **Building Inspectors:** The Building Inspectors shall be the municipal officers.

A. **Inspection.** The Building Inspectors shall inspect all buildings being constructed, altered, repaired, replaced or relocated for the purpose of enforcing the provisions of this ordinance and all other local and State laws governing the construction, alteration, replacement or repair of buildings.

B. **Right of Entry:** The Building Inspectors, in performance of their duties, may enter any building for the purpose of making the inspection required by this chapter.
(Note 1, M.R.S., T. 30, s 2151, sub. 4, c3)

Sec. 3. **Permit.** Before the construction, alteration, relocation, repair or replacement of any building or part thereof shall be commenced, the owner or lessee or the architect, contractor or builder employed by such owner or lessee shall obtain from the building inspectors a permit covering such proposed work.

A. **Application.** The application for the permit shall be in writing and shall be made in such form as the building inspector shall prescribe and shall contain a description of the proposed new, altered or relocated building, or the repairs or replace-

ment contemplated. The application shall be filed with the board of assessors. A map or drawing shall accompany the application.

B. Permit Approved: The building inspectors, after proper examination of the application, shall either issue the requested permit or transmit notice of refusal within a reasonable time. Notice of refusal shall be in writing and shall state the reasons therefor.

C. Life of Permit: All building permits shall be void unless work thereunder is commenced within one year from the date of issuance.

D. Display of Permit. Every building permit shall be displayed in a conspicuous place on the premises, clearly visible from the principle street, and shall not be removed until all work covered by the permit has been approved.

Sec. 4. Fees. The fee shall be \$2.00. All alterations subject to approval by the inspectors and no fee for expenses of less than \$200.00 if approved.

Sec. 5. Certificate of Occupancy. No building shall be occupied after its construction, or relocation until a certificate of occupancy is issued from the building inspectors. The building inspectors shall issue said certificate after proper examination shows that all work was performed in compliance with the provisions of this chapter.

Sec. 6. Size of Lot. Existing lot sizes are accepted. All new lots are to be of not less than 10,000 square feet.

A. Set-Back. No building shall be erected on a lot unless it shall be set back from the street at least 25 feet.

B. Side Yard Width. No dwelling shall be set less than 20 feet from any adjoining lot line.

Note: A 10,000 square lot provides outdoor living space for the family, produces a comfortable appearance of pleasant spaciousness for the entire neighborhood, decreases the danger of fire jumping from house to house, permits off street parking, decreases the hazard at driveway entrances to streets where shortened line of sight can cause injury to children and adults, and allows future street improvements (sidewalks, street trees and street widening,) to be made with the least possible convenience to owner.

Sec. 7. **Minimum Floor Area.** Every dwelling unit to be used by a single family shall have a minimum ground floor area of five hundred square feet except that on summer and sportsman's camps. The building inspectors may waive the requirements of this section.

Sec. 8. **Foundations.** All structures shall be solid foundations of cement, brick, stone or other acceptable masonry except that in special cases:

- (1) Where buildings are not used for living.
- (2) Summer and Sportsmen's Camps.

The building inspectors may waive the requirements of this section and permit the use of wood, metal, or masonry piers.

Sec. 9. **Minimum Construction Standards.** All building materials used and practices followed in the construction of buildings shall conform to the generally accepted standards of good practice.

Sec. 10. **Outside Walls.** Shall be constructed of material commonly used for outside construction and materials customarily painted shall be painted. Tarred paper or tarred felt or similar substance shall not be used unless completely covered and hidden from view by the finished exterior wall covering.

Sec. 11. **Roof Covering.** The roof shall be covered with non-combustible or fire resistant roofing materials. Untreated wooden shingles are prohibited.

Sec. 12. **Chimneys.** Shall meet the National Building Code as published by the National Board of Underwriters (Fire)

Sec. 13. **Electrical Wiring.** All electrical wiring shall conform with approved methods and practices for safety to life and property. Compliance with the National Board of Underwriters, shall be prima facie evidence of such approved methods and practices.

Sec. 14. **Sewage.** All dwelling and all commercial, public or industrial buildings are required to have sewage disposal systems. The type, size and construction of all septic tanks and drainage fields shall be in accordance with the State of Maine Plumbing Code. R.S. 1954, Chapter 25, Section 173.

Sec. 15 Lights and Ventilation. Every room in a dwelling house shall have one or more windows, opening directly on a street or on a court. Bathroom and water closets and compartments not vented by a window shall have a skylight or a connection to a vent shaft extending to the roof, or be provided with mechanical ventilation.

Sec. 16. Means of Egress. Each dwelling shall have at least two suitable means of Egress.

Sec. 17. Amendment. This ordinance may be amended by majority vote of any legal town meeting when such amendment is published in the warrant calling for the meeting.

Sec. 18. Exceptions. The construction of small accessory building not used for living purposes, together with minor alterations, repairs and general upkeep of existing buildings may be exempt from the provisions of this ordinance.

Sec. 19. Appeal. Any person feeling that they are unduly penalized shall have right to appeal.

***Sec. 20. Violations.** Any building constructed or work performed in violation of the provisions of this ordinance or any permit issued by the building inspectors, or any building constructed as a dwelling without the required certificate of occupancy shall be considered a nuisance. Note: M.R.S., T30, s 2151, sub 4, E1 "Any building, structure, trailer parking facility or equipment existing in violation of an ordinance authorized by this subsection is a nuisance."

Sec. 21. Takes Effect. This ordinance shall take effect upon its passage.

Sec. 22. Validity. If any section, clause, provision, portion or phase of this ordinance shall be held invalid or unconstitutional by any court of competent authority, such holding shall not effect, impair or invalidate any other section, clause provision, portion or phase of this ordinance.

*(Sec. 20.) Any person found guilty of violating any provision of this chapter shall be subject to a fine of not more than \$100.00 for each offense. Each day in which a violation is proved to exist shall constitute a separate offense under this section.

SECTION VII

SEWER ORDINANCE

AN ORDINANCE REGULATING THE USE OF PUBLIC AND PRIVATE SEWERS AND DRAINS, PRIVATE SEWAGE DISPOSAL, THE INSTALLATION AND CONNECTION OF BUILDING SEWERS, AND THE DISCHARGE OF WATERS AND WASTES INTO THE PUBLIC SEWER SYSTEM; AND PROVIDING PENALTIES FOR VIOLATION THEREOF: IN THE TOWN OF HARTLAND, COUNTY OF SOMERSET, STATE OF MAINE.

Be it ordained and enacted by the Town of Hartland, State of Maine as follows:

ARTICLE I

DEFINITIONS

Unless the context specifically indicates otherwise, the meaning of terms used in this ordinance shall be as follows:

Sec. 1. **“Company”** shall mean any industrial or commercial establishment with a liquid waste discharge.

Sec. 2. **“Town”** shall mean the Town of Hartland in the County of Somerset, State of Maine.

Sec. 3. **“Operator”** shall mean the Operator of Sewage Works and/or of Water Pollution Control Facilities of the Town of Hartland or his authorized deputy, agent or representative.

Sec. 4. **“Person”** shall mean any individual, firm, company, association, society, corporation, or group.

Sec. 5. **“Sewage Works”** shall mean all facilities for collecting, pumping, treating, and disposing of sewage.

Sec. 6. **“Shall”** is mandatory; **“May”** is permissive.

Sec. 7. **“Building Drain”** shall mean that part of the lowest horizontal piping of a drainage system which receives the discharge from soil, waste, and other drainage pipes inside walls of the building and conveys it to the building wall.

Sec. 8. **“Building Sewer”** shall mean the extension from the building drain to the public sewer or other place of disposal.

Sec. 9. **“Combined Sewer”** shall mean a sewer receiving both surface runoff and sewage.

Sec. 10. **“Public Sewer”** shall mean a sewer in which all owners of abutting properties have equal rights and is controlled by public authority.

Sec. 11. **“Sanitary Sewer”** shall mean a sewer which carries sewage and to which storm, surface, and groundwaters are not intentionally admitted.

Sec. 12. **“Sewer”** shall mean a pipe or conduit for carrying sewage.

Sec. 13. “**Storm Drain**” (sometimes termed “**storm sewer**”) shall mean a sewer which carries storm and surface waters and drainage, but excludes sewage and industrial wastes, other than unpolluted cooling water.

Sec. 14. “**Water Pollution Control Facility**” shall mean the arrangement of devices and structures used for treating sewage.

Sec.15. “**Garbage**” shall mean solid wastes from the domestic and commercial preparation, cooking, and dispensing of food, and from the handling, storage, and sale of produce.

Sec. 16. “**Industrial Wastes**” shall mean the liquid wastes from industrial manufacturing processes, trade, or business as distinct from sanitary sewage.

Sec. 17. “**Natural Outlet**” shall mean any outlet into a water course, pond, ditch, lake, or other body of surface or groundwater.

Sec. 18. “**Properly Shredded Garbage**” shall mean the wastes from the preparation, cooking, and dispensing of food that have been shredded to such a degree that all particles will be carried freely under the flow conditions normally prevailing in public sewers, with no particle greater than one-half ($\frac{1}{2}$) inch (1.27 centimeters) in any dimension.

Sec. 19. “**Sewage**” shall mean a combination of the water-carried wastes from residences, business buildings, institutions and industrial establishments, together with such ground, surface, and stormwater as may be present.

Sec. 20. “**Slug**” shall mean any discharge of water, sewage, or industrial waste which, in concentration of any given constituent or in quantity of flow, exceeds for any period of duration longer than fifteen (15) minutes more than five (5) times the average twenty-four (24) hour concentration of flows during normal operation.

Sec. 21. “**Watercourse**” shall mean a channel in which a flow of water occurs, either continuously or intermittently.

Sec. 22. “**BOD**” (denoting Biochemical Oxygen Demand) shall mean the quantity of oxygen utilized in the biochemical oxidation of organic matter under standard laboratory procedure in five (5) days at 20 degree C, express in milligrams per liter.

Sec. 23. “pH” shall mean the logarithm of the reciprocal of the weight of hydrogen ions in grams per liter of solution.

Sec. 24. “Suspended Solids” shall mean solids that either float on the surface of, or are in suspension in water, sewage, or other liquids, which are removable by laboratory filtering.

ARTICLE II USE OF PUBLIC SEWERS REQUIRED

Sec. 1. It shall be unlawful for any person to place, deposit, or permit to be deposited in any unsanitary manner on public or private property or in any area under the jurisdiction of the Town of Hartland, any human or animal excrement, garbage, or other objectionable waste.

Sec. 2. It shall be unlawful to discharge to any natural outlet in any area under the jurisdiction of the Town of Hartland any sewage or other polluted waters, except where suitable treatment has been provided in accordance with subsequent provisions of this ordinance.

Sec. 3. Except as hereinafter provided, it shall be unlawful to construct or maintain any privy, privy vault, septic tank, cess-pool, or other facility intended or used for the disposal of sewage.

Sec. 4. Where there is no private sewage disposal or where inadequate private disposal facilities exist, the owner of all houses, buildings, or properties used for human occupancy, employment, recreation, or other purposes, situated within the Town and abutting on any street, alley, or right-of-way in which there is located a public sanitary or combined sewer of the Town, is hereby required at his expense, to install suitable toilet facilities therein, and to connect such facilities directly with the proper public sewer in accordance with the provisions of this ordinance, within ninety (90) days after date of official notice to do so, provided that said public sewer is within one hundred (100) feet of the property line.

ARTICLE III PRIVATE SEWAGE DISPOSAL

Sec. 1. Where a public sanitary or combined sewer is not available under the provisions of Article II, Section 4, the building sewer shall be connected to a private sewage disposal system complying with the provisions of this article.

Sec. 2. Before commencement of construction of a private sewage disposal system, the owner shall first obtain a written permit signed by the Operator. The application for such permit shall be made on a form furnished by the Town, which the applicant shall supplement by any plans, specifications, or other information as are deemed necessary by the Operator. A permit and inspection fee of \$5.00 shall be paid to the Town at the time the application is filed.

Sec. 3. A permit for a private sewage disposal system shall not become effective until the installation is completed to the satisfaction of the Operator. He shall be allowed to inspect the work at any stage of construction and, in any event, the applicant for the permit shall notify the Operator when the work is ready for final inspection, and before any underground portions are covered. The inspection shall be made within 48 hours of the receipt of notice by the Operator.

Sec. 4. The type, capacities, location, and layout of a private sewage disposal system shall comply with all recommendations of the State Department of Public Health. No septic tank or cesspool shall be permitted to discharge to any natural outlet.

Sec. 5. At such time as a public sewer becomes available to a property served by an inadequate private sewage disposal system, as provided in Article II, Section 4, a direct connection shall be made to the public sewer in compliance with this ordinance, and any septic tanks, cesspools, and similar private sewage disposal facilities shall be abandoned and filled with suitable material.

Sec. 6. The owner shall operate and maintain the private sewage disposal facilities in a sanitary manner at all times, at no expense to the Town.

Sec. 7. No statement contained in this article shall be construed to interfere with any additional requirements that may be imposed by the Board of Health of the Town.

Sec. 8. When a public sewer becomes available, the building sewer shall be connected to said sewer within seven hundred and thirty (730) days and the private sewage disposal system shall be cleaned of sludge and filled with clean bank-run gravel or dirt.

ARTICLE IV BUILDING SEWERS AND CONNECTIONS

Sec. 1. No unauthorized person shall uncover, make any connections with or opening into, use alter, or disturb any public sewer or appurtenance thereof without first obtaining a written permit from the Operator.

Sec. 2. There shall be two (2) classes of building sewer permits: (a) for residential and commercial service, and (b) for service to establishments producing industrial wastes. In either case, the owner or his agent shall make application on a special form furnished by the Town. The permit application shall be supplemented by any plans, specifications, or other information considered pertinent in the judgement of the Operator. A permit and inspection fee of five dollars (5.00) for a residential or commercial building sewer permit and twenty-five dollars (\$25.00) for an industrial building sewer permit shall be paid to the Town at the time the application is filed.

Sec. 3. All costs and expence incident to the installation and connection of the building sewer shall be borne by the owner. The owner shall indemnify the Town from any loss or damage that may directly or indirectly be occasioned by the installation of the building sewer.

Sec. 4. A separate and independent building sewer shall be provided for every building; except where one building stands at the rear of another on an interior lot and no private sewer is available or can be constructed to the rear building through an adjoining alley, court, yard, or driveway, the building sewer from the front building may be extended to the rear building and the whole considered as one building sewer.

Sec. 5. Old building sewers may be used in connection with new buildings only when they are found, on examination and test by the Operator, to meet all requirements of this ordinance.

Sec. 6. The size, slope, alignment, materials of construction of a building sewer, and the methods to be used in excavating, placing of the pipe, jointing, testing, and backfilling the trench, shall all conform to the requirements of the building and plumbing code or other applicable rules and regulations of the Town. In the absence of code provisions or in amplification thereof, the materials and procedures set forth in appropriate sections of the

1973 specifications for “**Proposed Sewage System**” as prepared by Coffin & Richardson, Inc. shall apply.

Sec. 7. Whenever possible, the building sewer shall be brought from the building at an elevation at least one foot above the basement floor. In all buildings in which any building drain is too low to permit gravity flow to the public sewer, sanitary sewage carried by such building drain shall be lifted by an approved means and discharged to the building sewer.

Sec. 8. No person shall make connection of roof downspouts, exterior foundation drains, areaway drains, or other sources of surface runoff or groundwater to a building sewer or building drain which in turn is connected directly or indirectly to a public sanitary sewer.

Sec. 9. The connection of the building sewer into the public sewer shall conform to the requirements of the building and plumbing code or other applicable rules and regulations of the District, or the procedures set forth in 1973 specifications for “**Proposed Sewerage System**” as prepared by Coffin & Richardson. All such connections shall be made gas tight and watertight. Any deviation from the prescribed procedures and materials must be approved by the Operator before installation.

Sec. 10. The applicant for the building sewer permit shall notify the Operator when the building sewer is ready for inspection and connection to the public sewer. The connection shall be made under the supervision of the Operator or his representative.

Sec. 11. All excavations for building sewer installation shall be adequately guarded with barricades and lights so as to protect the public from hazzards. Streets, sidewalks, parkways, and other public property disturbed in the course of the work shall be restored in a manner satisfactory to the Town.

ARTICLE V

USE OF THE PUBLIC SEWERS

Sec. 1. No person shall discharge or cause to be discharged any storm water, surface water, groundwater, roof runoff, sub-surface drainage, uncontaminated cooling water, or unpolluted industrial process waters to any sanitary sewer.

Sec. 2. Stormwater and all other unpolluted drainage shall be discharged to such sewers as are specifically designated as combined sewers or storm sewers, or to a natural outlet approved by the Operator. Industrial cooling water or unpolluted process waters may be discharged, on approval of the Operator, to a storm sewer or natural outlet.

Sec. 3. No person shall discharge or cause to be discharged and of the following described waters or wastes to any public sewers:

(a) Any gasoline, benzene, naphtha, fuel oil, or other flammable or explosive liquid, solid, or gas.

(b) Any waters or wastes containing toxic or poisonous solids, liquids, or gases in sufficient quantity, either singly or by interaction with other wastes, to injure or interfere with any sewerage treatment process, constitute a hazard to humans or animals, create a public nuisance, or create any hazard in the receiving waters of the sewage treatment plant, including but not limited to cyanides in excess of two (2) mg/1 as CN in the wastes as discharged to the public sewer.

(c) Any waters or wastes having a pH lower than (5.5), or having any other corrosive property capable of causing damage or hazard to structures, equipment, and personnel of the sewage works.

(d) Solids or viscous substances in quantities or of such size capable of causing obstruction to the flow in sewers, or other interference with the proper operation of the sewage works such as, but not limited to, ashes, cinders, sand, mud, straw, shavings, metal, glass, rags, feathers, tar, plastics, wood, unground garbage, fibers, whole blood, paunch manure, hair and fleshings, entrails and paper dishes, cups, milk containers, etc. either whole or ground by garbage grinders.

Sec. 4. No person shall discharge or cause to be discharged the following described substances, materials, waters or wastes if it appears likely in the opinion of the Operator that such wastes can harm either the sewers, sewage treatment process, or equipment, have an adverse effect on the receiving stream, or can otherwise endanger life, limb, public property, or constitute a nuisance. In forming his opinion as to the acceptability of these wastes, the Operator will give consideration to such factors as the quantities of subject wastes in relation to flow and velocities in

the sewers, materials of construction of the sewers, nature of the sewage treatment process, capacity of the sewage treatment plant, degree of treatability of wastes in the sewage treatment plant, and other pertinent factors. The substances prohibited are:

(a) Any liquid or vapor having a temperature higher than one hundred fifty (150)°F (65°C).

(b) Any water or waste containing fats, wax, grease, or oils, whether emulsified or not, in excess of one hundred (100) mg/1 or containing substances which may solidify or become viscous at temperatures between thirty-two (32) and one hundred fifty (150)°F (0 and 65°C).

(c) Any garbage that has not been properly shredded. The installation and operation of any garbage grinder equipped with a motor of three-fourths ($\frac{3}{4}$) horsepower (0.76 hp metric) or greater shall be subject to the review and approval of the Operator.

(d) Any water or wastes containing strong acid, iron pickling wastes, or concentrated plating solutions whether neutralized or not.

(e) Any waters or wastes containing iron, chromium, ammonia, copper, zinc, and similar objectionable or toxic substances; or wastes exerting an excessive chlorine requirement, to such a degree that any such materials received in the composite sewage at the sewage treatment works exceeds the limits established by the Operator for such materials.

(f) Any water or wastes containing phenols or other taste-or odor-producing substances, in such concentrations exceeding limits which may be established by the Operator as necessary, after treatment of the composite sewage, to meet the requirements of the State, Federal, or other public agencies of jurisdiction for such discharge to the receiving waters.

(g) Any radioactive wastes or isotopes of such half-life or concentration as may exceed limits established by the Operator in compliance with applicable State or Federal regulations.

(h) Any waters or wastes having a pH in excess of 9.5.

(i) Materials which exert or cause:

(1) Unusual concentrations of inert suspended solids, (such as, but not limited to, Fullers earth, lime slurries, and lime residues) or of dissolved solids (such as, but not limited to, sodium chloride and sodium sulfate).

(2) Excessive discoloration.

(3) Unusual BOD, chemical oxygen demand, or chlorine requirements in such quantities as to constitute a significant load on the sewage treatment works.

(4) Unusual volume of flow or concentration of wastes constituting "slugs" as defined herein.

(j) Waters or wastes containing substances which are not amenable to treatment or reduction by the sewage treatment processes employed, or are amenable to treatment only to such degree that the sewage treatment plant effluent cannot meet the requirements of other agencies having jurisdiction over discharge to the receiving waters, i.e., phosphates and nitrates.

Sec. 5. If any waters or wastes are discharged, or are proposed to be discharged to the public sewers, which waters contain the substances or possess the characteristics enumerated in Section 4 of this Article, and which in the judgment of the Operator, may have deleterious effect upon the sewage works, processes, equipment, or receiving waters, or which otherwise create a hazard to life or constitute a public nuisance, the operator may:

(a) Reject the wastes,

(b) Require pretreatment to an acceptable condition for discharge to the public sewers,

(c) Require control over the quantities and rates of discharge,

(d) Require payment to cover the added cost of handling and treating the wastes not covered by existing taxes or sewer charges under the provisions of Section 10 of this article.

If the Operator permits an industry to pretreat or equalize its waste flows, the design and installation of their plants and equipment shall be subject to the review and approval of the Operator and subject to the requirements of all applicable codes, ordinances, and laws.

Sec. 6. Grease, oil and sand interceptors shall be provided when, in the opinion of the Operator, they are necessary for the proper handling of liquid wastes containing grease in excessive amounts, or any flammable wastes, sand, or other harmful ingredients; except that such interceptors shall not be required for private living quarters or dwelling units. All interceptor facilities shall be of a type and capacity approved by the Operator and shall be located as to be readily and easily accessible for cleaning and inspection.

Sec. 7. Where preliminary treatment or flow-equalizing facilities are provided for any waters or wastes, they shall be maintained continuously in satisfactory and effective operation by the Owner at his expense.

Sec. 8. When required by the owner of any property serviced by a building sewer carrying industrial wastes shall install a suitable control manhole together with such necessary meters and other appurtenances in the building sewer to facilitate observation, sampling, and measurement of the wastes. Such manhole, when required, shall be accessibly and safely located, and shall be constructed in accordance with plans approved by the Operator. The manhole shall be installed by the owner at his expense, and shall be maintained by him as to be safe and accessible at all times.

Sec. 9. All measurements, tests, and analyses of the characteristics of water and wastes to which reference is made in this ordinance shall be determined in accordance with the latest edition of "Standard Methods for the Examination of Water and Wastewater," published by the American Public Health Association, and shall be determined by the control manhole provided, or upon suitable samples taken at said control manhole. In the event that no special manhole has been required, the control manhole shall be considered to be the nearest downstream manhole in the public sewer to the point at which the building sewer is connected. Sampling shall be carried out by customarily accepted methods to reflect the effect of constituents upon the sewage works and to determine the existence of hazards to life, limb, and property. (The particular analyses involved will determine whether a twenty-four (24) hour composite of all outfalls of a premise is appropriate or whether a grab sample or samples should be taken. Normally, but not always, BOD and suspended solids analyses are obtained from 24-hour composites of all outfalls whereas pH's are determined from period grab samples.)

Sec. 10. No statement contained in this article shall be construed as preventing any special agreement or arrangement between the Town and any industrial concern whereby an industrial waste of unusual strength or character may be accepted by the Town for treatment, subject to payment therefore, by the industry.

ARTICLE VI PROTECTION FOR DAMAGE

Sec. 1 No unauthorized person shall maliciously, willfully, or negligently break, damage, destroy, uncover, deface, or tamper with any structure, appurtenance, or equipment which is a part of the sewerage works. Any person violating this provision shall be subject to immediate arrest under charge of disorderly conduct.

ARTICLE VII POWERS AND AUTHORITY OF INSPECTORS

Sec. 1. The Operator, and other duly authorized employees of the Town bearing proper credentials and identification, shall be permitted to enter all properties for the purposes of inspection, observation, measurement, sampling, and testing in accordance with the provisions of this ordinance. The Operator or his representatives shall have no authority to inquire into any processes including metallurgical, chemical, oil, refining, ceramic, paper, or other industries beyond that point having a direct bearing on the kind and source of discharge to the sewers or waterways or facilities for waste treatment.

Sec. 2. While performing the necessary work on private properties referred to in Article VII, Section 1 above, the Operator or duly authorized employees of the Town shall observe all safety rules applicable to the premises established by the Company. The Company shall be held harmless for injury or death to the Town employees and the Town shall indemnify the Company against loss or damage to its property by Town employees and against liability claims and demands for personal injury or property damage asserted against the Company and growing out of the gauging and sampling operation, except as such may be caused by negligence or failure of the Company to maintain safe conditions as required in Article V, Section 8.

Sec. 3. The Operator and other duly authorized employees of the Town having proper credentials and identification shall be permitted to enter all private properties through which the Town holds a duly negotiated easement for the purposes of, but not limited to, inspection, observation, measurement, sampling, repair, and maintenance of any portion of the sewerage works lying within said easement. All entry and subsequent work, if any, on said easement shall be done in full accordance with the terms of the duly negotiated easement pertaining to the private property involved.

ARTICLE VIII PENALTIES

Sec. 1. Any person found to be violating any provision of this ordinance except Article VI shall be served by the District with written notice stating the nature of the violation and providing a reasonable time limit for the satisfactory correction thereof. The offender shall, within the period of time stated in such notice, permanently cease all violations.

Sec. 2. Any person who shall continue any violation beyond the time limit provided for in Article VIII, Section 1, shall be guilty of a misdemeanor and on conviction thereof shall be fined in an amount not exceeding one hundred dollars (\$100.00) for each violation. Each day in which any such violation shall continue shall be deemed a separate offense.

Sec. 3. Any person violating any of the provisions of this ordinance shall become liable to the Town for any expense, loss, or damage occasioned the Town by reason of such violation.

ARTICLE IX HEARING BOARD

Sec. 1. A Hearing Board consisting of three members shall be appointed by the Board of Selectmen as needed for arbitration of differences between the Operator and sewer users on matters concerning interpretation and execution of the provisions of this ordinance by the Operator. The cost of arbitration will be divided equally between the Town and the sewer user.

**ARTICLE X
VALIDITY**

Sec. 1. All ordinances or parts of ordinances in conflict herewith are hereby repealed.

Sec. 2. The invalidity of any section, clause, sentence, or provision of this ordinance shall not affect the validity of any other part of this ordinance which can be given effect without such invalid part or parts.

**ARTICLE XI
ORDINANCE IN FORCE**

Sec. 1. This ordinance shall be in full force and effect from and after its passage, approval, recording, and publication as provided by law.

Sec. 2. Passed and adopted by the Town of Hartland, State by the following vote:

Art. 45. To see if the town will vote to use the Excise tax for the fiscal year beginning Feb. 1, 1973 and ending Jan. 31, 1974 and transfer \$10,000.00 from surplus, said amounts to be used to defray the town share of the cost in the Pollution Abatement Project.

Budget Committee recommends: Yes

Art. 46. To see if the town will vote to use \$2,000.00 from surplus to be used in conjunction with T.R.I.F. funds for road construction.

Budget Committee recommends: Yes

Art. 47. To see if the town will authorize the selectmen in behalf of the town, to sell and dispose of any real estate acquired by the town for non-payment of taxes thereon, on such terms as they may deem advisable, and to execute quit claim deeds for such property.

Budget Committee recommends: Yes

Art. 48. To see if the town will direct the selectmen to appoint a tax collector and treasurer for the ensuing year and authorize them to affix his salary.

Art. 49. To see if the town will vote to have a committee of 12 citizens appointed to cooperate with the selectmen in preparing a recommended budget for the next annual meeting.

APPROPRIATION OF \$40,546.00 OF FEDERAL REVENUE
SHARING PAYMENTS TO THE TOWN OF HARTLAND

Art. 50. To see if the town will vote to appropriate the sum of \$40,546.00, plus accrued interest, from the 1972 Revenue Sharing Account and transfer to the General Administration Account for the purpose of construction town sewer lines which are ineligible for Government Subsidy.

Budget Committee recommends: Yes

FOOD STAMP PROGRAM REPORT FOR SOMERSET COUNTY

In the early 1960's the U.S. Department of Agriculture instituted the FOOD STAMP PROGRAM as an effort to more adequately feed the people in this country. On July 1, 1972 the program began in Somerset County. It is underwritten by the Somerset County Commissioners and administrated by the Maine Department of Health and Welfare. Donated commodities were phased out of existance in Somerset County on October 1, 1972.

At the end of 1972—1,314 households in Somerset County were receiving food stamps. It is certain many more families are eligible for the program. NO ONE can determine if a family qualifies except food stamp workers. A families eligibility is based on family income family living expenses and medical or doctor bills. Any family has a right to apply. In this County the food stamp office is at 76 Madison Avenue, Skowhegan. Telephone: 474-5141

FROM BUREAU OF TAXATION

A new program has been established under Chapter 503, Public Laws of 1971, called "The Elderly Householders Tax Relief Act." Generally speaking, this program provides for a direct payment by the State to those resident maintaining a homestead, whether owned or rented, where at least one male member of the household is 65 years of age, or a female member is at least 62. The total income of all members of the household (including income from all sources) cannot exceed—\$4,000; and at least 35% of total household income must be attributable to the elderly members. Finally, no claimant may have more than \$30,000 of net assets.

The grant is an amount equal to 7% of the difference between total household income and \$4,000; but not in excess of the property tax on the homestead, or 20% of rent paid for the previous year.

Claims under this program are to be filed with the Bureau of Taxation. Local assessors will not be directly involved, although in many cases they may be approached initially by elderly persons asking information. Under this law, claims will first be filed (with the Bureau of Taxation) between August 1 and October 15, 1973. The Bureau will have informational material and the necessary claim forms prepared well in advance of the August 1 date, and we plan to furnish a supply to municipal officials for local distribution. In the meantime, if local taxpayers should have any further questions, please ask them to write directly to this office.

Town of Hartland

Section 706, Title 36, M.R.S.A. of the Revised Statutes states that before making an assessment, the assessors shall give reasonable notice in writing to all persons liable to taxation in the municipality to furnish the assessors true and perfect lists of their polls and all their estates not by law exempt from taxation of which were possessed on the 1st day of April of the same year. This section has been amended to read: The notice to owners may be by mail directed to the last known address of the taxpayer or by any other method that provides reasonable notice to the taxpayer.

Section 5 says that if the assessors fail to give this notice as required, the taxpayer is not barred of his right to make application for abatement.

The taxpayer should make out this list in writing and send it to the assessors or bring it in to them on or before April 1 of this year.

Any taxpayer receiving a town report with the above printed in it or receives a copy of the above section by mail is considered to have had a proper notice.
