Town Warrant

Sagadahoc, ss.

To Collingwood C. Shea, Constable of the Town of
Arrowsic, County of Sagadahoc, Greetings:

In the name of the State of Maine you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of said Town of Arrowsic, qualified by law to vote in town affairs, to assemble in the Town Hall, in said town, on the fourth day of March, A.D. 1929, at ten o'clock in the forenoon, to act on the following articles, to wit:

- Art. 1. To choose by ballot a moderator to preside at said meeting.
- Art. 2. To choose by ballot a town clerk for the ensuing year.
- Art. 3. To see if the town will vote to accept the report of the town officers.
- Art. 4. To choose by ballot selectmen, assessors and overseers of the poor and all other necessary town officers.
- Art. 5. To see if the town will vote to allow the use of the schoolhouse for religious meetings for the ensuing year.
- Art. 6. To fix the date when taxes for the ensuing year shall become due and payable.

- Art. 7. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for contingent expenses for the ensuing year.
- Art. 8. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the support of schools for the ensuing year.
- Art. 9. To see what sum of money, if any, the town will vote to raise in accordance with the provision of Chapter 154 of the Public Laws of 1917, as amended by Chapter 157 of the Public Laws of 1919, for the construction of a state aid highway through the towns of Woolwich, Arrowsic and Georgetown, beginning at the Dresden town line and extending in a southerly direction over the state aid location in the town of Woolwich crossing the state highway and toll bridge into the town of Arrowsic; thence over the state aid location in the town of Arrowsic to the Georgetown town line; thence over the state aid location in the town of Georgetown, ending at Five Islands.
- Art. 10. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the repairs of highways and bridges for the ensuing year.
- Art. 11. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for maintenance of state aid highway during the ensuing year.
- Art. 12. To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen to pay for cutting bushes, to comply

with Section 3, Chapter 145 from any unexpended money in the treasury.

- Art. 13. To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen to sell the south schoolhouse and lot.
- Art. 14. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the repair of the special resolve road.
- Art. 15. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the purpose of graveling unimproved town roads, the money to be taken from any unexpended money in the treasury.
- Art. 16. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for repair of schoolhouse for the ensuing year.
- Art. 17. To see if the town will vote to accept as a town road the special resolve road built in 1928.
- Art. 18. To see if the town will vote to discontinue that part of the town road that the special resolve road was built to take the place of.
- Art. 19. To see if the town will authorize the treasurer, with the approval of the selectmen, to procure the loan of money as many be necessary to for the ensuing year.
- Art. 20. To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen to act as agents for Arrowsic bridge for the ensuing year.

Art. 21. To see if the town will vote to accept the list of jurors, as prepared by the town officers.

Art. 22. To see what salary the town will vote for the collector and treasurer.

Art. 23. To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen to sell part or all of any property it is in possession of during the year.

Art. 24. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for maintenance of third class road during the ensuing year.

The selectmen will be in session at the town hall one-half hour before the time of said meeting for the purpose of correcting the list of voters.

Hereof fail not and make due returns of this warrant with your doings thereon to the town clerk at the time and place of holding said meeting.

IN GENERAL

Our school budget allowed a school year of 33 weeks. The attendance has been about equal to former years. Very few pupils have been demoted which speaks well for the work done in the grades.

Miss Marion Stevens' first year as a teacher produced excellent results. Three pupils, Howard Carlton, Irene Lawrence, and Madeline Snipe passed the high school entrance examination and entered Morse high, in Bath, last September. Arrowsic has the distinction of having the largest percentage of attendance in the high school of any town in Union 48.

Miss Maxine Walker, having been graduated from the Castine Normal School last June, returned to resume her duties as teacher for the fall and winter terms. Her good efficient work is so well known in Arrowsic that comment is unnecessary.

The pupils of the school, under the direction of Miss Marion Stevens, gave an excellent entertainment at the annual Community Day exercises, held in Woolwich last May.

We are pleased to note the addition of The Pictured Knowledge Encyclopedia to the school library. A vote

of appreciation should be extended to the School League for the generous gift.
